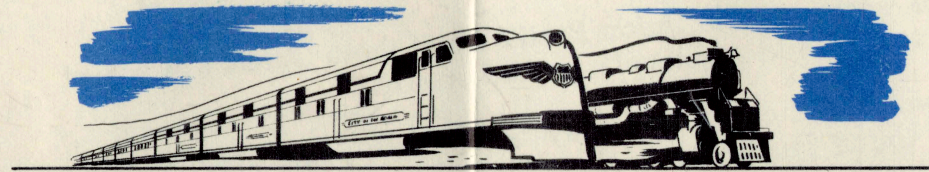

FAST SERVICE

to California

Between Chicago and California the Los Angeles Limited and the San Francisco Overland Limited with through standard Pullman accommodations provide convenient evening departures, both eastbound and westbound; morning arrivals at destinations. The Challengers with coaches and tourist sleeping cars follow approximately the same schedules between Chicago and Los Angeles—San Francisco. The Pacific Limited has morning departure and morning arrival daily at Chicago and at the two California Coast cities. This train has all classes of accommodations. The Streamliners, City of Los Angeles and City of San Francisco, offer the ultimate in travel convenience and comfort; these extra fare trains each make 10 round trips each month between Chicago and the Coast; standard Pullmans and coaches.

From Saint Louis, via Kansas City and Denver, there is daily service similar to that from Chicago and connects with it at Cheyenne or at Ogden.

Pacific Northwest

To and from the Pacific Northwest and Chicago the Portland Rose and the Pacific Limited operate daily. Each carries all classes of accommodations, and each connects at Cheyenne or Denver with trains of similar character, the Pony Express and the Pacific Limited, that operate to and from Saint Louis. The Streamliner, City of Portland, is a non-extra fare train between Chicago and Portland; five round trips each month; standard Pullmans and coaches.

Colorado

Union Pacific through service to and from Colorado is provided by the Streamliner, City of Denver, daily overnight train; no extra fare; coaches and standard Pullmans. The Columbine also carries coaches and standard Pullmans daily between Omaha and Denver, connecting with a coach train to and from Chicago.

Between Saint Louis and Denver via Kansas City are the Pacific Limited and the Pony Express. These popular daily trains carry all classes of accommodations.

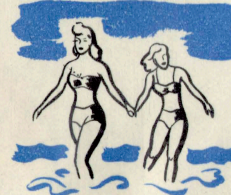

California, conscious of its popularity as "host" to a nation, always has an all-year calendar of special events for the enjoyment of its guests.



Scenic Attractions En route to or from CALIFORNIA

Going to or returning from California there are a number of distinctive attractions that will further enhance your trip. Convenient stop-overs can be arranged at such scenic wonders as Grand Canyon National Park in Arizona, Zion National Park and Bryce Canyon National Park in Southern Utah, Boulder Dam and Lake Mead in Nevada. A few of the highlights of these side-trips are briefly described below.



GRAND CANYON NATIONAL PARK

Grand Canyon is an experience you must discover for yourself. It is impossible to describe its sheer grandeur and breath-taking beauty. This tremendous chasm, 280 miles long, a mile deep and more than 12 miles wide, is rightly called the "Divine Abyss." The vivid colors, the changing lights of the Canyon are thrills that must be seen to be fully appreciated.

ZION NATIONAL PARK

The road travels deep into Zion Canyon where great red precipices rise in majestic splendor on both sides of the narrow valley. At times the Can-



yon widens, to open a curtain that reveals scenes of inspiring beauty, like the Temple of Sinawava. Here you will also find the famed Great White Throne, the Mountain of Mystery, the East and West Temples, and many more examples of nature's handiwork. The Gates of Zion are open to those who wish to view a world that is both spectacular and unusual.

BRYCE CANYON NATIONAL PARK



Bryce is one of the most amazing and fascinating sights on earth—seemingly a forgotten city of oriental brilliance with its temples, minarets and rock-statues glowing with light and color. The changing color patterns are almost as astounding as the unusual rock formations and both are unforgettable. From Bryce's sunken gardens rise architectural structures that might have come from the ancient capitals of the world. Even their names are intriguing—Bluebeard's Castle, Queen's Castle, Moon Temple, the Silent City, Temple of Osiris, and many others. The famous trails of Bryce are another treat, and every visitor delights in exploring them, either on foot or horseback.

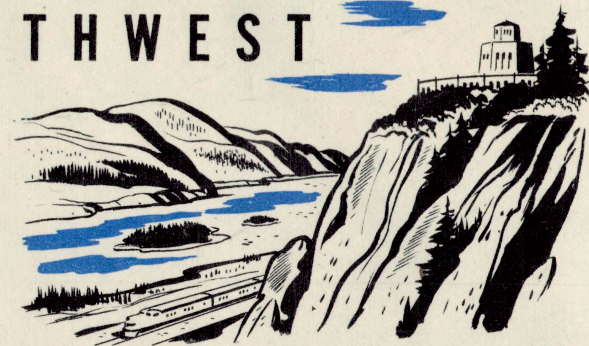
BOULDER DAM and LAKE MEAD

A short distance from Las Vegas, Nevada, with its "frontier days" atmosphere is Boulder Dam and Lake Mead. Mighty Boulder Dam is a tribute to man's genius in harnessing the Colorado River. Lake Mead, the vast reservoir, covers 227 square miles; largest artificial lake in the world. There are excellent hotels at Las Vegas and Boulder City for those who wish to prolong their visit.

THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST

Union Pacific trains parallel the magnificent Columbia River Gorge for 200 miles of inspiring scenery on the way to and from Portland. The Pacific Northwest presents a cool, green empire of great forests, crystal lakes and sparkling waterfalls. In this setting of enchanted beauty, you will see Bonneville and Grand Coulee Dams, Multnomah Falls, Mt. Hood and Mt. Rainier, the jagged Olympics, the majestic Cascades, the Oregon caves, petrified trees, and the end of the old Oregon Trail near Astoria, Oregon.

Another attraction of the Pacific Northwest is Puget Sound. This is an inland sea of more than 1,600 miles of golden strand, dotted with garden-like cities and towns, including Seattle, Tacoma and Olympia. Mountain climbing, hiking, horseback



riding, sailing and swimming are but a few of the delights of this vacation wonderland.

Traveling to or from the Pacific Northwest it is just a short side-trip to Yellowstone National Park.

YELLOWSTONE AND GRAND TETON NATIONAL PARKS

Yellowstone is weird and magnificent. It is the oldest, largest and perhaps the best known of our National Parks. So amazing are its geysers, hot springs, paint pots, mud volcanoes, petrified forests, mammoth canyons and waterfalls that for many generations people refused to believe that such things existed.

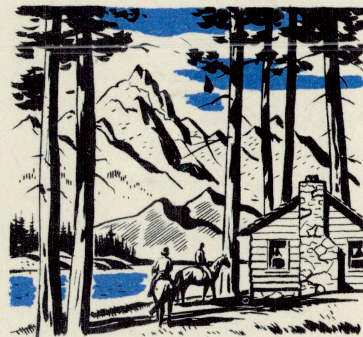
When the first exploring party arrived in Yellowstone in 1870, they thought the billowy cloud of vapor drifting from Old Faithful was smoke from a forest fire. Such a misconception is easily understood even today, for Yellowstone is so fantastic and incredible that it beggars description. Yellowstone is also one of the greatest wild-life sanctuaries in the world. Perhaps the bear family is best known. Begging for sweets and posing for snapshots is their specialty. Because they have no fear of visitors, it is hard to realize



that they are really wild animals, living year after year as they always have in the wilds of the Rockies.

The tang of the Old West still lingers in Grand Teton National Park. This is real old-time cattle country, and it isn't hard to picture the riding cowboy, the Indian with feathered head, the smell of the branding iron, the outlaw, and all the other lore familiar to every American boy.

Grand Teton is unsurpassed in striking mountain scenery. The towering peaks rise from the shores of Jackson Lake and pierce the sky with their cathedral-like pinnacles. Teton Lodge and Jackson Lake Lodge command splendid views of the magnificent Teton Range. The central lodges and sleeping cabins are built of native log, rustic in atmosphere, but thoroughly comfortable. From these lodges excursions are made in all directions into the surrounding countryside. Saddle horses, motor and row boats may usually be hired at the lodges.

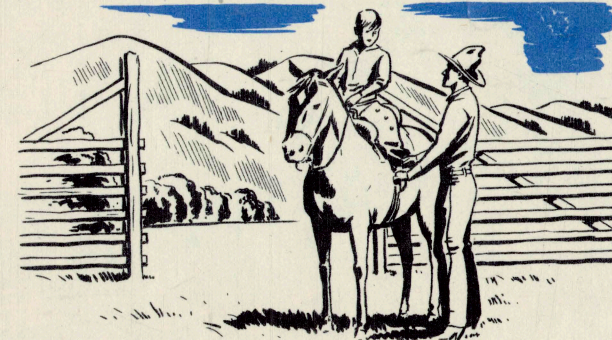
