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

Talk about unexpected rewards--your book of Swan's artwork came as a lovely surprise. It set me to musing whether I would have done *Winter Brothers* any differently if all that art had been available to me. I think I conclude--for the book's sake--that I'm glad I concentrated on Swan's diaries; but personally, damn, I'd like to have seen the art at the time.

I enjoyed meeting Nancy Kuhl when she was in Seattle recently, and told her I possibly hold the record for deferred results on Beinecke research. In 1968 I visited the library and drew on the Carl Van Vechten collection for letters written to him by the singer Taylor Gordon, from my hometown in Montana. The article I subsequently wrote never made it into print, but I revisited those shaky old copies of letters looking for Harlem turns of phrase when I was working on my last book, *Prairie Nocturne*. Good archival holdings never rust, I believe it proves, and I'm glad you have the Swan art. The book is a beauty, by the way, and thanks for the generous inscription.
