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## SYNOPSIS 8

The story takes place on the proud ship H.M.S. Pinafore, under the command of the courteous and beloved Captain Corcoran. With him are his sailors, including the dashing seaman Ralph Rackstraw, the grim and detested Dick Deadeye, as well as a rosy dockside vendor named Little Buttercup and the Captain's beautiful daughter Josephine. Ralph has fallen in love with Josephine, however the disparity between their classes prevents her from reciprocating his affections. Instead, Corcoran has betrothed her to Sir Joseph Porter, the haughty First Lord of the Admiralty. When Sir Joseph arrives with his company of sisters, cousins and aunts, our Josephine is dismayed to find she has no love for the man and excuses her lack of interest with reverence for his stature. She agrees to elope with Ralph after he threatens suicide, and together with the rest of the sailors they conspire to sneak ashore at night to be married.

#### Act II

Before the plan is set into motion, the wretched Dick Deadeye betrays them to Captain Corcoran. In his rage upon accosting the conspirators, Corcoran utters a profanity, which is overheard by Sir Joseph. As Sir Joseph deplores such asperity in a commanding officer, the Captain is sent at once to his cabin. Ralph is sent soon after to a dungeon cell when the First Lord learns of his amorous plans, but the predicament is reversed when Buttercup reveals her dark secret: Years before she had nursed both Captain Corcoran and Ralph and had accidentally mixed them up as babies. With this knowledge, Corcoran returns as a common sailor, and Ralph becomes captain. Sir Joseph can no longer marry Josephine due to her diminished social standing, and instead settles for his cousin Hebe. Corcoran is able to declare his love for Buttercup, and Ralph is at last free to unite with Josephine.

to do her menial's duty - to be her humble servant

foremast hands - those sailors who serve "before the mast" (those below the rank of filo officer) [see Quarter-deck]

**quarter-deck** – the deck to the aft of the mainmast where only commissioned officers may promenade

ship a selvagee – a hank of rope yarn made into a strap or sling

he would commit **solecisms** that society would never pardon – gaffes, or breaches of etiquette

Sir Joseph Porter, K.C.B. – Knight Commander of the (Order of the) Bath (high honor)

bang the loud **nine-pounders** go – the smallest of the battery of the cannons carried on Royal Navy ships (which also include 18 and 32-pounders)

**pocket borough** – refers to a parliamentary seat controlled by a single individual (usually wealthy landowner); these seats were abolished by the Great Reform Act of 1832

**grog** – rum diluted with water (from the nickname of the Admiral who began the custom of issuing the drink to sailors, "Old Grog," so called for the grogram cloak he usually wore)

British tar – slang for sailor

**Cimmerian darkness** – according to Homer's Odyssey, the Cimmerians lived in a land where the sun never shines

I am but a living **ganglion of irreconcilable antagonisms** – a bundle of nerves

either at sixes or at sevens – to be "at sixes and sevens" is to be confused

**bumboat** woman – boat used to peddle provisions to ships in port

storks turn out to be but logs; bulls are but inflated frogs – references to Aesop's fables

turbot is ambitious brill – kinds of fish, turbot being preferred

gild the farthing - lowest denomination of British coin at the time

the prospect is Elysian - in Greek mythology, Elysian fields were the home of the blessed

**cat-o'-nine-tails** – (or simply "t**he cat**") – a whip with nine knotted lashes used for punishment

**fo'c'sle** – short for "forecastle," the forward part of the ship, usually containing the crew's quarters

**no telephone** – the first telephone transmission was in 1876, and the first London exchange opened in June of 1878, a month after H.M.S. Pinafore did



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## S ARTISTS N

Sean Anderson (Baritone) Captain Corcoran Mr. Anderson made his solo operatic debut at age 10 as Harry in *Albert Herring*. Since then, he has had leading roles in over 60 productions all over the world. Diversely adept at comic, tragic, sung, and spoken works, he has garnered national critical acclaim from such publications as *Opera News, Opera Today,* and the *Wall Street Journal*. This is his sixth appearance at Intermountain Opera Bozeman having debuted in 2008 as Eisenstein in *Die Fledermaus* and most recently as Dandini in this past May's production of *La Cenerentola*. Mr. Anderson closes the 2014 season with the Knoxville Opera, reprising the role of Captain Corcoran. He

will appear as the guest soloist with Opera Southwest for their New Year's Gala, and then begin the 2015 season as Count Almaviva in *The Marriage of Figaro* with the Sarasota Opera, where he is a perennial favorite.

Caitlin Cisler (Soprano) Josephine

Ms. Cisler, from Appleton, WI, made her professional debut in 2009, headlining as Cunegonde in *Candide* with Four Seasons Theatre in Madison, Wisconsin. Praised for her "breathtaking range of voice," Ms. Cisler has appeared as Marie in *La fille du régiment*, Oscar in *Un ballo in maschera*, Pamina and Papagena in *Die Zauberflöte*, Gretel in *Hansel und Gretel*, Lola Markham in *Gallantry*, and Norina in *Don Pasquale*.



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A well decorated competitor, Ms. Cisler is the proud recipient of a 2012 Career Bridges Grant. Also in 2012, she was an honored finalist of the Fritz and Lavina Jensen Foundation

Competition in New York City. In concert, Ms. Cisler has performed as a featured soloist with Madison Opera in their annual "Opera in the Park" as well as with the Dayton Philharmonic for their New Year's Eve Celebration in 2012 and the *Messiah* in 2013. Ms. Cisler holds a Masters in Opera Performance from the University of Wisconsin – Madison, and Bachelor degrees in vocal performance and biology from Lawrence University. She is a published researcher in vocal health and the effects of singing on the immune system.



#### Glenn Seven Allen (Tenor) Ralph Rackstraw

Mr. Allen has appeared on Broadway and at major concert and opera venues throughout the United States. Upcoming roles include Tony in the workshop of *Great Scott* by Jake Heggie and Terrance McNally for Dallas Opera and Charles in *The Long Christmas Dinner* at Alice Tully Hall with the American Symphony. His operatic roles include II Duca in *Rigoletto*, Alfredo in *La Traviata*, Romeo in *Romeo et Juliette*, Tonio in *La Fille du Regiment*, Almaviva in *Il Barbiere di* 

Siviglia, and Rodolpho in William Bolcom's A View from the Bridge. Broadway. His N.Y. credits include The Light in the Piazza (Lincoln Center Theatre), Carousel, \*PBS Great Performances (Avery Fisher/NY Philharmonic), Guys &Dolls (Carnegie Hall), and A Fine and Private Place (York Theater). Mr. Allen trained at the University of Washington (MFA/Acting) and the University of Michigan (BFA/ Musical Theatre). This fall, he joined the acting faculty at the Yale School of Drama.

Keith Jurosko (Baritone) Sir Joseph Porter
Mr. Jurosko brings nearly 40 years of stage experience with
him to Intermountain Opera Bozeman's production of *H.M.S. Pinafore*. For 35 consecutive seasons he has been a principal
artist with The New York Gilbert & Sullivan Players , where he
has appeared in over 800 performances in two dozen roles. In
addition, he has been a guest artist with many of the country's
leading regional opera companies, including Virginia Opera,
Chautauqua Opera, Mobile Opera, Opera Delaware, Anchorage
Opera and The Boston Academy of Music, where he has sung

in a wide variety of roles in G&S, opera, operetta and musical

theatre. Trained originally as an actor, Mr. Jurosko has also performed in many nonmusical productions, including leading roles in works by Shaw, Noel Coward, Neil Simon and Ken Ludwig, among others. Keith was also one of the original members of the internationally renowned travesty troupe La Gran Scena, whose zany yet brilliant operatic parodies delighted and tickled audiences and garnered spectacular reviews and a still loyal following of opera-loving audiences (and more than a few major opera stars) the world over.

Kenneth Stavert (Baritone) Dick Deadeye

Praised for his strong "sense of theatricality," Mr. Stavert has performed on operatic, concert and recital stages throughout the United States and Europe. Some of his credits include Guglielmo in *Così fan tutte*, Figaro in *Il barbiere di Siviglia*, Yamadori in *Madama Butterfly*, Sciarrone in *Tosca*, Schaunard in *La bohème*, and Gregorio in *Roméo et Juliette*.

Kenneth's orchestral credits include Fauré's Requiem, Orff's Carmina Burana, Handel's Messiah and Mozart's Vesperae

Solennes de Confessore. He has also been a featured recitalist throughout the United States specializing in less performed English art song.

Kenneth holds a Bachelor of Music in voice performance from the Bob Cole Conservatory of Music in Long Beach, California, and a Master of Music degree from the College Conservatory of Music in Cincinnati, Ohio. He currently resides in Cincinnati where he studies with Kenneth Shaw.



#### Sarah Larsen (Mezzo-soprano) Buttercup

An alumna of the Seattle Opera Young Artist Program, Ms. Larsen has performed as Maddalena in *Rigoletto*, the Secretary in *The Consul*, Mercédès in *Carmen*, Suzuki in *Madama Butterfly*, Tisbe in *La Cenerentola* and the 1st Touriere in *Suor Angelica*. For her performance as Suzuki with Seattle Opera, Sarah was praised in the press as "the hidden gem of the show," "smart, succinct and with a sultry mezzo that belied her demure demeanor," and possessing

considerable "maturity & depth." Recent engagements include Ms. Larsen's debut with The Glimmerglass Festival as Neris in *Medea*. Prior to that she created the role of Sarelda in John Musto & Mark Campbell's comic opera *The Inspector* with the Wolf Trap Foundation.

Ms. Larsen grew up in Roseville, MN, and attended Simpson College (B.M. Vocal Performance) and Rice University (M.M. Vocal Performance).





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### S ARTISTIC STAFF №

Steven Byess - Conductor

The extraordinarily-varied career of Steven Byess takes him not only to the stages of symphony orchestras and opera companies, but also to the stages and genres of Broadway, jazz and television. He is a dynamic conductor and has been hailed by critics as "masterful and brilliant," "creating the epitome of instrumental elegance" and "a talented interpreter, able to capture the sweep of a piece without neglecting detail."

He is the Music Director of the North Mississippi Symphony Orchestra (formerly the Tupelo Symphony Orchestra) and the Arkansas Philharmonic Orchestra, and Associate Music Director for the Ohio Light Opera. With the Ohio Light Opera he has conducted, to critical acclaim, over 450 performances of 60 diverse operas,

operettas, and musical theater works. Mr. Byess recently conducted the U.S. premiere of Russian violinist Alexander Markov's Rock Concerto and made his Carnegie Hall conducting debut leading the work in New York in October 2010.

Mr. Byess received his Bachelor of Music Degree in classical performance and jazz studies from Georgia State University, and his master of music degree from the Cleveland Institute of Music, where he studied conducting, bassoon, violin and piano.

Mr. Byess is a passionate advocate for the arts, much sought after for his speeches on the arts, music, music education and general education. An important community leader, he has created and organized frequent and annual collaborations with numerous choruses, chamber music ensembles, and festivals of the arts. He also wrote, co-directed and is featured in a PBS presentation entitled *Count On It!*, which is designed for children grades K-3, and shows the correlation of music to mathematics. He is a conductor of the Carnegie Hall Weill Music Institute Link Up orchestral education concerts, performing in multiple U.S. communities for over 15,000 children in 2013.



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#### Benjamin Wayne Smith - Stage Director

Mr. Smith brings a balance of practical experience and innovative storytelling to his projects, which have been hailed by Opera News as "full of comic inventiveness." He has recently directed new productions of *Hansel and Gretel, The Pirates of Penzance, La Cenerentola,* and *The Turn of the Screw.* In 2012, he directed all of the Mozart/Da Ponte collaborations, and this August he directed the gala concert honoring Speight Jenkins at Seattle Opera.

Mr. Smith has directed for Seattle Opera's Young Artist Program, Tacoma Opera, Asheville Lyric Opera, Opera Theatre of Pittsburgh, The Intermountain Opera Bozeman, the Young Artist Program at Pittsburgh Opera, the University of Cincinnati/CCM, Baldwin Wallace University and The Opera Theater of Lucca, Italy.

In 2010, Mr. Smith finished his tenure as the Resident Assistant Director at Seattle Opera where he worked on eleven productions over two years. Other assisting credits include Washington National Opera at the Kennedy Center, Cincinnati Opera, Michigan Opera Theater, Pittsburgh Opera and the Opera Theatre of Pittsburgh. Following his tenure at Seattle Opera, Mr. Smith joined the faculty at Baldwin Wallace University as their first Director of Opera. In this capacity, he trains all of the vocal performance majors in a self-designed, seven semester opera workshop sequence and directs the opera season. In 2013 Ben was appointed Artistic Director of the Accademia Vocale Lorenzo Malfatti, a summer training program for young singers in Lucca, Italy.

Mr. Smith holds an MFA in Opera Stage Directing from the University of Cincinnati where he studied with Nick Mangano, Nic Muni and Sandra Bernhard. He began his career in opera as a singer, performing twenty-one leading roles in opera, operetta and musical theater. He has logged over 250 performances in the U.S. and Italy.

#### Linda Curtis - Artistic Director

Linda Curtis was educated at Wells College and Northwestern University where she received her Master of Music degree in voice. She was on the faculty of the Colorado Rocky Mountain School and has taught voice at Colorado Mountain College and at Montana State University. Linda has appeared at the Meadowbrook, Grant Park, and Aspen Music Festivals and has studied and performed at Opera Barga in Italy. Linda was co-founder and frequent guest artist with Colorado's Crystal River Opera Association. Roles she



has performed include Annina (*La Traviata*), Rosina (*The Barber of Seville*), Baby Doe (*The Ballad of Baby Doe*), Mimi and Musetta (*La Bohéme*), Adina (*Elixir of Love*), Micaela (*Carmen*), Adele and Sally (*Die Fledermaus*). She has soloed with the Bozeman Symphony in various works including Honegger's *King David* and Berlioz' *L'Enfant du Christ*. Linda was president of the Intermountain Opera from 1995-1997. She assisted Artistic Director Pablo Elvira until 1997 when she assumed the responsibilities of Artistic Director.



#### Jon Harney - Choral Conductor

Jon Harney has been chorus master of IOB since 2002. He has sung supporting roles in *Carmen, Manon Lescaut* and *The Ballad of Baby Doe* with the Intermountain Opera. With other companies, he has performed more than 25 principal and supporting roles in opera and major works with orchestra and chorus.

Dr. Harney is associate professor of music at MSU, where he teaches voice and choir. He holds and M.M. and D.M.A.in vocal performance from the University of Minnesota where he studied

under Clifton Ware and a B.A. in music education from Luther College, studying under Weston Noble.



#### Tessa Hartle - production pianist

Ms. Hartle is currently a pianist/coach on the music staff of Opera Theatre of St. Louis and has also worked for Sarasota Opera, Virginia Opera, Des Moines Metro Opera, Aspen Opera Theater Center, Opera North, and UrbanArias (Arlington, VA). In the fall of 2014 Tessa will be joining the music staff of Florida Grand Opera as a coach/accompanist working primarily with singers in their young artist program. She has her bachelor's degree from the University of Michigan and a master's degree from the University of Maryland – College Park.

#### Beth Lee - choral pianist

Beth Lee has several decades of experience as a piano accompanist. She studied piano at Florida State University and later privately with James Streem. Her experience includes work as a piano accompanist for music majors at Florida State University and Montana State University, church organist for many years, music director and accompanist in several community theater organizations, harpsichordist with a string quartet in an opera arts association, and accompanist for a varied assortment of choral, jazz and instrumental groups.

## Puccini (double bill) Suor Angelica & Gianni Schicchi May 15 & 17, 2015

Nearly 100 years ago, composer Giacomo Puccini was inspired by a Didier Gold play to fulfill his long-held desire to compose a trio of one-act operas. It took him just over two years, but Puccini achieved his goal, naming the triptych II Trittico. The operas were vastly different, musically and thematically, but Puccini reveled in the drama, from the heartbreaking but redemptive *Suor Angelica* to the farcical *Gianni Schicchi*. The opera opened in December 1918 at New York's Metropolitan Opera, but thanks to the physical and economic demands of mounting three operas in a single evening, the three acts were rarely performed as the triptych Puccini intended. Still, their resonance and beauty endure even now, individually and together. IOB is proud to bring *Suor Angelica* and *Gianni Schicchi* to the Bozeman stage in May 2015. You won't want to miss a moment ...

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Suor Angelica portrays the poignant saga of a noble-born woman turned nun who, banished from her family, lives with the memory of her illegitimate child. The opera is filled with hope — hope that Sister Angelica will reunite with her family and child — and with devastation, when she learns her son has died. It's impossible to listen to the sweeping composition without feeling the dramatic emotions that define this solemn and exquisite work.

By contrast, the fast-moving *Gianni Schicchi* is comedic and uproariously delightful. Based on a scene in Dante's Divine Comedy, the opera tells the tale of a family — and the trickster, *Gianni Schicchi* — who will go to any lengths to steal the fortune of a deceased relative. It was Puccini's first full comic opera and arguably the most often performed of the three operas in Il Trittico. *Gianni Schicchi* includes one of the most popular arias in all of opera: "O mio babbino caro." A triumph in popular culture since 1918, *Gianni Schicchi* was even produced to great fanfare by Woody Allen in 2008.
