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THE LADIES AGAIN

Since our mothers, sisters, daughters and wives have generally acclaimed the smoking habit the arguments both pro and con have waxed furious. Not as to whether it should be the pipe, cigarette or cigar, but whether it is the thing to be done. Eastern society circles were first to pass up the female smoker without a terrible nod of accusation. Then when young girls of high school and college years took to the fad the battle was on. Generally, men don't approve of women using tobacco, and the objections are stronger when the so-called wrong-doer is a sister, sweetheart or wife, but the flapper age was here and cigarette smoking went with the flapper as nonchalant goes with Murad. Deans of women at our leading colleges and universities ostracized smoking, and the young lady with the fag was looked to as rather fast. But how times have changed. The girl now who refuses a smoke or who won't have a drag is as scarce as a chaperone at a spring party, and there are even smoking rooms provided in some exclusive girls' schools. Dr. Anna Richardson, Smith College physician gives out the startling figures revealing that two thirds of the girls graduating last June were occasional or habitual users of cigarettes. According to her statistics, twenty-one per cent smoked from five to twenty cigarettes per day; twenty-one per cent smoked from one to four daily; and twenty-three per cent were occasional indulgers. And this is very probably representative to a conservative degree. The physical benefits of tobacco are negligible. The solution is probably best estimated in the statement: The cigarette habit is developed through a human desire preyed upon by vanity, susceptibility to advertising, and custom. Most certainly it is very much a product of the last century, and there are those who predict that it will go as suddenly as it appeared, but this is questionable. Youngsters under their teens are attracted by smoking as an act of manliness and esteem, first in their gangs and later in their social groups. Maybe the women will be the death of the thing yet, for if an inborn abstinence from femininity is prevalent among boys and young men, cigarette smoking will be taboo in a very few years, and the old pipe and snuff can win the day.

Plew, who took his A. E. at Illinois in 1920, is supervising architect for the state. Mr. Cheever received the degree of B. S. at Illinois in 1921.

The department of electrical engineering offers a course that is very popular. This course seeks to fit its graduates with a general as well as a technical training in the field of an electrical engineer. English, mathematics, physics, chemistry, drawing, and shop work are given as general studies while the technical work consists of the theory of application of electrical phenomena, and the designing and testing of electrical machines. The head of this department is Joseph A. Thaler who received the degree of E. E. at Minnesota in 1900. William A. Murray is assistant professor of E. E. He took his degree at the University of Idaho in 1914.

Industrial engineering is a branch of the engineering profession that has been developed during the last decade. The application of science to business has made it necessary for the business man to have some knowledge of engineering. To fill this requirement, industrial engineering has been developed. The student in this department spends about one-fourth of his time in the study of business and correlated subjects. These consist of the economics of business, commercial law, accounting, and investment mathematics. The remainder of the student's time is spent in learning the fundamentals of the engineering profession that he may have a more thorough knowledge for engineering work. Professor Eugene L. Grant who received his degree of Bachelor of Science at the University of Wisconsin in 1917, is the advisor of the department of Industrial Engineering.

The department of Civil Engineering offers a course that is very practical. The study of railroads, public highways, bridges, water power, and allied subjects is given. Mechanical engineering, irrigation engineering, engineering physics, and chemical engineering and industrial engineering also offer courses that fit the student for either general or special work in their chosen field.

The professors in the College of Engineering are: Chemistry, William M. Cobleigh, A. M. Columbia University, 1899; Civil Engineering, Leon D. Conkline, C. E. Cornell University, 1900; Physics, Frank W. Ham, M. S., Montana State College, 1905; Mechanical Engineering, Eric Therkelsen, M. E. Montana State College, 1922; Architecture, William R. Plew, A. E. University of Illinois, 1920; and agriculture engineering, Harvey F. Mordock, C. E., University of Colorado, 1911.

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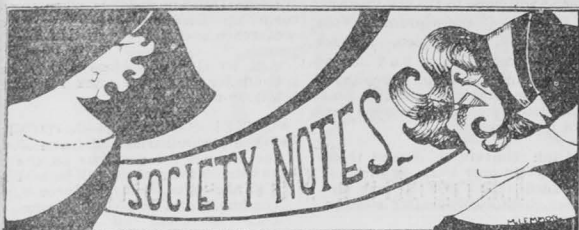

camps and boats, during which time they lived on meat only for almost nineteen months. From the Eskimos they learned the art of spearing seal from holes in the ice. Their groceries were not sufficient to provide them for a long while on the vast fields of ice, therefore they lived for the remainder of the time by hunting. There formerly was a belief that no seals were farther north than a man could walk in a half day. This belief was destroyed by Stefansson's extended trip out in the icy prairies. The seals speared from holes in the ice furn-

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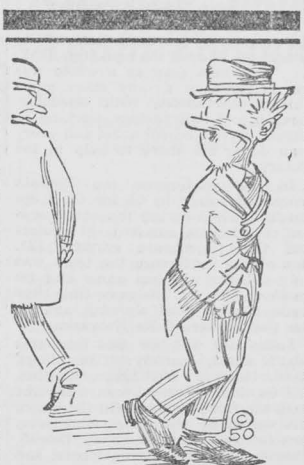
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ished the party with heat, light, food, and clothing, which enabled them to survive starvation and lengthen the mileage and period of time spent by the party. On one of Stefansson's many trips, he and his expedition party were as far as seven hundred miles away from food supplies. After the provided food supplies were used up, they lived on the resources of the country, which are primarily seals. As much as ten thousand miles were traveled by foot away from the base. Dr. Stefansson has wrote several books about his experiences in the far North. His lecture was humorous, interesting and very educational.

In the conference the Bobcats scored 60 points to 63 for their opponents, while during the entire season the Bobcats amassed 81 points and their opponents garnered 121. Out of the conference the team was only able to win one game and tie another but at the same time they made a very good showing against the Cornhuskers from Nebraska.

Seven men will be lost from this year's squad, namely: Chez, Vogt, Hurd, Grady, Wellington, Breeden, and Gardner. Several men will come from the frosh squad to fill the places left vacant by these men who leave. Some of these men are Frady, Dowell, Cheevers, Long, Griffin, Bauer, and Larson. Kleffman who has been sick during the past season is expected to be in uniform again next year.

Coach Dyche is to be congratulated on the showing the Bobcats have made this season. Taking a great deal of new material to start with he developed a team that was above the average and made a good showing in the games they participated in.

The most consistent men on the team were Captain Chez and Captain-elect Wylie. Chez, whose position on the team last year was in the backfield, was

broke through to tackle the man with the ball and throw him for a loss. On offense he could always be relied upon to do his bit in opening a hole in the opponents line. In all Chez is a dangerous man and he will be sorely missed when the team dons the moleskins next fall.
