

Members present: Paul Collier; Dr. Charles Nelson; Errol Champion; Jim Eriser; Alan Bowslaugh.

Others present: Dick Oblinger, Stan Lloyd, and Jack Hemingway.

The meeting was opened at 8:30 by President, Paul Collier. A quorum was present.

Paul noted the biggest responsibility for this meeting was to choose the future leaders of the FFF.

Champion complimented Paul on the packet of information sent ahead of time to each committee member.

Collier reported on the MWC conclave in Mountain Home, Arkansas. It was very successful as well as profitable - about \$1100.00 profit.

He has attended many club meetings as well as the SWC meeting.

Paul read a letter from Mrs. Elwood Hull which included a \$10.00 donation in memory of her husband who was a charter member. She also included a membership for her nephew. It was decided to transfer Mr. Hull's charter membership to the nephew.

MOTION: Eriser moved the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting, August 19th, 1975, be accepted. Seconded by Bowslaugh, and carried.

MOTION: Eriser moved that these clubs be encouraged by the council chairmen and the president to bring their dues up to date. If there is no response, they will be removed from the mailing list without notification. Seconded by Champion and carried.

Secretary's Report:

Chuck Nelson reported that he has been working with a number of groups which are interested in starting new clubs or in affiliating with the FFF. There are several now in the process of becoming members.

He also reported he had finished the lapiz ring awarded to Arnold Gingrich at the National Conclave in August, and had sent it to Arnold. It was presented to him in Manchester, Vermont, and he was very pleased.

There was discussion concerning the inclusion of the two Alaska clubs, the Alaska Fly Fishers and Dame Juliana Berners, in the NWC rather then the Council-at-large.

MOTION: Eriser moved the Alaska Fly Fishers and Dame Juliana Berners be included in the NWC. Seconded by Bowslaugh and carried.

MOTION: Bowslaugh moved the secretary's report be accepted. Seconded by Champion and carried.

Treasurer's Report:

Alan Bowslaugh presented the following report:

MOTION: Eriser moved that the treasurer's report be accepted, with expenses to be discussed as each item comes up. Seconded by Champion and carried.

Membership:

Champion suggested that clubs are a good source of new associate memberships, and that each club could send "Dear Paul" letters to their memberships. Dick Oblinger spoke as chairman of the SWC, and said he intends to visit each club and will push FFF membership.

The mailing list for the membership drive was questioned, and it was suggested another list might be used to better advantage.

Will Godfrey mailed a questionaire to a random sampling of FFF members, through the Boise State University, to find out just what sort of people are members, and what their interests are. He got a 54% response, and the results are ready for the computer. This mailing brought up the question of whether or not the FFF mailing list should be available to FFF officers for Federation projects.

MOTION: DEFiser moved the FFFF mailing list be made available to officers for Federation projects at the discretion of the Executive Committee. Seconded by Bowslaugh and carried.

In the current membership drive, approximately 748 new associate members have been added to the membership. Eriser commended the membership office for a good report.

Discussion ensued concerning getting adds in various magazines. Amato has been contacted.

A letter was read from Martin DeFore, an associate member. Mr. DeFore is retired, and inquired about the possibility of a reduced membership rate for senior citizens. Following discussion, it was decided that expenses are too great, and the membership fee too low, to allow for this special catagory.

MOTION: Champion moved there be no special catagory for senior citizens. Seconded by Bowslaugh and carried. Life Membership It was suggested that the life membership money be put into a preferred savings account at approximately 6% to generate continuing income. It was also suggested that now the life membership is established. it should be promoted. Life membership jewelry is a possibility. A life membership certificate was discussed. Nelson presented a sample of a certificate which he had prepared and had printed. MOTION: Eriser moved the certificate as presented, with a few minor changes, be accepted, to be presented to Life Members, Contributing Members, Clubs, and Sustaining Members. The wording will be changed for each catagory. Seconded by Champion and carried. Nelson will further develop the certificate for final use. There have been requests by charter members to retain their original numbers in becoming life members. Paul suggested the original number be retained plus the new life membership number. Example: Charter Member #395L6. Paul will check into having a Life Membership card made up. MOTION: Eriser moved life membership money be invested for income. Seconded by Champion and carried. Fund Raising Champion presented a project for council fund raising to increase conservation funds. Through the efforts of Ted Rogowski, Charles DeFeo has agreed to make his painting, "September Salmon", available to the FFF for printing a limited number of prints. These would be autographed and sold to FFF members at \$50.00 each. Input was read from Gardner Grant concerning a similar project in the East which might provide competition. Considerable discussion followed, including the possibility of using the profit toward the purchase of the Silver Creek property. (Silver Creek discussion later in meeting.) Several felt the money could not be tied down to one project, but would need to be distributed to all councils. MOTION: Eriser moved that the project be shelved for the time being. Seconded by Champion and carried. The president expressed disappointment in the outcome, and hopes it will be brought up again at the next Executive Committee meeting.

Vibert Box

Eriser presented the new Whitlock-Vibert Box, and demonstrated its function. There are already a number in the field, but no results have been obtained as yet. All orders should be placed through Bob Cunningham.

Jim has been in contact with Callaghan concerning the patent on the box, and steps are being taken to secure it.

Miller High Life & Phillip Morris Company has been approached to sponsor all costs of the box. Their name would appear on the box along with Whitlock-Vibert and Federation of Fly Fishermen. Also approached was Atlantic Richfield Company in Dallas, Texas. If neither of these works out, there are several other possibilities. All agree that the box has created great excitement.

Price of Boxes

The original idea was to sell the boxes at cost. However, Whitlock and Cunningham feel the price of the boxes should contribute toward further research and development. The actual cost is 32ϕ per box, plus mailing, plus royalty to Dr. Vibert. This brings the total cost to approximately 50ϕ each.

MOTION: Champion moved the Whitlock-Vibert Boxes be sold for \$1.00 apiece, with the profit to be used for further research and development of the Box as directed by the Executive Committee. Seconded by Nelson and carried.

MOTION: Bowslaugh moved a large vote of thanks be extended to Jim Eriser for his work on the production of the Vibert Box. Seconded by Champion and carried.

MOTION: Champion moved we thank Bob Cunningham for his work in the distribution of the Vibert Box, and for keeping records of its use in the field. Seconded by Eriser and carried.

MOTION: Champion moved a vote of thanks to Dave Whitlock for the tremendous amount of work he has put into the research and development of the new Vibert Box. Seconded by Bowslaugh and carried.

Paul stated that the Vibert Box is one of the biggest projects ever undertaken by the FFF, and these three men deserve a great deal of appreciation from all Federators.

Jim feels the manual covering the use of the V.B. must be made available as soon as possible, followed by a new slide show.

MOTION: Eriser moved the instruction booklet be made THE high priority item, followed by a new slide show. Seconded by Bowslaugh and carried.

Executive Secretary

There was agreement as to the immediate need to hire a "supervisor" to carry on the day to day responsibilities of the FFF office, and to assist the officers, and carry on a continuity of operation from year to year.

Bowslaugh informed the committee that, at the moment, he cannot see the necessary funds in the budget for the salery commanded by an executive secretary. However, he gave the need for one top priority.

Paul suggested that perhaps the funds now being used for council funding should be allocated to pay an executive secretary next year.

Eriser suggested that the executive secretary position would need to be a part time position at the start, and he proposed that Collier could step into that position when his term as president is finished.

Champion spoke to the support of professional management, but felt that definite guidelines should be set up, and the latitude of the job should be carefully defined.

Jim asked for a thorough analysis of the budget to determine how much can be skimmed off for a salary for a part time executive secretary.

MOTION: Bowslaugh moved the Federation should have a business manager, at least on a part-time basis, to give direction to the FFF, by the August 24th Executive Committee meeting. Seconded by Nelson and carried.

Dues

Champion recommended an increase in dues. Discussion followed. It was agreed the need is there.

MOTION: Bowslaugh moved a recommendation be made to the Board of Directors that associate membership dues be increased to \$15.00 per year. Seconded by Champion and carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:30 P.M.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

Sunday, Dec. 7, 1975

Committee Members Present: Collier, Champion, Nelson, Eriser

Others Present: Lloyd

Meeting convened at 8:05 A.M.

Collier reported a phone conversation with Will Godfrey, who was unable to attend due to the airlines strike. On his questionaire, many exciting ideas are upcoming. One result will be to indicate where new membership can be cultivated. He felt the American Medical Association should be considered as a possible target. He also reported the formation of a new club in Pleasant Valley, and said others are in the process of being formed.

Silver Creek

Jack Hemingway told of a piece of property (479.1 acres) called Janss Property on Silver Creek in Idaho, which is for sale. The assessed value is \$480,000.00. The asking price is \$500,000.00. The Nature Conservance wishes to buy the property, and needs donations to cover the \$20,000.00 difference, as they cannot offer more than the assessed value. The Conservancy would then turn the property over to the Idaho Fish and Game Department for fly fishing only, and possibly a stretch of the stream would be reserved for the Federation.

The feeling of Hemingway is that the FFF should get involved with the project, and have the opportunity, as individuals and clubs, to participate in its support.

Godfrey feels there are many things involved, and that all parties need to get together for a thorough planning session.

mail info. to clubs, help solicit funds, & MOTION: Eriser moved the FFF/accept monies to be donated to the Janss Property project of Silver Creek through the Nature Conservancy. Seconded by Nelson and carried.

Councils

The NWC, the MWC, and the NC nav quested eneir allotted conservation funds. The last amount is \$2,208.14.

MWC: Arkar as is planting Jr. Vibert Boxes.

NWC: Champion reported several conservation programs under consideration. He feels the Council will need 300-500 Vibert Boxes.

The Council plans to furnish boxes to all clubs and members of the Council. Therefore, all requests should go through Rod McDonald, Conservation Chairman. Everything to do with Vibert Box orders and research should be done done through Bob Cunningham, and heshould be thoroughly informed. Council Chairmen should also keep in touch. The Fish and Wildlife, Dept. of the Interior, is very excited about the box.

Council Activity

Eastern: Lou Rossi reports having some difficulty getting people together. To encourage participation, travel expenses and lunch will be taken care of at the January Council meeting. He plans to start a strong drive for FFF associate members.

George Haak is the new Eastern Council secretary.

The Eastern Council's main conservation effort was to get a reasonable flow of water in the Delaware. It promises to be a successful effort, and Jim will contact Phil Chase for a final report.

RMC: In a letter commenting on the National Conclave, it was told how the RMC divided at that time into Eastern and Western sections. The Eastern section includes Wyoming, Colorado, and New Mexico with Lynn Simonson as Sub Regional Chairman. The Western section included Montana, Idaho, and Utah with Mike Wolverton as Sub Regional Chairman.

Goals set for the coming year include:

- 1. Increase associate membership 50% within the affiliated clubs.
- 2. Affiliate 10 new clubs in the Council.

3. Increase conservation activity.

NWC: Errol announced the appointment of Wayne Daley as President, and Neil Farler as Secretary-Treasurer of the Washington Council of the FFF.

Conclave: Theme - Where Do We Go from Here? Workshops were conducted of 5 subjects:

How to organize and operate a successful flyfishing club.
 How to acheive desired changes in rules, regulations, and statutes.

3. How to create and maintain quality fishing.

4. How to create and maintain an effective working relation among regional clubs and with the regional council.

5. State Wildlife Coalition - An idea whose time has come? The iled booklet will be available for all clubs.

There is a strong probability that an amendment will be proposed at the next Council meeting that the best of the 3 Directors elected from each Council who cannot be respectively. It is some 3 Directors.

MOTION: Eriser moved that Champion, as c. iman, is authorized by the Executive Committee, to assure each cil that their be upon the final ballot. Seconded by Champion and carried.

3. Errol feels there is a lack of trust or understanding within the NWC, of the Executive Committee. He suggested the Executive Committee minutes be distributed for better spread of information. He also feels there should be a packet for new clubs containing the FFF Constitution, a certificate of membership, brochures, etc. MOTION: Eriser moved the minutes of the Executive Committee meetings be available to Council Chairmen for use within their Councils upon request. Seconded by Nelson and carried. MOTION: Eriser moved an informative packet be developed by Nelson for new clubs, to be presented at the next Executive Committee meeting for approval. Seconded by Champion and carried. Council Chairmen Meeting Champion and Gilwee are Co-chairmen of this project, and have been in correspondence with one another concerning possible dates and agenda for the meeting. They would like to meet in conjunction with the next Executive Committee meeting. They agree they would like the President's input ahead of the meeting. MOTION: Eriser moved that there will be a Council Chairmen meeting Friday, and Executive Committee meeting Saturday, with Sunday held open, the weekend of February 13, 14, and 15. Transportation and housing will be covered by the FFF. Seconded by Nelson and carried. Nominations The nominating committee will be composed of Council Chairmen: Jim Gilwee - NCC, Dick Oblinger - SCC, Will Godfrey - RMC, Lynn Simonson - ERMC, Mike Wolverton - WRMC, Bob Cunningham - MWC, Lou Rossi - EC. MOTION: Eriser moved Errol Champion be appointed as Chairman of the Nominating Committee, 1976-77. Seconded by Nelson and carried. Champion feels the necessity of getting the slate of officers, directors, etc. sent to the delegates at least 4 weeks prior to the National Conclave. Public Relations The need for a professional leader, plus a representative from each Council and sub Council was discussed. Following discussion, it was agreed that Champion would discuss this need with Ted Rogowski, and Paul would check with Dick Oblinger for recommendations of persons to be considered for this position. Conservation A letter was received by Ray Fisher from Diane Lee Lewis, Trinity High School Conservation Class, Weaverville, California. This class has conducted a carcass count in the spawning areas of the Trinity River from Lewiston to Helena. She asked Fisher's help, and in response, he sent a number of letters to Congressmen and Senators. He commended the class on its well-organized efforts.

A letter was read from Bob Baiocchi stating the Northern California Fly Fishers are fighting to have Deer Creek Canyon area set aside as a Wild and Scenic River. Collier offered the support of the FFF. Action Bulletin A questionaire to find out whether or not the Action Bulletin was useful to clubs, was due to be sent to the clubs. Father Ryan is willing to continue putting it out, but has difficulty getting input. Collier suggested dropping it, or making it a more valuable publication, including some "How to" articles as well as FFF news. Discussion followed. MOTION: Eriser moved the production of the Action Bulletin be suspended with the option to bring it back brought to the attention of the delegates at the National Conclave. Seconded by Champion and carried. Bulletin Mailing dates are set, but sometimes difficult to make. Last issue - 7,000 copies. Total cost \$1,241.02. Costs are continually increasing. NOTION: Eriser moved the budget be increased to \$1,400.00 for the remaining issues of the Bulletin. Seconded by Champion and carried. Mailing house problems were discussed. Eventually a change will have to be made. Appreciation was expressed to Stan Lloyd and John McKim for a fine job on the Bulletin. Flyfisher Magazine Collier read several letters of appreciation for the Flyfisher magazine and Bulletin from across the country. Net profit from advertizing in the last 4 copies: Approx. \$4,000.00 Steve Raymond was most upset by the lateness of the last issue. A letter was read from Steve urging a change to a more reliable printer. He submitted several proposals for making the change. Considerable discussion followed. MOTION: Errol moved we endorse Option 1: "Continue black-andwhite format, but switch to Metropolitan Press of Portland, Ore. Cost: \$4,700 per issue. All other costs remain the same. Total for four issues: \$29,700.", effective with the next issue if possible. Seconded by Eriser and carried unanimously. · MOTION: Errol Champion moved that the Executive Committee wants enough input from Steve Raymond by the next E.C. Meeting so that a contract can be signed at that time. Seconded by Nelson and carried.

It was decided a committee consisting of Paul, Jim, and Errol will check with the Canadian center on the utilization of films before making any decision about removal of the center.

Paul threw out the possibility of eventually having only one audio-visual center to service the entire country.

The need was expressed to have one extra copy of each film so that it may be used for repairing and refurbishing other copies.

New Films:

Fenwick - Casting with Jimmy Greene, \$250.00 per copy Eriser recommends purchasing two copies; one for the east and one for the west.

Ivan Arnold - Fly Tying

FFF for the cost of reproduction; \$800.00 - \$1,000.00.

It was decided the cost was too great at this time, and

MOTION: Eriser moved two copies of Fenwick's film, Casting with Jimmy Greene, be purchased for \$500.00 plus tax. Champion seconded and the motion was carried.

MOTION: Eriser moved he have approval for costs for heads and tails for all films now available, not to exceed \$200.00. Seconded by Nelson and carried.

Discussion ensued concerning the wording of the heads and tails. The decision was made for Jim to contact Roderick Haig-Brown for the wording and possible audio.


Conclave Monies



CALIFORNIA GOLDEN TROUT (Salmo roosevelti)



There have been times, while prowling the bank of a clear, rushing stream working toward that magic moment when fly and fish become one — when the air was sweet and a wisp of a breeze buffered the rays of the sun — that you were so happy with life you wished you could share the moment with a loved one, a friend . . . even the whole world.

This is a feeling that has captured every member of the Federation of Fly Fishermen. While you are here this exhilaration — compounded by fellowship, freedom and fly fishing — can come again and again. But what happens after you are gone? You know the FFF is dedicated to the preservation and enhancement of fly fishing throughout the world. You subscribe to this philosophy, which is why you are a member. Shouldn't you, then, take steps to see that this philosophy is propagated for future generations?

"Our Helping Hand . . . "

To finance our projects we have had to use current income originally intended for the day to day operations of the Federation, such as the Flyfisher magazine, the News Bulletin and the special quarterly news letter. There are other expenses connected with our far flung activities in other lands. There have been numerous calls on us for financial help. Funds, too, are needed to save our favorite streams from dams, channelization and the inroads of those who would destroy our watersheds.

To keep our waters clean and bright we gave what we could. It is not enough. We need your help.

"Your Helping Hand..."

There are ways you can help the FFF continue its program for "Cleaner Waters — Brighter Streams" that will give your life added meaning while creating a living memorial after you are gone.

The easiest and most common gift is the Annual Payment — usually made by check — which is recorded by your bank and is evidence of a tax-free donation. The amount of the payment is up to you.

Another easy way of making a bequest is by including the Federation of Fly Fishermen in your will.

Bequests by will may consist of cash, or the cash value from securities, or real or personal property. Outright gifts made by will to FFF are entirely exempt from federal estate taxes and are exempt from inheritance taxes in most states. If the gift is not outright your estate will nevertheless obtain a deduction equal to the value of the interest given to the FFF.

In addition, no capital gains tax is paid if stocks, bonds and other property that has appreciated in value is given to the Federation and later sold by the FFF.

Do You Have A Will? Is It Up To Date?

The New Tax Reform Act of 1969 contains many provisions that could have important effects on your estate, both to your family and to your favorite charities.

Gifts under wills serve a variety of purposes. A bequest to an organization like the FFF can accomplish a number of purposes. It may be a vote of confidence in our programs and objectives. It might support a special project; our overall operation, or, it could serve as a memorial to yourself or a loved one. It would be your "Helping Hand."

Seven out of eight Americans die without making a will — leaving important personal decisions in the hands of the courts. It doesn't have to be that way. With a properly executed will you have the privilege of deciding who will receive your possessions, no matter how large or small your resources may be.

The FFF urges its friends and supporters to consult their attorney immediately for specific information on the new tax changes regarding bequests and deferred gifts.

When you make your new will please remember the Federation in your personal bequests, because an up-to-date will ensures that your assets will be distributed according to your own wishes — not in the manner decided by someone who probably does not even know you.

"What's It All About ...?"

Since 1965 when the Federation was started at the Eugene, Oregon Conclave, the FFF has made substantial progress in the areas of research programs concerning water and insecticide pollution, the ecological aspects of industrialization and the expansion of the sport of fly fishing.

Its goals were then, and are now, to:

Provide cleaner waters

Promote the sport of fly fishing

Protect the fishing environment for generations to come

I find it rather difficult to understand how ten or more individuals living around 40 miles apart, seldom or never meeting, will promote the goals of the FFF. Under these circumstances it would appear to me that we would have about as much voice unorganized as we would informally organized. (Informally--no meetings or the like--just dues or contributions as you suggest) With a national director in our midst in the form of Bud Lilly, it appears that we would have some sort of representation and voice for the area. I assume that Mr. Lilly still is a director. My feeling is that if we are going to organize an affliate of the FFF that we ought to meet regular as possible, outline goals for our area that are in tune with the national goals of the Federation and go like hell to reach those goals. Any organization that is short of that concept would be like the West Yellowstone Trouter, the Montana Chapter of Trout Unlimited -- which both seem to be failing their purposes. Representation from our area in matter of national flyfishing conservation policies is important. However, in my opinion, representation from our area "club" should come from the group and not from one man as it will boil down to if we are not meeting add discussing our problems mutually. My partner, George Wright, and I our 100 percent for the Federation. We want to help promote its goals in our area. But we want to do it in a formal way. Dear Bud;

Good to hear from you especially as I am quite sure you are now right in your busy season. Hope that you aren't so busy that you do get a chance now and then to cast a fly in some of those good waters I read about.

In regard to the Federation fly plaques as I wrote previously I haven't any idea where they are at presently but suggest they may have been on exhibit at the Northwest regional conclave. Perhaps the first step would be to get in touch with who ever is or was in charge there. Communications are in such a sad state I never received any more than a communication such a meeting was being held so can offer lttle information. I do have a report of the business meeting held prior to and I assume at the conclave which very frankly is quite disappointing in certain respects.

Your report to me of the lack of fly fishing clubs in your area suggests the necessity of a planned advertising campaign directed to gaining strength through associate members. The same is applicable here. Maine, Vermont and New Hampshire probably have more fly fishermen, local and tourist, than any other States in the north east. The club approach is impossible and un fortunately the Federation has no administrative organization geared to promotion fitting these circumstances.

Apparently the need for an overall administrative organization was recognized at this last meeting, (formal) but unfortunately the importance was not recognized and no action was taken. In so far as I know the "formal" applies to a paid professional in the administrative end of our business. My concern however is the immediate need for organized action at the grass roots which in turn can only be sponsored by planning at the Director and officer level. This requires in addition financial support.

Another concern is geographic distribution which so far seems to have prevented full Director meetings. Without these I doubt very much if we can make any progress in understanding the other fellow's problems.

Again let me wish you a lot of good fishing and in time lots of progress in the promotion of the Federation. When convenient it will be very good to hear from you again - and don't hesitate to call on me if you think I might be of assistance.

Thank you so much for your catalogue especially as it proved to be the catalyst prodding me to write a letter that should have been written long ago. Our lines of communication between Directors haven't as yet proven very effective and perhaps through this agtter I may be able to appraise you of some of the problems pertinent to New England and ask you in turn what are your regional problems.

I am sure you appreciate that along the whole Atlantic coast we are just one long city which extends from Portland, Me. south through Virginia and inland about fifty miles. In this area put and take fishing is the general rule with here and there a small number of ponds, lakes and streams which produce a few carryovers. Under these conditions of overpopulation fly fishing clubs are in competition with hundreds of others for memberships who are not particularly interested as a body in fly fishing. Rather the average (?) club member bait, spins and fly fishes, target shoots and hunts. As a rule the fly fishing club is a pleasure club. In actual practise most flyfishermen who live in cities look to northern New England and Canada for their week end and vacation fishing.

Strangely, Maine which is the only State that actively supports fly

fishing has no fly fishing clubs.

The Federation, to expand in New England has to compete for membership with an inordinately large number of "rod and gun" clubs; fly fishing clubs are in such a minority they have no sphere of influence; being for the most part pleasure clubs, turning the membership toward active participation in programs that actually require sweat is exceedingly difficult. This last applies to both Conservation programs and believe it or not that which comes under the heading of pleasure,

The situation is so complex I really can't give you a comprehensive description, About all I can say any way a Federation Director turns there

is a problem.

My first step has been to attempt an organization of hard core workers drawn from the various Federation clubs. This I have been working on for many months. I have also been doing my best to get material flowing to THE FLYFISHER. The problem concerning the last is that the professional would rather sell an article of merit and the amateur can't put out any thing first class. I also sponsored a publicity program with the Rhody club who responded beautifully (enclosed) and Alexander and I with our own two little hands set up the Federation fly plaque exhibit. Not much I admit but a beginning. At present we are attempting to get the Fish and Game Dept. of Massachusetts to extend the season a month. Put and take trout are wasted unless caught and removed from the waters.

CENTRAL AVENUE PHOENIX, ARIZONA 85004 November 18, 1969 To the Directors of the Federation of Fly Fishermen Gentlemen: Those of you who were fortunate enough to be present at the Sun Valley Conclave this year remember, no doubt, my admonition that I expected to be in monthly contact with all of the Directors. Obviously, there has been no contact in the month of October and a number, if not all, of you, must wonder why your own Prexy has apparently initiated his administration by speaking with a "forked tongue." Probably the best answer I can give (besides the fact that I have been short on stationery until recently) is in the form of an apocryphal story related to me on a recent flight between Phoenix and Los Angeles: The passengers on a commercial jet flight were just settling back into their seats after having taken off from a major metropolitan area--the Captain came on the intercom and announced that he had two items of news, one good and one bad. He related that the good news was that they had swiftly reached cruising altitude of 35,000 feet and were proceeding ahead of schedule at a ground speed of 675 miles per hour aided by a fortuitous tail wind. The second item, the bad news, said the Captain, was that the navigator had just reported that they were hopelessly lost and he had yet to sight any familiar landmark upon which he could chart a course.

Directors of the Federation -2-November 18, 1969 of Fly Fishermen While I am not at 35,000 feet in Phoenix (closer to 1200 feet above sea level) in some respects I am "hopelessly lost" in trying to pick up the reins of the past four years' administration. While, except for the first get-together in Oregon, I have stayed in reasonably close contact with the Federation as a Director, that is hardly the same thing as having access to the books, records and files of the officers who actually were charged with the burden of performing and did perform the duties of making the ship go. Somehow (and I suppose this is attributable to my shortsightedness as a lawyer) I believed that it was essential to have an orderly transferal of all the accumulated information from prior years in order to take a step forward. Apparently, this is not to be. Gene Anderegg has advised me, and perhaps quite rightly, that it would not be feasible to attempt to provide the President and Secretary in Phoenix with the accumulated information presently residing in the East. I have visited Fresno and Ed Strickland gratiously opened all of his books and records concerning the history of the Federation, which courtesy has indeed been helpful but has not foreclosed my feeling that I am bound to step on one or more toes in my communications to all of you and others interested in the Federation merely because I do not have the detail or knowledge with respect to what has gone before. Well, enough time has elapsed and I feel compelled to do something even if it is wrong. Unfortunately, I do not know which of you have served, or presently think you are serving, on various Federation committees. In fact, I'm not sure just how many committees we have. Rather than pursue that futile line of inquiry further, I have arbitrarily (subject to your approval) established committees other than the financial committees which were established at the first Directors meeting at the termination of the Sun Valley Conclave this year. Copies of my proposed administrative committees in the form of appropriate amendments to our By-Laws are enclosed herewith for your review and comment. Now, I realize

Directors of the Federation of Fly Fishermen -3- November 18, 1969 that an initial letter to those of you who are brand new Directors which, in effect, says "what the hell am I doing?" is not a particularly auspicious beginning. For those of you who already know me, you know that I have given the subject a considerable amount of thought before approaching the matter in this fashion. If any of you can report that you have been serving on a particular committee and that you have been pursuing that committee's activities in some fashion since the Conclave without any direction from the Board or the officers of the Federation, I would like very much to receive a short resume of your activities and an indication as to whether you desire to remain on such committee or committees. For those of you who have no specific assignment from years gone by, I would like to receive on the basis of first three choices which of the committees you would like to serve. It is my hope and intention that each of the designated committees will be staffed and guided by Directors, at least in the committees' formative stage. For those of you who are serving on the Board of the Federation for the first time, I would like to extend my personal welcome and my deepfelt request that you volunteer to do more than merely occupy the capacity of Director during the ensuing year. While summoning sufficient courage to send out this letter, I have done the following: (1) Appointed Gene Anderegg as publisher of the Flyfisher magazine so as to centralize the lines of authority for the magazine which, at least for the time being, appears to be strictly an Eastern activity. (2) Appointed Dr. Jack Miller, 7237 E. Villa Way, Scottsdale, Arizona, as the person in charge of the distribution of the Federation's fly displays. (3) Made arrangements with the Phoenix Art Museum for an extended display of the fly plates to be concluded by a lecture concerning the hidtorical significance of the items

Directors of the Federation of Fly Fishermen -4- November 18, 1969 on display as to which I am hoping that we can make arrangements with Austin Hogan to travel to Phoenix (Austin, you will have at least sixty days' notice and all expenses paid) to give the lecture. Absent Austin, the logical initial choice, I will canvass this side of the continental divide for an appropriate substitute. (4) Initiated a national conservation program, which I will submit to you in detail within the next two weeks, based upon the idea of a stream survey looking towards the classification of fishing waters in the United States into three categories: (a) unredeemable, (b) redeemable, and (c) pristine, or unpolluted. While the bare bones of the idea does not seem terribly appealing or even practical, I ask that you withhold judgment until you receive my more detailed proposal, which was based upon an idea first presented by Herbert Hoover, a President whose economic ideas have not been shared by all but whose avidness as an angler is not subject to dispute. (5) Continued the initial distribution of the "Limit Your Kill patches" to the point where our current supply is exhausted. We are about to order more and will encourage further distribution of what appears to be a rather successful informational program. (6) In furtherance of the sponsorship of the next Conclave, the Northern California Federation Council attempted to obtain the Secretary of the Interior as our main speaker of the Conclave. Individual responses to various of your communications are being prepared for distribution and it is my plan to take a little time off from work after the first of the year and visit (1) those places that seem in need of some special interest being shown, and (2) those places that you may request that an appearance be made for whatever local reasons seem appropriate.

Directors of the Federation of Fly Fishermen -5-November 18, 1969 I would like for all of you to provide some response as to whether you think it would be advisable to expend \$3,000 to \$5,000 in paying for the services of individuals such as Lefty Kreh to do "missionary" work in visiting various angling clubs in the name of the Federation in providing a program on a sporadic basis during the course of the winter. My own inclination, subject to Strick's financial advice to the contrary, is that such monies would be well invested. I am not terribly concerned about any commercial stigma that might attach. While fellows such as Lefty or Jimmy Green are traditionally associated with certain products I think that their general demeanor is such that it would be indeed difficult to construct their entertainment and educational programs as being an endorsement by the Federation of any particular product. The idea of a dues increase is still festering. As you will remember, the Dues Committee is comprised of the following fellows: DAVID E. PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS OF FEDERATION OF FLY FISHERMEN

GENERAL PROVISIONS APPLICABLE TO AND POWERS OF STANDING COMMITTEES; COORDINATION OF COMMITTEE ACTION

A. General Provisions Applicable to Standing Committees.

Unless otherwise expressly provided in the Constitution or by-laws or in the authority creating any committee, the following provisions shall apply to all standing committees:

members and a chairman. Notwithstanding the specification in the by-laws of the number of members for any committee, the President may, with the approval of the Board of Directors and prior to the first annual meeting of each committee, increase or decrease the number of members of a committee in any one year by three, but no committee shall have fewer than fifteen members or more than twenty-seven members, in addition to a chairman. In reducing the number of members of a committee the President may reassign members to different classes but shall not remove from the committee or decrease the term of any member theretofore appointed.

2 Appointment. The President shall appoint the 2. chairman and members of all committees and fill all vacancies. Appointments shall be made by him as soon after his election as practicable and, in the case of newly created committees, as soon as practicable after the committee is created. 3. Tenure. (a) Chairmen of committees shall be appointed for one year. A chairman may not be reappointed after having served as chairman for three consecutive years until one year after the expiration of his third consecutive term as chairman. (b) Except as otherwise provided herein, members of committees shall be appointed for terms of one year. (c) If a committee member is absent in any one year from three meetings of the committee or of a subcommittee of which he is a member, unexcused by the chairman, that fact shall be reported by the chairman in writing to the President and the President may deem the member's place on the committee vacant and appoint a successor. (d) The President may, with the approval of the Board of Directors, remove a committee member or chairman for cause.

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- 4. <u>Committee Year</u>. The committee year shall run from September 1 through August 31, but the members thereof shall continue in office until their respective successors are appointed and have qualified.
- 5. Organization. Each committee shall meet and organize within such time as the President may direct, but in any event not later than December 31, and upon organization shall notify the President and Secretary in writing.
- 6. Procedure at Committee Meetings. Each committee may fix its own time and place of meeting and regulate its procedure, consistent with the Constitution and by-laws, and subject to review by the Federation or the Board of Directors. Each committee shall keep such record of the attendance and proceedings at its meetings as its chairman deems appropriate.
- 7. Financial Statements. Each committee shall transmit to the Treasurer on or before August 1 of each year an estimate, itemized in such detail as the Treasurer may require, of its expenses during the next ensuing fiscal year and an itemized statement of all outstanding liabilities, if any, incurred by such committee. The chairman of any committee may at any time make application to the Treasurer for appropriation of funds for the work of such committee.

5 To consider all such matters and to publish reports, conclusions and recommendations with respect thereto and to take such other action in the name of the Federation as the committee may find advisable. To examine existing and proposed laws, legislation pending before any state or local legislative or administrative body or executive or before the Congress or the President of the United States and in the name of the Federation to publish reports with respect thereto. 3. To advise, consult and cooperate with federal, state and local legislative and administrative bodies, commissions and agencies and, with the approval of the President or Board of Directors, to authorize the committee chairman and members to appear before such governmental agencies to express the views of the Federation. 4. To assist in arranging, in cooperation with the Board of Directors, for lectures, forums and courses of study in promotion and effectuation of the purposes and objectives of the Federation. Coordination of Committee Action. C. Notwithstanding any other provisions of these by-laws, all standing and special committees are subject to the following provisions:

6 Committees shall be subject at all times to such directions as may be given at any meeting of the Federation respecting action taken or proposed to be taken on behalf of the Federation. No committee shall commit the Federation or take action on its behalf in conflict with any action previously taken at a meeting of the Federation until the proposed action is considered and approved at a meeting of the Federation. The Board of Directors may waive the requirements of the foregoing sentence in the event time does not permit or in its judgment the nature of the proposed committee action does not warrant submission to the Federation. 3. Any question arising as to whether a subject is within the jurisdiction of a committee shall be submitted to the President for final decision. 4. If any committee prepares a report or reaches a conclusion in conflict with any report or conclusion of any other committee, whether or not such other report or conclusion has been published or made public, or proposes to take action on behalf of the Federation in conflict with the action taken or proposed to be taken on behalf of the Federation by any other committee, the committees involved, or their chairmen, shall consult with each other in an effort

7 to resolve such conflict, and if such committees, or their chairmen, are unable to do so, the dispute shall be submitted to the President for final decision. The President or the Board of Directors may require any committee to refrain from publishing or disseminating its report or conclusions or from taking any action in the name of the Federation. STANDING COMMITTEES There shall be the following standing committees having jurisdiction as defined by the title of the committee: A committee on the Federation periodical; A committee on promotion, publicity and public relations; A committee on increase of membership; C. A committee on legal procedures and advice; D. E. A committee on finance; A committee on conservation; F. A committee on youth education; G. A committee on the promotion of fly tying; H. A committee on the promotion of fly casting; I. A committee on preparation and dissemination J. of the Federation handbook; A committee on citations and awards; K.

A committee on definitions, tackle specifications and records; A committee on the establishment of a reposi-Μ. tory for preservation of artifacts and documents; A committee on establishing and maintaining a film, book and audio-tape library; A committee on the maintenance and sale of 0. Federation insignia and jewelry; A committee for promotion of a stamp issue for fly-fishing; A committee to coordinate Federation programs with tackle shops. NOMINATING COMMITTEE; INSPECTORS OF ELECTION 1. At the annual meeting, a Nominating Committee of nine shall be elected by ballot by the Federation. Each voting delegate of the Federation shall be permitted to vote for only five members of such committee, to be named on one ballot, and the nine persons having the largest number of votes shall be such committee. The committee so chosen shall nominate candidates for the various offices and memberships in committees to be elected at the ensuing annual meeting and shall provide written notice of such candidates to all members not less than sixty days before the next annual meeting. The committee shall, by its nominations, assure that representation on the Board of Directors is substantially proportionate to membership by geographical area, except for

9 the Senior Director who may be nominated without regard to geographical location. Other nominations may be made by the submission of a list of such nominations, signed by at least twenty-five members, at least ten (10) days preceding the annual meeting. No nominations, not so made, shall be considered or voted upon at the meeting. 2. At the annual meeting there shall be elected by ballot three Inspectors and Canvassers for the ensuing election, two of whom shall constitute a quorum; and, if necessary, at or before the election, the President or presiding officer may fill vacancies. 3. At the annual meeting, the polls for the election shall be opened at the organization of the meeting, and shall remain open for one hour.

Welcome to Livingston!


Excitement in Livingston is growing as plans are being made for Conclave 1988 "The Year of Learning" August 8 - 13. 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
The Pat Lilly Gallery of Angling Art

The Gallery

hen Bud Lilly established the Pat Lilly Gallery of Angling Art in 1983, it seemed at the time a small and elegant project befitting his wife's memory as an avid patron of sporting art and Montana's artists. At the suggestion of Esther Simon, then Executive Director of the FFF, a hallway outside the business offices of the International Fly Fishing Center was converted with carpeting, wall coverings, and track lighting into a gallery space.

The first season's exhibit was a delightful response by over 20 artists from around the United States and Canada. Some works were donated, some were on loan, and some were brought for exhibit and sale. By the next season, however, the Gallery began to take shape as the art museum it was originally intended to be, housing a permanent collection of work having to do with anglers, fishing, and their environment. That summer, the collection received donations of works by award-winning American sporting artists Lee Stroneck and Shirley Cleary, by Sweden's angling pro Gunnar Johnson, by Japanese artists Susumu Uchida and U Morimoto, and arrangements were made to purchase the entire collection of Michael Simon's illustrations for Yellowstone Fishes: A Freshwater Wilderness, an identification guidebook by John Varley and Paul Schullery. With these acquisitions, the potential to make this a truly international gallery and educational facility like no other, became real.

The fact that its works have to be angling-related makes it unique among the country's many sporting art galleries, and shows the fish and its environment to be a universally beloved subject for artists and patrons. Already outgrowing its designated space, the Pat Lilly Gallery is establishing itself as a one-of-a-kind institution, visibly demonstrating the fisherman's deep appreciation and concern for the fragile beauty of nature. Of his brainchild, Bud Lilly says: "I've always felt that flyfishing is an international language that we all speak; the gallery is an expression of that language."



The Artists


Angling art, in its many aspects, has been around for thousands of years: from ancient Egyptians to Pablo Picasso, artists have chosen the fish as a favorite image, sometimes for its mystery, sometimes for its beauty (or grand ugliness, in the case of some), and most recently, for the peculiarly respectful rapport between the creature and its "hunter". Great masters such as Gustave Courbet, Paul Klee, and Winslow Homer have painted fish and fishing, and angling art has been presented to us in an amazing variety of ways from childlike drawings to sophisticated accuracy. Some artists use the fish as a symbol,

perhaps to represent the greater intelligence of nature that is always outwitting us, or perhaps as a personal symbol in the artist's cast of characters. Other artists portray the fish with an eye on the scientific: perfection of detail, anatomical correctness, accurate coloration, proportion, and environmental surroundings. And still others choose to depict the world of the angler, the incredible landscapes and streams, the moodiness of the places into which a fisherman steps. A small sample of the variety of styles and interpretations that the field of angling art brings with it, can be seen in the works of six artists who have exhibited with the Pat Lilly Gallery.

One Gallery artist whose work has been described as capturing the mood of early mornings and evenings on Western trout streams, is Hugh Mossman of Boise, Idaho: "I work almost exclusively in watercolor and because of that, I try to take advantage of the looseness and expressive nature of the medium. Watercolor lends itself to moodiness, and so I try to create a feeling that I think other people experience when they're fishing a stream." A sports-oriented, outdoor artist, Mossman paints angling subjects most often, explaining that "I get a sort of vicarious enjoyment from it. If I can't be fishing, I can enjoy it almost as much by painting." He describes his work as "expressionistic, loose, and free-flowing" renditions of the fisherman's world "with enough realism that an angler can relate to it. I try to combine the two.'

Shirley Cleary, a painter from Helena, Montana, has taken realism a step further and describes her style as "more than realistic. It's not really *photo*realism. When you first see it, it appears to be photographic, but up close you see the prominence of the brushstroke." Her

paintings are bold and striking, usually of anglers in instantly recognizable fishing spots. Cleary says that her favorite places are Nelson's and Armstrong's Spring Creeks in the fall because of the color: "High contrast is very important to my work and I do a lot of water scenes and subjects that allow me to

play with reflections. While I'm not strictly an 'angling artist,' I fish a lot and it's something I like to do. So I feel like I'm getting some work done while I'm playing.' Recently, she became one of 30 women asked to show work in the Wild Wings Gallery's "Women in Wildlife Art" Invitational Exhibit in Lakewood,

Minnesota, and found that she was the only one doing angling art. Cleary says that "the field is new and exciting; it's something that's just beginning to 'take hold.' I think there's a whole new realm of art out there just waiting to be explored."

Lee Stroncek of Bozeman, Montana, is concerned with blending the illusionary aspects of art with a respect for realism: "Accurate portrayal is not foremost in my work, but it is at least equal to the mood of the painting. Accuracy does not mean hard-edged realism, getting down every detail. Something painted as a little more obscure and general will appear more real and accurate to the eye." With a background in wildlife and fisheries biology from the Universities of Montana and Alaska, and the prestigious 1985 California Wild Trout Stamp under his belt, Stroncek is highly aware of the individualities of species and their environments: "At first I relied a lot on underwater slides, but the more you paint, the more you are familiar with what should be there. Underwater you can't tell what the fish looks like: you have to take them out of the water to see their markings. So I have to use my imagination quite a bit, matching up the stream bottom with the species, making the fish

stand out, making its markings obvious. This is where I make use of research and a knowledge of natural history.' He indicates that his current work is not so heavily involved in underwater scenes anymore. Like

Cleary, he has become fascinated with water surfaces, and is now concentrating on "quiet scenes of rivers, streams, and moving water."


Working in the scientific mode is Rene Harrop, who has been recognized for years as an expert flytyer from St. Anthony, Idaho. His drawings and paintings are celebrations of the perfection of nature's creatures, and he says that, as an artist, he is "most interested in correct detail, primarily anatomy. I think this is an extension of my attitude toward flyfishing, and the exactness in my work is a logical progression stemming from the precision of flytying. I'm particularly careful that I am correct, and I consider it one of the greatest compliments I've ever received that Steven L. Jensen, one of the top three experts on aquatic insects in the country and also a scientific illustrator, purchased some of my drawings." Thirty-five years of studious observation of both fish and insects has given Harrop the finely tuned eye that naturally picks up and reproduces minute detail. He states that he has never attempted a subject that he wasn't "intimately involved with", and this thorough knowledge has grown into an equally thorough respect for these subjects: "I see them as beautiful, distinct, and unique creatures. Any time a person specializes in something, it's born of a deep affection. I love fishing and I take it very

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
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
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With completely different concerns are two artists whose works are both highly original and "seriously humorous." Dennis Cunningham of Portland, Oregon and Fran Noel, Professor of Art at Montana State University in Bozeman, are artists who are dedicated to producing work unlike anything anyone has done. Critics at a recent Cunningham show labelled it "Fish and the Cosmos," and the artist describes his linoleum block cuts as "idiosyncratic and representational, but not realistic." He considers himself an angling artist, but not in the usual sense: "I fish quite a lot and finally decided that here was something I knew which offered me a lot of latitude in being able to represent a whole range of ideas. Although my work is about fishing, the meaning is often much broader; it's kind of a home base that I work from. The sport is a terrific allegory for so many things. For instance, in 'Baited Breath,' it's allegorical in the sense that people who are intimately involved with something tend to speak in their own languages: Fishermen TALK FISHING. There's a kind of a pun on the 'you are what you eat' idea in there, too. I'm interested in more than just the usual. If I can open the door to the viewer a little bit by being funny, then perhaps some of the more serious aspects of art, like beauty of line, composition, or application of the technique, will come through. My prints are not just funny; I'm always

serious when I choose a subject. I just finished a piece where a fisherman is in a stream with an angel coming out of the sky handing a fish to him - it's not a 'haha' kind of joke, it's a serious joke. I think that humor is a door through which people can enter the work and get more meaning from it.'

Fran Noel, however, uses fish in his art without any concrete reference to flyfishing, although he has been an avid angler for 40 years. "There are two kinds of artists," he explains. "One wants to paint what he sees out of a reverence for it. The other is concerned primarily with creating, with doing something unlike anything he's ever seen. I know of many artists from the Western region who are using fish imagery, but maintaining a creative stance, people like Bill Allen and David Wharton. Maybe something is 'angling art' only because the piece has a fish in it, as in one of Wharton's prints showing a steelhead under water. The print is not just about the fish, it's about how hard it is to see that fish in the water, and about the reflections on the surface of the water. The best example is Winslow Homer, who was one of the greatest watercolor painters in history. He did many pieces about fish and fishing, but it was the painting that was great, not the subject." Noel says his etchings, lithographs, and watercolors that contain fish are "pure whimsy." I've used lots of other creatures as well,

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
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like snakes and coyotes, especially coyotes. I prefer to use fish in a incongruous way, as water creatures seen out of water. You know, it makes you stop and say, 'Hey, what's that fish doing walking around?' My work is fairly far removed from the usual wildlife art in the etching, 'Coyote Fish Bait,' the fish ends up eating the covote, so it becomes an element that piques curiosity and interest. Sometimes I use the fish as a symbol: I did a piece called 'Trophies' where the fish were much larger than the fisherman. Sort of an 'Old Man and the Sea' situation, where the man was literally overwhelmed. And for a long time I used a creature that was half-fish, halfwoman that was a symbol for something scary or powerful, something you might be afraid of. I think it's extremely important to expand people's perceptions of what angling art can be.'

The Future

Noel's sentiments are largely shared by both enthusiastic artists and art appreciators. Paul Schullery, past Executive Director of the American Museum of Fly Fishing, points out that such a specialized

gallery is "territory that so far no one else has hit on. It is a very special thing, an exclusive concept that really belongs to the idea of an educational facility." Rene Harrop says that "in the last five years, there has been a great deal more appreciation for angling art. I think this gallery is one of the most exciting ideas to come along in years."

Another top priority is the acquisition of works by international artists. The Gallery was highly honored by the gift of two watercolors from the Japan Flyfishers. The paintings are of the two species of trout, amago and yamame, indigenous to the islands of Japan. "Amago" artist, Sumumu Uchida,

says that he began flyfishing 11 years ago at Hokkaido, and thus began his love of angling art. A commercial artist. Uchida says "My business at first was only related to advertising, but now the chances to draw fish have increased. This for me is very delightful. I would like to continue fish illustrations as the center of my

Owner of a Tokyo design studio, "Yamame" artist, U Morimoto has quite a different view of angling art in Japan: "In the illustration world, fish are a minor subject. Moreover, 'turn-away-from-fish' phenomenon spreads in Japan. Fishes and vegetables used to be the main foods at the Japanese dining table, but it is not so anymore. Housewives say that fish eyes make them scared. Young people eat hamburgers rather than bony fishes. I try not to be pessimistic, but the days that I can draw beautiful trout, or the gracefulness of a yamame rising up to a dry fly will not come soon in the near future." Because of this, Morimoto is very pleased to find a gallery where his art is so highly valued. He becomes very attached to his paintings, however, and was a little sad to "release it as far as Yellowstone, yet I also feel good that my work travels to the U.S."

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
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
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

A third international artist, Gunnar Johnson, donated one of his lithographs of a Kingfisher to the Gallery last summer. Editor of the Swedish flyfishing journal, Flugfiske i Norden (Flyfishing in the North), Johnson is a well-known fishing expert, author and artist throughout the Scandinavian countries.

There are still many other countries including Argentina, Chile, England, Scotland, Germany, Norway, and New Zealand whose artists need to be contacted about this project. Funding for the purchase of international works is a goal which the Gallery is working hard to attain. And, as its scope and collections broaden, such improvements as more gallery space with proper lighting and wall covering, and adequate security, are needed. Paul Schullery points out: "The Federation and the International Fly Fishing Center have developed something very important in the Pat Lilly Gallery. In a very short time the Gallery has become a significant presence in sporting art, and that reflects well on the parent organization. Because of the high visibility available at the Center, the Gallery provides artists and flyfishermen an extraordinary opportunity to present

their messages to the world. I can't imagine a higher goal for the Center, or one more likely to enrich the world of flyfishing, than to assure the continuation and growth of the Pat Lilly Gallery. Established in honor of an exceptional, unique person, the Gallery has shown that it has those very same qualities in its own character.''

When Bud Lilly originally had the idea to start a gallery in honor of his wife Pat, Bud and I talked about it in West Yellowstone. I endorsed his idea and jumped on the bandwagon to assist him in coordinating the venture. As I returned home that summer, Pam Lanza and I had several conversations and started the wagon rolling. Pam is very much up to date

on wildlife art and was in charge of the art gallery in Bud Lilly's shop in West Yellowstone. She has very good taste in selecting proper artwork and from a professional point of view is well qualified. On my return to West Yellowstone the following year, I visited the Pat Lilly Gallery. At that time I made available some of my own artwork for a starter on a loan basis. Without questions, Pam's involvement proved to be very instrumental and in a short period of time she had a very professional exhibit at the International Fly Fishing Center. Many of my friends from the Bay Area visited the Center over the past couple of years and had nothing but excellent comments about the venture. Should you be talking to Pam Lanza, please give her my best regards as I think she is a very enterprising young lady with a great knowledge of wildlife art.

Take care, Molly Dear Council Presidents, My last letter, written in December of 2007, was addressed to the BOD, the Executive Committee and Council Presidents. In that letter, I addressed concerns about: the move to Loveland, the Museum and Discovery Center, Membership, Annual Financial Reports and Conclave.

Ten months later, very little has happened to instill confidence in me that the FFF leadership is heading in a constructive direction. In

regards to the move to Loveland, I have read that a committee (some board members, some not) has been formed to address the many questions that must be addressed in order to make a wise decision about the possible move. This is good; however, other concerns of mine far outweigh moving to Loveland, the Museum and the Discovery Center.

These other concerns have to do with the proper management of finances, fundraising, membership and staff of FFF. In preparing for my letter in December, I looked over the finance reports available to me from 2003-2007. Each year, the financial condition of the FFF worsened. Our current financial state is one of crisis. The FFF Board of Directors has a fiduciary responsibility to its members. The board must take action quickly.

Current leadership has not proven to be effective in reducing expenses, raising funds, managing current funds, raising membership with the intent of raising funds via the membership, and lastly taking care of the staff. Staff morale is at an all time low. I would think it would be difficult to work under the current status of the FFF.

My recommendation as a life member of the FFF is to change the current leadership. More directly, I feel the CEO position needs to be eliminated at this time. The CEO has not been effective. Pete Van Gytenbeek has not raised enough money to cover his salary and expenses and his salary is expensive-FFF cannot afford the cost of

the CEO on either count. The Board must play a more active role in the organization in order to sort out the current situation and make recommendations for the future of the FFF (generally through a one, three, and five year plan). One possibility is for the BOD to run the FFF through a committee structure. Once the finances are under control, the possibility of an office manager might be considered. The FFF must learn to live within its means. This can be done with a clear strategic plan. Changing the leadership will not be easy; however, it cannot stay the same. More of the same will not work!

I am asking you all to educate yourself on the current situation of our club. Write to our board members and express any concerns you may have. This is a time that requires our active participation. This is our club and we have the responsibility to stay informed.





FEDERATION OF FLY FISHERS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING STATE COLLEGE, PENNSYLVANIA Minutes July 28, 1986 The meeting was called to order by President Beatty in Room 67, Willard Building, State College, Pennsylvania, at 9:10 AM. Members present were: Danny Beatty, Mary Black, L. D. Goodrich, J. D. Hosfield and E. A. Pettine. Also attending were Carrie Christiansen, FFF Office Manager, D. J. Halblom, D. Mosley and Sarge Reynolds. MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as written. THE FLYFISHER Pettine stated he and Bitton had agreed in February, 1986 on a cost of \$66,000, but have not reached agreement on a contract. Need businesslike contract including handling of extraneous costs and distribution on excess copies. AUDIO-VISUAL Pettine ordered four each VHS tapes "Alaska, Once in a Lifetime" and "Babine Steelhead". These will be distributed among the AV centers and exchanged to complete general availability. **MEMBERSHIP** Hosfield reported results of the mail solicitation (9963 pieces) with 181 responses in 5 weeks. Need a total of 214 Associate Memberships to recover costs. Responses continue at 4 to 5 per week. Suggests another mailing if this one recovers production and mailing costs. Present annual cost of THE FLYFISHER is \$8.15 per member. MOTION BY PETTINE, SECOND BY GOODRICH, THAT THE MAILING BE MADE IF DIRECT COSTS OF CURRENT MAILING IS RECOVERED. MOTION CARRIED. MOTION BY PETTINE, SECOND BY HOSFIELD, THAT EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE RECOMMEND TO DIRECTORS THAT LIFE MEMBERSHIP FEE BE INCREASED FROM \$250 TO \$350. LIFE MEMBERSHIPS MAY BE PURCHASED BY DOWN PAYMENT OF \$100 AND SUBSEQUENT INSTALLMENTS OF AT LEAST \$50 EACH TO RECOVER THE ADDITIONAL \$250 WITHIN 12 MONTHS. MOTION CARRIED. Slow payment of club dues and its potential solutions were discussed. Note: The meeting was recessed at 12:00 Noon and reconvened at 1:25 PM. INTERNATIONAL FLY FISHING CENTER Goodrich discussed the Management Plan for IFFC. The high priority item is roof repair. Now have \$5,000 which may be used for this purpose. Cost could be \$17,000 minimum if roof replaced using vertical seam metal roof.

IFFC needs more storage space. Would like to build another building for storage, audio-visual and classroom. Last year IFFC received 70 new books, and will receive the David Bascom Estate collection of 200 books. The Harry Kime collection may become available immediately.

Health inspectors have indicated certain minor work to be done prior to next inspection.

Landscape design was donated, but not plantings. Sprinkler system is perhaps a year or two away. Casting pond is complete. City Council asks a 3' fence be put around it.

Art Gallery is receiving paintings from all over the world. The Museum received two more Kosmic rods from Charlie Church. The Trude Ranch has given a Trude Fly plate, another photoplate and a history of the Trude Ranch.

The Southwest Council offers \$1,000 a year for the next 4 to 5 years to mount representations of all the Buszek Award winners, using standardized plates.

The Whitlock Vibert Box Aquarium is in operation. Eggs will be placed in incubation within two weeks.

The Governor's Program fund raising is not producing expected results. Goodrich discussed his use of individuals to assist in fund raising activities from possible grant sources. Other sources of revenue include pin sales, club gifts and visitor donations. Some Councils are donating a week of service to the IFFC.

RESOURCE CONSERVATION

US House Bill #4350 is to place in the Wild and Scenic River systems five rivers including the North Fork Kern (California) which was first recommended by Congressman Chip Pashayan.

MOTION MADE AND SECONDED TO RECOMMEND TO BOARD OF DIRECTORS THAT FFF SUPPORT BILL #4350. MOTION CARRIED.

BUDGET AND OPERATIONS

Directors will receive proposed budget for 1986-87 as is contained in Annual Report.

Dan Callaghan submitted his resignation as Legal Counsel. President Beatty has asked Ted Rogowski to serve.

Executive Committee will recommend to Directors as a resolution that FFF parallel the position of the Great Lakes Council on equality and club atonomy.

COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

Executive Committee will recommend to Directors the position on Canadian Council as reported in June 18, 1986 Executive Committee minutes.

OTHER

MOTION BY HOSFIELD, SECOND BY GOODRICH THAT EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE RECOMMEND TO DIRECTORS THAT LEFTY KREH BE AWARDED THE LAPIS LAZULI AT THIS CONCLAVE. MOTION CARRIED.

MOTION BY HOSFIELD, SECOND BY PETTINE, THAT SUSTAINING MEMBERS BE CHARGED FOR MAILING LISTS \$50 PER 1,000 NAMES AND ADDRESSES. MOTION CARRIED.

Hosfield will prepare policy statement in this regard.

MOTION MADE AND SECONDED THAT GROTY'S RECOMMENDATION ON SALARY POSITION FOR STAFF EMPLOYEES BE ACCEPTED. MOTION CARRIED.

FEDERATION OF FLY FISHERS BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING STATE COLLEGE, PENNSYLVANIA Minutes July 29, 1986 The Board of Directors Meeting was called to order by President Beatty. The directors were seated and 45 proxies accepted. Total proxies by councils were: Eastern 3, Southern 1, Northern California 6, Northwest 8, Southwest 9, Eastern Rocky Mountain 6, Great Lakes 5, Western Rocky Mtn. 7. MOTION BY WILKE, SECOND BY LISS TO APPROVE MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING. MOTION CARRIED. INTERNATIONAL FLY FISHING CENTER Slide presentation by Goodrich on operation of the Center descried the people who operated the IFFC, museum, displays, etc., the addition of real estate to permit the construction of Joyce and Elliot Liskin Fly Casting Pond, which is complete, and allow for a picnic unit; a 6' selfcontrolled aquarium for Whitlock Vibert Box incubation, donated by the Green Country Flyfishers, together with a \$2,200 maintenance and repair fund; and the urgent need for repairs to or replacement of the roof. Goodrich has asked clubs to present information to permit in uniform display, individual club information, pictures and patches. Goodrich discussed the Management Plan for the Center, including landscaping, building another building for quality museum storage, audiovisual center, and classroom and the need for financing this project. Clubs are requested to donate projectors, vcrs, etc. Pins are given to those making contributions of \$10.00 or more. Ralph Moon discussed the sales program - last year \$5,000 income from merchandise, pins and patches, and anticipated greater income this year. The gallery takes 30% commission on all art sales and items are moving. Moon described some of the many unique and valuable items being donated or loaned to the museum, library and art gallery and the significance of the museum's growth. Honda Foundation requires that the Board of Directors of the organization requesting funds approve any request for funding. MOTION BY MOSLEY, SECOND BY ATKINS THAT DIRECTORS APPROVE REQUEST FOR FUNDING FROM AMERICAN HONDA FOUNDATION. MOTION CARRIED. RESOURCE CONSERVATION In the absence of Seldon, Beatty presented FFF resolution prepared by Seldon supporting HR 4350, including North Fork Kern River (California) among others as Wild and Scenic Rivers. COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

Beatty read the resolution developed by Thurston regarding the possible development of a Canadian Council;

"A Council, named the Canadian Council, shall be established and be comprised of that area of Canada east from the British Columbia-Alberta border. It shall have all the rights, privileges and responsibilities of other councils. It shall subscribe to the constitution and bylaws of the Federation of Fly Fishers."

The Executive Committee recommends acceptance of this resolution with the addition of stipulations: 1) that they meet the criteria - 10 clubs, 300 members, 2) adopt a constitution if they desire, and elect officers thus giving them one year to qualify for a Council before Conclave, 1987, but does not limit possible council qualification to one year.

Pettine reported on the stable position in financing and publication of THE FLYFISHER, and on the quality of the product. Bitton needs more club information for the magazine.

Each AV center now has a VHS tape available for usage test purposes to determine potential. Four Centers have "Alaska; Once in a Lifetime", and four have "Babine Steelhead". They will be exchanged in approximately six months so each Center will have had both tapes.

We believe that fly fishing offers the greatest of angling challenges and is the most sporting way to catch fish. We are working to maintain both the environment and the fish resources.

The Federation of Fly Fishers was committed to catch-and-release fishing for trout and other game fish on good and suitable waters right from its inception a quarter of a century ago. FFF's influence was largely responsible for some of the very first "No-Kill" streams - waters declared no-kill by Park Superintndent Jack Anderson, in Yellowstone National Park.

Catch-and-release, the re-cycling of fish on the premise that a good game fish is too valuable to be caught only once and should give pleasure to many anglers rather than to only one, has provided continued and expanding fishing by many fishermen in waters which the old regulations of catch-and-take-home had left relatively barren of both fish and fishermen.

We are not dedicated to a single species but to fly fishing itself, the phase of the sport that offers the greatest challenge and is most protective of the fishing resources and their environment.

There will always be those who would pollute our streams, lakes and salt waters. We are engaged in constant battles to save our angling resources so that our children and theirs, too, can enjoy the great fly fishing opportunities that we now have or can have with good management. We are the major national organization dedicated to fly fishing, and we need your help to preserve and protect our special sport for ourselves and our kids.

As a charter member of the Anchorage Chapter of the Federation of Fly Fishermen, it occurs to me that you would be interested in the Alaska Position on International Fisheries Management with Special Reference to the Single Negotiating Text of the United Nations Conference on the Law of the Sea.

The State of Alaska certainly supports extended fisheries jurisdiction, preferably through multilateral means; for example, Law of the Sea. However, between now and when the United Nations Law of the Sea bears fruit and is ratified by the many nations involved, including the United States, we feel it is necessary to obtain protection for the coastal fisheries. This, of course, is necessary to have stocks to administer under a Law of the Sea Program.




