Any woman may be eligible for membership who is of the age of eighteen years, and who is descended from a man or woman who, with unfailing loyalty, rendered material aid to the cause of Independence; from a recognized patriot, a soldier or sailor or a civil officer in one of the several Colonies or States, or of the United Colonies or States; *Provided that the applicant be acceptable to the Society.*

Official proof of service must be furnished with the application; also references to authorities quoted, to show line of descent. *Where reference is made to unpublished or inaccessible records, the applicant must file duplicate certified copies of same. Statements based upon tradition alone cannot be considered.*

ANCESTOR'S SERVICES.

My ancestor's services in assisting in the establishment of American Independence during the War of the Revolution were as follows:

John McCutcheon served as private in Captain James O'Hara's Independent Company of Virginia Troops - He served in this organization from Sept. 16, to Dec. 18, 1778 -

He also served as private in Col. John Gibson's Company 9th Virginia Regiment Commanded by Col. John Gibson Revolutionary War.

His name is first borne on the Company muster roll covering the period from June to Sept. 1779, which shows that he enlisted March 24 to serve during the war -

And it is last borne on a company muster roll for the months October, November, & December 1779 -

in Window Rock, N.M. Nice
adobe style house with corner
fireplace, beams, corner fireplace.

1936 - Back to Des Moines for Christmas.
 Rosemary born in same house on
 34th St. Dad paid his folks
 \$30 month for our board while
 he went back to Arizona.

1941 - Caroline born in same house 9/28.
 Dad tried to enlist in Corps of
 Engineers but not accepted - had
 3 kids. Went as civilian to Kodiak
 Island, Alaska '42-43 while Sage
 built. Then back to Des Moines +
 later to Trinidad + French Guiana.

Late '43 - early '44 - While Dad was in
 S. America, moved to 24th St.,
 a block or so from Elmwood school.
 Bill was born on dining room
 table by Grandpa (nurse).
 Thought it best to have babies
 born at home. (March 6, 1944)

1944, Fall - moved to Omaha, Neb., to work for National Park Service. I had accompanied him from Omaha to Des Moines on one interview.

1946, August - left Omaha when we had to give up rented house to a vet. People in office offered to loan Dad \$9,000 to buy it; he did not accept. (Halley Davidson joined in the loan offer.)

Moved to Holiday Camp, between Child + man lakes near Hackensack mirror. Dad was caretaker. Rode to school with Kurt + Myra Hill, after walking to their house. Went to school for a couple of months.

1946, November - Moved to Mammoth
Hot Springs, Yellowstone Park.
Carl, 1 year old, crying; Dad
remembers it as the only time
Carl cried. Train left
Minneapolis + picked us up
in Little Falls. Frank Mattson
met us in Livingston.

now had to learn to boil potatoes
longer at high altitude.

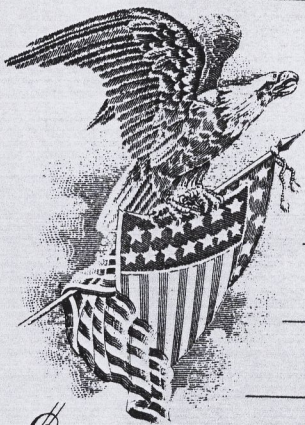
