- chaff beds: repelled ticks @ threshing; beds were plump - "you were all touching ceiling". Thistle pts might poke thru.
- old chaff was emptied into piggy d; ticks w washed off - filled - sewn up.
- "charnie dogs": China dogs on mantelpieces
- rag rugs c. 1810
- pic of Angus peat cart in 1820s
- plate s. of Glamis outlined by stone fences



- Muir Blidge tower and have been prominent at Albert Harbour; looks up - Clyde, so'd "home"
- tops of hills lost in clouds - , flowers in hills across Clyde - in every bay (on every hillside)
- Gourock: green hills across water (hills of Argyll?) ("Argyll's green hills")
- A's eyes are on-water, R's on-land because of his family, as their ship travels out - Frith
- generosity of strangers while traveling: whoever tells them a lemon/lime for freshening-mouth



- Steamboat Quay, to c. of customs Hse where ship's fence is now
- E. India Hs, looks west: tall-masted ships, & small boats a paddlewheeler amidst ships, tall funnels smoking
- view across - Clyde, from Customs Hse Quay: steamer passing smokeily, sail boats
- Mid Quay, W. Harbour: Muni Bldg Tower high over all, chim' pots, 3-masters moored steamer moored, small boats around quay.
- Municipal Tower & Spire of Mid Parish Church - from Well Park
- view up - Clyde - from Princes Pier: steamers smoking & river, constancy of bldgs along shore
