LES BOUFFONS INITIATE SIX NEW MEMBERS

Honorary Fraternity Holds Initiation
Wednesday—Appearance of Initi-
ates Causes Excitement

Last Wednesday evening the Les Bouffons fraternity initiated six members of the junior class. Les Bouffons is an honorary fraternity and is the oldest on the hill having been organized in 1900. Its membership is made up of upperclassmen who are active in college work and men who are active in the various organizations on the hill. The fraternity has always been a power in the college as it is made up of live wires and the success of many of the undertakings of the student body is due to a large extent to the active leadership and untiring efforts of the members of Les Bouffons. It was due in a large measure to their efforts and zeal that Montana State was able to send her famous basketball team to Chicago last year to compete for the world's championship. It has been conceded that the best dances given during the college year are those of the Les Bouffons and an invitation to one of them is desired more than any other during the year.

Only one member was left in school at the beginning of the college term and he, with the assistance of Professor R. C. McChord, an honorary member, immediately initiated three men who were pledged last year. These men pledged seven new men, six of whom were initiated last Wednesday night.

Those initiated were: Earnest Stanley, Nelson Graves, Leo Humphrey, Russell Davis, Leroy Fowler, and Daniel Noble. Homer Taylor, the seventh pledged was to have received the ceremonies at the same time, but he left Tuesday for Seattle to take entrance examinations for the aviation corps.

A great deal of interest was attracted and laughter provoked Wednesday when the initiates appeared on the campus in several novel costumes. One pledge appeared in a middy blouse and khaki trousers with an old straw hat on his head carrying a ted-

NEW COURSES TO BE OFFERED SOON

State Board Selects Montana State
College to Give Courses in
Vocational Training

On February 23, 1917, congress passed what is known as the Smith-Hughes vocational education bill. The purpose of this legislation is to establish a cooperation between the federal government and the different states in promoting vocational phases of agriculture, trades and industries and home economics. During the present year \$30,000 is available for this work. The bill provides that a part of it shall be expended in training teachers, supervisors and demonstrators. The state board of education at its June meeting selected the State college of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts as the institution to give this training.

This means that a new field of work has been offered to the students of the State college. At the present time teachers of agriculture, trades, and industries have come from other states. Our county agents and extension workers have come from neighboring states where training courses are offered. If our Montana young men had realized that the salaries paid were higher than in most other lines of work which are open to the college graduate, no doubt many would have made special preparation. At the present time several Montana schools have no teachers of agriculture and are willing to pay salaries as high as \$2000. A number of counties are asking for county agents. The salaries paid range from \$1500 to

MONTANA STATE TO LOSE COACH FRED BENNION

Coach Retires on Leave of Absence to
Take up Work as County Agri-
cultural Agent Temporarily.

Students and faculty of Montana State college regret deeply the temporary loss of Coach Fred Bennion, who has directed the athletic activities of the college for the last five years. Ever since coming to Montana Mr. Bennion has been deeply interested in agriculture and has spent a great deal of time in studying agricultural subjects. Last spring when men were wanted to act as agricultural agents in the various counties Mr. Bennion offered his services and was employed as agent in Yellowstone county where he made a decided success. He resigned his position this fall to come back and resume his duties as athletic director at the college. After his return to Bozeman the farmers of Yellowstone got up a petition which was signed by nearly every rancher in the county, asking Mr. Bennion to return and resume his duties as agricultural director. After the football season Mr. Bennion applied to the college authorities for a leave of absence to carry on this work, which was granted.

Mr. Bennion's retirement is not final as he intends to take up his duties at the college again after the completion of his work in Yellowstone county. Only a part of his time will be taken up with his new work and the remainder will be spent in helping with the coaching of the college teams. The loss of "The Coach" will be felt keenly on the hill where he was not only admired and respected by the members of the different teams but by the entire student body. It was through his untiring efforts that Montana State turned out a championship basketball team last year and a football team from raw material this year of which, although they won no victories, we can be justly proud. During his entire stay at the college Coach Bennion, through his ability as a leader and an athlete, has turned out teams that, although not always victorious, have been a credit to him and to the institution.

Through the retirement of Mr. Bennion the active direction of athletics must pass into other hands. Plans for filling the place made vacant by his retirement have been made but no definite announcement has been made as yet.

Mr. Bennion's most important work for the present will be in connection with the establishment of farm bureaus in Yellowstone and perhaps other counties, where he is being assisted by Clarence R. McCormick, a graduate of the State college agricultural course in 1915.

ORCHESTRA WORKS UNDER HANDICAP

The college orchestra, under the leadership of Professor Jackson, is practising steadily every week, and progressing rapidly with their work. This organization has felt the stress of war too, in that on account of extra work imposed, several of last year's members have been forced to drop out. However there is a membership of fifteen, which composes a well balanced organization.

The program this year will be on the same plan as in previous years. They expect to give one or two assembly recitals, and also to furnish music for various social functions of the college. The recitals have always been splendid and very much appreciated by faculty and students who look forward to the recitals for this season.

The college orchestra furnished the music for President Hamilton's reception this year and was one of the most enjoyable features of the evening. This organization is one of the best things the college can have and deserves the support of the entire college.

Trained men in all branches of industry will be needed badly before very long and the student of today will have to fill the vacancies made by those who have left for the front.

Mr. Hartridge Whipp of Portland will appear under the auspices of the music department of Montana State college and will render a varied and attractive program.

SOPHS ADD ANOTHER FROSH SCALP TO BELT IN RACE FOR CLASS CUP

INTERCLASS BASKETBALL SERIES STARTED MONDAY IN DRILL
HALL. UPPER CLASSES SUFFER ON ACCOUNT OF LACK OF
MEN AND SENIORS HAVE TO CALL OFF SECOND GAME ON THIS
ACCOUNT.

The interclass basketball series started Monday afternoon of this week. The upper classes are suffering from lack of men and especially the seniors who were unable to play games scheduled for Tuesday and Wednesday on this account. So far, the Sophomores are invincible and without doubt will be champions of the series. A great crowd, consisting of howling freshman substitute players, patriotic freshman knitters and a lone fair sophomore witnessed the opening games. Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons saw a bigger attendance on the part of all the classes.

From the start the freshmen showed their superiority over the junior team and kept the long end of the score throughout the game, which was hard fought on both sides. The frosh used three different teams against the juniors who had but seven men. The score at the end of the game was 19-9.

In the second game the seniors, realizing their lack of skill and condition, resorted to "tact," threw aside all evidence of dignity, donned head gear and shoulder pads and entered the game resolved to do or die. Fate decreed the latter. Lack of team work prevented the seniors from scoring more than seven points. Ross, captain of last years Bobcats did good work for the seniors and more than once broke up the team work of the sophs. Harris, also of last years team, sketched at will from end to end of the floor and was responsible in large measure for most of the sophomore points. The final score was 35-7.

Tuesday afternoon, the game between the frosh and seniors was called off because the seniors were unable to collect enough men for a team. The sophs trimmed the juni-

ors 33-3 in a hard played game. Good teamwork marked the sophomore playing and as a result the ball was near their basket for most of the game. Bush brought wild cheering from the spectators when he threw five baskets in succession. Fitzgerald played a good game for the juniors.

Wednesday afternoon the sophs added another freshman scalp to their collection when they defeated the whole freshman regiment by the score of 33 to 5. Although the score was one-sided the game was fast. The first year team was constantly reinforced by fresh troops but the good team work of the sophs could not be broken up. Pitts starred for the sophs, scoring 18 of the 33 points made.

The first half of the game would have been a complete shut-out but for the single point made by Miller when he threw a foul just before time was called. The frosh were disorganized and made a poor showing against the good team work of the sophs. The score stood 23 to 1 at the end of the first half.

In the second half the sophs took a slump and their team work became ragged and they were called for frequent fouls. Maloney put new hope into the hearts of the frosh when he slammed the ball into the basket from the center of the floor. This was the only field basket made by the freshmen during the whole game. Score at end of game stood 33 to 55.

COLLEGE MEN CAN PERFORM SERVICE

Can Serve Country by Explaining
War Tax Law to Parents
and Others.

College men can perform a practical patriotic service in connection with the war tax law. If the government is to obtain the full amount of revenue authorized by congress it is essential that every taxpayer shall know how to compute the amount of taxes he must pay and the time, place, and method provided for its payment.

The new income tax law will reach more than 7,000,000 persons who have never before paid a federal income tax. Every unmarried person who had a net income in 1917 of more than \$1,000 and every married person whose net income was more than \$2,000 is required by law to make a return to the collector of internal revenue for his district. He must not wait for the collector to call on him or send him notice. He must voluntarily apply to the collector for the income tax form. If college men will familiarize themselves with the war revenue act and point out to their parents and others with whom they come in contact what the law requires them to do they will be rendering a patriotic service.

The purpose of the war tax is identical with that of the Liberty Loan. Its patriotic appeal is even stronger for instead of an investment it calls for a contribution. The bond buyer loans—the taxpayer gives—to the cause of liberty. The splendid success of the Liberty Loan was achieved through the cooperative efforts of

OFF TO THE WAR.

In the last week nearly twenty students have cancelled their registrations and are leaving to take examinations prior to their enlistment in Uncle Sam's fighting forces. The most popular branch of the service is the aviation in the signal officers' reserve corps. The students, many of them seniors, returned this fall hoping to complete their courses of study before being called in the draft. The new selective system places these men in the first class and makes it almost impossible for them to finish their work here. Montana State wishes them every success in their examinations and knows that they will uphold the splendid reputation made by the representatives of the blue and gold who have already gone to fight for their country.

CHANCELLOR ELLIOTT BRINGS MESSAGE.

Chancellor Elliott speaks this morning at Montana Hall. As always he brings a message of importance to the students of the college. His message this morning is perhaps by far the most important of all as it has to do with a subject which concerns the very life of the college. The selective draft will take nearly all of the upperclassmen and many of those who registered for the first time this fall. It will leave at Montana State only a few who are capable of carrying on the college work for another year. If something is not done to keep the younger students in college and acquaint them with the importance of having trained men for this war and the work of upbuilding which must come afterwards, it may be necessary to close the doors of Montana State next fall. The class series in basketball will begin Saturday afternoon, at which time three games will be played.

Several bylaws were also adopted; and resolutions concerning the various activities were read. The leaders of the different activities then gave reports on what was being done. Several other matters were also discussed; and the President of the student body gave a short talk on the relationship of the short course students to the institution.

As no vice-president had yet been elected, the following candidates were nominated for that position, Howard Bissonett, Kelly Graeber, and A. G. Stephens. The election will be held at the next student assembly.

A large number of students attended the meeting of the Short Course Literary society last Tuesday evening. The meeting was opened by singing "The Star Spangled Banner." The principal features of the evening were the singing, by Professor Currier, the talk by Captain Clark, and the honor roll call, in which the names of the former students who are now in government service, were called.

Captain Clark gave a very interesting talk on war. He stated that we should have foreseen this war and been ready for it sooner, that the only way of predicting what will happen in the future is by considering what has happened in the past; he reviewed briefly the wars of this country, showing how, at more or less regular intervals of a generation or less, they had occurred through its entire history. He told how this war differed from those of the past, how the Germans had thrown over all the customs of the past century or more in regard to the treatment of prisoners and civilians, and how they were making slaves of the people whom they conquered. He also spoke of the difficulties of sending men and supplies to Europe, and said that we must have patience and persevere with the unfaltering determination to win.

\$2000. The work in trades and industries is new, consequently no teachers are available. Next year at least ten schools will need special instructors in these subjects. The salaries paid will be from \$1600 to \$2000. These facts are stated for the information of those who would like to qualify for these positions during the remaining two terms of the college year. M. J. Abbey is director of the work and will be glad to meet with students who contemplate taking up this new work. He will offer three college courses next term, one in secondary agricultural education, agricultural cooperation and extension methods, and Rural life problems. Professor Challender will offer a course in trades and industries, open to students in the engineering college. Prof. Livingston will offer three courses to be announced later.
