





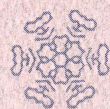
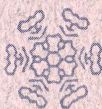
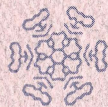

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Burton K. Wheeler (1882-1975) migrated to Butte from his native Massachusetts in 1905. A capable and strong-willed young attorney, he quickly made his mark in Montana, first as a legislator and then as U.S. Attorney for Montana during World War I, where he demonstrated great courage as a defender of civil liberties.

In 1922, he won election to the U.S. Senate, where he served for a quarter-century until 1947. His Senate career was one of the most distinguished in American history. Senator Wheeler won fame and prestige as an unrelenting pursuer of wrongdoing in the Harding administration, as the leader of the Senate coalition that defeated President Franklin Roosevelt's attempt to "pack" the U.S. Supreme Court, and as an outspoken "isolationist" who opposed American entry into World War II.

Following his defeat in 1946, Senator Wheeler "retired" to a highly successful Washington law practice, which he maintained until the close of his long and distinguished life. Thousands of Montanans remember him as one of the most colorful and prestigious citizens the state has ever produced.
