



A Handy Western

Bud Lilly's Guide to Western Fly Fishing by Bud Lilly and Paul Schullery. Nick Lyons Books, 184 pages, \$19.95, hardcover; \$12.95, paperback, 1987.

Bud Lilly's Guide to Western Fly Fishing is the best and most practical book I have read on fly fishing the West.

That statement in itself might well say enough to be the complete review of this outstanding book, but there is much more that must be said.

Fly fishing in the American West is often an intimidating experience for anglers from other parts of the world. The fly-fishing traditions and "rules" that are appropriate in other areas often do not apply here.

Stimulated by photos of huge trout and magnificent scenery, along with stories of fabled rivers, many anglers view a trip to the West as the ultimate fly-fishing experience. And it may be the ultimate experience, but unfortunately many anglers are disappointed when the reality does not live up to the expectation.

Such disappointment may be the result of unrealistic expectations, but more often it is due to the angler being unprepared for the size and variety of the waters, the vastness of the distances, the season, the weather, the altitude, and the special fly-fishing demands resulting from a "different set of rules." The photos and stories are not myths, but a certain knowledge, and often a new angling approach, are required before the expectations can become realities.

No other book that I have read can help the angler prepare to meet these

challenges better than Bud Lilly's Guide to Western Fly Fishing.

This is not a guide book that pinpoints "hot spots" or simply tells how to do it. Its mission is to educate the reader to the special demands of Western fishing, the modifications of angling techniques that are required, and the great breadth of fishing opportunities that exist. The book also helps the angler set realistic goals.

I know of no one who is more equal to this task than Bud Lilly. A native of southwestern Montana, Bud has fly fished the West for more than 50 years, and he has the wealth of experience that can only be accumulated by one who has been a guide, outfitter, and owner of a top Western fly-fishing shop.

The book is, like Bud, informal and relaxed, filled with information, and with a real love and respect for the country, the water, and the fish. Writer Paul Schullery has succeeded in capturing Bud Lilly, the man, on paper.

The first section of the book, titled "Getting Ready," discusses the mental approach to fishing the West, appropriate tackle, flies, and fishing manners. The second chapter, "Guides and Guidance," is alone worth the price of the book. [The "Guides and Guidance" chapter, excerpted from this book, can be found elsewbere in this issue. THE EDITORS]

In the chapter "Western Fly Fishing Techniques and Tips," the authors discuss big rivers and small spring creeks and lakes, along with floating, how to locate fish, special techniques, and much more.

To successfully fly fish in the West, it is not enough to merely know the required angling techniques, or even specifically where to go. Often one must know the special adjustments that are required during each season. The next section of the book is devoted to an indepth discussion of the seasons, and how each affects both the fish and the techniques required to catch them. Valuable stuff.

Finally, the authors discuss the "Total Experience," and it is here, that Bud's love and appreciation of the environment, the fish, and the West are apparent. Fly fishing is more than simply catching fish, and Bud and Paul remind us of that. They tell us why some of the West's best water is in trouble, and they offer practical suggestions on how it can be saved. They discuss catch-and-release, and they tell us why much of the West's fly fishing is better than ever. The book's appendix contains a state-by-state listing of map sources and further information, as well as a fairly complete list of Western fly shops and a bibliography for additional reading on the subject. Both should be helpful the both the novice and the experience. fishermen.

The book contains many excellent black-and-white photos, and fine pen and ink sketches by Lee Stroncek that introduce each chapter.

Many book reviews end with the phrase "this book belongs on every fly fisher's bookshelf." Not this one. Bud Lilly's Guide to Western Fly Fishing belongs in every present or prospective Western fly fisher's bands, and it should be read and reread. DAVE ENGERBRETSON

There are plenty of fine local guidebooks that tell you how to get to fishing spots in the Rockies; Bud Lilly's Guide to Western Fly Fishing prepares you for how to fish.

The former owner of Bud Lilly's Trout Shop in West Yellowstone wrote this guide with his fishing companion, Paul Schullery, whose other books-Mountain Time, American Fly Fishing: A History and Freshwater Wilderness, Yellowstone Fishes and Their World (with co-author John D. Varley)-sparkled like spring creeks.

Lilly narrates this book, preparing pilgrims for their first trip to America's fly-fishing mecca, the three-state area of Yellowstone National Park, but his advice applies to the rest of the Rockies, too.

The most important part of the fishing trip, he emphasizes again and again, is "the total experience," the ability to appreciate the big sky, the broad meadows, the streamside wildlife.

Of course the trout are important to "the total experience," but the authors put the fish in perspective by dispelling myths that actually leave some fishermen disappointed when the trout act finicky about flies or weigh less than three pounds apiece.

To catch those fish, you need to bring the right gear, and Lilly, the former outfitter, offers thorough advice on everything you'll need, including specific fly patterns, for most waters in the Rockies.

If you plan to fish from a drift boat with a guide, he not only explains effective fishing technique in one chapter, but he devotes another to how to find a guide, what to expect of him, and how to behave and benefit from the experience. For fishermen who want to wander off on their own, extensive appendices list fly-fishing shops and outfitters in the area and government agencies that offer maps and free information.

Lilly introduces readers to all the fine little spring creeks and the wonderful alpine lakes the Rockies offer, and he devotes entire chapters to fishing each of the four seasons.

Melville did not stay home.

The best of the current traveling writers (not "travel writers") can bring back all sorts of touching eccentrics, desperate losers, and wise primitives from places many of their readers will never have heard of, and none would ever consider visiting. In this category one thinks of Paul Theroux, Jonathan Raban, and, of course, Bruce Chatwin.

Chatwin's In Patagonia is one of the best of the genre. His new book, The Songlines (a hybrid—part travel writing, part fiction) is just as strong. The setting is Australia, among the Aborigines, for whom nomadism is more than a way of life. The original natives walked the land singing the world into existence, and the paths of those journeys are dotted with sacred places. Their descendants still sing those songs and know these places and paths.

In the modern world, this is cause for inconvenience. When a railroad is planned through the bush country, the right-ofway will inevitably cross—and destroy sacred places. Chatwin travels with a man named Arkady, himself a wanderer, as he tries to discover where the sacred places are and make sure they are left alone.

The journey is remarkable, as are the people Chatwin runs into along the way. In a quick sketch, he gives the reader a policeman who speaks volumes about racism in a few inarticulate lines. There is a wonderful woman named Marian, who is capable and humorous and whose feeling for the natives is profound. There are Aboriginal holy men who know the sacred places and tell Chatwin the fabulous stories of the land he is traveling. It is all very rich; more than enough to make a solid book.

Chatwin, however, goes further. The Songlines is an inquiry into a question that he returns to again and again: What is it that makes hearth and home seem, after a while, so oppressive?

Chatwin quotes Pascal, Rimbaud, Heidegger, and many others whose words he has copied in his notebooks along with his own thoughts and observations as they touch on this central concern. The journals work into the narrative almost without friction, and by the end of *The Songlines* the reader is convinced that Chatwin's theme is as large and important as he claims, and that he has the talent and the wit to explore it endlessly.

Bud Lilly's Guide to Western Fly Fishing

BY BUD LILLY AND PAUL SCHULLERY, NICK LYONS BOOKS, \$12.95. There must have been more written about fly fishing than about

any other recreation in the history of the world. Why trout fishing should inspire so much more literary output than, say, horseshoes is the proper subject for a book itself. My own theory is that fly fishing is as much an inquiry as a physical activity, and that anyone engaged in an inquiry wants to publish his findings. But for whatever reason, it is beyond argument that fly fishermen tend to write, publish, buy, and perhaps even read books. Since Izaak Walton got things started 300 years ago, there have been thousands—more books than fly patterns.

A recent specimen that deserves mention is *Bud Lilly's Guide to Western Fly Fishing*. For years, Lilly ran a shop in West Yellowstone, Montana, and was widely regarded as one of the finest guides and outfitters in the West. He has retired now and lives in Bozeman, where he publishes a newsletter.

This book is a distillation of what Lilly has learned over the years. Written for the Eastern angler on his way out to fish the big Western rivers for the first time, its charm is in how offhand and neighborly it is. Lilly doesn't get all carried away with the mechanics of catching fish. He wants to make sure you understand how to enjoy your "total experience," a phrase he uses often. In a time when instructional videos are proliferating and The Wall Street Journal is writing about the boom in fly fishing, Lilly wants to remind people that fishing is in no way comparable to business and cannot be approached the same way.

Instead he wants you to know how to pack for your trip, how to get along with your guide, and how to keep from driving all over hell and creation and fishing for 18 hours of each day, thinking you are having fun. Here is a sample of Lilly's wisdom:

Look for what the area has to offer. Some of my fondest memories of fishing trips are of the lodges and the lodge owners, the amazing little restaurants that seem to get by in the most out of the way places, the shops and stores we find, and most of all, the people we encounter. I assure you that when I fish I fish hard, but I've learned to enjoy the rest of the day too. Few fishermen (at least the polite ones) will talk much about it, but if you're fishing with a wife, husband, boyfriend or girlfriend, an important item of equipment can be a blanket. Who knows, maybe some sunny afternoon in some secluded stretch of stream the two of you will be fishing away, tuned in to the natural setting, and the mating of the salmon flies will inspire you. The experience doesn't get much more total than that.

"It's also because I've learned that very often you can wade right through the best water, right near shore, getting into what feels like a comfortable spot to fish. Do a minimum of wading at all times."

He prepares the small-stream fishermen for big rivers such as the Yellowstone or the Missouri, with the advice to "think of the narrow band along the shore as a small stream; you'll be surprised how it will change your outlook when you suddenly stop worrying about what might be out there beyond your reach."



Heptachlor was applied to seed grain to control wireworm damage. Use of both endrin and heptachlor is banned in Montana.

Since 1981, the DFWP has issued precautionary warnings to sportsmen and others about potential health risks associated with consuming upland game birds and waterfowl. The warnings also included instructions on how to trim and cook the game to minimize health risk.

Weigand said removing similar warnings about pesticide contamination from Montana's waterfowl hunting regulations is also under consideration, but a final decision will not be made until the waterfowl hunting regulations are finalized in September (about the time this magazine goes to press). Waterfowl, which migrate through Montana and winter in southern states and in Mexico, have other opportunities to pick up pesticide residue and are more difficult to monitor than Montana's resident upland bird pop-

ulations.

Agencies cooperating in the testing efforts include the DFWP, the Montana Departments of Agriculture and Health and Environmental Sciences, the EPA, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

BUD LILLY'S GUIDE TO WESTERN FLY FISHING, by Bud Lilly and Paul Schullery, illustrated by Lee Stroncek, Nick Lyons Books, 31 West 21st Street, New York, NY 10010; 1987, 192 pages, \$12.95, soft cover.

Bud Lilly, one of the West's most knowledgeable outfitters and for many years the proprietor of Bud Lilly's Trout Shop in West Yellowstone, has teamed up with author Paul Schullery to produce a practical and easy-to-read guide to fly fishing in the Rocky Mountain West. The beauty of this book, aside from the authors' obvious love for the country and its fish and wildlife, is its simplicity: It's one of the few "how-to's" on fly fishing that doesn't load you down with so much entomology and technical jargon that you're exhausted even before you begin your trip. Fly fishing doesn't have to be all that intimidating, and it's nice to hear someone like Bud Lilly, who has had 50 years of experience as a fisherman, say SO.

Lilly is a natural story teller, and the chapters on western flies, tackle, techniques, float fishing, and fishing in the various seasons are liberally spiced with personal reminiscences. Schullery, a naturalist-author and expert fisherman in his own right, stays in the background, but his deft skills as a writer are evident throughout this useful and refreshing introduction to western fly fishing.

Sections are included on fishing manners, catch-and-release fishing, and "guides and guidance," the latter a discussion of what to expect from a guided trip, the guide-client relationship, and a glimpse into the life and livelihood of a fishing guide. A chapter called "The Well-Rounded Angler" points out there is much more to western fishing than simply catching fish. It is the country itself—the scenery, the wildlife, the climate, and the many intangibles that the authors refer to as "the total experience"—that combine to make a western fly fishing trip a memorable experience.—Dave Books

TRUTH, LIES & OTHERWISE, by Carl "Skinny" Rowland, 45 pages, \$5, available from the author; Basin, MT 59631.

Ever since Izaak Walton took pen in hand and wrote "The Compleat Angler," outdoor literature has made its mark on the recreating public. Roosevelt, Steinbeck, Hemingway, and a host of others often mixed powder with prose, rifles with rhyme, and text with trout to recount their adventures afield. And today, be it in one of the major outdoor magazines or in the more "cultured" literary sporting journals, tales are still told about the big buck, the great hunt, or the perennial favorite, "The One That Got Away."

Although not claiming the credentials or status of the aforementioned "outdoor literati," Basin outdoorsman/poet Skinny Rowland has produced a book of rhymes about some of his experiences outdoors and the people he has encountered in his 62 years in the West. In the process, Skinny has done a good job of putting to verse the things that anyone who has spent any time pursuing trophy trout, bigger bucks, or wily wapiti has either seen or (for those with the audacity to claim it) experienced. Take, for example, Skinny's:

The Big One

Now in Montana's Big Hole, is where I made fishing history,

and how you could've missed this tale, to me sure is a mystery.

But in a secret spot I know, one day I cast my line.

Something grabbed the bait and ran, it made my reel whine.

The pole bent double. The line it snapped, I fought to hold my ground,

and then I seen that mighty splash, and my heart began to pound.

It was right there on that spot, that I became a firm believer,

that even a calm guy like myself, can catch the fishing fever.

So I got myself a bigger pole and all, again he was the winner.

Well things kept going, till I was down to my last hope.

which was a king sized derrick hook, on a three inch nylon rope.

I dallied around a great big tree, and tied to one just like it,

then tossed the hook into the hole, and watched that bugger strike it.

I know I had him hooked for good, but he gave it his best try;

he made a jump you won't believe, but came down on hard dry land. I can't tell you what his weight was, he was too big for any scale,


but you can rest assured men, he outweighed the largest whale.




API FLY REEL
