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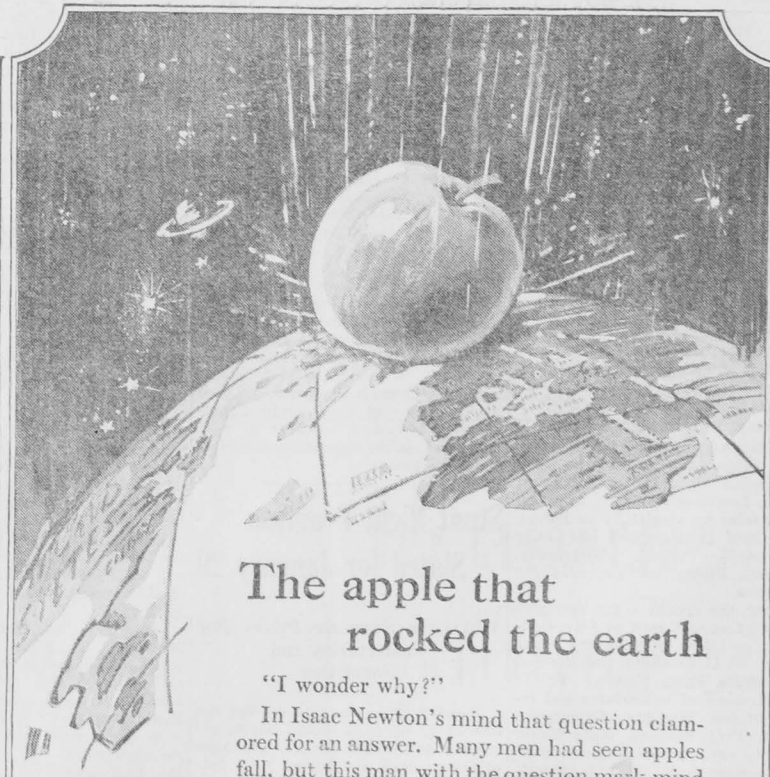

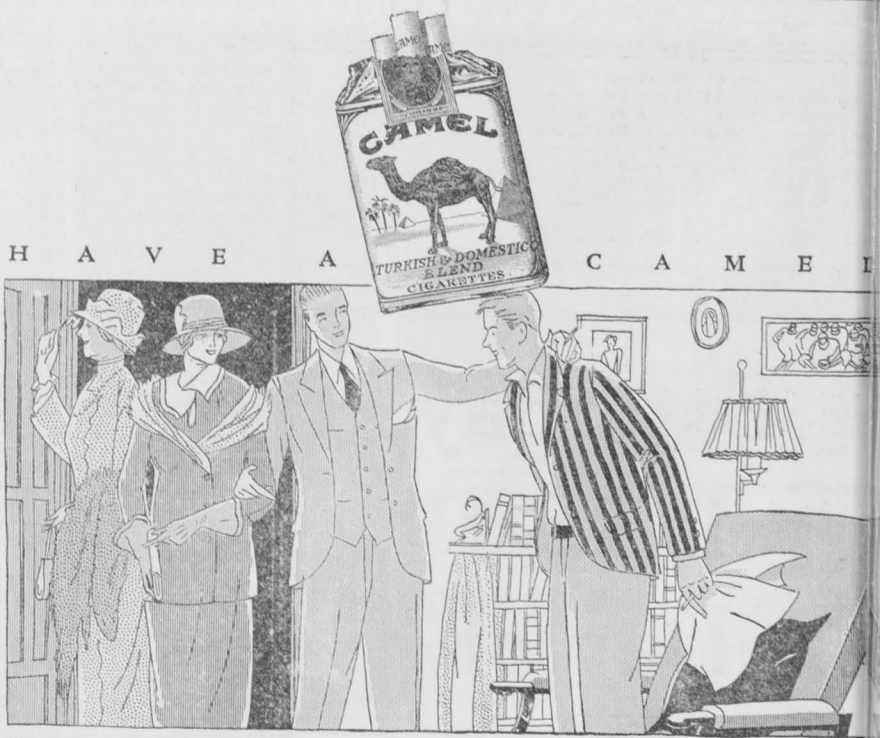
Rifle Team Margaret McDonald, a freshman won the rifle medal with a score of 93.
