Dear Ivan:

My seniors and I are still reveling in the extraordinary session we were privileged to have with you on April 16. I know that you had reservations about meeting with high schoolers, but I am hoping that the enclosed comments will put to rest any apprehension you might have about their ability to appreciate your amazing writing and to gain valuable insights into the craft of writing. Their comments speak to how successfully you addressed their questions and inspired some of them to follow the sage advice you offered. I would add that I have included all of the comments that students submitted, warts and all! I am also enclosing some photographs of the art display as well as one of all of us together. My apologies for their poor quality.

On a more personal note, I deeply appreciated the opportunity to meet both you and Carol. Having been an admirer of your writing for over twenty years, I was thrilled at the chance to have a few moments to talk with each of you individually. As a teacher, I was mesmerized on Tuesday evening by your careful analysis of the paragraph on the opening page of This House of Sky, and will draw on it in my own lessons on good writing in the future. Watching my students listen raptly to you the following day and discussing the session with them in the classroom afterwards, I was delighted that they gained so much from their meeting with you.

Your entire two-day visit to Corvallis was a resounding success. Those of us who worked on the One County One Book committee were immensely pleased that we had made a wise decision in selecting *This House of Sky* for the project, realizing only in hindsight that we were fortunate not only in having picked a fine piece of literature but also in happening upon a renowned author who is approachable, engaging, diligent, and witty. We couldn't have asked for more.

Thank you so much for agreeing to participate in our project and for your willingness to meet with high school students. Your impact on all of us was profound.
