

# MSU found answer to bison problem: let them roam around campus

Montana State students will soon be bumping into some new neighbors on campus. MSU has agreed to accept all buffalo that migrate from Yellowstone National Park.

Initially, Brick Breeden Fieldhouse will be demolished to make room for the animals. Approximately 100 buffalo are already on the campus.

Football coach Hi Cliffsel was asked about the buffalo being close to his football team dur-ing practice. "They will have to be vaccinated of course," Cliffsel said. "Also, they are big, ugly prehistoric animals that only want to eat, sleep, fight and reproduce, but I think the buffalo can get used to them."

Governor Marc Raicot stressed that the decision to stock the campus with buffalo was very carefully researched.

"As you know, last year when we traded three sororities and a fraternity to Ted Turner in exchange for his flounder fishing rights in Sidney, Montana, there was a perception by some that

that was not in the best interest of the university," Raicot said. "Those critics obviously chose to overlook the fact that in just one year Turner has produced some genetically superior stock from those sororities. However, we wanted to prevent similar contro-

University administrator Stan Alone said the university applied the same reasoning used to decide how many parking lots are necessary for the school. "We found we could support 6500 buffalo on about twelve square feet," he said. "As a double check, we used the formula that we use to apportion computers. The original figures were conservative.'

Congressman Max Baucas, instrumental in procuring the \$7 billion federal grant for the buffalo program, said he is enthusiastic about the program. "However, I am writing legislation that will require a five-day waiting period prior to the purchase of a buffalo chip," he said. "Also, no one will be allowed to possess a backpack capable of holding more

"I am confident the buffalo program will succeed," Hibert said. Administrator Alone said there is absolutely no danger to students from the buffalo. "There have been absolutely no buffalo attacks on students," he said. Furthermore, none of the injuries have been serious.

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
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



### Linguistic Society declares Officialium an emerging dialect of the English language

### Food service battles fat with forks

A survey conducted among Montana State students showed an overall decrease in body strength despite attempts to get people in shape.

"What we've got is a bunch of brainy weaklings," said Chuck Lindemenn, director of student athletics. "The survey shows what used to be a beef-eating, barbecuing, weight-lifting community has turned into an organic parsleygrowing, forest -eating, poemreading lot of pansies.'

Despite food service attempts to inform the average eater about fat, calories and how to keep the extra pounds off, students have continued to gain weight, said Lew Hill, director of University Food Service.

"First we tried to hike our prices up so students could only eat a bagel a day, possibly with a tiny, overpriced package of cream cheese, and that would hold them off from snacking until they got home," Hill said. "That's when we went for more drastic measures."

In coordination with Montana Steel Works, Hill and Director of Student Health Jim Mitchell recalled all silverware from the three dining halls for "modifica-

The new silverware will have an additional 10 pounds attached to the handles in the form of attractive animal shapes made entirely of steel. The engineers at Montana Steel hope to meet the demands of combining forks and other silverware with dumbbelllike art, said Bob Lashaway, director of facility services.

"At first we just wanted to attach some odd pieces of machinery we have lying around that nobody uses any more," Lashaway said. "But then the health department cracked down on sanitation problems. The pieces were fine; it was the kitchens that needed some work.'

Lashaway said he was disappointed to see that his "odds and ends" were going to be junked for the steel figurines.

But the reactions to the new weighted silverware have some students complaining.

We can't even put our normal plate of fried burgers, tater tot casserole and scones on the same plate as the fork," said Holly Orifice, a distraught sophomore. "I can't even hold the tray up.

"Exactly," Hill said. "This is what it is supposed to do. For your \$5 a meal that you pay, not only will you feel better since you are eating less, but will also get an upper body workout every time to lift your fork.

Hill said the food service hopes to secure higher profits off meals, as long as freshmen are required to buy meal plans at inflated prices and are not allowed to sell them off with the declining meal plan.

It's a small price you pay to have biceps just from eating our food," Hill said. "The weights will just help them come faster.'

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




MSU is the only college to offer midget wrestling but Lindaman said he believed MSU will start the spark to light the fire.






