

MEDIOCRE EXHIBITION OF FOOTBALL COLLEGIANS TROUNCE BUTTE ATHLETES

Gridiron Science is an Absent Quantity at Second Game Played on the Campus Field—Although Visitors Were Never Dangerous the Work of the Blue and Gold Squad Was Disappointment—Bennion Uses Many New Men in College Lineup—Only Real Football is in First Quarter.

Montana State college easily defeated the East Side Athletic club of Butte in a poorly played game of football on the college field last Saturday by a score of 29-6. Many fumbles, mad and freak plays characterized the play on both sides. Several players, namely: Hamilton, Boberg, Benbrug and H. Taylor, were kept out of the game because of injuries received in received in Denver last week. Whether due to the fact that a walkaway was expected or to other reasons, the college failed to show anything in the way of class.

The first score came after 10 minutes of snappy playing when Gattton crossed the Butte line. In the first play in the second quarter Roubideaux punted over for a second touchdown. Another touchdown by Gattton and a goal kick by Roubideaux completed the scoring for the first half.

Butte's only score came in the second quarter when Capt. Weir got away and ran 40 yards over the line. In the second half a drop-kick by Gattton and a touchdown by Rice summed up the scoring by the college.

Butte threatened to score twice more. Oaas intercepted a Montana pass and with a clear field headed for the goal. He was downed after a thrilling chase by Morphey on the 10-yard line. The second threat came in the last quarter when Weir caught a pass and was downed just before he reached the line. Except for these two plays and the touchdown the work of Butte was ineffective. Nothing seemed to puzzle the blue and gold defense except one play, which Butte tried over and over again.

On the college side fumbles, poor passes, loose interference and at times poor judgment was the general order of the play. Only in the first quarter was any real football shown. After the game was practically clinched, Coach Bennion called off most of his first string men replacing them with reserves. A lack of pep and organization, due probably to the many changes in the lineup, marred the college work. The first team was put back in the last quarter, but were unable to get together. The blue and gold line was exceptionally strong and smeared play after play sent against it.

The first touchdown came after their grabbed a fumbled punt. A forward pass to their gained 20 and Gattton carried it over. In the kickout a poor attempt forfeited the chance to try for goal.

In the second quarter Roubideaux went over on the first play after Butte was held for downs on their 20-yard line. "Ruby" kicked goal. A few minutes later Butte fumbled a punt which the college recovered. Gattton again scored on an end run. In the last few minutes Weir scored the visitors' only touchdown when he out-guessed Saltz in deep field and got away. Saltz came back in the third quarter and put a drop kick over from the 30-yard line. The last tally came when Rice speared a pretty pass from Gattton behind the goal-line.

For the college Roubideaux and Gattton were dependable. Capt. Taylor at tackle played a strong game and also kept the whole line working like a "stone wall." Rice, in his first game of college football, showed good form at end.

The absence of the injured men was plainly noticeable.

For Butte, Fogarty at end and Capt. Weir and McDougal in the backfield showed up best.

OLD BALDY AT LAST WINS COLLEGE LETTER

The "M" Club Is to Receive a New Member—Sophs Will do the Presentation.

The idea of placing an "M" on the side of Old Baldy has spread rapidly since it was first suggested a short time ago, and even rivaled the inter-class football game in the amount of interest aroused in sophomore circles. The matter has been discussed at class meetings, and is the principal topic about the campus.

Committees have been appointed to make arrangements for the location and construction of the "M". A preliminary survey was made about two weeks ago, and last week a party took a transit up the steep slope of Baldy and spent the best part of the day in locating and staking out the letter. The party was composed of Edward Preston, Carl Borton, Raymond Kuhns, Rubert Streets, and Dave Thomas.

After scrambling up and down the hill and engaging in some lively discussion a suitable location was decided upon and the transit set up. From this time the work of laying out the letter progressed rapidly, and shouts of "line" and "chain" echoed up the mountain. Many factors were considered in the placing of the "M", among which were the supply of available material, the foreshortening of the letter as viewed from the city below, and the position which would make the "M" show the best.

Although exact information has not been given out it is understood that the letter will be of enormous dimensions, as it must be visible from the college, nearly five miles away. The height of the "M" is said to be two hundred and fifty feet, and it is to be constructed entirely of stone.

President Hamilton has expressed his approval of the project and declared his willingness to make a sophomore holiday to allow the class to carry out their plans. Next Monday has been set for the work day, providing the weather is favorable, and the committee is busy getting everything in readiness for the big day's work.

VOCATIONAL CONGRESS.

At the present time circular letters are being sent out to all who would be interested in the appointment of delegates and the congress promises to be the best yet. Lee Park Is the New President and Dan Noble Becomes Vice-President of the Club.

Last Friday evening about 30 of the college Boosters met in Prof. Tallman's room and elected several officers. Whit Manning, '17, presided. Lee Park, '18, was made president of the organization; Dan Noble, '19, vice-president and Manfred Snow, '17, secretary treasurer. Since a yell leader was needed the honor was voted to F. Crittenden, '17. At this point a motion was made that the meeting adjourn, which was accomplished without delay.

DEBATE COUNCIL MEETING LAST FRIDAY AFTERNOON

A short meeting of the debate council was called last Friday afternoon for the purpose of discussing matters of importance to forensic activities. Owing to the fact that the triangular debate league is a thing of the past, it is now necessary that the question for the freshman-sophomore debate be selected by some new means. A committee composed of David Steele, Raymond Cannon and Don Langohr was appointed to confer with Prof. Duddy and select a question for this debate which will take place Dec. 17, this year.

The matter of finances for debate was brought up and considerable discussion followed as to whether or not there was any allowance made for debate in the new activity ticket. Owing to a lack of knowledge on the subject, it was laid on the table to be brought up at a special meeting of the council in the near future.

A letter from the manager of debate at the University of Montana was read in which he expressed his opinion that there should be no debate between M. S. C. and the U. of M. this year, but no action was taken on the matter.

STREETS IS CHOSEN EDITOR OF ANNUAL

At a special meeting of the sophomore class held Tuesday afternoon Rubert Streets was elected editor of the 1918 Montanan, which will be issued next year. Mr. Streets has had two years' experience on the Exponent staff, of which he is now managing editor, and is an excellent man for the position.

The balance of the meeting was devoted to other business, principally the reports of committees. The location committee reported that the location of the letter had been determined and the necessary surveying done. The committee on class numerals recommended that numerals be given to all participants in class contests, and submitted a design. The action of the committee was approved and several minor matters were brought before the attention of the class. The meeting was perhaps better attended than any held thus far this year.

BIOLOGY CLUB.

The students registered in the biology course held a short but enthusiastic meeting last Friday afternoon. At this meeting the new science club to be known as the Linnean society was formally organized and the constitution adopted. The membership is limited to students enrolled in biology but the meetings will be open to all who wish to attend. Howard Seemans was elected president; Don Langohr, vice-president, and Rubert Streets, secretary-treasurer.

OUTLINE OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTION OF ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF MONTANA STATE

The name of the organization shall be the Associated Students of Montana State college.

Each regular student who has paid his activity fee shall be a member of this body and shall have a vote in all matters that shall come before it.

Legislative power shall be vested in an executive board which shall be elected by the Associated Students. It shall consist of a president, vice president, yell leader, two student members, all members of the A associated Students of Montana State college. This board shall call meetings, have charge of elections, and attend to matters of minor importance that shall arise.

There shall be five councils, the Council of Finance, Council of Publications, Council of Music, Council of Athletics, Council of Forensics, and the Council of Social Affairs. These councils shall consist of three members each, of which the chairman shall be elected by the Associated Students. The two other members, one from the faculty and one from the student body shall be selected by the chairmen of the councils shall be to secure information and make recommendations in regard to their respective activities. The council shall have no legislative power.

Under the proposed constitution the Associated Students shall assume control of the student activity fund, the distribution of which will be in charge of the Council of Finance.

This outline of the proposed constitution was read before the student senate last Wednesday afternoon and was favorably passed. A committee consisting of Edwin Ronne, Howard Seemans, and Edward Jacobs was appointed to act in conjunction with President Steel of the student senate in drawing up the constitution which will be presented to the student body for approval.

TRAVEL CLUB HOLDS FIRST MEETING OF THE YEAR.

Monday evening the travel club held its opening meeting in the chemistry lecture room. Rev. Divine gave a talk on the privileges and benefits of travel. This was followed by a discussion of the costs and possibility of travel as planned for by the average student.

Rev. Divine spent a portion of the time in outlining his plans for the year as follows: Two courses will be given during the year, the first one will consist of eight lectures to be given on the Tuesday evenings between now and Christmas. The second course will be composed of twelve lectures and will be given on Tuesday evenings following Christmas.

The club is fortunate in having such a man as Rev. Divine as a leader. He has kindly consented to give his time to the club. Rev. Mr. Divine is an exceptionally good man for this work, as he has personally visited all points that will be discussed by the club.

Next Tuesday evening at 7:00 p.m. one of the best lectures of the year will be given and illustrated by the Rev. Divine on "The Hawaiian Islands."

AGGIES OF COLORADO DEFEAT COLORADO U

The Aggie-Colorado game Saturday was no great surprise to followers of the conference football teams, when the Aggies walloped Boulder 23-6. For the last three years Aggies have had one of the best teams in the conference, but through injuries and hard luck have missed the championship.

The game Saturday was most interesting to spectators, as the teams played football all the time and the game was clean and fast. Boulder was completely outclassed, however, not being able to gain against the strong Aggie line, while the Aggies ran the ends and plunged the line of Colorado almost at will.

Nelson's punting for Colorado was the feature of the game, the long spirals saving Colorado time and again after the Aggies had worked the ball down the field.

Colorado's score came after an Aggie fumble, when Talbot scooped up the ball and ran 30 yards through a clear field to a touchdown. Only once after this was the Aggie goal in danger, when Colorado had the ball on their eight-yard line.

The Aggies have a wonderful scoring machine, with Nye and Duke as the chief ground gainers, and will make every team in the conference fight to stop them.

FROSH BRING GRIEF TO SOPHOMORES IN FINAL SESSION OF GRIDIRON CONTEST

Hamilton Saves the Day for the Infants in the Last Quarter of Inter-Class Pigskin Scramble—Frosh Finally Kick Loose the Slats of Defeat From the Cradle of Inexperience and Fasten a Deathgrip on the Scalps of the Mighty '18's—Lots of Good Material Shows up.

In a well-played game of straight football the freshmen defeated the sophomores last Wednesday by a score of 14-6. The sophs made their only touchdown in the second quarter when Riddick got away on an end run, ran 60 yards. The frosh secured

two touchdowns in the last quarter, the last one just as the whistle blew for time. About 400 students and townspeople saw the game.

The play was fast and rough at all times although a few fumbles and bad plays were made. Straight football was used throughout. The Frosh tried the forward pass about a dozen times, only three, however, were successful. Two of these counted for touchdowns. The sophs tried the pass game but a few times, though to no effect. In punting Thien and Graves did good work with the latter having a shade on distance.

The sophomore score was made when Riddick got away around left end and made a pretty run of 60 yards for a touchdown. Theirs try for goal failed. The score, 6-0, stood until the last quarter, when the freshmen were strengthened by the addition of Hamilton. Of the next dozen or so of plays Hamilton carried the ball two-thirds of the time. With about five minutes left to play a forward pass from Morphey to Hamilton resulted in the first touchdown. Boberg kicked goal. Score 7-6.

The freshmen kicked to the sophs and forced them back almost to their goal line. An intercepted pass gave the 19's the ball. A series of line plunges in which first down was made once followed. Then a forward pass from Boberg to Bergman on the old shoestring formation gave the frosh their second touchdown. Boberg kicked the goal leaving the score, 14-6.

The victors' line was well defended by Trask, Bean, and Eenz, all of whom played a wonderful game, both on the offense and defense.

Graves, new at the game, showed up well in the backfield while Hamilton, Hansen and Boberg all contributed to the frosh victory.

Captain Ross, Hastings and Borden all did stalwart work on the defeated line, while Riddick, Carl Borton and Holt showed much promise as back field men. Riddick displayed fine speed at running and dodging. The lineup was as follows:

SENATE APPROVES OF COMMITTEE REPORTS

At a meeting of the Student Senate held Wednesday afternoon the report of a committee proposing the drawing up of a constitution for an associated student body was read and approved. The report of the committee on rallies was also adopted. It provided for a permanent committee composed of the president of the Boosters, and the president of the band to have complete charge of all rallies. Under this rule any student who attempts to start a rally of his own accord and with no authority from the committee on rallies or from President Hamilton will be liable to faculty discipline without any interference from the senate in his behalf.

THE WEEKLY EXPONENT

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The Weekly Exponent is strictly a student enterprise. Its chief purpose is to present to its readers each week an accurate and complete record of the developments in college affairs during that period and it is intended that its influences shall be exerted for the upbuilding of Montana State College. The paper is the result of voluntary effort put forth by the students who compose the staff.

An Associated Student Body.

At last Wednesday's meeting the student senate passed favorably on the report of a committee which had been appointed to look into the matter of revising the old senate constitution, or making a new one. A brief outline of the proposed constitution which was unanimously passed by the senate appears elsewhere in these columns.

It has been no secret that the student senate plan at Montana State is a failure. Previous to the adoption of the constitution of the present senate the old senate failed. Two years ago the plan of the present body was worked out. It, too, has proved inadequate. The failure of the senate plan of student government has not been caused by lack of strong leaders. The senate has always been fortunate in having capable men at its head. The primary cause for the failure has been the feeling among the students of the college that the senate was a body which was not truly representative of the students, and one in which they had no direct interest. Thus it has been that rulings made by the senate have not carried the weight which they should in order to be of any great value. Students failed to co-operate with the senate rulings because they felt that the body was not truly representative of them, and therefore did not have authority to make rulings.

Under the proposed plan each four-year college student will be a member of the Associated Students of Montana State college. He will have a vote in all matters that come up before the student body. Each separate division of the student activities will have a

council whose membership will consist of two students and one faculty member elected by the Associated Students.

Thus the Associated Students of Montana State college would be an organization composed of the members of the student body, and therefore absolutely representative of them. Every action taken by the Associated Students would then be in accordance with the judgment of the majority of the students instead of with the judgment of a body of students elected indirectly by the students and not truly representative of them.

To the Exponent the plan of an associated student body and especially the plan of the one proposed by the senate committee is an excellent one. Time and time again students who have come to Montana State from other colleges have asked why the college has no associated student body. It is by no means an experiment. Montana State college is among the very last of the state universities and colleges of the country to take hold of the idea. All around us in the northwest are institutions which have long ago given up the old idea of a student senate and have adopted the associated student body plan. In every case when a plan, similar to the one proposed here, has been followed, success has resulted.

Visitors who have come to Montana state from other colleges have missed a certain something which they have found elsewhere. Some have even gone so far as to say that something, which many other colleges have and which Montana State has not, is an atmosphere of that indefinite power called college spirit.

The effect of three student organizations, the Student Senate, The Boosters, and the Boosters working separately has not been to greatly improve college spirit on the hill. The combination of the three, which in reality would result from an associated student body, working to the same end would be a big factor in creating a powerful college spirit at Montana State.

The proposed constitution when finished will be put before the students for approval. Now is the time to start thinking on the question. Do you want an associated student body, an organization that has proved successful in scores of other colleges, or do you want to retain the present student senate which has been stamped as a failure not only in this college, but in nearly every other college in which it has been tried?

AT OTHER COLLEGES.

The department of journalism of the University of Washington will publish a monthly magazine devoted to the interests of journalism throughout the state of Washington. The first issue was published October 10.

With the primary object of perfecting the University of California students in rooting, the yell leader of that institution has instituted bleacher yell practice. The students meet in the bleachers a 4:30 on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons to practice college yells and songs.

Columbia University will play football this year, after having abandoned the game for ten years. Seventy green candidates have signed up to turn out for the varsity.

Rugby football has not only been routed from the University of California, but also from many of the large high schools and athletic clubs of the state. Several other institutions intend to adopt the American game next year, so Stanford will practically stand alone in the support of the English game in this country.

In the future the editor of the Iowa State Student, the daily paper of the Iowa State college, will be appointed, instead of elected by the students, as has been the custom heretofore.

Yale football enthusiasts received a shock October 2, when the University of Virginia eleven defeated the New Haven team 10 to 0 in the Yale bowl. Yale threatened to score only once, and that was in the first quarter. Her defeat is laid to the fact that the attack lacked coherence and versatility.

Cornell university will formally dedicate its new athletic field, Schoelkopf field, October 9, when the Ithaca eleven meets the Williams college football team. Besides a gridiron and a quarter-mile running track, the field contains a stadium with seating accommodations for 9000 people.

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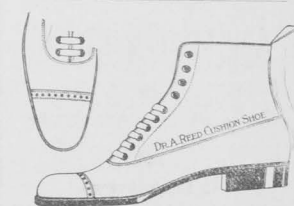
