Dear Mr. Smith:

Bud Lilly referred you to me for information regarding Bud's First Annual Backpacking School.

The school for backpackers will be directed by me and is primarily intended for inexperienced people in this growing sport with a desire to invest their time in a wilderness experience.

The primary goal is to help these people achieve proficient knowledge and skills so that they may feel more confident to enjoy a backcountry experience rather than fear it.

These are generalizations, but in the basic three day school, two days will be devoted to an in depth study and inquiry on hiking, with emphasis on where to go and how to go (conditioning, planning, equipment food considerations, techniques, woodsmanship, map and compass reading, safety, and many other considerations.) This will be spiced with demos of techniques, equipment, along with visual aids about the subject. Of course fishing will be emphasized also. One day will be devoted to a field trip with fishing and to practice specific things covered in the classroom.

The basic backpacking school will be:

2 days of 6 hours each with 1 evening for a 1 hr. slide program

1 day of 12 hours for a field trip with fishing

Total instruction - 25 hours

Also included is the fishing license (1 day) and a backpackers fishing rod, reel, and line for the day (if desired)

A diploma will be awarded at the completion of the school.

Tuition cost for the basic school - \$50.00

The first school will begin August 3, 1970 with other classes scheduled for August 10 and 17 if the response warrants it.

Backpacking equipment may be rented from the Trout Shop. It also can be purchased.

The four days in the week after each school will be set aside for those persons desiring to take a wilderness backpacking trip, up to four (4) days duration (3 nights out). See enclosed sheet for rates.

These trips will be in either the Absaroka Primitive Area (directly N of Yellowstone National Park) or in the Beartooth Primitive Area (NE of the NE entrance to Yellowstone National Park,) or in the Thorofare area of NW Wyoming via the SE arm of Yellowstone Lake. If a party has a specific area in mind then of course every effort would be made to go there. However, it is believed that the areas mentioned will offer every thing that man can appreciate in the wilderness. I will act as a guide for these trips.

Your attention is called to item number 21 of the conditions of this permit. Prior to 1969 an end-of-season report was required and was submitted on a special form supplied by the park. This is no longer required. Instead, each trip is to be reported prior to its start. (In some cases, this report can be submitted most conveniently at the start of the trip.) Except is special cases, the report will be made to the sub-district ranger in whose area you will be traveling and the actual reporting procedures can be worked out with him. This removes the need for a detailed and time consuming report from each permittee at the end of the season. The basic backpacking school will be:

1 day of 12 hours for a field trip with fishing.
