Among the honor women who will be back this year will be several former Women's Day speakers. It is also very fortunate that many of the medal donors will be in Bozeman to present the various awards.

The Women's Day speaker is chosen on Women's Day from the members of the graduating class and the one chosen is to deliver the Women's Day address five years after her graduation. It is with great pleasure this year that M. S. C. welcomes Miss Laura Asbury as speaker. Miss Asbury, when at M. S. C. was a member of Alpha Omicron Pi sorority and a member of Mortar Board. She is at present educational director in the personnel department in Lord and Taylor department store in New York City. Her subject for Women's Day is "Enthusiasm for the Interesting Things in Life". Norma Beck is outgoing A. W. ELABORATE PROGRAM PLANNED FOR ALUMNI

Home Coming Day Will See Great Variety of Entertainment for Grads

Following the pageant, awards will be made to all athletes who have won letters and numerals during the past year. This is the last opportunity for many people to see Thompson, the Ward brothers and many others who have made athletic fame for Montana State.

At noon all alumni, former students and members of the class of 1930 will be hosts at a picnic lunch on the campus. The M. S. C. band will play during the luncheon.

CENSUS RETURNS SHOW LARGE CITIES INCREASE

Cleveland, the largest city to report in the 1930 census so far, has 901,482, an increase of 13.1 per cent over 1920. Some of the other cities are: Milwaukee, 567,962, an increase of 24 per cent; San Francisco, 625,974, a 23.5 per cent increase; Tacoma, 106,372, or a 9.7 per cent increase; Long Beach, Calif., 141,390, a 15.3 per cent increase. The increases in the very large cities are slowing up as compared with the 1920 increases, but the medium (100,000) class cities are making big jumps.

VACATION CUM LAUDE

"Whenever a college man applies to me for a job I never inquire about his scholastic standing," recently remarked a business man, himself a university graduate. "What I want to know is how he spent his summer vacations—three months per annum, and before he gets his degree that amounts to a whole year, the most valuable, I think, of his entire collegiate course. Never again will he have a similar opportunity. If he has wasted it, I know something about him; if not, he has a record worth showing."

"Here's the record of one boy I've just employed," this man continued. "At the end of his freshman year he went for one month to a citizens' military camp; after sophomore year he worked for six weeks with Dr. Grenfell's mission in Labrador; at the close of junior year he had a month and a half with the Banks fishing fleet, and after graduation he spent July and August with a forestry outfit. All of it was open-air work, putting him in good physical condition and in touch with all sorts and conditions of men. He used only 26 of the 48 free weeks at his disposal, but I don't care what he did with the others. Those 26 weeks were what I call a 'vacation cum laude.' They gave him an unusual equipment for success and I only wish I could find more young men who possessed it."

THOSE EXAMINATION PAPERS

When examination papers are returned, some students are always disappointed. There are those who think themselves abused, who think they have received an injustice: their "C" should have been an "A."

Haven't you attended concerts where you and a goodly portion of the other auditors could have laughed cynically, wept bitterly, or screamed wildly so utterly abused was the decision? Consider "Abie's Irish Rose," which went a begging for a buyer, and then leaped, under a wise manager's hand, to immediate and widespread popularity. It is cheerful, at least, that the play's worth ultimately was rewarded.

The only thing for us to do is work, and wait. There may be

Book Treats With Engines, Principles of Heat and Power, and Steam Power Plant Engineering

Dean Earle B. Norris, formerly of Montana State but now Dean of Engineering at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and Eric B. Therkelsen, Professor of mechanical engineering at M. S. C. have just completed a new book on "Heat Power". The book is published by the McGraw-Hill Book Co. of New York and contains 366 pages accompanied by 256 illustrations.

The book treats with the subjects of internal-combustion engines, principles of heat and power, and steam power plant engineering. The book is a text for an introductory course in the principles of heat power for engineering students and throughout the text emphasis is placed upon fundamental principles. In the belief that the student's mastery of a subject is both aided and measured by the solving of problems, examples have been worked in the text and a series of study problems has been placed at the end of each chapter.

The authors have departed from the traditional arrangement and have deferred the presentation of steam-power machinery until the more familiar internal-combustion engine has been covered. Furthermore, the approach to thermodynamics appears to be facilitated by this arrangement, the student finding it easier at the outset to understand the "permanent" gas cycles of internal combustion engines.

This book is the first of a series of three which the authors will publish as soon as possible. The second of the series will treat with the subject of "Thermodynamics", while the third will be one the "Economics of Power Plant Engineering." The book contains the new steam tables which are the result of an eight year joint research by Harvard University, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and the U. S. Bureau of Standards. This is the first time the new steam tables have been published in book form and they now appear simultaneously with those published by the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

At Montana State College the book will be used as text material for the mechanical engineers in "Heat Power Engineering" and "Thermodynamics" and for the electrical, chemical, and civil engineers it will be used in "Heat Engines". The book has already been adopted by the engineering faculties of Penn State, University of Pittsburgh, and the Missouri School of Mines as a text.
