TORMENTORS PRESENT PLAY AT ELLEN THEATRE TONIGHT

PLANS MADE TO TAKE "THE FAMILY UPSTAIRS" TO DEER LODGE AND BUTTE NOVEMBER 17TH AND 18TH

"The Family Upstairs" will make its initial bow at the Ellen tonight at 8:15 p. m. as the first production of the M. S. C. dramatic season. This play is fostered by the Tormentors, the entire cast is composed of members of the organization.

Miss Cameron is giving an unusually fine interpretation in the role of the oldest daughter of the Heller family, who has risen above the social level of her parents through outside influences. Keith Sime, as the lover, ably portrays the mental anguish of a young fellow who wants to get away from a salary of forty dollars a week. These two, in their attempt to solve the problem which has arisen, through the exaggeration of Mrs. Heller, incorporate a sincere dramatic line into this exposition of domestic relations.

Mary Tattan, as Mrs. Heller, is a success when it comes to bawling up the matrimonial aspect of the play. Though Hoe Heller, played by Red Gregor, spends all his energies in trying to curb her excessive desire to impress "Louise's young man," her characterizations will undoubtedly prove high lights in the performance of this evening.

The most home-like touches are made by "Annabelle," Lois Cobleigh, who is most desirous of escaping from the torture of practicing her piano on, and "Yens" Riveres, as William, who has decided to become a policeman. The two minor roles of Mrs. Callahan and the talkative dressmaker, are carried by George Benephe and Jo O'Connor.

The Family Upstairs is a roaring comic comedy, interspersed with sympathetic heart interest, which undoubtedly provide the audience with their money's worth of enjoyment.

The Tormentors are booked for one evening in Deer Lodge on Nov. 17, and for two performances in Butte on the nineteenth, so it has been doubly while for the cast to put forth an effort to make "The Family Upstairs" a production of the first class.

GRAIN JUDGING TEAM WINS THIRD PLACE

Livestock Team In Fourth Place—McCall Second High Individual

The Grain Judging team consisting of R. McCall, Carpenter and Sutherland obtained third place in the International Livestock Exposition held at Portland October 29-November 1. Idaho captured the coveted silver loving cup, with Oregon second.

The grain contest consisted of the commercial grading of various grains, oats, wheat, rye, barley and corn, and the identification of varieties of grains and weed seeds. The livestock team made up of Chet Paisley, Oscar Fowler, Harold Armstrong, M. Shanahan and Harry Noel took fourth place in their department. Their judging covered many of the principal commercial breeds of livestock, horses, beef cattle, dairy cattle, and hogs.

R. McCall was second high man in the contest in grain judging. An Idaho man placed first. Montana State college and Idaho tied for second place in hay grading. The lack of many varieties of grains in this state, especially the soft white wheats is a detriment to the teams of Montana State college, Professor A. H. Holst explained.

There were fairly good crowds at the exposition, though the last day was stormy, the visitors report. Many of the boys are stopping in the coast cities. Professor Post who accompanied the grain team and Professor McChord of the livestock department, returned with two of the members of the grain team.

HOUSING COMMITTEES BUSY FOR VISITORS

Delegates For Girls Vocational Congress Will Tax Accommodations

Women students of Montana State college have started their canvass for rooms to house the hundreds of high school young women who will attend the annual Girls' Vocational congress here on November 17 and 18. Home owners of Bozeman each year volunteer rooms for the housing of the visiting young women, while many Bozeman civic organizations contribute to the entertainment and local transportation of the delegates to the congress.

The attendance at this Girls' Congress has grown so rapidly that it has become necessary to limit registration from each school. With the registration strictly limited, there were more than 300 young women at the meetings last year.

Prominent professional women of America come to Bozeman to address these meetings. Miss Helen Bennett of Chicago may return for the congress this year, having been urged by Montana people to repeat the fine service she gave last year to high school girls. The high school delegates will hear about the opportunities open to them in medicine, nursing, journalism, art work, science subjects, etc., in the world of today. Special emphasis is given each year to the importance of careful preparation for home making.

Miss Hazel Border of Gallatin County high school, Bozeman, has been named by the State College Girls Vocational Congress officials as the delegate who will welcome members of the congress to Bozeman on November 17. Butte City high school will be asked to name a delegate who is to make the response on behalf of all high school delegates from out of the city.

The congress program is handled entirely by college women here, the college committee working under the general direction of Dean Una B. Herrick, who started the girls' congress idea in Montana many years ago. The congress in Montana has become the model for similar conferences in many parts of the United States.

ALUMNI TICKETS.

One hundred ninety two tickets for the Grizzly game to be sold to alumni and townspeople arrived from Butte yesterday and will be placed on sale at Hausman and McCall's tomorrow morning, according to Mr. Therkelsen, faculty athletic treasurer. The tickets are for reserved seats in the west side of the field near the center. A charge of two dollars is made for the reservations. The railroad tickets will be placed on sale by a representative of the railroad at a later date, Mr. Therkelsen has announced.

The tickets allotted the Bozeman fans will be on sale until November 14 when the remainder will be sent to Butte. "In event that the ticket supply is exhausted and there appears to be a demand for more, an effort will be made to secure more from Butte but it is not known whether or not it will be possible," Mr. Therkelsen said.

FIRST ASSEMBLY HELD LAST FRIDAY

Plans For Butte Game Discussed By Prof. Therkelson

The first general assembly of the year was held Friday morning at 10:30 to discuss plans for the Butte game. One of the largest crowds to attend assembly was present showing the interest and enthusiasm that is being displayed over the game.

Acting President Linfield opened the assembly. Professor Therkelsen made general announcements concerning the special to Butte, explaining that the plans are practically the same as last year with the exception of the tickets. This year the one fare tickets will be good only on the special train which leaves Bozeman at 7:00 a. m. November 19 and leaves Butte at 7 p. m. of the same day. Other tickets may be purchased for a fare and a third which will be good for four days, November 18-21 inclusive. All those desiring to stay over in Butte must report to Dean Linfield the length of time to be in Butte and the address at which anyone might be able to communicate with them, it was announced.

Dean Linfield also announced that the Montana Power Company has offered the use of their display window to M. S. C. to use for any display or exhibit they desire to have.

The latter part of the meeting was turned over to the singing of new songs. Lou Howard led the singing assisted by a three piece orchestra and a "choir of twenty men students."

CAROLL HOLLOWAY GIVES LECTURE ON USE OF BURROUGHS POSTING MACHINE

Carroll Holloway, M. S. C. '26, gave a talk to the Principles of Accounting class of the Secretarial department at 9 o'clock this morning on the subject of "The Use of the Burroughs Posting Machine for Cost-keeping and Inventory Control in Retail Merchandising."

Carroll has charge of the accounting system for H. A. Pease and Co., which is one of the most modern and comprehensive in use for supplying the management with information for the determining of departmental costs and for inventory control. This is the only retail jewelry store in the state that has an accounting system sufficiently comprehensive to co-operate with the Harvard Bureau of Business Research in its operating costs of retail jewelry stores.

This study is being made in order to supply this type of retail business with what appear to be the attainable standards of costs, turnover, etc., and so afford information from which the business budget can be planned.

THE ECONOMIC CONFERENCES.

The economic conferences for Ravalli, Sanders and Missoula counties are now being held. The district irrigation conferences for central Montana and the Milk River valley will be held from Nov. 14 to 18. The conferences are a part of the extension service program for the agriculture development of Montana.

Lou Howard and thirty piece Bobcat band will leave for Sheridan Friday morning at 1:32 a. m. They will have a special car on the tracks at 9 o'clock in the evening, preceding. A few students will accompany the band and others will join them at Billings. A fare of one and one third rates for the round trip has been granted for parties of fifteen or over. Special rates apply from Billings to Sheridan. The party rate is \$13.62.

When the governors of Wyoming and Montana meet at Sheridan, Wyoming next Friday it will not be to discuss politics, but to watch the football representatives of the University of Wyoming and Montana State college settle their difficulties for another season. The Wyoming city of Dude Ranch fame is planning for one of the largest crowds which ever attended a football game in southern Montana or Wyoming. Festivities will commence the day before when two high schools clash and will continue until after the big game on the following day.

Wyoming has won two thrilling contests from the Bobcats in the last three seasons. The margin of victory, 10-0, last year was the widest of the three, giving the Bobcats their first victory in the period. All three games have been staged before homecoming crowds.

Wyoming Strong While the conference title is yet undecided, the percentage column will indicate Montana well down in the list if Wyoming wins. If the Bobcats win, their conference record will be as clean as any in the conference since every team has been beaten at least once. Lack of sufficient number of games scheduled will leave them out of consideration for the title. So while no title is at stake, each team will no doubt be determined to make the best possible showing in the conference record book and will consequently "put up a great fight to carry off the honors of the day."

Wyoming has lost four of their games this season, not a particularly enviable record. Three of these teams were of the Rocky Mountain conference—Denver U., Colorado college, and Utah Aggies. However, the score of the Colorado college game was 12-8 with the Cowboys going down the field twenty yards at a leap when the game ended, if that means anything. The lop-sided score of the Tiger-Montana game might give some boosters the idea that the bronchobusters have a fairly good edge on us, even though we defeated Utah Aggies who in turn walloped Wyoming 42-0.

Bobcats Have Rest Two men stand out on the Wyoming eleven as dangerous ball-packers—George and Harkins. Of course, these two men are probably not as effective as Wilcox and Welch of Purdue, but they might cause as much trouble if they are not watched rather carefully.

As for the Bobcats, a rest over last week should leave the team in tip top condition. With Chez, Elkrem, Gardiner, and Olsen on the injured list from the Purdue game, the rest came in rather handy. The Wyoming battle should see the Blue and Gold team in full strength. They will nearly have to be since Wyoming has been "pointing" to this game ever since their reverse at the hands of Denver. A rest over the week end was also accorded the Cowboy eleven.

CHEMISTRY SOCIETY MEETING.

The Chemistry society held its regular monthly meeting in the Chemistry building Thursday evening. Marjorie Richie gave a short talk about Hiedelberg University. Stuart Morton compared our chemistry curricula with those of other schools and an open forum discussion was held. Mr. Cobleigh explained why our courses have so much math and engineering and Mr. Johnson and Mr. Sheppard also gave their views on the subject. After the meeting, ice cream and cookies were served in the freshman lab.

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THE SONG CONTEST

Usually, and we might say almost invariably, song contests are a "flop," to use a rather descriptive word common to all of us. We were rather fortunate in our contest in that not only one but several good songs were submitted. The prize winner, "The Blue and the Gold Hold Sway," by Edwin Pegram of Dillon, was particularly good

and far above the average college song, considering its originality and characteristics of the school. The parodies written were surprisingly good. While it is always difficult to make words of a parody "stick," they are nevertheless often good pep songs. It will be a long time before a tune becomes as popular as the Yale "Boola" song.

We don't expect "The Blue and the Gold Hold Sway" to go down in history beside "On Wisconsin," but we do expect it to last indefinitely at Montana State college.

THE FAMILY UPSTAIRS

We don't mean any particular family, but rather the production by the Tormentors which will be given in the Ellen Theater tonight. This group annually produces one or more high grade plays each college year, and ask the support of the students in their effort. This response has always been generous and should be this year.

The students appreciate a diversion from their studies once in a while. They are assured of a diversion in the form of comedy of unusual merit, the Tormentors say, if they see "The Family Upstairs." The cast is composed of many students who have appeared on the stage before. Only members of the organization are in the cast of this particular production.

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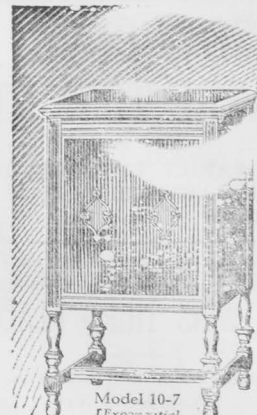
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ROSH SQUAD GIVES U. CUBS TROUTING IN ANNUAL GAME

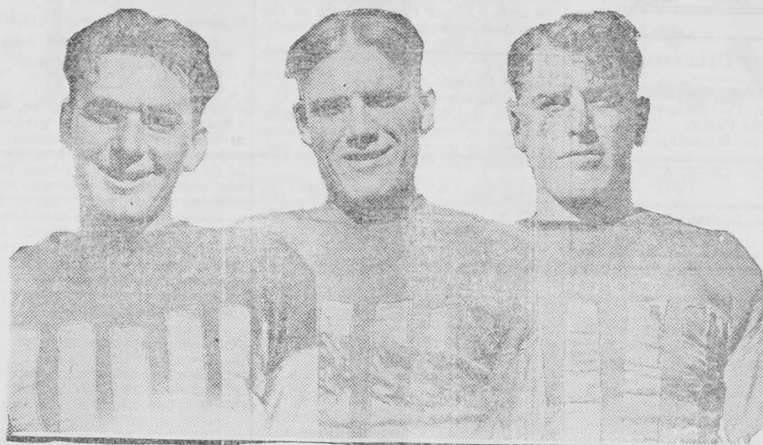
First Quarter

WASHINGTON TO USE GRID LOUD SPEAKERS

Student Body Votes \$15,000 for Installation of Public Address System in Stadium

University of Washington, Nov. 5.—Football hot off the gridiron will be the fans' dish this season.

There will not be room for doubt as to what plays have been made or why such and such a penalty has been inflicted and on what "layer." In fact, no question should be asked that will not be answered immediately because the Associated Students of the University of Washington have voted approximately \$15,000 to pay for the installation of the new public address system in the stadium.

The University of Washington will be the first institution in the Northwest to adopt this system. The public address system is a Western Electric product and will be installed by the Graybar Electric company.

A cluster of loud speakers will be erected at the east end of the stadium with an announcer in the house on the west end of the stadium. Observers will be on the sidelines following the play of each game and will be directly connected with the announcer with a special head set telephone over which each play will be related and explained without loss of time. Each loud speaker will be at a different angle so that the information will be carried to every seat in the stadium.

The installation was started last week and everything will be ready for operation in time for the University of Washington-Washington State college game here October 22, which will open the home series.

ROCKEFELLER DONATES \$1,150,000 TO U. OF C.

Gift to Erect New Dormitory—Will Be Known as International House

University of California, Berkeley, Nov. 5.—The university campus will be the site of a \$1,750,000 dormitory, to be known as International House, a gift of John D. Rockefeller, Jr. This gift which is the largest single donation ever made to the university, will provide a residence and social center for nearly 500 men and women students of all nationalities on a two and one-half acre site.

Actual work on the structure will begin immediately upon the completion of the plans and specifications, which are being drawn up now.

Follows New York Plans
International House was suggested by the phenomenal success of a similar institution in New York City, which has become favorably known throughout the world, according to President W. W. Campbell in his announcement of the project. The New

York building was provided by Mr. Rockefeller a few years ago, representing the first attempt in history to gather a considerable community of university students from all nations beneath one roof.

The University of California was chosen as the location of the Pacific coast institution because of its strategic focal position in the world's activities, and because it is attended by more foreign students than is any other American university.

World Peace Sought

Promotion of the cause of peace is the purpose of the foundation of the two institutions by Rockefeller. "It is important that the future leaders in the different countries shall understand each other and, if possible, know each other," the donor explained in announcing his gift.

Accommodations for over 300 foreign students will be reserved in the dormitory, the remaining third of the rooms being assigned to American students. A definite part of the house will be divided off for women students with separate entrance for them. Non-resident students will be permitted use of the dining, assembly, social and committee rooms. A registration of these non-resident members will be made, as in the New York house, where the list already approximates 800 students.
