Endowment highlights

\$ Collection endowment

The goal is to build the world's greatest collection of books, gray literature, and manuscripts devoted to trout. Funds produced by the endowment will permit the library to purchase or bid on items for the collection. It is important to recognize that the more successful we are in building the collection, those items that we desire to acquire are likely to be more expensive.

\$ Lecture Series endowment

The goal is to fund an annual lecture series. Funds produced by the endowment will support honoraria and travel-related expenses for two to four speakers per year. It is expected that not all presentations will be in Bozeman, but that at least one per year will be elsewhere in Montana. Topics are limited only to the extent that they will be trout-related; so, they might be about angling, fisheries management, trout ecology, literature, anthropology, politics, etc.

\$ Faculty endowment

The goal is to put in place a member of the MSU Libraries' faculty whose primary responsibility will be the development and management of the trout & salmonid collection, the provision of information support to various trout constituencies, and the extension of the intellectual resource embodied in the collection to a variety of audiences ranging from scientists, in-the-field resource managers, anglers, teachers, and students across the university to kindergarten spectrum.

\$ Support for holder of the chair

The goal is to enable the holder of the chair to attend appropriate professional meetings as well as to travel on buying trips to build the collection. There will also be funds to support student workers who will assist in the processing of the collection and web site(s) maintenance.

Some time back, I met Anne Barnaby, a local radio personality and a member of a wide variety of community organizations (Jazz Montana, Battered Women's Network, Campfire Youth, Humane Society, etc.) It didn't take me long to figure out this was someone I really wanted to know.

Anne grew up near the Sierra foothills of Northern California in a household where her parents were both accomplished pianists—her mother played classical music, and her father jazz. Surrounded by music from a very early age, Anne has fond memories of the two side-by-side pianos in their home where she and her family members would play beautiful music together.

I watched the gold in her eyes sparkle as she spoke of the bond she shares with her Cajun/French father and Irish/Scottish mother. She spoke of her mother's love of books. Apparently a voracious reader, her mother would escort Anne to the local public library to gather books on current affairs and politics, encouraging Anne to be an informed and well rounded young woman. (Anne pointed out that her mother continues to devour five or six books a week.)

Anne grew up in the 50s and 60s during a time of significant cultural pressure and change. Her lazy summer days were spent watching "I Love Lucy," listening to the sounds of Joan Baez and Bob Dylan, practicing her music and escaping into the adventures her books provided her.

"Books, writing and libraries—city, community, university libraries—are the foundation for everything I have ever done or accomplished," says Anne. "From the late nights with a flashlight under the covers as a child, to the first creative writing class, to the J.R.R. Tolkien series, and the beautiful children's classics, it has all helped me discover who I am. I was a fast reader, without great retention, but enough imagination to bridge the gap. I would build pictures in my mind which were helpful to create a theater in my mind in terms of broadcasting it to others. Books helped to build a mental world that was very enticing to me as I was a bit of a reclusive kid. The books were my playmates—all of my playmates were in the books."

Anne goes on to quote Edward R. Murrow who once said, "'Speak every word as if it were your last. Make your words count.' Every word does count. I still believe it. The root of everything comes from proper writing skills that translate to speech. If you can't write, you

After dominating our thought and time for the better part of two years, the renovation of MSU's Renne Library is

nearing completion. Those who have recently entered the building will have immediately noticed the difference. Perhaps the most striking thing is the bright light that ties the circulation counter and main lobby with the elevated reference area and the Heathcote Court. The Heathcote Court, formerly ponds and planters, is now a relaxed seating, new book display, and beverage bar ("The Brewed Awakening") area--an indoor version of the village green. We expect the entire renovation project to be completed by the end of November. Certainly, after 20 months of renovation, staff and students will be ready to move in and on. I must say, students have been extraordinarily patient, civil, and adaptable and staff have been stalwart and perseverant in enduring the confusion, disruptions, dislocations, and din of the last 20 months. The result will be a library that looks fresh and vibrant and which will be a far safer and more comfortable working and study environment for both students and staff.

Also, new and prominent in the library's main lobby is a major donor recognition installation. The form is a tree

sheltering male and female students reading books. The foliage of the tree is composed of copper, silver, and gold colored metal plates symbolizing various levels of giving. We hope that through this beautiful piece of functional art our major donors will feel both appreciated and honored to be so recognized and that potential donors will be inspired to give.

While the renovation has moved forward, we have not lost sight of our commitment to continuing to build quality paperbased collections. At the same time, we continue to make impressive progress in building a quality electronic resource environment for our students and faculty. In order to accomplish both of these goals successfully in an information marketplace that routinely sees eight percent or higher annual inflation, building endowments to support collection growth as well as access to electronic resources is absolutely essential. I am convinced that our success in building quality collections and access in the face of limited resources contributes directly to

Award. He has received the Los Angeles Times Book Prize for fiction, an American Book Award, a Chevalier de L'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres from France in 1997 received the Native Writer's Circle's lifetime achievement award. Welch has honorary doctorates from Montana State University, Rocky Mountain College and the University of Montana. Currently, he is working on a sequel to *The Heartsong of Charging Elk*.

Blakely Acquisition

It would be difficult to find a more colorful narrative of the frontier than the life reminiscence of Charles P. Blakeley, a Missouri-born ex-Confederate soldier who literally escaped the Civil War to participate in the 1864 Montana gold rush. Finding the life of a miner at Virginia City too difficult, Blakeley became one of the first settlers on the West Gallatin River and embarked on a remarkable career as a lawman, territorial legislator, town promoter, and county assessor. It is with no small amount of hyperbole that Leeson's 1885 History of Montana describes the tale of Blakeley as one "fraught with vivid and interesting incidents and sorrowful and thrilling anecdotes."

Fortunately, for present day historians and scholars, Blakeley felt moved to record some of those "thrilling anecdotes" shortly before his death in 1912 on over 400 handwritten pages which have recently been acquired by the Montana State University Libraries' Special Collections. Blakeley's remarkable autobiography is accompanied by a scattering of legal documents, letters, and memorabilia, which help put this outstanding pioneer story into context.

CHOOSING AN APPROPRIATE WINE

Wine, like a small boy, is not at its best after even the very shortest of journeys. From the wine shop to home, it gets shaken up and ideally needs several days or even weeks to recuperate and reassemble itself. It would be a pity to buy a great bottle of wine, bring it home, pour it into a glass and expect it to be sensational. Even beer protests movement, and froths and foams in great agitation if it is not handled with care. Wine does not appear to behave with such obvious indignation, yet because it is far more complex than beer, it is even more fragile.

If you just feel like having a bottle of wine for dinner, or with some cheese, it would be better to choose an inexpensive regional wine like Beaujolais rather than something from a grand château which will cost two or three times as much, and taste like a regional wine anyway if it does not have time to rest.

The general idea behind choosing the wine is that it should match the occasion. A heavily magnificent Bordeaux is best saved to be served with a touch of reverence and some beef. Not that it would be wrong to drink it out of a mug in the dormitory; it would simply be a waste when a gallon of would do the job at hand better!

SERVING THE WINE

Though Beaujolais, the red wine from southern Burgundy, is sometimes served slightly chilled, ALL OTHER RED WINES ARE ALWAYS SERVED AT ROOM TEMPERATURE. Draw the cork from the red wines an hour before they are to be served. (If the wine is more than ten years old, the cork should only be drawn half an hour before it is served, as the older the wine, the greater the tendency for it to disintegrate on being exposed to light.) If you doubt the efficacy of opening the wine for an hour before serving it, taste it as soon as it is opened and then every fifteen minutes until it is served. As the wine comes into contact with the air, the gases which have been trapped in the bottle are released and the wine softens and becomes more mellow.

White wines are chilled for two hours before serving (not two days!) The cork is drawn just before they are served.

Unless the wine contains a heavy deposit, it is not necessary to decant it.

WINE GLASSES

Wine glasses should be clear and either large or enormous! Of course any glass is better than none at all, and so much the better if you happen to own a glass designed for a specific type of wine, such as a hock glass for Rhine wine or a Bordeaux for a Bordeaux. These glasses have been made in such a way as to enhance to the fullest possible degree a particular characteristic of color or bouquet of the specific wine. Assuming you do not already have a series of glasses, then select one which will be suitable to all wines. A clear glass will enable you to see what you are drinking, and to judge the brilliance of a young American wine, the variation of color (from gold to straw) of a German wine, and the red depth of a well aged French red wine. Smoked glass tends to distort all colors, and though it looks pretty enough when it is empty, it does not permit you to see the wine as it really is.

Small glasses should be scorned in direct relation to their diminishing capacity. The smaller they are, the more they seem to imply that their contents are a dose, rather than a generosity of giving. A wine glass should be only half filled in order that the wine may come into contact with the air and be able to "breath." Small wine glasses filled tremblingly to the brim are inevitably half empty with the first tentative sip, and the reply to the third suggestion of "more?" evokes a predictably negative response, based more on moral compunction rather than gastronomic fulfillment.

Chimney shaped glasses and those which curve inward at the top concentrate the escaping bouquet, holding it like a child cupping a rose lovingly in her hands, so you may breathe in all the escaping fragrance in one precious moment.

"That's all very well," you may say, "having a great glass for a great wine, but I only plan to drink inexpensive wines from gallon jugs from here to eternity." All the more reason to buy a good glass; if the glass can improve the greatest of wines, imagine how much it can do for those wines whose need of help may be considerably more acute!

For some, it is enough simply to drink the wine provided. Diogenes was once asked which wine he liked best, and he answered with no small degree of honesty, "I would as soon have someone else's..." (Montaigne). Yet, he who thoughtlessly gulps the wine down is like a man who embraces a beautiful woman without first having seen her enter the room and admired her style, her color and her fragrance...

WINE EVALUATION

Wine evaluation relies on three basic senses: sight, smell and taste. So the standard procedure for wine tasting involves three easy steps:

- 1. looking closely at the wine to evaluate color and clarity,
- 2. swirling and sniffing the wine to evaluate aromas,
- 3. sipping the wine to evaluate body balance and flavors.

Wine evaluation requires attention to four basic areas:

- · color and clarity
- · aromas and bouquet
- · body and balance
- · and flavors and finish

Color & Clarity

Wines should be clear, bright, and free of sediment and cloudiness. (Older red wine may be an exception to this, as they tend to throw off sediment during aging. After settling and decanting, however, the liquid should be free of particles.) Colors will vary according to the grape varietal, the style and the age of the wine.

Aroma & Bouquet

Often used interchangeably, these terms refer to the complex set of smells resulting from the grape varietal, wine making techniques and aging. For tasters who like to get technical, the aromas result from the grape and wine making process, while the bouquet results from the aging process!

Body & Balance

The overall feel of the wine in the mouth-light, full, round, heavy-is referred to as body. Balance refers to the relationship between fruit, acidity and oak. In a well-balanced wine no single element will overpower the rest.

Flavors & Finish

Like many fruits, wine grapes have flavor elements characteristics of each varietal. The length of time these flavors remain in the mouth after swallowing (or spitting—whichever you prefer!) is called the finish.

Wine, like people, is alive and constantly in a state of change, either improving or deteriorating. Buying wine is like buying stock; the trick is to be there at the right moment, neither drinking the wine prematurely nor holding it until it dies or you do!

NATURAL PARTNERS

As with all food-and-wine matching, many cheeses can go deliciously with a specific wine. But certain types make natural partners, either because they share regional associations or they have worked well in personal experience. The age of a wine is less of an issue than its level of subtlety. Because strong cheeses can rob more complex wines of their nuances, simpler wines generally go with a wider range of cheeses. Use the following list as a starting point.

Greetings from a New Dean

As I sit in the Library Dean's office, the view is much the same, but the Dean is different. My name is Tamara Miller, and I am delighted to introduce myself to the Friends of the MSU Libraries. I have held faculty or librarian positions at Michigan State University, University of Wisconsin, and the University of Tennessee. I grew up in Great Falls, and I served as the Associate Dean of the MSU Libraries from June 2003 until July 2007. I am delighted that Patricia Denison has rejoined the Libraries as Director of Development. Brian Rossmann, former head of the Reference Team, is now the Associate Dean. As with all new jobs, there are always unexpected challenges.

Water and Books: A Bad Mix!!



On January 22nd and again on January 29th, the library suffered flooding from broken pipes. Although the circumstances were slightly different in each case, cold air, water pipes, and the building ventilation system each played a sinister part in dumping water in the building, and on the collections.

In the first flood, the pipe was small, and about 4,000 gallons of water was mostly contained in an elevator shaft. However, some of the water fell into the Third Floor Study Area, and then flowed into Special Collections one floor below. Fewer than 300 special collections items were affected. Some of these were frozen immediately; others were air dried or dried with blotters, and handled as delicately as possible. We will continue to work on conserving, restoring, or replacing these valuable materials for some time to come.

The second flood was larger and more widespread. It is estimated that over 10,800 gallons of water poured into the second floor in about eighteen minutes. It could have been worse, and we thank the emergency and facilities personnel who responded quickly and got the water turned off in the wee hours of the morning. The water moved quickly down to the first floor Reference, Circulation, and Documents areas, then moved on to the basement Audiovisual, Oversized, and other stack areas.


The library staff responded quickly to cover bookshelves with plastic, unplug and cover computers, and begin moving those books that were already wet.

Archivist Travels to Australia



sabbatical. This spring he will be traveling to Sydney, Australia where he will be doing research on Royal National Park. Royal National Park bills itself as the world's second national park, having been established in 1879, just a few years after the United States Congress set aside Yellowstone National Park. Kim became interested in Royal National Park after discovering that its history is quite different from Yellowstone's. Early Australian managers of Royal cut down native trees and planted English oaks. They also altered the landscape to facilitate fox hunting by planting hedgerows and spacious lawns. This led Kim to believe that there may have been a problem in translation of the National Park "idea" during the 1870's, and his determination to do a comparison study between Yellowstone and Royal.

Kim's recent publications have included a number of works on Yellowstone National Park, including Yellowstone Denied: The Life of Gustavus Cheyney Doane, published by the University of Oklahoma Press last year. In addition, he edited the extensive correspondence and diaries of Montana pioneer Peter Koch, one of the founders of Montana State University. His sabbatical will also allow him to work with copy editors on the Koch manuscript and facilitate its publication later this year.

Inaugural Trout and Salmonid Lecture

On November 8, 2007, a crowd of nearly 200 gathered at the Museum of the Rockies' Hager Auditorium for a joyous kick-off to the Trout and Salmonid Lecture series. This event marks a milestone in the development of the MSU Libraries' Bud Lilly Trout and Salmonid Initiative. Due to the generosity of many, this lecture was free, and open to the public.

The highlight of the evening was the presentation by Dr. Robert Behnke. Known as "The Trout Doctor," Dr. Behnke is our nation's pre-eminent authority on trout biology and professor emeritus at Colorado State University. A conservationist and superb fisherman, Behnke writes about topics such as native species, genetic markers, endangered species, angling tips and successful rejuvenation of freshwater fish habitats. His collected columns from Trout Magazine have been published in the book About Trout: The Best of Robert Behnke from Trout Magazine. Many enthusiasts were able to purchase a copy of the book and have it autographed by Dr. Behnke during the reception that followed the lecture.

Dr. Behnke's papers have been added to the MSU Libraries' trout collection. This important research collection includes a vast array of created and collected material representing his many years studying the trout and salmonid families of fishes. Organized into two series, the collection contains subject files about genetics, water conditions (limnology), and management of fisheries, with a concentration on the Northwest regions of the U.S. The second series is based on Dr. Behnke's research, professional and personal correspondence, and studies by universities, fish and wildlife agencies, and other related groups.

Greetings from the new Dean, continued...

During the two days that the Libraries were closed, the staff moved and boxed more than 500 cubic feet of books. These 380 boxes of books were placed on the loading dock to freeze, and then loaded into a freezer truck for transport to a freeze-drying facility in Texas. We estimate that over 7,000 books and documents were shipped. In addition to the damage to the collection, six staff offices were inundated, a large area of carpeting was stained or came unglued, and over 700 ceiling tiles had to be replaced. It is a minor miracle that we were able to reopen with limited services only 48 hours after the pipe broke. Students rushed back into the building and consumed nearly 25 gallons of free coffee, courtesy of the MSU President's Office and the Libraries.



We know that the Libraries' spaces are more important than ever, and we are well on our way to recovery. The Library is central to the MSU learning community and has become the primary informal learning space on campus. One's education is the journey of an entire lifetime, and we are pleased to welcome students, faculty, and all Montana citizens through our doors, and into our information-rich spaces, even as they are still drying out.

As always, I invite you to visit the library and join in the activities of the Friends of the MSU Libraries. I believe that each Friend makes a real difference in the everyday lives of the students at MSU. 

Dear Bud and Esther:

Greetings supporters of the Bud Lilly Trout Initiatives at the MSU Libraries.

As I have done each of the last two summers, I want to update you on the progress the MSU Libraries has made on its Bud Lilly Trout initiatives.

As I write this, the Trout & Salmonid collection stands just a few titles short of 7,300; it continues to steadily grow thanks to the availability of funds generated by the endowment. The collection has truly reached a point of critical mass that gives it (and MSU) status as a library collection of preeminence in the world of trout and salmonid literature.

Phase 2 of the Lilly Chair initiative is the establishment of an endowed annual lecture series. Although thus far we have made only partial progress toward our goal for the lecture series endowment, I am pleased to announce that the inaugural Bud Lilly lecture by Dr. Robert Behnke, professor emeritus at Colorado State University and author of *Trout and Salmon of North America* (2002) and *Native Trout of Western North America* (1992), is scheduled to be given at 7 PM on November 8, 2007 in the auditorium at the Museum of the Rockies on the MSU Campus. Please, mark this date on your calendars.

My other news is personal. After 22 years at the MSU Libraries, the last 14 as dean, I have decided to step down and do something a bit less "executive." My last day at the library will be June 30th. Next academic year, my time will be split between being associate director of the University Honors Program, including teaching a freshman seminar each semester, and working on a team in the provost's office preparing the university for its decennial accreditation in the Fall of 2009. Tamara Miller, our associate dean, has been named my successor for a term of three years. Kim Allen Scott, our special collections librarian, will take on the responsibility for continuing to build the Trout & Salmonid Collection. In 1952, Behnke was drafted into the U.S. Army and then served in Korea and Japan. Upon his return to the U.S., Behnke earned a bachelor's degree in zoology in 1957 from the University of Connecticut and then went to the University of California-Berkeley, where he earned a master's degree in zoology. His Ph.D. was

also from the University of California-Berkeley, where his thesis focused on trout of the Great Basins.

After graduate school, Behnke spent 10 months researching salmonids in the Soviet Union and learning Russian, then moved to Fort Collins, Colorado, in 1966. He recently retired as a professor at Colorado State University, where he taught fisheries, aquatic biology and conservation courses.

Dr. Behnke's books, "About Trout: The Best of Robert J. Behnke from Trout Magazine" and "Trout and Salmon of North America," will be available for purchase in the lobby during the reception.



Bob Gresswell has been studying habitat relationships and population dynamics of cutthroat trout for more than 30 years. He is currently a research biologist with the USGS Northern Rocky

Mountain Science Center in Bozeman, Montana, and he is an affiliate assistant professor in the Department of Ecology at Montana State University and an adjunct assistant professor with the Department of Watershed Sciences at Utah State University. His interests concerning the influence of land-use activities on forested ecosystems have led to research on the relationships among landscape-scale environmental features, instream habitat characteristics, and coastal cutthroat trout abundance and distribution in watersheds in western Oregon. Bob became involved with research on the effects of fire while working in Yellowstone National Park, and his current research reflects a continued interest in the role of disturbance in shaping the aquatic systems.
