A DECIDED SUCCESS

SUCH WAS THE VERDICT OF THE THOUSANDS AT THE ELECTRIC SHOW.

WAS THE THIRD ANNUAL SHOW

Countless Electrical Appliances on Display.—Students at Hand to Explain Everything.

The electrical show, given by the students of the electrical engineering department of the Montana State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, in the electrical building last Friday afternoon and evening, was a brilliant success in every respect, and was well attended despite the fact that the day was rainy.

The first attractions for the visitors were two wireless telegraph field stations located on the campus. These were in operation during the whole time ringing bells and sending messages to the receiving station.

On the first floor of the electrical building were found students giving demonstrations in the testing and operating of dynamos and motors. A mercury arc rectifier for changing alternating current into direct current was in operation near by. A full display of both flame and arc lamps was also shown. In another part of the room an electrical forge for welding and forging was being operated by one of the students, while another was giving demonstrations in metal cutting by means of the electric arc. A group of the various kinds of electrical meters was kept running with the ever ready student near by to furnish any desired information.

The Streich telephones, whereby one may feel himself talk, the machines for testing the strength of materials and the electrical whistle were the other objects of interest.

On the first floor of the "annex" an oscillograph, for investigating alternating current wave forms, was shown in operation, and near by an innocent, unassuming speaking arc lamp was patiently and accurately reproducing songs, speeches and whistled tunes as sent by a kindly student in the engine room across the campus.

On the second floor were shown the

150,000 volt transformers for testing insulators. An interesting demonstration with the high frequency Tesla coil, showed how lamps may be lighted from electricity in the air, and how a large current of rapidly alternating electricity may be sent through the human body without danger. Visitors were also permitted to examine their anatomies by means of the X-Rays. In another room was shown a large assortment of the various types of storage batteries, while at another place electrical lamps were being tested. An automatic telephone demonstration set, furnished by the Montana Independent Telephone company, was shown in working order, operators ready to give explanations. A large mercury arc lamp was present with its deceiving colors, and the electrically scented flowers, the "mysterious cabinet" and the colored photography studio furnished amusement for everybody.

On the second floor of the annex was an electrical kitchen furnished by the Gallatin Light and Power company, where palatable refreshments were being prepared, by domestic science girls.

The electrical incubator and electro hen were busy hatching and caring for a brood of chicks, and one of the college wizards was employed at putting a plate of copper on the various keys and spoons furnished by the visitors.

The Madison River Power company exhibited a full line of heating and cooking appliances, and a display of Mazda and Tantalum lamps, induction motors, supply and heating devices was furnished by the General Electric company.

Other exhibitors were the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Co., The Benjamin Electric Manufacturing company, the American Vulcanized Fibre company, the National Metal Moulding Co., Dossert & Co., the G. and W. Electrical Specialty Co., and William Spieth.

The great success of the show was due largely to the efforts of the electrical show committee composed of S. A. Williams, (chairman), C. T. Booker, Harry Peek, A. S. Brown and W. T. Haines, and their student assistants, and too much praise cannot be given the boys for the large amount of work they contributed.

The college band gave open air concerts between shows in the afternoon and evening, and a dance in the drill hall at 9:30 that night.

NEW BOOSTER ADMINISTRATION

The first annual election of the Boosters was held Wednesday. A fair attendance was present and the general tendency toward perfect agreement of the smooth working organization was apparent. There was no contest for any office but those nominated were unanimously elected in each instance. Through the whole meeting there was an element of enthusiasm which augurs well for the work which lies before the society.

For the position of president J. Marvin Spain was chosen; John Hugo Dahling for vice-president; William T. Haines for second vice-president; Chas. Draper for secretary-treasurer; and Annis Maclean for sergeant. These officials will assume their duties at once and a meeting will probably be held soon for the purpose of finishing up the business of the year.

ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL TEACHER

Popular Member of '09 Class is Re-elected to Envious Position.

Miss Edna Bull, a member of the graduating class of 1909, has been re-elected as sewing supervisor in the Bozeman public schools—with an increase of salary.

Miss Bull has spent the greater part of her life in Bozeman, having received practically all of her educational training here. She was graduated from the Gallatin county high school in 1905 and entered college in the



fall of the same year, taking up the course of home science. She graduated in 1909 with the B. S. degree and this year has been teaching sewing in the Bozeman schools.

During her entire college course Miss Bull took an active interest in college affairs and was especially active in the Y. W. C. A. and Hamiltonia. She was president of the Y. W. C. A. one year, was one of the cabinet for three years and was a member whose work left a great impression and influence for good.

When it was decided by the public school board of Bozeman last spring to install a manual training and home science department, Miss Bull was promptly chosen for the latter work. She has been very successful in the work and the products of her department attracted especial attention at the exhibition held last Friday.

Though only a year out of college Miss Bull has made an enviable record. That her success may continue is the wish of her hosts of friends.

ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION ELECTS OFFICERS.

The assembly hour on May 20 was given over entirely to the election of officers of the Athletic Association for the ensuing year. The nominations for president were Roy B. Williams, James T. Annin and John Taylor. For vice-president Miss Edna Hagerman was elected without opposition, and Miss Blanche Metheny was elected to the position of secretary in the same way. Prof. W. D. Tallman was re-elected as treasurer and for assistant treasurer E. A. Chambers and J. Marvin Spain were nominated. By another unanimous vote George Cook and Vera Anderson were elected as sergeants-at-arms.

The managers of the different athletic teams were chosen by unanimous vote as follows: Football, W. G. Tremper; basketball, Noble Donaldson; baseball, Harold Wolpert; track, Ralph Brabrook; girls' basketball,

Clinton T. Booker.

The final vote resulted in the choice of Williams for president and Chambers for assistant treasurer. Mr. Williams is known as a quiet, reliable man, a zealous supporter of athletics, and a man of considerable business experience. He is a member of the senior class of next year. Mr. Chambers has distinguished himself in football and as a member of the band, as well as by being one of the most capable members of the Exponent staff. He is a member of the class of 1913.

The meeting was presided over by Louis K. Pool, one of the best athletes the school has ever had, who was president of the association last year.

An incident of the meeting was the defeat of a proposed amendment to the constitution providing that the men who win seconds in a triangular meet should be eligible to emblems. The sweaters and emblems for basketball and track men were distributed by Coach McIntosh. Annin, Sloan, and Sleeman received sweaters with "A's on them, Annin and Brown being awarded also a star in recognition of the fact that they had made their emblems in more than one branch of athletics. Pool made his second star in the track meet at Missoula.

By the middle of next week the fourth volume of the "Montanan" will be ready for distribution. It had been planned to have the Annuals here on the day of the electric show and they would have been here if the engraving company had sent the cuts on time. TENNIS SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED.

A tennis tournament will be conducted next week between the Bozeman Town Club and the College players. About twenty-five members have been playing on the city courts and about the same number at the college.

During examination week the inter-class tournament will be pulled off at the college. On Tuesday teams chosen from the Freshmen and Sophomore teams will play doubles. On Wednesday the Seniors and Juniors will meet and then on the following afternoon the finals in doubles and the singles will be played.

Some fast work has been seen at both the town and college courts and these tournaments should prove interesting.

INTER-CLASS MEET OF LAST SATURDAY IS SCENE OF SURPRISES.

JUNIORS WIN FACULTY CUP

Close Struggle Throughout.—Annin Wins Individual Loving Trophy.

On the afternoon of Saturday, May 21st, the annual inter-class field meet was held at the Inter-State fair grounds. During the day just preceding heavy showers fell and although the mile track had dried quickly it was rough and quite heavy. Notwithstanding this fact a majority of the inter-class records were broken. The following is a tabulation of the old records, their holders and of new records and by whom established.

Broad jump. Record held by Otis Keeler (1907), distance, 18 feet, 8 inches. Record broken by Ralph C. Brabrooke. Distance, 18 feet, 11 inches.

880 yard dash. Record held by Harold Flager (1907), time 2 minutes, 15 seconds. New record made by Elmer Sleeman, time, 2 minutes, 13 seconds.

220 yard low hurdles, held by Guy Kirscher (1907) time 27 seconds. Shot put. Held by Wm. Driscoll (1907). Distance, 31.89 feet. New record established by John Taylor and James Annin with a tie. Distance 34 feet.

One mile race. Record held by Earl Osborne (1905), time 5 minutes, 1/2 second. Not broken.

220 yard dash. Held by C. L. Henderson (1906) time 23 2-5 seconds. Not broken.

One quarter mile race. Record held by Louis Allard (1907) time 52 seconds. New record made by Louis A. Pool. Time, 51 3-5 seconds.

Hammer throw. Record held by Harold Baker (1905) 93 2-5 feet. Record stands.

No record for the discus throw had been previously recorded and John Taylor in taking first place established a record of 101 feet, 8 inches. Jimmie Annin repeated his clever performance of the triangular meet at Missoula by carrying off first place in the inter-class meet. "Sunshine" amassed a total of 27 points and thereby allowed the junior class to nose out the strong team of the sophomores by two points.

This victory puts the Faculty Cup in the hands of the Junior class. Coach McIntosh presented Annin, as individual champion, with a beautiful loving cup engraved in appropriate style.

Louis Pool was second in the race for individual honors with a total of 24 points. Pool was the only athlete entered by his class and deserves credit for the game struggle which he put up to win the meet for the class of '10.

The scores of the classes was as follows: Juniors, 34; Sophomores, 32; Freshmen, 27; Seniors, 24.

The dope sheet proved a failure with regard to the meet and surprises were distinctly the order of the day. Annin was expected to pocket the honors in the hurdles but was beaten by Pool in clever form. Jimmie, however, reversed the tables in the 100 yard dash and surprised the crowd by taking first from Pool in that event. Donaldson was booked to trot away with the \$80 yard run but was beaten by Sleeman.
