ASSEMBLIES

The large attendance at the assembly last Thursday morning has been the cause of much comment both from freshmen and upper-classmen. The new people were very favorably impressed with the institution and the older ones were pleasantly surprised by what seemed a rejuvenation of real old-time college enthusiasm. Not enthusiasm in the sense of activity, physical contortions, and vociferous yelling, but an intelligent interest in the more serious affairs of our school. Some years ago there was an established assembly period at Montana State College, once every week at the same hour. Attendance became lax and continued dropping off at so great a rate that it was decided to entirely abolish the system and adopt a new experiment. Students regarded the assembly hour as a brief vacation, to be utilized for lunch, gossip, or smoke, such as the case might be. Probably it was true that the regularity of the meetings became monotonous and uneventful. In a school of this size, the excitement and attraction of a student gathering does not carry the force that it does in a larger institution. Our daily routine brings us in contact with nearly everyone on the hill, by sight at least. The revised system was adopted in the fall of 1926 and has been kept since. It calls for assemblies on special occasions and requests only, with permission granted by the president. All periods are shortened so that the assembly does not cut out any class altogether. With these meetings of the student body coming as an exception rather than the rule, and with only matters of extraordinary note being used as subject material, students attend, if for no other reason than curiosity. And the success of such gatherings depends upon the proportion of people who can be induced to be present. No better method can be devised to create unity and school patriotism than these periodic meetings, where we meet with each other, our faculty, and, most important of all, get an idea of what's going on. Let's put assemblies over big.

A few announcements were made pertaining to the activity of the chorus during the school year. The chorus has in past years been an important function of the college in that it has always scheduled a program in Bozeman during the tour taken in the spring quarter. On special occasions it has offered its services for assemblies.

As Rev. H. G. Klemme is unable to direct the chorus this year, Mr. Kintz will be in his place. He is a man of ability, and those here from past years will remember his orchestra and musical programs given.

Tours State

Last year, the tour of the chorus took in the territory from Bozeman to Great Falls by way of the Milwaukee. The chorus was well received and booking were petitioned for this year, but this matter will be decided upon at a later date.

Last year the chorus consisted of about thirty members. It acts as a single organ in that it has as its aim the increasing of interest in music and the advertising for the college.

Those that were unable to attend the first meeting of the year, October 8, should by all means, if interested, turn out. All are invited and at the second meeting it is hoped there will

be a few more men singers. In the past years much interest has been shown and it is anticipated by old members that there will be a large musical talent.

Three thrusts at the line and then went around the ends for the second C. C. touchdown. He kicked goal to tie the count. The Tigers carried the attack during the rest of the quarter and were held but twice. The score was still 14-14 as the teams entered the final period. Then, with some clever football, they carried the ball to the Bobcats' 17 yard line. Clark ripped the line and Vandenberg skirted the ends for a score to put the home team into the lead.

Bobcats Start Passing

With the Tigers in the lead the Bobcats opened up a passing attack that threatened to score, but Clark intercepted one on his own 48 yard line and skirted the end for 25 yards. Vandenberg worked the cut back play for 25 yards and a touchdown.

Clark hit the tackles and passed to Ingram for long gains, and on the fourth down the giant Clark smashed over the tackle for the last touch-

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down. He missed all tries for goal during the last period.

Montana State had the Tigers guessing during the first half of the game but they couldn't stop the strong rally led by Clark and Vandenberg in the second half. The victory puts the Colorado Tigers as high favorites in the Conference dope sheet for the championship.

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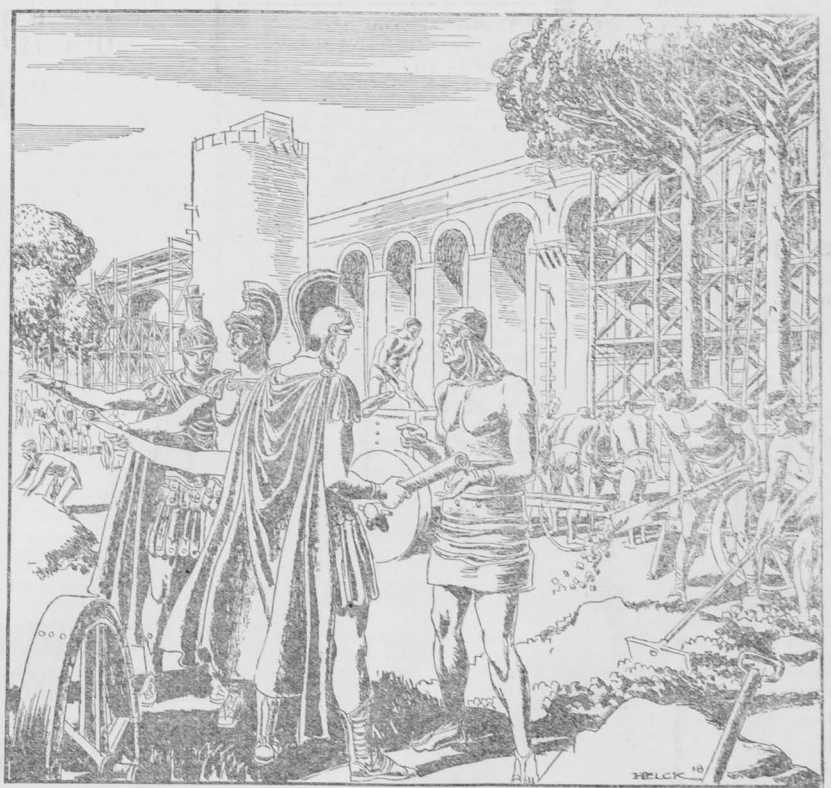
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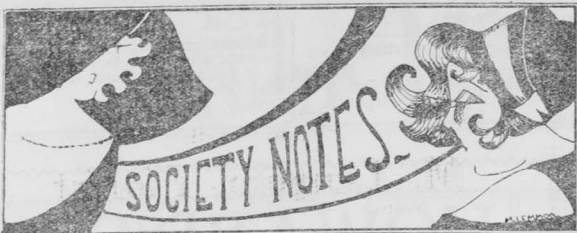

The first Bobcat Band was organized in 1906 by Lou Howard, who has been, and at the present time is its director. In 1906 he was requested to furnish a band for the celebration in honor of appropriations for new buildings at the college by the State Legislature. After three weeks work, his band played at this celebration. Every year since then he has organized the Bobcat band. These bands and the college have become noted because of the advertising they received during their state tours, for which Mr. Howard is responsible.

The band numbers among its members soloists of exceptional skill. Louis True, euphonium soloist, was offered a contract to play with Sousa during the present concert season. K. Schwartz, cornet soloist for four years, Ray Patten, phone soloist,

tana State rooters will have seats in the east side bleachers at Clark Park. A block of seats has been held especially for holders of activity tickets. The Fangs will usher, and two members of the organization will be stationed at the gate to identify people who present student activity tickets. The Bobcat Band as usual will have a reserved section.

Rates on Railroad
Special reduced rates have been allowed by railroads from points in Montana. From Bozeman, round trip passages will be sold for the price of

a one-way ticket, limited to the special train, and one-third rates will be given on other trains. The special will depart from Bozeman at 7:00 o'clock Saturday morning, and leave Butte on its return trip at 6:00 p. m. the same day. BOBKITTENS TO MEET BUTTE CENTRAL HERE

Although the gridgraph report of the Montana State-Nebraska fracas will be of interest to the student body, the first home game to be played on Gatten Field will draw a big crowd when Central High School from Butte will try to keep their undefeated record of this season clear against Coach Adams' Kittens. The frosh are just as strong this year as they have been the past few seasons, when they went

through their seasons undefeated. Coach Eaton's entries haven't been defeated in Montana State interscholastic circles this year and have taken some leading contenders to camp. They downed Glendive 74-0 last week end and took Dillon and St. Peters high of Anaconda across the carpet. They held the powerful Englewood team of Butte to a tie and are pointed out as possible State champions in the high school race. Included in their lineup are, Dan Handley, all state gridon and basketball performer, Winston, and Keyes, all of whom have played three years before this season, and such other

men as Duff, Greiger, Freebourn, O'Brien, Holland, Grund, Sartini, McCabe, and Murray, all who have had experience before this year and who are the backbone of that powerful eleven. The victory last Saturday might prove costly, for Winston, line cracking artist and open field star, was taken from the game with a badly wrenched leg which may put him out of the game for the rest of the season. Captain Hanley wormed his way for yards, against every team he has played this year and the stone wall line will have a chance to meet a line which is better than the average Kittens lines.

Powerful Kitten Crew
Coach Adams will send into the field a nice aggregation of former interscholastic stars and a well balanced team, one whose strength will be considerable. In the backfield will be quarterback Johnie Inkret former Butte star, fullback Cap Griffin of Billings, halfbacks Cheever, a Minnesota star, and Long, former Anaconda open field artist. The line has some strong men with Frady at center, an all state man of Nebraska, Larson from Butte, Shieker of Denver and Hoffman lead an impressive looking set of line men, all of whom will be given a chance to get into the game. Maxon and Dowell look like the best bets from the number of end candidates, although there are many who can handle the positions.

The game will be called for 2:00 o'clock according to all done at the present, although efforts will be made to run the game so that the gridgraph reports of the Nebraska-Bobcat game can also be attended either before or after the game. It will be the first game of the season on Gatten field this season and the field is in the best of condition, although the teams have been using it a great deal the last few weeks. The first home game for the Bobcats will be two weeks from now when the Colorado Teachers come to Bozeman Oct. 20.

BOBCATS TO BATTLE NEBRASKA SATURDAY

Next Saturday will be another red-letter day in the history of M. S. C. when her fighting warriors of the gridiron meet the powerful Cornhuskers from Nebraska. Not a great deal is known as to the power and ability of the Nebraskans this year but it is to be remembered that they were the champions of the Missouri Valley Conference last year and had two All-American men in their lineup. One of these men has graduated but the other remains to strengthen his team's chances for this year.

Lead Conference
Nebraska is almost always one of the leading teams in the Missouri Valley Conference and is a team to be looked at with respect at all times. Saturday they defeated the strong Ohio gridders to the tune of 12 to 0. As Ohio is touted to be one of the strongest teams in the conference, it makes the Cornhuskers loom as one of the serious contenders for the title again this year.

The Bobcats bumped up against stiff opposition Saturday and now have a strenuous trip ahead of them. They will however, have a short rest before their contest next Saturday. Ott Gardner flashy fullback star of the Bobcats will not be in the lineup due to injuries received in the Idaho game.

Step Out of Division
Up until the last year or so the Bobcats have been content to stay in their own conference and play various teams within easy reach. They have now stepped out of their own territory and are scheduling games with such teams as Idaho, whom they defeated 15-13, and Purdue, whom they held for the first half only to be defeated after a terrific struggle. Now they try Nebraska.

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COUGARS CLAW DEEP INTO GRIZZLY HIDE

Montana University went down to a crushing defeat at the hand of Washington State College, the final score being 26-6. The game was the first conference attempt for both teams.

Montana's defeat was due almost entirely to short end runs and off tackle plays. Montana was unable to gain thru the Washington line and her ends were continually boxed by the Cougars. The Grizzlies' secondary defense was also considerably weaker than their opponents.

Grizzlies Score First
A Montana pass was intercepted by Horan near the beginning of the second quarter. Washington then gained a few yards through the line and punted to Montana's 22 yard line. After a punting duel, Rohwer attempted to pass from behind his own fifty yard line and Rognlein intercepted it. Montana failed to gain through the line and punted to the Cougars 18-yard line. In attempting an end run, Rohwer fumbled the ball and Lewis recovered it on Washington's own 14-yard line, and crossed the line for the first score of the game. Washington came back strong and marched down the field for a touchdown, tying the score. After recovering a punt early in the third period, Horan ran 62 yards for a touchdown. Hein intercepted a pass and ran 33 yards for another score. Powerful drives at the Montana line by L. Hein paved the way for the fourth counter.

The final quarter saw several punting duels, and many wasted passes on Montana's part in their final attempt to score. Montana was completely outclassed and the game ended with the Cougars marching steadily through the Grizzly forward wall toward another score.



It was the first Conference test of the season for both teams.

It was a great game for two quarters, but the trouble was that the fracas lasted four.

The University went down under the slashing attack of Washington State, as usual.

Vogt is showing up well as a converter of points after touchdowns. Reliable on the kickoff, too.

The game established a new Rocky Mountain Conference record for number of forward passes thrown in a single contest.

The University of Chicago garnered 47 points from Wyoming last Saturday, with the Cowboys failing to score.

And of course its a matter of how low the Bobcats can hold Nebraska's score. The Cornhuskers' line is one of the heaviest the game has known.

It will be a hardened, veteran pack of Bobcats that hits the Missoula boys in Butte on October 27.

There will be a meeting of all candidates for the swimming team in the gymnasium at 5 o'clock, Wednesday, Oct. 10, to lay out the program this year.

Ott Gardner, Bobcats leading back-field artist, was left home to recuperate from injuries received during the Idaho game. It is hoped that he will be able to play against C. T. C. here Oct. 20.

Coach Adams' Kittens will do battle with Central's gridiron warriors Saturday on Gatten field. They need your support.

Utah University took the University of Nevada to camp by a decisive score and showed some individual stars that promise trouble later in

the season. Utah won the Conference title two years ago.
