He may write these at the Mammoth School, if you will arrange with the principal for the proper supervision and send us the name and address of the person to whom we should send the papers. The examinations will be those of the Secondary Education Board known as English III and Mathematics III Arithmetic. We are enclosing samples of these examinations. Perhaps you will wish to write to the Secondary Education Board, Milton 86, Massachusetts, for their publication "Definition of the Requirements for 1948". This booklet, which sells for $45 \rlap/ e$, indicates in detail the ground to be covered in preparing for the several examinations and contains the corresponding examinations given in 1947. We hope that Datus by passing these examinations will qualify for admission to Exeter. This letter deals with admission only.
