SUBJECT: Rest-Rotation Grazing System

Your reference:

(Your Washington Office will be notifying you shortly, if it has not already, that I will be working part time for the Bureau again this fiscal year. I will put in six months time on Bureau work interwoven with Forest Service research. As in the past I will be headquartered at the Experiment Station in Berkeley. I know I will enjoy the assignment as in the past. I hope you find it worthwhile.

(I have been asked to conduct additional training sessions on rest-rotation grazing, check on the status of the pilot rest-rotation grazing allotments, provide counsel on range management problems generally, and to talk with stockmen and other groups on rest-rotation management.) This program and a work schedule are outlined in Washington's memorandum to you.

This summer and fall I would like to meet with the area managers and permittees and take a look at the pilot rest-rotation allotments that have been in operation a season or more to see how things are going and help resolve problems if any. As you know (these pilot allotments were set up to test the effectiveness and practicability of rest-rotation grazing under various range conditions. It is vital that the best form of rest-rotation grazing possible under the circumstances be practiced on these allotments for they will serve as examples for the many interests concerned with wildland management like land managers, land administrators, conservationists, wildlifers, recreationists, researchers, educators, legislators and the public) ~~to see and appraise.~~

(I am particularly anxious to get the reactions of the permittee to rest-rotation grazing. His wholehearted cooperation is essential.) I hope we can meet with him on the ground, but if not there then elsewhere that is convenient. I would like to take photographs and notes on each allotment so would like to spend an hour or so on the ground. This may not be necessary in cases where I visited the allotment recently.

(According to my records about 42 BIM allotments in the 10 western states are now under some form of rest-rotation management. I would like to see as many of these and others that may be operating as can be conveniently arranged.) A list of these allotments and a tentative trip schedule to the state accompanies Washington's memorandum. Attached here is a somewhat more specific trip schedule. Kindly let me know if the schedule for your

state is satisfactory. If not, please send me your suggestions. While on this trip I will be glad to discuss other range problems with you or talk with stockmen groups.

Two week-long rest-rotation grazing training sessions are tentatively planned for February (6-17) in Salt Lake City. These sessions are designed for prospective in-service instructors who will teach rest-rotation grazing at the district level.) The recruits will be drawn largely from the groups that took the ~~original~~ week-long training course. Still other sessions may be held later for those who have not had an opportunity of attending any of the training schools yet. Please let me know if the date and place of the presently planned meetings are satisfactory. If not, may I have suggestions. I will notify you of the concensus.

Please send me a travel and program schedule for your state so I can plan my coming trip accordingly.

Bureau of Land Management

1. Check status of management on rest-rotation grazing allotments.
2. Conduct training course for Bureau personnel selected to teach rest-rotation grazing management in service.
3. Provide counsel on special problems.
4. Explain rest-rotation grazing management to stockmen and other groups.

Forest Service--Research Projects

1. Method of appraising range trend under rest-rotation grazing.
2. Bitterbrush grazing management.
3. Bitterbrush seed germination.
4. Reliable cattle weights.
5. Training guide--rest-rotation grazing management.

Hormay - Main jobs with BLM FY 1967

1. Training additional instructors on rest-rotation grazing management.

BLM need - To train all BLM personnel directly concerned with range and resource management on principles of rest-rotation management. Train people as quickly as possible so on-the-ground application can be made as soon as possible. Additional instructors are needed for this purpose.

Program for FY 1967 - The Bureau is asking Mr. Hormay to conduct additional local training courses designed specifically for these instructors. Potential instructors will be drawn from district and state offices. Plan is to have one instructor in each district and in each state office. Candidates will be drawn from personnel that have taken Mr. Hormay's

week long training course two years ago. Men showing a good grasp of rest-rotation management, a desire to learn more, capacity to teach and counsel, will be selected from this group. These men will have to be provided time to carry on this training work.

2. Status of pilot rest-rotation grazing allotments - The prime purpose of these allotments is to check the effectiveness of rest-rotation grazing management under the various conditions encountered on lands administered by the Bureau. It is essential that the best form of rest-rotation grazing possible under the circumstances be practiced on these allotments. If a substitute form of management is being applied the allotment does not classify as a test rest-rotation grazing allotment.

Mr. Hormay is being asked to look at the allotments that are actually under management during the 1966 grazing season (about 50) and check with both the allotment manager and the permittee on results obtained, and on any unresolved management problems. Mr. Hormay should meet with and get the reactions of the livestock operator. Information and photographs on these allotments for use in talks with stockmen and others and for range management training purposes would be advantageous.

A proposed calendar of trips to the states is attached. These trips have been fitted in with his Forest Service program. This schedule must be checked with the BLM State Director before finalizing.

There are approximately 50 pilot allotments under management this year in the western states. Mr. Hormay should see as many of these as time permits, particularly those that are showing responses, good or bad, and those posing unresolved management problems.

3. Special problems - We are also asking Mr. Hormay to look at unscheduled special problems of concern to the various offices from time to time while he is visiting in the states.
4. Stockmen and other contacts - Part of Mr. Hormay's assignment with the Bureau will be to meet with stockmen, Advisory Boards, and other groups to explain rest-rotation grazing management and good range practices.

Fly to Worland arriving at 10 a.m. Spend remainder of Thursday and Friday reviewing Rannell's system and other systems as proposed by Worland District.



The itinerary proposed for California in your August 19, 1966 memorandum meets with no known conflicts.

Inasmuch as you have already made field inspections of the 2 rest-rotation allotments in the Bakersfield District we believe another district should be visited. Susanville is having difficulty getting started on their allotment so we propose Riverside as the best remaining alternative. This will be a different allotment (lease) than the one inspected by you early this spring. It is a little unique in that both perennials and annuals enter the management picture and we have a 12 month period of use. The rest rotation plan is being formulated cooperatively with SCS on a joint Ranch and Range Management Plan. If you are interested in this proposal we can meet you at the Riverside District Office on the morning of November 15th or at whatever time you can arrange to be in Riverside. We will review the plan in the district office during the morning and early afternoon, then drive to the Baker area that evening. On the 16th (Wednesday) we will review the allotment in the field and take you in to Las Vegas that evening.

November 10, 1966	8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.	Lakeview District Thompson Lake - Crump Reservoir Allotment


We have arranged the Oregon schedule to begin at Baker and end at Lakeview, hopeful this would meet your travel plans involving Idaho and California.
