College Man Writes \$10,000 Essay While Ill At Home

A college man—Dudley L. Harley, Lehigh, '30—has shown his heels to many thousands of entrants in a national essay contest for a \$10,000 first prize. Harley, whose home is in Martinsburg, W. Va., is a candidate for a Rhodes scholarship from his home state, and expects to use his new wealth in furthering his education and is ambitious to be a writer.

The essay which won the contest for the Lehigh undergraduate was

a gain of ten per cent over the enrollment of four years ago. The enrollment this year to date is 1149.

President Atkinson's address which followed, was a direct appeal to the students of Montana State College for understanding and support of the measures which the legislature is asking the voters of the state to approve. He believes that if the voters of the state are informed as to the real meaning of the two measures which the legislature wishes them to approve, they will not fail to do so.

President Atkinson pointed out that the support for teaching work in the state institutions comes out of the mill and a half which was voted in 1920 for a period of ten years. Unless something is done this year the support will have to come out of the general fund of two mills. The legislature is therefore asking the voters to approve a three mill appropriation. The second measure for which the legislature is asking approval is a three million dollar bond issue for the purpose of furthering a building program among the educational institutions of the state.

Due to the increase in enrollment, Montana State College has need of new buildings and new equipment. Each department is handicapped by a shortage of equipment. Unless this issue passes there can be no new building on the campus.

President Atkinson ended his address by stating, "If Montana young people are to get higher education, it will have to be supported by Montana people."

Prof. E. Grant Resumes Work

Returns From Leland Stanford. Tells of Six-year Engineering Courses and Departmental Work

Professor E. L. Grant of the industrial engineering department, who has been teaching in the civil engineering department at Stanford University, has returned to Montana State college to teach the winter quarter subjects in industrial engineering. He will return to Stanford University in the spring.

When asked as to how the engineering courses at Stanford differed from those at M. S. C., Mr. Grant said that, "Stanford University has a six-year engineering course which leads to the A. B. degree in engineering and that all undergraduate students register in the school of engineering—not in courses as here." He also said that, "Graduate work at Stanford is set up on a departmental basis and that the undergraduate may at the end of his first four years of general engineering register for two years of graduate work in civil, electrical, mechanical, or mining engineering." It will be seen from the above statements that the engineering courses at Stanford University differ a great deal from those at M. S. C.

More Students Enter College

Enrollment Numbers Over One Thousand... Marked Increase Over Last Year

Montana state college is still growing rapidly. Each new quarter brings in many new students, and each year the average enrollment is found to be materially increased. Recent reports from the office of the registrar show that in the last year, there has been an increase in the registration of regularly enrolled students of nearly 12%.

At the present time, there are in actual attendance at this institution, 1065 regularly enrolled students. A year ago, the number of such students was only 958. This leaves an increase of 107 students for the year, or an increase in registration of 11.16%. The total registration for the year of 1929 was 1149 regularly enrolled students. According to Mr. McCall, the registrar, this indicates that the total enrollment for the present year will be between 1175 and 1200 regular students.

A comparatively large number of students registered here for the first time at the beginning of the present winter quarter. A list of those who have not attended college here before is here given: Atkins, Clara; Atkins,

New System Will Be Used at Assemblies

Disorder to Be Overcome. Freshmen and Sophomores Must Occupy Seats in the Balcony

A new seating arrangement will be introduced at the next assembly in the gym. This plan is as follows:

Faculty members, seniors, and juniors will occupy the chairs on the lower floor, the faculty on the north side, the seniors in their customary places on the south half of the floor, with the juniors occupying the seats behind the faculty and seniors. The freshmen and sophomores will sit in the balcony.

This revision has been deemed wise in view of the present disorder, in which a speaker must raise his voice to be heard in all points of the room, while the best seats, immediately in front of him, remain empty.

The new system will eliminate the use of the uncomfortable side bleachers downstairs, insuring everyone a chair. It will also make it easier to hear all of each announcement and address. The Fangs and Spurs will function at assemblies, at least until the new arrangement is familiar to everyone.

Rifle Squad Is Cut Down to Thirty Men

Five Lettermen Retained on Final Squad. Number of Promising Freshmen in Line-up

After about six weeks of competition, the rifle squad has been cut down to about 30 men, according to Captain Butler, who is in charge of that work in the military department. The squad as it now stands contains five lettermen, eight who have been on the squad before, and 17 new men, who are mostly freshmen.

This squad will again be cut down at the end of the week to about 20 men. During the week all the men will shoot two rounds of targets and the 20 best will remain on the squad. The plan that Captain Butler announced at the first of the year has been followed out and will be used in these final selections. That is, if two men shoot about the same, the one shooting the best in the standing position will be given preference.

In comparison to last year, the men are shooting better, as a whole. The five lettermen have raised their scores of last year and the old squad members have also improved considerably. New men who have been showing up well are: Gollinger, Buckland, Eure, R. Baur, J. Baur, and Kauffman. Of last year's squad, Burns, and Amundson just missed making a letter last year by a part of one point.

"The squad will be as good as last year's squad," said Captain Butler, "and although there will be no outstanding shot, like Zion, the average will be better and that is what really counts."

Prestige Trip Results in Losses to Butler, Loyola, and Pittsburgh With Wins Over Marquette, Purdue, Pennsylvania and Nebraska. Return Home Yesterday

The Bobcats made a very creditable record on the eastern barnstorming trip with four victories out of the seven scheduled games played. The "Cats" defeated Marquette 39 to 30; Purdue 38 to 35; Penn. State 51 to 42 and Nebraska 61 to 30, and losing to Butler 49 to 32; Loyola 38 to 28 and Pittsburgh 38 to 37. On this trip the Montana State quint met some of the hardest competition in the east and proved their ability to rank among them.

Bobcat-Pittsburgh game

The Bobcats led during the greater part of the game, leading at the half 18 to 15, but the Panther quint tied them at 36-36. Max Worthington netted a free throw which placed the Bobcats in the lead. Just before the gun Captain Hyatt of the Panthers, made the winning basket. Hyatt was the ace of the eastern quint making two-thirds of his teams points.

Frank Ward made twelve points and was high man on the Montana team. Throughout the game the Bobcats held the audience tense with their passing and floor work.

Upon their return from their long eastern invasion the Bobcats come back to a hard schedule in their first week at home. On Wednesday night they meet their old rivals, the Grizzlies and on Friday and Saturday evenings they meet the University of Utah Redskins in their first conference game of the season. The Utes are by no means set up and the Cats are liable to have to play their best to come out on the top of the fray.

The Utes have been to the coast on an invasion during the holidays and made a very impressive showing against all the teams they met. The Utes opened their season on December 20, handing Wyoming university a 54-48 defeat and came back the next evening to again trounce the Cowboys 42-36. Leaving for their coast invasion they met St. Mary's on December 23, and came out on the long end of a 35-22 score. They again defeated St. Mary's December 26 with a 37-26 score. The redskins then met their first defeat at the hands of U. C. L. A. They came out on the short end of a 44-34 score in the first tilt and lost again the following evening 44-33 to the same team. However, in their third game with U. C. L. A. they emerged victorious in a 52-44 contest. On January 3 and 4 the Utes downed the University of Nevada 30-23 and 31-26. The showing is one that any team could be proud of. The Utes, however, dropped two close games to the Utah Aggies in their first conference games.

Vandal Peterson, Utah coach, has been famous for his great defensive teams in the past but this season he has discarded his pet system and has turned to an offensive style of play. Judging from his success in his cost invasion his offense theory must be working in a satisfactory manner.

Captain Smith and Dow show plenty of scoring ability and loom as contenders for high scoring honors. Dow is a letterman and captain of two years ago and an excellent ball rustler and has an excellent eye for the basket. Clark has been shifted from center and forward to a guard position and adds to the Utes scoring punch as well as to their defense. Lybberg, at the other guard is fast rounding into form and is considered as a strong contender for all-conference guard. In addition the Utes have an avalanche of reserve strength.
