

Cloudy Weather Fails to Halt Campus Day

Activities Postponed Yesterday Because of Rains, But President Calls Campus Day This Morning Despite Clouds. Cars Start Leaving at 7:30; Fill in Rocks, Pull Grass, and Paint "M"; Fangs Give Up Plans to Concrete Letter

Campus day this year was devoted to weeding out, filling in, and repainting the big "M" on Mount Baldy. The Fangs decided definitely to delay concreting the huge letter until some future time. Considering the large amount of work to be done this year the student body worked both fast and well.

The undertaking was well organized; the Fangs and Spurs being in full charge of operations. The Fangs supervised transportation, roll call, and the operations under way at Mount Baldy. The Spurs had charge of the preparation and serving of the lunch as had become the custom. Originally a dance was planned to take place after the big feed but the Associated Student Senate would not sponsor it so the matter was dropped.

Operations
The men students who did not have cars met in front of the Y. M. C. A. building between seven-thirty and eight-thirty and proceeded to the "M" via buses furnished by the Erickson Taxicab company. Transportation cost twenty-five cents each way. The first car load left at seven-forty. The first group to arrive on location went to the top and formed a rock line, for the "M" needed repairing before painting operations should begin. This was the easiest work of any for the rocks were relayed down hill while the lime and water had to be carried up.

The next gang to arrive were assigned the task of pulling weeds from the face of the letter. By the time the third gang had arrived and relays had been organized enough of the hillside had been cleaned and renovated to that the whitewashing could be started.

The lime used this year was hydrated, instead of the old-fashioned lump variety. The hydrated form is already slaked, and although it costs more it will go much further than the old type. Where 1,800 to 2,000 pounds have been used previously, 1,000 pounds were enough this year due to the superior quality. This meant a considerable saving in both money and effort. This lime came in fifty pound bags so it was not too much of a job to get it to the top of the hill.

The job was finished by twelve-thirty or one o'clock, at which time a lunch consisting of sandwiches, pickles, baked beans, cake and coffee was served near the little spring in Bridger canyon.

Originally the Fangs had planned to concrete part of the big "M" each year beginning with this year. The material to concrete five hundred square feet, which would be the most that could be done by a student body of the present size, could be purchased for twenty-five dollars. It was only after consultation with one of the mathematics instructors at the college that the organization decided to wait awhile before starting work on the project.

This is the problem as it now stands: the distance from the top of the hill to the base of the "M" is 1,900 feet; the "M" itself is 103 feet wide, 237 feet long, and 16,500 square feet in area; twelve tons of material will cover 500 square feet with a layer of concrete two inches thick; if one bucket held forty pounds of building material and one bucket went up entire student body five hours to get every minute, it would take M. S. C.'s those twelve tons to the "M", to say nothing of putting it on. If 500 square feet were done every year it would take exactly thirty-three years to complete the job.

Some day in the future the "M" should be concreted to insure its permanency. When shall it be?

SENIORS DONATE FOR MEMORIAL

Class of 1923 Starts Fund of "Montana Union Memorial"

MONEY TO BE USED TO ERECT UNION BUILDING

Present Class Donates \$5.00 Each Which Will Add Much to the \$357.57 of the Fund

SENIOR MEMORIAL

On May 12, 1923, the senior class gave \$3.00 apiece, cash, to be set aside toward a memorial fund for Montana State College. This they called the "Montana Union Memorial." This fund is to be allowed to grow until some time in the future it can be used to erect a Union building on the campus for the benefit of future students of Montana State.

The class of '24 bought senior caps and gowns and handed them over to the college with the stipulation that each year they were to be rented to the graduating class at a price of \$2.50 each. This \$2.50 rental goes to the memorial fund each year.

The class of '25 purchased 15 more caps and gowns to be used in the same manner. The rental turned in by that class brought \$130.85.

Up to this year the total amount in this fund is \$357.57.

This year the class of '26 has donated \$5.00 apiece to be added to the total. This money is put into a student loan fund by means of which the money is put into use and so allowed to accumulate.

AGGIE SENIORS SUCCESSFUL AT SECURING JOBS

Many of Ags Graduating in June Now Have Jobs Promised

SEVERAL POST GRADUATES ALSO HAVE GOOD POSITIONS

Two Seniors Operating Gallatin Creamery Now; Two Ag Education Students at Work Now in Smith-Hughes Field.

Nearly all of this year's seniors have been successful in securing jobs for the coming year after graduation. Several of these men are already in the field doing active work as county agents and as dairy men and the others will take up their work as soon as school is out.

John Bowen, who has majored in dairy manufacturing has accepted a position with the Yellowstone Creamery company at Billings. Bowen is a member of Omega Beta fraternity.

George Cooley, ex-farmer and a graduate of M. S. C. in 1919, will upon the completion of his post graduate course assume his duties as Smith-Hughes instructor at Newcastle, Wyoming.

Howard Clemmons received his degree in Agriculture at Ames, but has done post graduate work in ag education here this year. He is to be stationed at Whitefish after his graduation.

Herman Dokken and Walter Sutherland, seniors in dairy manufacturing, will go into business after they graduate in June. These men bought the Gallatin Milk and Produce company creamery last fall. Both men are veterans of the World war. They are members of Alpha Gamma Rho, and Alpha Zeta, national honorary ag fraternity.

Theodore Fosse is going to what a poet has termed "a nifty, thrifty Polson by the lake." This is a new field as far as Smith-Hughes is concerned. Ted is a member of Sigma Chi, Alpha Zeta and Phi Kappa Phi.

The banquet was a great success in spite of the rather small attendance.

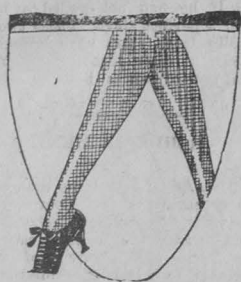
SEPARATE ASSEMBLIES NEXT FRIDAY MORNING SPECIAL ON THURSDAY

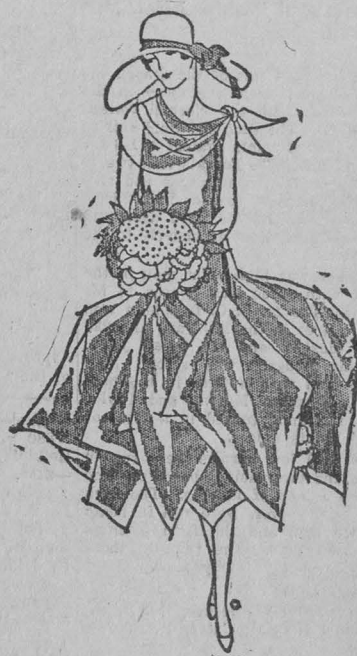

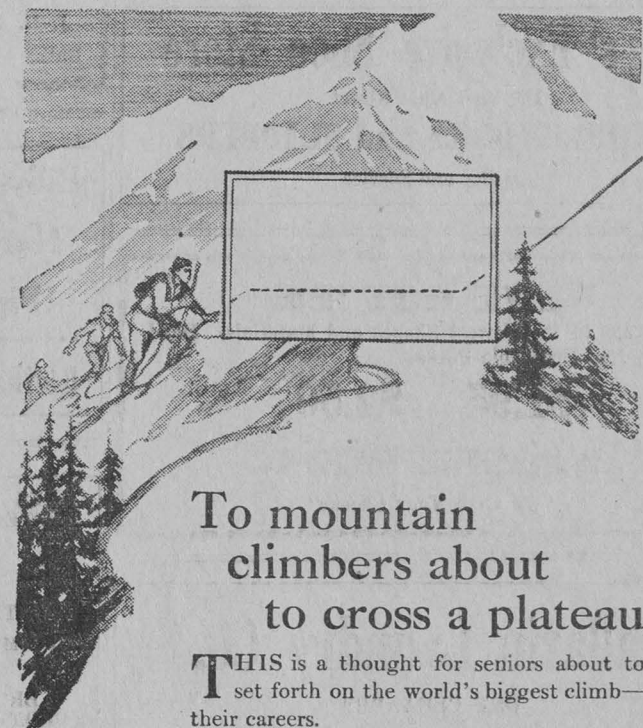

In the first test of the season the Bobcat track team ran away in the dual meet with the Normal college at Dillon. The Blue and Gold entries scored 96 2-3 points against 22 1-3 for the Normal. The Bobcats took twelve out of thirteen first places and also a good share of seconds and thirds. Two events, the 440 yard dash and the half mile, went exclusively to the Bobcats.

Decker was high point man in the meet with three first places to his credit. The M. S. C. freshman won first places in the 100 yard and 220 yard dashes and the broad jump. Captain Hodgson was second high point man with a first in the mile and half mile. Murray and Taylor of the Normal turned in a total of seven points apiece.

The 220 low hurdles were run in heats and the placings based on time due to a lack of hurdles. The high hurdles, however, were run in heats of two men and the final placings based on time. The time in these events was necessarily slow.
