TRADITIONAL DEBATE IS TO BE REINSTATED HERE

Fresh and Sophomore Contest to Be Held Friday 13th During December

The traditional freshman-sophomore debate is to be reinstated. This was definitely assured at a joint meeting of the sophomore and freshman debate committees held last Tuesday. Arrangements were made for the time and place of the debate as well as for the method of selecting teams, and for the subject, which is to be the national Pi Kappa Delta question: Resolved: That the nations should adopt a plan of complete disarmament excepting such force as are needed for police purposes.

This debate is one of Montana State's oldest traditions. It originated in the early days of the college and has continued until last year, when, for various reasons, no debate was held. Interest in the contest has always been high. No matter how technical the subject, the ancient rivalry of the two classes always serves to make the debate interesting for everyone. It is the only time of the year when a frosh is given an unhampered opportunity to express himself, and consequently satire and wit are likely to run rampant.

Tradition, which says the debate must be held toward the middle of December, is to be followed exactly. Consequently Friday, the 13th, is the day it falls on this year. This is one week before the end of the quarter. The question is to be debated by three men teams. The freshman team is to be selected by tryouts in the near future. These tryouts will also determine the winner of the Pi Kappa Delta cup which is awarded annually to the best freshman debater. Four members will be selected for the team. Of these, three will debate the sophomores, and the fourth will be alternate. The same four persons probably will later take part in the dual debate with the University, two of them going to Missoula, and the rest (Continued on Page Three)

SEVENTY-FIVE TURN OUT FOR RIFLE TEAM

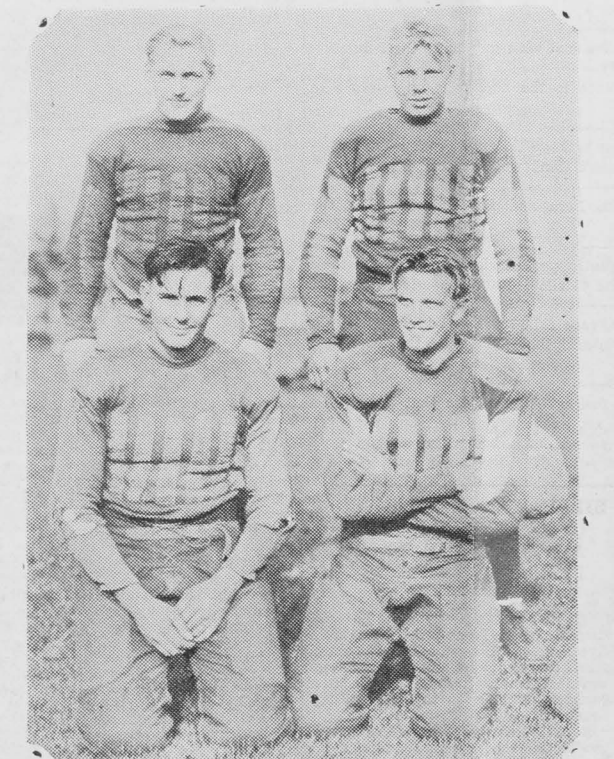
Candidates for Team may Fire One to Five, Monday, Tuesday Thursday, and Friday

The opposing team will be none other than the mighty squad from Mount Saint Charles College at Helena, and the field will be at Great Falls. BOBCATS TRIUMPH OVER COWBOYS ON WET FIELD AT SHERIDAN, WYO., MONDAY AFTERNOON

Defrate, Wylie and Worthington Make Runs for Long Gains. First Three Quarters End Scoreless. Game Characterized by Careful Playing. Wyoming Kept on Defensive During Most of Tilt

GRIDIRON COVERED WITH BLANKET OF SNOW

Two Touchdowns and One Successful Try for Points Gave M. S. C. the Game. Dyche's Men Forced the Playing and Made Long Marches for Opponents Goal

Montana State was again victorious when they defeated the Wyoming Cowboys on a snow-covered field with a score of 13-0 at Sheridan, yesterday. After dopsters had predicted that the Bobcats would lose on a wet or snow-covered field, Defrate, Wylie and Worthington ran wild to build up the decisive score in the contest.

After playing careful, even football in the first quarter and neither team scoring in the next two periods, the Bobcats spectacular long runs and passing brought the game to a climax in the last period.

Gatton Field Done in 1930

Work Commenced Last Spring to Be Completed During Present Year

Next fall will see the Bobcats playing their home games on a new and improved field. For several years it has been planned to abandon the old Gatton field for a new one located in the back of the gymnasium. This will be of great advantage to the teams playing as it will give them access to better quarters between halves.

Work was started on the new field last spring when it was graded, sided, and water lines put in. This year a fence is to be built completely around the field, and the bleachers will be moved up from the old field. The track has been graded and cleared, and, after rolling this year, will be in readiness for the track men. The total cost of this improvement will be \$6,500 when completed. However, the track included in this amount is only temporary.

A separate appropriation was made for tennis courts. The courts are surfaced with disintegrated granite; they should be ready for use next fall. These, with the new athletic field, will be a big improvement in the equipment of the department.

Montana State student are promised one of the most interesting evenings of the fall quarter Tuesday night, November 26. That is the Tormentor production, "The Doll's House" will be presented at the Emerson Auditorium.

This three-act play is distinctly a college production with a cast consisting of the best theatrical talent on the campus. All of the costumes and stage sets are being made by students and "The Doll's House" is under the direction of Mr. Hansen and Mrs. Davis, both members of the faculty.

The Tormentors are going to great pains to produce the Doll's House in perfect representation of the period. They are doing research work to bring out the exact costumes worn in the early eighteenth century, in Sweden. A special set has been built to show the typical Swedish home of that period and Bozeman homes are being ransacked to obtain representative furniture types used. "The Doll's House" promises to be the most detailed and elaborate period production ever offered by the Tormentors.

The cast is completing work on the third act this week and will give Director Hansen about ten days to put the finishing touches on the production. Every member of the cast is perfectly characterized. Billings Air Transport Opens Flying School at Belgrade Landing Field

Offering to the air-minded students of Montana State College and opportunity to receive instruction in the art of flying, the Billings Air Transportation company of Billings has opened a school in Bozeman. Wayne Seifert of Bozeman, a licensed transport pilot with almost 1,000 hours in the air, and Robert Westover, of Billings, one of the two licensed airplane mechanics in Montana are in charge of the work. Because of Bozeman's lack of a flying field, the B. A. T. ship is flying from the Belgrade field. The Mono-prep, manufactured by the Mono-Coupe Airplane company of Moline, Ill., powered by a 65 horse power air-cooled motor which develops a top speed of 105 miles per hour, and which cruises the ship at 75 miles an hour, is being used to instruct students. Instructor and student are seated side by side in one cockpit instead of one behind the other as in most ships. Dual controls are in the cockpit. The Mono-prep carries an NC license issued by the Department of Commerce of the Federal Government which permits a transport pilot to fly it anywhere he might desire to go—interstate or intercountry.

Wayne Seifert, who does the teaching, has instructed students at the Ryan Airport in California and also in Kansas City. He has soloed (Continued on Page Two)

bers and of the engineering profession in general.

The Institute now has a membership of 20,000, representing all branches of electrical engineering and nearly every prominent electrical engineer is a member. It has 157 sections and branches in cities and colleges. Montana State College is District No. 9, which comprises the states of Idaho, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Montana. The Institute provides for student branches and enrollment. The student branches are local electrical engineering societies organized by students in colleges and technical schools under the auspices of the institute. Any student who is registered as a full-time student in a university or technical school of recognized standing and "who is pursuing a regular course of study in preparation for the profession of electrical engineering may be enrolled as a student of the A. I. E. E." The Institute published the A. I. E. E. Monthly Journal and each student member is entitled to receive it. The student member dues are three dollars per year. The advantages a student gains by affiliation with the national organization may be summoned up by saying that he receives, "The honor benefit and stimulation and association with those prominent in the electrical industry." Some of the activities of the Montana State College student branch of the A. I. E. E. are the holding of technical meetings, debates, joint meetings with other student organizations, motion picture shows, electrical shows, dances, outside lectures, Electric club banquets, and inspection trips to nearby power plants. The Montana State College branch was organized in 1907 and has been continuously active since its organization.

The officers of the branch here are: President, Eric Wilson; vice president, Earl Rudberg; secretary, Otto Van Horn; and treasurer, Robert Jones. Professor J. A. Thaler of the E. E. department is Counselor for the branch and is also chairman of the committee for District No. 9.

Dr. Sternheim continued by saying that students seem to have no grasp of world affairs. He blames this on the short cut to culture. To correct this fault he advocates more reading. "Instead of reading in detail," he said, "most people pick out a paper or magazine that gives the news in a very brief form."

He suggested that if people would read more current fiction that the idea of international relations would be understood.

Dr. Sternheim was born in England. He is a graduate of Oxford university, England, of Heidelberg university, Germany, and of the United University of Paris, France. He has been an American citizen for 19 years and has served on faculties of the University of the State of New York and the University of Minnesota. At the present time he is employed as an extension lecturer for the University of Minnesota.

CALLS ON RED CROSS INCREASE; RESPONSE TO ROLL CALL URGED

Society's Activities Reach Millions Each Year—Chairman Payne Asks Generous Support in Membership.

Disaster relief work, service to disabled veterans and their families, public health work and its many other activities caused expenditures of \$11,064,000 by the American Red Cross for the year ended June 30, 1929, according to the annual report of the organization.

This work by the Red Cross is supported by the annual Roll Call for members, which is held from Armistice Day to Thanksgiving Day, November 11 to 28.

Directing attention to the heavy expenditures by the Red Cross during the past year, and to the fact that the organization was called upon for assistance in 120 disasters in the United States and its insular possessions, Judge John Barton Payne, the chairman, said:

"The Red Cross is a volunteer society, supported by its membership and belongs to all of the citizens. While it is a semi-governmental agency in that the President of the United States is its president, and one third of its governing board are representatives of Government departments, yet it receives no financial support from the Government.

"Funds for our work for war veterans and their families, for carrying on disaster relief, for our varied health activities, the life saving and first aid work and our many other activities, all are derived from the membership fee. The public is asked only once each year—at the Annual Roll Call—to join in this support of the Red Cross."

The Red Cross expended an average of \$936,000 per year in the past seven years, in disaster relief work from its own treasury, statements show. The work for world war veterans also has caused heavy expenditures.

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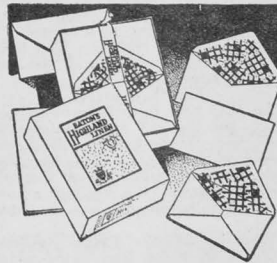
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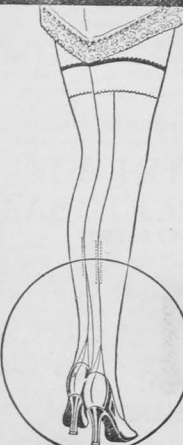

PROSPECTS FAVOR THE UTAH INDIANS

Mormon Team Lead In Confer-
ence Series. Aggies Defeated
By Colorado

With the football season drawing to a close it looks as if the Utah Indians will repeat their conference championship again this year. With the championship practically won they have two games yet to play. They meet the Wyoming Cowboys on Nov. 16 and on Thanksgiving they will take the field against the Utah Aggies. The Armstrong Indians have a clean slate for the season with an average of 100 per cent. With the aid of Utah's all-American candidate, "Powderhouse" Poweroy, they have swept through all opposition to remain the only undefeated team in the Rocky Mountain conference. Colorado College held the Redskins to the lowest score of the season when the Tigers held Armstrong's men to two touchdowns and collected 3 points with a field goal by Dutch Clark, taking the short end of a 3 to 12 score.

The Indians are heavy favorites in their coming tilt with Wyoming and unless Wyoming plays a better brand of football than they have displayed so far there is little doubt as to the result. Although Utah Aggies have been defeated by B. Y. U. and Colorado Aggies they have a fast, strong team and will make U. U. tight to remain undefeated for the season. Even if the Indians should lose on both of their remaining games they will still have a percentage which gives them first or a tie for first place.

Utah Aggies who were in second rating were defeated by Colorado Aggies 6 to 7 which combined with the defeat at the hands of B. Y. U. practically eliminates them from the running. With two games to play they have little chance of a comeback. One of their games is with Denver U. but victory would help them little unless they can overcome U. U. B. Y. U. has also suffered two setbacks one from U. U. and last to Montana State for the second consecutive time. Although Romney's men have made no great impression as a championship team they have proven themselves formidable foes for any team in the R. M. C. Colorado College and Colorado Aggies are well down to list but both have two more games to play and the outcome of these games is uncertain and each have a chance to yet make a bid for honors.

Aside from U. U. the standing of the other conference members are very doubtful. Teams which got off to a poor start are beginning to display unusual strength thus making a probable rating uncertain. Although Montana State rates among the leaders we are in reality out of the running before the season begins. To win the conference a team must play at least five conference games to be eligible for the championship. Since we have only three conference games it is impossible for us to win a championship.
