Speaker 5 [00:12:30] You're listening to Trout Talk on the Worldwide Fish Network. We're coming to you live from RJ Cain Outfitters in beautiful downtown Bozeman, the heart of the trout-infested 'Bozone', as they call it up here, with our second broadcast on the Trout Jam '96 summer radio tour. And we're also broadcasting today with our special guest, Jack "the Heron" Gartside, and also Cal Dunbar, who is a monster fly fisherman from West Yellowstone. And we're going to get Denise Durham over here from R.J. Cain. She's a guide and we're going to have her give us a real quick trout watch update of what's on the board here at RJ Cain. Why don't you come over here, Denise, and give us a quick rundown on what's happening? Stand right here. There you go.

Speaker 7 [00:13:11] Okay.

Speaker 5 [00:13:13] Right in there. There you go.

Speaker 7 [00:13:16] Okay, fishing's doing quite well here. The Madison River is [00:13:19]up. Opportunity season. [1.4s] We have ants and beetles, some stones and caddis, the flow is 1320, temperature is 57, color is clear. Fly patterns of choice, parachute hoppers, Dave's hoppers, black foam beetles, yellow sallies and black with red ants.

Speaker 5 [00:13:39] And that's on the on the Upper Madison.

Speaker 7 [00:13:41] On the Upper Madison.

Speaker 5 [00:13:42] How's everything on the Gallatin?

Speaker 7 [00:13:44] The Gallatin is doing well. PMDs, golden stones, caddis, midges. Also some hoppers, beetles, and ants.

Speaker 5 [00:13:51] This is the trout menu.

Speaker 7 [00:13:53] This is the trout menu.

Speaker 5 [00:13:55] Trout menu in Montana from RJ Cain with Denise, a lovely guide here. What about the spring creeks? How are they doing?

Speaker 7 [00:14:01] Uh, they're not doing very well right now. The [00:14:03]DePuy [0.0s] is off, yeah.

[00:14:03] Okay, well, we'll move along to the Yellowstone.

[00:14:03] Yeah, move right along.

[00:14:07] The Yellowstone is great. Starting to get really clear. People have been fishing with hoppers and having much success.

Speaker 5 [00:14:15] Also [00:14:16]royal wolves. [0.2s]

Speaker 7 [00:14:17] Royal wolves? Yeah.

Speaker 5 [00:14:17] Sculpins down deep with the big ugly stuff.

Speaker 7 [00:14:19] Oh, yes. You can always use big stuff down the Yellowstone.

Speaker 5 [00:14:23] Okay, that's a real quick trout watch update for you from Denise [00:14:26]Sturm, [0.0s] a guide here at RJ Cain.

[00:14:27] Thank you.

[00:14:28] You did that very well.

[00:14:29] Thank you!

[00:14:30] Bringing the trout menu. Cal Dunbar is here, Jack Gartside is here. We're at RJ Cain Outfitters in Bozeman, Montana, and we're doing this show on Saturday afternoon, and you'll be listening to it right now on your local radio station on Sunday morning. We're also going to be broadcasting our third show on the Trout Jam' 96 Summer Radio Tour live

from our RJ Cain Outfitters next week, we'll probably do that sometime on Saturday. We haven't figured out exactly when yet, and it'll be airing in your area at our regular broadcast time. If you want to call the show, you can call 1-800-AMHATCH, 1-800-AMHATCH, we're going to be giving away RJ Cain t-shirts. We're going to be giving away copies of Jack Gartside's book, we're going to be having an awful lot of fun. And we have some surprise celebrity aficionados coming down to the show next Saturday from the conclave. And we have a couple of ladies there. It was a featured topic of the conclave this year, women in fly fishing. And we interviewed several of those gals who have also written books. And we're going to be bringing you some of those interviews next week, along with some really great fly tying interviews that we did from people around the world. And we sat down with them and tied flies and we put it on tape. So we'll be bringing you that next week from Montana, and then we'll be back on our regular schedule whenever we get back there and do it. And Jack, Jack is going to tie up for us this morning, the blow torch hopper and which was invented last year on the Madison River. For me especially, it was quite an honor to have a fly tier of his stature to tie a fly and then write it up in his book and bestow us with the honor of the Strayhorn blow torch hopper. So why don't you give us a quick rundown here about what we need? And let's tie it up, Jack.

Speaker 6 [00:16:13] It's really simple.

[00:16:15] Sure it is.

[00:16:16] All we need is a long shank hook. I'm using Dai-Riki number 270 right now. And number eight, larger hopper size and yellow thread. And most important with tying these hopper is to imagine the fly before you even begin, imagine the finished fly so that you get your proportions right, so that you don't crowd the eye and you get all of the materials in the right place and in the right proportion. The most important feature of the blow torch hopper is visibility. And of course for visibility I use a post poly yarn and in a color 'flame orange', that's my favorite color. I could see that from a far distance. So I try to tie that in about one third of the way back from the eye and I just lay on a thick slab of poly yarn, and oh, Bud Lily just walked in and distracted my attention, and then raise it, tie it around, clip it off, and I've got a parachute post. And having done that, I'm going to move my thread to the rear of the hook and tie in a short, a very short tail of light, light elk hair.

Speaker 5 [00:17:27] Which is yellow thread, by the way.

Speaker 6 [00:17:28] Yellow thread. That's right. Because it is going to be a yellow-bodied hopper. And then I'm going to take some dubbing and I'm going to put it on to the hook right now. I mean, onto the thread right now and dub it onto the hook around the body. Make a nice, smooth tapered body covering up the base of that tail and bringing that body material right up to the-the post, the base of the post. And having got there, I'm going to stop. And now I'm ready to tie on a hackle. And I like--it's going to be done in a parachute style. So I'm going to strip some of the hackle away and just the base of the hackle and tie this hackle in face down, concave side down.

Speaker 5 [00:18:05] Face down. That was kind of like you in the Murray last night.

Speaker 6 [00:18:07] It's kind of like that. That's kind of like what I was at the Murray. I'm going to tie it concave side down right at the base of that post, and then I'm going to wrap it around that post. And I like to, when I'm doing a parachute hackle, to go up and down, up and down, kind of crisscrossing the stem each time as I wind, and I build it up fairly thick so it'll float high, when I get to the right amount of hackle that I've decided on, I clip off

the excess and tie it down and then I add a little more dubbing to my thread and lift up that hackle out of the way and tie in just in front of that and just in back of the hackle and the post to fill in any bare spots and gradually taper that body right up to the head. And now I'm ready to finish the fly off.

Speaker 5 [00:18:54] Ready to snip it off and finish it off.

Speaker 6 [00:18:54] Snip off that wing to, you know, the height I like. If the height is too short, you can't see it from a distance, if it's too high, then it'll spin the fly. So you have to experiment with the height of that post.

Speaker 5 [00:19:07] And it works.

Speaker 6 [00:19:08] And it works, and even Strayhorn can see it from a distance. And so when I showed it to him, he said that looks like a blowtorch. And thus the name was born, the blow torch hopper, first tied along the banks of the Madison in Strayhorn's inimitable trailer, formerly used as a Las Vegas Showgirls dressing room--

[00:19:26] The old fifth wheel.

[00:19:27] --now used as a trailer on the Madison.

[00:19:29] Exactly.

[00:19:30] We took it out the next day and started to catch fish, and even Strayhorn caught one or two, as I recall. It has to work.

Speaker 5 [00:19:36] We also have, we also have another special mystery guest that showed up here. It was by special invitation. He just kind of wandered in to do the show with us this morning.

Speaker 6 [00:19:45] He certainly did.

Speaker 5 [00:19:46] And we don't, we don't want to really reveal who this is right now. I want you to give us just a real quick little hint.

Speaker 6 [00:19:52] No, I'm not going to do it. Our special guest, Cal Dunbar from West Yellowstone, Montana. That man about trout town that [00:20:05] Hopper [0.0s] had himself, Cal Dunbar, will give a few hints about our mystery guest. And if you can guess, if you can guess who the mystery guest is from Cal's brief description, he's not going to reveal too many details, so you have to listen closely, you get a prize, you get the fly I just tied. The blowtorch hopper.

Unidentified announcer [00:20:23] He's a native from this area, and it goes back several generations. And if anybody was going to be known as "the Old Man of the Madison"...

Speaker 5 [00:20:34] There's a complement.

[00:20:35] He's actually a Fabio lookalike and he's standing behind us. And we're going to, we're going to get him up here. And this is our special mystery guest, a legend in the fly fishing world, especially in the West. Jack, why don't you give a brief introduction here for this legend we have sitting next to us.

Speaker 6 [00:20:53] We're going to introduce him right now.

Speaker 5 [00:20:55] Right now? Yeah.

[00:20:55] Right now.

[00:20:56] Right now.

Speaker 6 [00:20:57] This man to my right, briefly, tantalizingly described by Cal Dunbar as the "Man of the Madison". I'll drop the adjective. He is the Man of the Madison. There are very few people in the world of fishing since I've been coming out here, and that's been about 35 years now, that I've ever met whom I respect as much as the man to my right who's fishing ability and genuine human qualities--

He's a man known to everybody in the trout fishing world, especially in Montana, as the person who's probably done more for fishing in Montana than anyone. A man I really admire, a man who had a fly fishing shop. I'm going to give you a hint--down in West Yellowstone for many, many years, and a landmark still. And I'd like you to give a big Trout Talk. welcome to our special guest, Mr. Bud Lily.

[00:22:01] Hey, Bud Lily, right here alive on Trout Talk, nice to have you here at RJ Cain Outfitters on the Trout Jam '96 Summer Radio Tour. Good afternoon, Bud.

Speaker 8 [00:22:12] Thank you. It's a wonderful introduction that Cal and Jack gave me. I get to the point now at my age where I start to believe that stuff.

Speaker 5 [00:22:22] You're starting to read, you're starting to believe all the stuff that's been written about you.

Speaker 8 [00:22:25] That's right.

Speaker 5 [00:22:26] Why weren't they writing it when you needed it?

Speaker 8 [00:22:28] That was a very good question, I was always waiting for it.

Speaker 5 [00:22:31] We understand that you have a new fly-fishing mecca buried somewhere in the hills here of Montana. Why don't you tell us about that?

Speaker 8 [00:22:37] Well, I do. I'm very lucky. I'm back in contact with a lot of fishermen in a very personal way. My mother had a little historic hotel in Three Forks that's strategically located, you know, to be on those famous rivers.

Speaker 5 [00:22:51] Okay, why don't you hang on a second now, Bud.

[00:22:52] [Incoherent]

[00:22:54] Oh, we do. Okay. Well, go ahead. Go ahead.

[00:22:57] And I've turned that into a little retreat for fly fishermen or fisherman, period. And it would be our pleasure if we could show it to you sometime.

Speaker 5 [00:23:05] And that's, what's the name of it?

Speaker 8 [00:23:06] It's Bud Lilly's Anglers Retreat.

Speaker 5 [00:23:08] And it's down around Three Forks.

Speaker 8 [00:23:09] It's in Three Forks, just off Main, behind the Town Club bar.

Speaker 5 [00:23:13] And when you say--right behind a bar, that's conveniently located.

Speaker 8 [00:23:17] They give room service.

Speaker 5 [00:23:19] Is it a full service?

Speaker 8 [00:23:20] No, we don't sell food because there's a lot of excellent places, nice restaurants and Sacajawea and others there to have a nice meal.

Speaker 5 [00:23:29] And what does it cost to go down there?

Speaker 8 [00:23:30] Well, we have sleeping rooms for \$55 per night for a man or a couple, and then we have a couple of nice small apartments that are condo apartments that are full-service housekeeping with two bedrooms, sitting room, kitchen, and the whole works.

Speaker 5 [00:23:42] Do you have guides down there?

Speaker 8 [00:23:43] I can arrange for fishing guides. I do throw through the shop here.

Speaker 5 [00:23:47] Okay. Stand by for a second, Bud, we're going to take a break. We'll be back with more Salmo-babble from Bait Basher headquarters live from R.J. Cain Outfitters on Main Street in beautiful downtown Bozeman on the Trout Jam '96 Summer Radio Tour with Jack Gartside and Bud Lily. Unidentified announcer [00:26:34] Boy, it sure is a nice day today. I believe I'll go back out in the garden and dig me up some worms, and go fishin'. I got me a nice little spot picked out down there on the creek. Boy them perch is bitin' like crazy. Yes, sir. I'm going fish, fish, fish, fish, fish, fish, fishin'. I'm going fishing. Hook, sinker, and line. I said, fish, fish, fish, fish, fish, fish, fishing. Ma, I'm going fishing. Just to ease my mind. You know, some folks say that fishing on Sunday is a sin. I don't believe in that though. If a fish bite my line on a Sunday I'mma reel him on in. Haha. I believe I'll take him on home, and fry him up good and have a ball, 'cause I don't see nothin' wrong with fishin' on Sunday at all. I'm going fish, fish, fish, fish, fish, fish, fishin'. Boy, I'm going fishing, hook, sinker, and line. I said, fish, fish, fish, fish, fish, fish, fishing. Yes! I'm going fishing. Just to ease my mind.

Unidentified announcer [00:28:33] From Corpus Christi to Corpus [00:28:34][?], [0.0s] spanning the continent from the parched right in the desert to the polluted rivers of progress. This is a fish head's, Interactive Radio news magazine. And these are the stories in this week's Trout tabloid.

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Speaker 8 [00:29:13] Well, as I said, I began to believe it.

Speaker 5 [00:29:17] And when did you open that? You opened Bud Lilly's Trout Shop in West Yellowstone.

[00:29:21] Yeah, I put the name Bud Lily on it in 1951. Originally, it had been a shop more or less instituted by Don Martinez, who was a very sophisticated and talented fly tier and fisherman in those days. And he put his stamp on West Yellowstone and made West Yellowstone--really recognized the, what fly fishing could be for the community and for a business.

Speaker 5 [00:29:44] And you also did a, you also did some radio stuff back then, didn't you?

Speaker 8 [00:29:48] We, we had a new radio station that opened in West Yellowstone called KWIS, and I'm not sure the exact year, but it occurred to me it might be fun to tell people about the fishing through the radio broadcasts so we'd get on the air live every morning at 7:55, and I'd recap the day's fishing previously and what I predicted for that day and the next few days.

Speaker 5 [00:30:09] You two have known each other for quite some time, Bud Lily and Jack Gartside, and you used to wake up to his fishing reports, right?

Speaker 6 [00:30:14] When I woke up.

Speaker 5 [00:30:16] Where were you?

Speaker 6 [00:30:17] I was out of Baker's Hole, and the reception out there was pretty poor because it was a small radio station. You know, it only broadcast over an area of about two miles.

Speaker 8 [00:30:24] Yeah. Jack told me to talk loudly so he could hear me.

Speaker 5 [00:30:31] So you've seen an awful lot of changes in the
[00:30:33][unintelligible?][0.0s]

Speaker 8 [00:30:33] Yeah I have. A lot of it I can kind of, you know, I've known Cal Dunbar, and we had a great time fishing together. 1959, the year of the earthquake in West Yellowstone, and many years after that, I met Jack shortly after that. And my first impression of Jack is kind of the Huck Finn, the fly fishing. He fished because he loved it, and his tackle in those days was pretty rudimentary. Came in the shop one day and he said, Look at my new waders. But he'd found a pair of discarded waders along the river and cut off the tops and just had the bottoms. So that suited him very well because he could fish and do a great job in any kind of a garb.

Speaker 5 [00:31:09] And what, what advancement in fly fishing now has impressed you the most?

Speaker 8 [00:31:14] Well, the numbers of fishermen now, you know, are pretty impressive. When I first started in West Yellowstone, the first few years, I could name all my customers by their first name, and I could identify all the fly fishermen who came through West Yellowstone. Of course, now those days have changed, and a lot of the business has become more, less personal. And people have different expectations. I've always--my fishing philosophy, and I think Jack, too, if I can speak for him and Cal Dunbar, as we fish just because we like to fish. And we took the results as being a bonus, and just making us happy. Many of the younger fishermen today probably go out, try to catch the biggest, the most, and it's kind of competitive. I don't regard it as a competitive sport.

Speaker 5 [00:31:56] You mean the yuppies in their post, post-grunge fly fishing fashions, and their Jeep Cherokees, and their cellular phones, and their \$800 rods are out there fishing for numbers and more competitive, and then back in your day when you were fly fishing, it was more of a contemplative sport and you went out for relaxation and just a love of fishing.

Speaker 8 [00:32:18] I think Jack can address that.

Speaker 6 [00:32:20] I think, I think Bud is right. Fishing has become very competitive. I just go out, I love to catch fish, don't get me wrong. I certainly love to catch fish and that's why I do it. But I'm not really out there competing with anyone but myself, if competition even enters into the equation, I just enjoy being out there and fishing with someone like Cal Dunbar, for instance, who likes to walk a lot. I love to walk. I don't feel comfortable standing in one place. Cannot cast into one fish all the time. I like to put one foot in front of the other. Move, and walking is large part of the pleasure. Being in the beautiful state of Montana and looking up at the big, big blue sky and, and seeing the water go by. That to me is a large part of it. Fish, the fish, and the number of fish caught is important. But if I have a bad day, and there's no such thing, and don't catch as many fish I had hoped, I've still had a wonderful time. And, and that's, and that's what Bud Lily was talking about earlier. It's not competitive. It's just it's spiritual in a way, without being wimpy about it. This is spiritual.

Speaker 5 [00:33:29] No wimps.

[00:33:30] No wimps.

[00:33:30] No wimps on this program.

Speaker 6 [00:33:31] That's right.

Speaker 5 [00:33:33] This, this retreat, Bud, there is an awful lot of water up here in Montana. A guy could not fish all this water in his lifetime if he didn't have a job like Dick Hennesey. And where is your favorite place to go?

Speaker 8 [00:33:44] Well, that's a question I get, you know, all the time and have for many, many years, what's your favorite--

Speaker 5 [00:33:49] And I know you always lie about it.

[00:33:50] And I lie--

[00:33:52] You don't want anyone to go in there.

Speaker 8 [00:33:52] And I put them off. But I'll tell you, the way I answer that is that we have so many choices, it depends on the time of year. You can't have a favorite stream that's always in season because things change. You have high water, you have low water, you have conditions that are not correct. The hatches aren't there or whatever. I had to do so, to get myself back in the groove. I spent a summer, in fact I spent three summers fishing broadly, and from my little retreat I fished 40 different rivers. And that's in Western Montana, parts of Idaho, Wyoming. And we can reach a majority of those streams within an hour to 2 or 3 hours. So we have a lot of choices.

Speaker 5 [00:34:32] So if somebody came up and spent a week or two weeks at the retreat, they could fish 40 different spots, 40 different rivers.

Speaker 8 [00:34:38] Well, whatever time they had. And that's part of my service. As I lay out their fishing itinerary for them, I give them a direction. I make their reservations, like through the RJ Cain shop and the other fly shops in the area. We've got a shop in Three Forks. We have guides that live in that area, and we can give them a really complete and great program.

Speaker 5 [00:34:58] What would be your most, your most memorable trip?

Speaker 8 [00:35:03] Well, I've gone over this a number of times because it's one that sticks in my mind most of all, is to be with a fisherman that caught his last trout and recognized it, and to be able to help him catch that last trout, that's made my most memorable trip.

Speaker 5 [00:35:19] And you've done that.

[00:35:20] And I've done that.

[00:35:22] That's a great moment. What about, what about you, Jack? Montana, up here in Western Montana.

Speaker 6 [00:35:28] My most memorable trip?

[00:35:30] Yeah.

[00:35:31] I can't remember it.

[00:35:31] You can't? Both you guys are, both of you guys are obviously over 40 and you can't remember much. And you're just leaving me out here hanging.

Speaker 8 [00:35:39] I've always had that comment. Like in one of my books you said, I know a lot, but I can't think of it.

Speaker 6 [00:35:43] That's right. I saw a T-shirt the other day that said, "I've been there, done that. I just can't remember it."

Unidentified announcer [00:35:48] Right.

Speaker 5 [00:35:49] And who was it that said fly fishermen never lie, fly fishermen never lie, but they have one hell of a fudge factor.

Unidentified announcer [00:35:56] That's good.

Speaker 5 [00:35:57] Who was it that said that?

Speaker 6 [00:35:58] I think that was [00:35:59] **Ish Kabibble**, [0.0s] a famous fisherman from Three Forks.

Speaker 5 [00:36:02] We were talking with Cal a little bit earlier about fishing with ants, and he had mentioned lakes, that a lot of people don't fish terrestrials on lakes. What's your take on that, Bud?

Speaker 8 [00:36:11] Well, I think the terrestrial is generally really overlooked because that, they're not, they don't have the consistency as the other hatches that we can identify. But being able to learn to use the ants in the right place, and then, of course, fishing the grasshopper and learning all the angles of using the grasshopper. The grasshopper, you know, is the one that catches the big fish.

Speaker 5 [00:36:32] That's right. Do you have any hopper tips since this is a [00:36:34] **[unintelligible]**. [0.0s]

Speaker 8 [00:36:34] I have a hopper tip. The guy that ties the greatest grasshopper in the world is sitting on my left.

Speaker 5 [00:36:39] That would be Jack "The Heron" Gartside sitting right there.

Speaker 6 [00:36:42] Thank you Bud, I'll give you five bucks later.

Speaker 8 [00:36:44] So that's what he charges for the flies.

Speaker 6 [00:36:46] That's true. That's true. There are 44 steps involved in tying a good one.

Speaker 5 [00:36:50] And I'll tell you, Jack's hoppers really do work. They do work, and they're in the new book Fly Tying for the Criminally Insane. But that'll be out soon, and then Jack's other two books are also available here at RJ Cain. Have you seen Jack's books, Bud?

Speaker 8 [00:37:04] I have. Jack sent me one of the books, and I have it. I'm not sure where he is at the moment.

Speaker 5 [00:37:08] He obviously sent your bill with it too, didn't he, if I know him.

Speaker 6 [00:37:13] When, When is your book? When is your book going to come out?

Speaker 8 [00:37:16] Well, I've printed a couple of books with Paul Schullery as my coauthor, and they're now out of print, and we're in the process of doing another one. We'll probably put that out next spring.

Speaker 5 [00:37:28] It will be coming out. What's that about?

Speaker 8 [00:37:30] Well, we're not going to disclose that at this time. We're just going to do--

Speaker 5 [00:37:34] Obviously, the manuscripts aren't proofed.

Speaker 8 [00:37:38] We're going to do a lot of reminiscing, probably.

Speaker 5 [00:37:39] Are you? Will it, will it be an inspirational book, or will it be an informational book? Or what kind of book would it be, a combination of both?

Speaker 8 [00:37:46] I am trying to stay away from the information because there's thousands of books that have been telling all the secrets.

[00:37:53] Mm hmm.

[00:37:53] And I'll leave that up to the experts.

Speaker 5 [00:37:56] And the Bud Lily's Angler's retreat down there in Three Forks, the number. Write this down because it is a heck of a place to go stay, and you can fish an awful lot of water from there. And if you need some help, you're down there most of the time, aren't you?

Speaker 8 [00:38:09] Well, I'm down back and forth, but I have a wonderful couple that manage it, my cousin Dave Miller and his wife, Norma.

Speaker 5 [00:38:15] So if they have any, any, any information that they need and if they have any--

Speaker 8 [00:38:18] They will be there.

Speaker 5 [00:38:19] Need for equipment, they'll help them out.

Speaker 8 [00:38:20] We've had a full house this past week, and the comment that really makes us happy is that they say that not only is this a wonderful facility, but it's the cleanest and the most friendly place we've ever stayed.

Speaker 5 [00:38:31] Is that right? Get a pencil and write this number down to Bud Lily's Fly Fishing Retreat: numbers 406-285-6690. 406-285-6690. And this is your shot, right here, we're 70 cities coast-to-coast. And this is your shot to say whatever you want to say.

Speaker 8 [00:38:54] Well, I appreciate that opportunity. And all I want to say is that if you want to meet great people with great hospitality and a great area, come to the Gallatin area or the Yellowstone area and you'll find them.

Speaker 5 [00:39:06] Gallatin, that's my favorite river. I catch an awful lot of fish on the Gallatin. How about you, Jack?

Speaker 6 [00:39:10] That's one of my favorite areas, too.

Speaker 5 [00:39:12] We were talking last week and I was having a heck of a time down there on a couple of trips, and I guess I was just in the wrong spot. I've never had a whole lot of luck on the Gallatin. Do you believe in being trapped in like a, a fishing vortex like that where there's a certain spot you just don't do well at?

Speaker 8 [00:39:25] Well, I talked to Cal a couple of days ago and Cal and I kind of agreed that we had a fairly major weather front go through the last few days, it changed conditions drastically, and that can be a big factor.

Speaker 5 [00:39:36] So does that mean I'm constantly fishing in a bad front? I mean, each day I pick to go fish is the wrong day, right?

Speaker 8 [00:39:42] That's the best excuse I've been able to come up with.

Speaker 5 [00:39:47] We're coming to you live on the Trout Jam '96 Summer Radio Tour with our special co-host, Jack "The Heron" Gartside, who's sitting here in a tuxedo shirt with a fishtail bolo on.

Speaker 6 [00:39:55] I just got it at the thrift shop in Montana [00:39:56][unintelligible]. [0.0s]

Speaker 5 [00:39:57] And it is truly a sight to behold. I'm telling you, shoes are untied--he tied his shoes. I'll be darned. And our mystery guest here, Bud Lilly. Thank you for joining us today on Trout Talk Bud. It's nice to have you come by.

Speaker 8 [00:40:07] Well, I've had a lot of fun. Thanks.

Speaker 5 [00:40:09] We'll be back with more Salmo-babble from Bait-Basher headquarters here at RJ Cain in beautiful downtown Bozeman. There's more action waiting upstream on this morning's audio-angling adventure, so stick around for the final segment. Don't wiggle off because there's more trout talk to come.

And they were, they were really onto them, and I didn't have a one on me, so it will never happen again.

Speaker 6 [00:47:08] You were fishing for gulpers, Cal, perhaps you could tell the audience what gulpers are.

Unidentified announcer [00:47:12] Well, we have, there's two kinds of gulpers. They had the early morning gulpers, which is--

Speaker 5 [00:47:17] Wait a minute, stop. We're talking about gulpers here--

[00:47:21] Gulpers.

[00:47:21] And you've got our aficionados who are listening right now on the edge of their seat.

[00:47:24] Is that right?

[00:47:25] Yeah. What we're gonna do is we're going to milk this radio moment. We're going to give out our [00:47:28] **keister** [0.0s] award, right now.

Anyway, Gulpers are feeding on these mayflies that are coming off in the morning, and they have the Tricos come off early in the morning, they're the small ones, and then, and then about from ten till about one or till the wind comes up, we have the Callibaetis, which is a fairly large size mayfly. Comes off, it comes off from about the middle part of July till the middle part of September, and for about 2 hours in the morning. And there, it's a large fly, it's a #14, and the fish are very attracted to it.

Speaker 5 [00:49:17] Cal, I want to thank you for coming down, doing the show with us today. Jack, I want to thank you for co-hosting with us today. I'd like to thank Ross and his wife at the Windmill RV Park in Livingston for their great hospitality and a wonderful sewer hookup, and special salmontations go to Montana Master Angler for supporting Trout Talk on KPRK in Livingston, Montana.
