Harvey Valley Soil Evaluation Trip

According to your speed-memo reply to Jack Reppert, you are suggesting the dates of July 22-24 for the visit to the Harvey Valley Project. I see no particular conflict here with my visit to you. Tentatively, I will plan to see you and Chet for a soil-review on July 25 and 26.

As you well know, we did not make the area coverage goal for June 30 as we had estimated for the Shasta area. Probably the poor mapping weather of April and May was the chief contributing factor among other things. This will mean, of course, a more concerted effort from you and Chet to close the gaps for the balance of the field season in order to fulfill our committed goal of completing the Shasta and Trinity County areas by July 1, 1964.

In view of this, I feel you can, at the most, devote no more than three days of your time to the Harvey Valley Project even though Jack Reppert indicated in his letters that he wanted you for one or two weeks. I discussed this with Harry Camp and, in essence, two or three days was the amount of time that we originally agreed to with Joe Woolfolk.

As you know, we welcome these interesting side projects. They not only give you field men a little diversion and experience with new soils in other areas, but they also aid other researchers in their soil problems and encourage them to use and understand our maps and to extend the results of their experiments to other areas.

Since you may be unfamiliar with the soils on the Harvey Valley area, especially the bottom land "200" area, I go along with your original recommendation that Reppert request some help from the SCS soils man, Les Williams. I understand he has surveyed in that general area and should know the kinds of soils and their extent in the Harvey Valley area.

On July 19, 1963, Mr. Julian Mapes, grazing permittee on the Lower Pine Creek Allotment, called at this office regarding trailing his permitted cattle from the Lower Pine Creek Allotment to his private holdings north of Board Cabin via Gooch Valley.

The route Mr. Mapes has been using is not an established stock driveway as he deviates from the driveway at Champs Flat.

There have been some complaints from the users of the Gooch Valley Allotment through which he travels with his stock at the close of the grazing season.

Since Mr. Mapes' allotment is on the Susan River District but the area in question is on the Bogard District, both Rangers were present. After discussion, the following actions were decided on:

1. A Forest Service representative will plan to accompany the Mapes drive through Gooch Valley to Board Cabin to ascertain whether or not damage to the resource is taking place.
2. An attempt will be made to pick a site for a holding field in the east end of Champs Flat, 20-30 acres. This is on the regular driveway and Mr. Mapes' present enclosure is much too small.

Management (Range - Training Course)

The last two days or so of the range management training course scheduled in the regions February, March and April 1964 will be spent in discussing and preparing management plans for specific allotments. Will you please assemble the information called for on the enclosed form for six representative allotments in your region. Pages 4 and 9 are not included in the form. Cover sheep and cattle ranges if both are important, and ranges presenting multiple use as well as livestock grazing problems.

Please prepare a colored range-type map for two contrasting allotments on a scale of 2 inches = 1 mile or greater. In addition, please prepare a colored range utilization map for these two allotments.

Show:

1. Area not grauable by livestock. Leave uncolored.
2. Area grauable by livestock but not used at present time because of lack of water or for some other reason. Color yellow.
3. Area grazed at present time broken down by degree of use by sites within vegetation types. Use the following arbitrary breakdown of percentage use and map colors.

<u>Use percent^{1/}</u>	<u>Use description</u>	<u>Map color</u>
0-5	none to negligible	Light blue
6-25	Light	Dark blue
26-50	Moderate	Green
51-75	Heavy	Orange
76-100	Very heavy	Red
