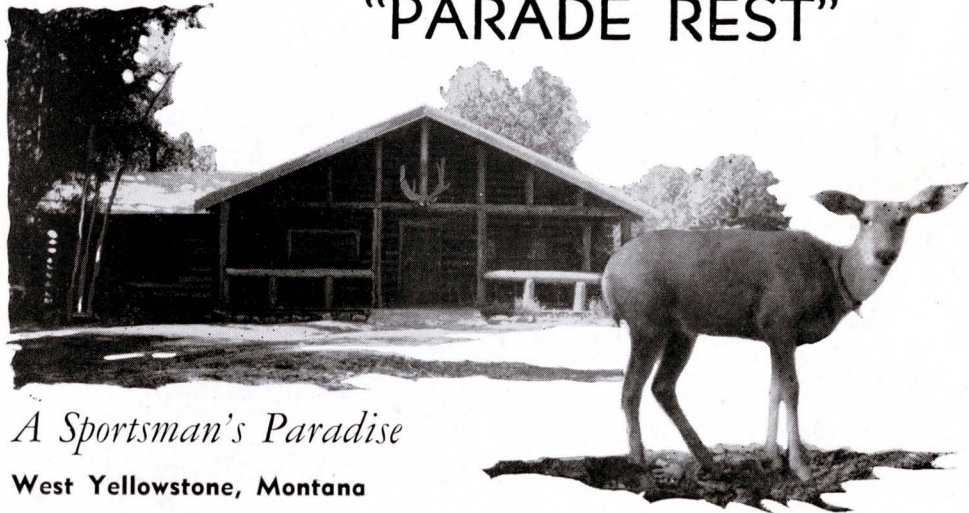

"Each season has its special reason." The latch string is out at Parade Rest from June 1st until the end of December. June, July, August and September are the vacation months for all the general attractions.

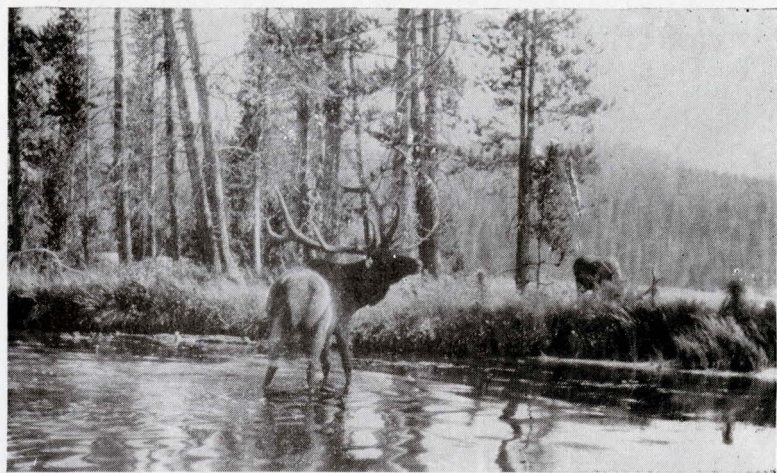
FISHING IS AT ITS BEST through June, July, August and September in all the lakes and streams adjacent to Parade Rest. Wherever fishermen gather, our famed Madison River is referred to as "the finest Trout Stream in the world." Its clear cold waters produce solid scrappy fighters that "never say die." Hebgen Lake, just a mile and a half from the Ranch, is another favorite spot for fishing with fly or trolling for big 'uns.

THE FINEST DUCK SHOOTING in the West is in season during October and November. Mallards, Blue and Green Teal, Pintails, and the wary Canada Geese as well, will assure you of your full bag, and plenty of satisfying sport.

BIG GAME HUNTING is unequalled in this part of the Yellowstone Country. From October through November, the stalker of deer, elk, and bear will find a full measure of adventure and success.

WHERE TO GO . . . WHAT TO DO

PACK TRIPS, week-end or week-long, may be arranged to Hidden and Coffin Lakes, and to wild secluded spots where few white men have ever been . . . and fishing is at its fighting best.

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, at its Western entrance, is but a short distance from Parade Rest. One of the most thrilling trips from the Ranch is to follow the Madison River to its junction, through the fascinating geyser basin, there to watch the most famous geyser of them all—Old Faithful; then on to Majestic Yellowstone Lake and to the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone—spectacular and soul-stirring sight. You can leave the Ranch in the morning for this trip, and yet be back in time for dinner in the evening. Truly, Yellowstone is Parade Rest's frontyard!

HISTORIC VIRGINIA CITY is only a few hours' drive from the Ranch. Here is where the Vigilantes were formed, here is "Boothill Cemetery" where the famous western outlaws lie, and here is the original source of Montana Gold.

A PICTURESQUE ROUTE TO BUTTE from Parade Rest is one that follows the Madison River through its canyon to Ennis, and over the hill to Norris; from there the Bozeman Butte Highway takes you into the city, famed in song and story, that is built on "the richest hill in the world."

LIFE AT PARADE REST

IF YOU WANT ADVENTURE of the breathtaking variety, there are horses to ride over high mountain trails traveled by only a few of the hardest souls. There are lower trails, too, equally enthralling in their peaceful isolation and in the vistas of beauty they reveal.

SWIMMING is an exhilarating experience in nearby Hebgen Lake, and boating is another popular pastime.

LIFE ON THE RANCH, wherever you go and whatever you do, is simple, satisfying, and of course, completely informal . . . just substantial old Western hospitality. The rooms are large, the beds exceptionally comfortable, and the meals abundant and excellent. You will need only sports clothes, and you will be wise to bring along your woolies for the crisp mornings and evenings.

PUREST OF DRINKING WATER is brought from Grayling Creek by means of our complete water system. Hot water is *always* available for shower baths the year-round.

YOU will have all the joys of roughing it at Parade Rest, and none of the inconveniences. The interior of the Lodge, with its peeled and polished log walls, and its cheery Navajo rugs and deep comfortable chairs presents an hospitable atmosphere of solid masculine comfort, which feminine guests will also appreciate. Parade Rest is different—a real sportsman's vacation.

GENERAL INFORMATION

HOW TO GET TO PARADE REST . . . Come by Union Pacific, either railroad or bus, or by Western Air Express, to the village of West Yellowstone at the Western Entrance of Yellowstone Park. Let us know in advance the time of your arrival, and we will meet you at West Yellowstone, and motor you through this glorious country to Parade Rest.

IF YOU ARE DRIVING . . . the map on the back of this folder will help you to locate Parade Rest in its relation to Yellowstone Park and nearby towns. (Adjacent lakes, rivers, and routes are also identified on the map.)

RATES . . . from \$50.00 to \$65.00 per week, depending on the number in your party and the length of your stay. These rates cover lodging, meals, boats, horses, and transportation to and from the Ranch to train or plane in West Yellowstone. The same rates apply to children. Laundry and special trips extra. Guide service extra. Pack trips and hunting trip prices on request.

OUR ACCOMMODATIONS ARE LIMITED . . . to twelve guests at a time, so your reservations *should be made well in advance.*

Non-Resident fishing license, \$2.50, 10 days; \$5.00 season. Duck, \$10.00. Big Game—Deer, Elk and Bear, \$30.00.

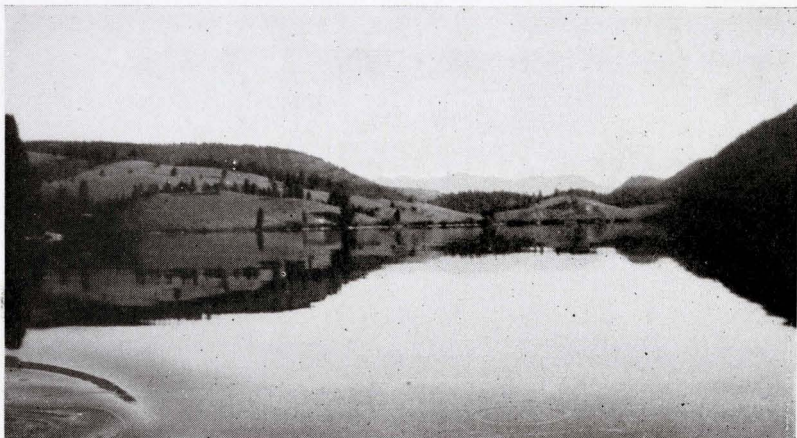

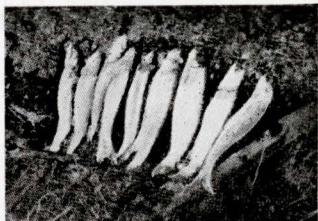

HIGH UP in the Rockies—6,666 feet above sea level— is Parade Rest Ranch, just ten miles from the old frontier town of West Yellowstone, Montana. In a grove of cottonwoods

The true angling and hunting enthusiast will find Parade Rest a thoroughly congenial vacation choice. Other activities are horseback riding over game-trodden trails; elk, deer, bear, and smaller game may be seen at close range. Varied short rides, pack trips, swimming, boating, and hiking make each day a full one.

GUESTS who want a vacation, not entirely for fishing or hunting but for health and rest, will also find in Parade Rest a delightful setting with an invigorating climate. The hottest summer days are mountain-cool, with cooler nights to invite perfect sleep. In the main lodge the roaring log fire in the stone fireplace gives a warm and welcome greeting to those returning from a day's fishing.
