Ivan's handwritten notes from senior year at Northwestern U. (Medill) and 5-week summer staff job at Natl High School Journalism Institute at Medill, paid \$350. Includes notes from Institute lectures, ref. to CT (contemporary thought) papers students had to write weekly; also "news events" staff made up and acted out for students. Also instructions for cherub (student) editorial writing.

Note that Ivan, Carol (Muller) and Jerry (Ackerman) are class assistants for copyreading class. 1st ref to Carol and Ivan, not yet linked.






Faulkner - great
because he tries to
accomplish impossible.
He sets himself new
tasks & materials - he
is endlessly fertile.
When his experiments
are successful, he comes
out with a profound
vision of human conditions.

& he absorbs all sorts of
interpretations - most of which
make sense. Like
Melville & Shakespeare,
there are always new
insights in Faulkner's
works.

Faulkner deals c
violence for a purpose -
he's disturbed at what
it means for human
nature. He does not
merely deal in
"cult of cruelty."

Nor was he a
"traditional moralist".
He was
"untraditionalist".

Another limited view
is Cowley's: Faulkner
as a spokesman for
legend of South.

A fairly-recent development is to regard Faulkner as a great technician. But he's more than a virtuoso.

Now there is an attempt to find Christian allegories throughout his work.

Christian motifs appear, but Faulkner didn't use Christian doctrine for a specific purpose. He is a novelist of people, not of ideas. Second, his attitude is not basically Christian. He doesn't believe in a loving God, apparently. He puts his faith in human beings: "man will endure."

"Dry September" —

"Bloody Sept. Twilight"
shows his careful use
of language.

relationship is
perhaps his main
preoccupation.

• Plunkett crystallizes

outlet.

Miss Minnie Cooper —
She is frustrated because
she is upper middle-class,
but not high enough to
marry upper class. So
she's relegated to
spinsterhood — as a
marginal figure whom
"town had relegated to
adultery." She uses this
gossip against another of
town's victims — Negro.

Faulkner doesn't
describe lynching; he's
interested in elements
leading to it.

After lynching Miss
Minnie goes downtown,
to enjoy a vicarious
sexual experience. And
as she enjoys attention
"children eat ice-cream."






