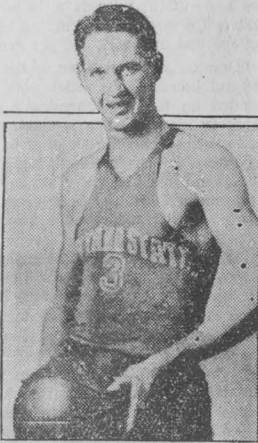

Montana Combination That Slapped Faces Of Gate Receipters

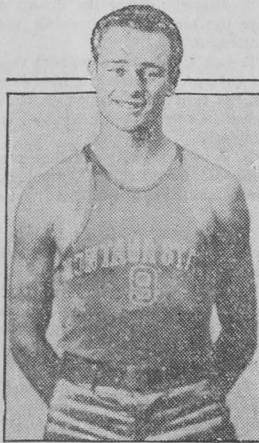


Jim Taylor

He is a member of the last great Gallatin team, that held along with Livingston, the Big Fourteen Conference title. He was a feared forward on this squad and attracted much attention at the state tournament. He was one of the leading scorers on

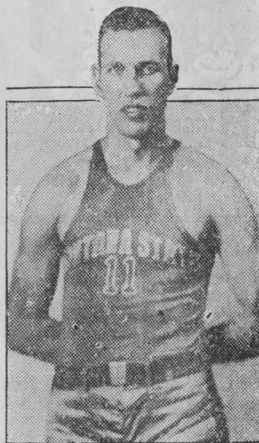
Ed Exum

He immediately jumped on the first string where he remained as one of the highest scorers for that year. He was one of the instrumental factors that helped the Bobcats to win their four games in the conference. He was also an instrumental factor in helping the

Sand Coulee

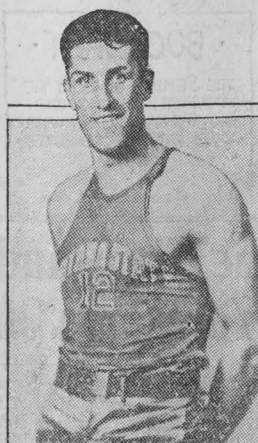

Eli was a member of the Bobcat squad that started here four years ago although he did not earn his letter during his first year. The first year the work he did along with Young, Bobcat scoring star, did much to set the new Bobcats on their way to the championship.

This year Eli was the main cog in the machine that Montana State placed on the hardwood. When Eli was off his ball game, the team fell badly

The Aggies after running wild over the weekend celebrating the return of the conference trophy to the show case in the Gymnasium turned on more enthusiasm yesterday from 11:00 till 2:00 with a "victory assembly" which ended with a free noon lunch and matinee dance.

The college whistle throatily blew the students into the gym at 11 o'clock to pay formal tribute to the Rocky Mountain Conference title winners. Jim Watson, newly appointed commissioner of demonstrations presided.

President Atkinson spoke briefly and feelingly on the faculty's reactions and sentiment toward the winning of the Championship. The term "Number one Bobcat" has affectionately been given President Atkinson, who has backed the team and shown more enthusiasm and school spirit than any of the entire student body.

Dick Nelson represented the student side of the athletic board and brought to light the long hours of practice that went into the making of champions.

Harry Reif, Montana Power, expressed the sentiment of the local merchants and downtown backers. "The business men are proud of

Defeat D. U. Twice For R.M.C. Flag

A final fighting crack at the Rocky Mountain conference basketball title, last week, netted the Bobcats of Montana State College the championship trophy, two berths on an All Conference first squad selected by "Boss" Parsons of the Denver Post, and the honor and prestige of an invitation to play in the national A. A. U. basketball tournament.

Double victory over the Denver U. Pioneers to the tune of 61-49 and 54-36 set the 1937 Bobcats on an athletic throne comparable to the record of the nationally famous "Golden Bobcats" of several seasons ago.

Eddie Exum, star forward of the Cats and high point man in the western division of the conference, and Bill Ogle, high point guard and mainstay of the Montana defense climbed aboard the all conference bandwagon along with Babcock, scoring center for D. U., Miller of Utah, and White of Colorado, as first selections for top rankers in the conference. Jim Taylor rated all-conference guard on the Denver Post second quint.

The first night stands watched the inspired Bobcats take off on a scoring spree in the first few minutes of play that left the dashing blocking Pioneers 10 points in the wake. Cashing in on free shots and looping in miraculous field tosses, Taylor, Ogle, and Doyra kept the crowd howling throughout the opening period. Some kind of record was made or broken when the time-keeper's watch pointed at eleven minutes and the score sheet registered ought in the Denver field goal column. Commentators generally agreed that basketball history doesn't list any previous championship series where a team has been held away from pay territory for that length of time at the beginning of a game.

basketball contests in Bozeman on the week-end. On Thursday night Montana State's Bobcats defeated Denver University, 61 to 49. The next evening the Bobcats won, 54 to 36. Those two games made the lowly Bobcats champions of the 12 teams of the Rocky Mountain conference, titleholders on their last appearance with an elite Big Seven which hereafter will send its crack athletic aggregations into the arena for the edification of the fans.

Montana State College has had academic renown for years now. Its graduates are scattered over the nation, many of them being prominent in various lines of endeavor. Also the Bozeman institution has been long known as the home of good basketball, in fact, for a stellar brand of that fast and exciting pastime. In the late 20's Montana State had its famous Golden Bobcats, who won the Rocky Mountain Conference honors three seasons in a row. Now they have another championship team and all Montanans are proud of their achievement in besting the squads representing the neighboring and athletically-minded states of Utah, Wyoming and Colorado.

It may be presumed that somebody's neck was red when the Bobcats topped a sensational season with a victory for Montana, for when the "weaklings" were weeded out there was some mention of them being unable to supply sufficient competition for the mightier schools of the conference. Now the Bobcats are through with the conference, and possibly their departure can be considered a big break for the Big Seven. That's how most persons would figure it, anyway.

One Thousand Dollars, New York Trip Offered In Contest

An all-expense trip to New York City, plus a total of \$1,000 in cash prizes, is being offered students in a prize competition for essays on "How Advertising Benefits the Consumer."

The contest is open to all undergraduate students in colleges and universities. It is being sponsored by Advertising Age, The National Newspaper of Advertising, Chicago, for the purpose of inducing college men and women to give more intelligent and careful thought to the functions and value of advertising in the social and economic life of the nation. There is no entry fee, and nothing to buy.

Essays are limited to 1,000 words, and must be mailed before midnight, May 1, 1937, to be eligible. The writer of the best essay will receive \$250 in cash, plus an all-expense train to New York City. Second prize is \$100, third prize is \$50, and ten honorable mentions of \$10 will also be awarded. Identical prizes will be awarded in a similar essay for high school students, which will be judged separately.

Essays will be judged by a group of prominent individuals representing consumer and educational interests, and including Mrs. Roberta Campbell Lawson, President General Federation of Women's Clubs, and Prof. Herbert W. Hess, professor of merchandising at the University of Pennsylvania.

Editors' Reports Show Gain In Student Drinking

There is more drinking of alcoholic beverages and students are drinking more hard liquor in most American colleges and universities according to a survey just completed by *The Literary Digest*, which findings are published in its current issue.

Questionnaires were sent to the heads of 1,475 colleges and also to 1,475 student editors and leaders, the magazine states, asking an appraisal of their campus drinking situation since repeal.

Replies are reported from 645 residents, deans and student leaders who represented 581 American colleges "of every type of sectarian and non-sectarian school in the country."

More drinking since repeal is reported by 303 of those responding and 60 others state there is less drinking in their colleges. Reports from 205 state that students are drinking more hard liquor and from 100 that they are drinking more light liquors.

The Literary Digest epitomizes the findings from its nine-part questionnaire survey of American colleges:

"1. Drinking is on the increase everywhere, but there is relatively less drunkenness.

"2. Students abhor the drunk, admire the man who can drink like a gentleman.

"3. One third of the colleges reply see a great increase in beer drinking, two thirds see an even greater increase in cocktail and highball consumption.

"4. A vast majority of college presidents see drinking as a problem in other institutions, but not in their own.

"5. Everywhere, teetotal enforcement in colleges appears to be crumbling.

"6. The average undergraduate does most of his tipping off the campus.

"7. Coeds and women students in general have lost their moral revulsion toward drinking.

"8. Most student editors agree that repeal has aided temperance. The majority favor education for drinking, not against it, as a solution for the liquor problem.

"9. No matter whether the state or community is wet, or dry, students have little trouble in buying what they want to drink.

"Practically every one of the ques-

tionnaire letters told of a plentiful use of hard and light intoxicants by the undergraduate body as a whole. One editor wrote that drinking in his college had increased 500 per cent.

"Opinion as to whether or not the general increase was deleterious depended on the correspondent's personal opinions. Many students who had never touched liquor prior to college days, it was disclosed, found social pressure or the new availability of liquor or the safety of government-bonded stock an inevitable incentive to drink moderately.

"Because liquor could be gotten so easily, with none of that thrill of law breaking once prohibition fell, hardened carousers drank more temperately than did their older brothers in the days of bathtub gin.

"Traditional home of American education, New England, slipped into repeal with lax liquor regulations in its colleges and showed a definite increase in drinking.

"Harvard and Yale allow drinking in rooms and fraternity houses. Smaller colleges restrict drinking as best they can, but on or off campus, consumption is general with slight student sentiment against it.

"Women's colleges are most liberal because so many of their students come from cosmopolitan drinking areas. Also, most "dates" attend neighboring wet men's colleges.

"Of thirty-five New England institutions queried, sixteen men's and six women's were definitely wet, eleven men's and two women's had occasional or no drinking.

"As a rule, the larger the college and the higher its academic standing, the fewer its regulations for the consumption of liquor and the less their observance."

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Greater Part Of M. S. C. Potato Growers Elect A. H. Small President

More than 97 per cent of the Montana State college graduates who earned their degrees from 1928 through 1935, a period which included the most severe depression of this generation, are employed and 80 per cent of them are Montana residents.

These figures are indicated in a recent survey of the economic status of Montana State college alumni conducted in cooperation with the U. S. office of education and financed by the WPA. The survey is part of a standardized national study covering 30 educational institutions of the United States. R. H. Palmer, professor of agricultural education is the supervisor of the Montana State college survey. W. H. McCall, is the project manager and Warren Leland of Bozeman, compiler.

A standard form of questionnaire was sent to all graduates of Montana State college during the period covered. Deaths, illness or other causes, reduced the number actually delivered to 1,125. Nearly 800 were filled out and returned, or 61 per cent of those delivered, which Supervisor Palmer says is an unusually good return. The study of the questionnaires analyzes nearly 40 factors which either aid in measuring or influence the economic status of graduates.

The average salary reported is \$1800 per year and the highest \$6000. Nearly 59 per cent of the alumni are in professions, five per cent in trade, about two per cent in communication and transportation.

The remainder are in miscellaneous occupations.

About 70 per cent reported their first job the same as the course studied or closely related to it. Nearly 80 per cent obtained their first position within four months after graduation. About 70 per cent are receiving a higher salary than when first employed and 30 per cent have had but one employer. The survey also gives some indication of the future. It reveals that nearly half of the alumni are employed as proprietors or in administrative capacities where opportunities are greater.

Nearly 40 per cent are employed as skilled labor or clerks. One per cent covers the unskilled.

The questionnaires revealed that alumni credit the college with obtaining about as many positions for them as they obtained themselves by personal initiative. Personal initiative is given but one per cent advantage. Experience prior to graduation accounted for about 18 per cent of the positions obtained and family influence more than six per cent.

Commenting on the credit given by the college for its aid in locating them positions, President Alfred Atkinson says, "This is a fine tribute to the personnel service which provides guidance to the students while in college and assists them in getting located after graduation."

Some of the sidelights uncovered in the study are that earning part or all expenses of a college education is an aid rather than a detriment. A higher percentage of those who earned their way are employed than those who earned little or none.

Slightly more than 50 per cent of the alumni are married and only 50 per cent have living children. The majority have but one child.

Counties north of the Yellowstone are in the northern district of which Mr. Herron is the director.

In addition to state college faculty members, several of the leading growers in the state discussed various phases of potato production at the two day meeting.

A vote of thanks and commendation was given to F. M. Harrington, head of the horticulture department and H. E. Morris, plant pathologist and also to E. E. Isaac, extension horticulturist, by the association. In the resolution the association expresses its appreciation for the experimental work on potato improvement that has been done by the three state college men and cites the benefits accruing to potato growers in the state.

Unions

In United States Less Well Organized Than Britain's

(ACP)—Only one out of ten American workers belong to a union whereas approximately one out of every two British working men belongs to a labor organization, The Literary Digest states.

In the United States, it notes, out of 44,475,000 workers gainfully employed only 4,517,000 are organized. Great Britain's trade unions include virtually half of her 11,125,000 employed.

Internships In Public Affairs Offer Washington Training

(NSFA)—Announcement of thirty graduate scholarships providing internship training in the Federal Government for the year 1937-38 has been made by the National Institute of Public Affairs, organization for the promotion of better-trained leaders in government and politics. The Institute asserts the purpose of the internships is "to increase the interest of American youth in public affairs, to help in the development of career opportunities in government administration and to add to academic preparation for public service the experience of working with government officials holding positions of responsibility."

The internship training program includes experience in administrative agencies, comprehensive, informal study of government problems and personalities, with graduate instruction and individual supervision. Present seniors and those holding a bachelor's degree from a recognized college are eligible for internships, but must qualify by proving interest in public affairs by securing the endorsement of the Chairman of the Political science of corresponding

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Students Act

To Abolish All Fees in State Owned Colleges in Wisconsin

Madison, Wis.—(ACP)—To abolish all fees in state-owned colleges is the aim of a "student act" that will be presented in the Wisconsin state legislature this week.

Following close on the heels of the Wisconsin Youth act, now under consideration by the assembly, this bill has the support of the Wisconsin Youth congress, representing the Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., church groups, trade unions, Workers' alliance, WSA Progressive party groups, and YCL.

In addition to calling for the cancelling of fees, the bill provides for: 1. Election of one student and one faculty non-voting representative to the board of regents by the student body and faculty respectively.

2. Reduction of out-of-state tuition.

Maintenance of scholarships awarded on a basis of merit and need.

4. Representation of the student body on the student life and interests committee by a voting representative.

5. Establishment of a commission to investigate the possibility of furnishing free texts for students.

6. Free dental and optical care for students.

7. Creation of a state board of education with wider powers and larger membership to integrate educational policies of all state-owned schools.

The Wisconsin Youth Act, which is being considered before the "student act", is similar to the American Youth Act now being proposed in Washington by Sen. Ernest Lundeen (D., Minn.) and Rep. Maurer (D., Tex.).

Providing for an appropriation of \$5,000,000 to broaden the scope of the NYA in the state, the Wisconsin Youth act is accorded, by political observers, a fair chance of passage. Besides increasing student appropriations, it would apply to unemployed youth, and would be administered by a committee appointed by the legislature.

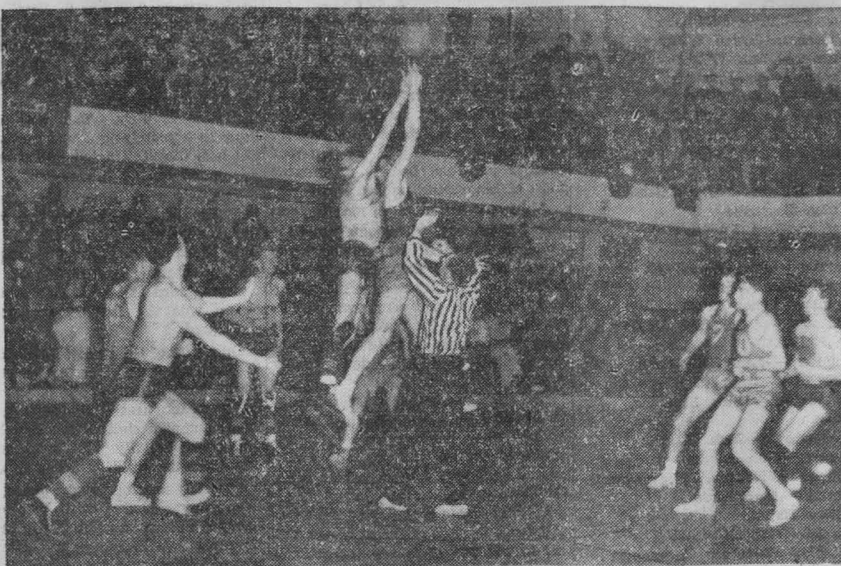
Novice Swim Meet

Twenty-eight neophytes dived into the college plunge for their very first experience in competitive swimming February 20 and gave a good account of themselves.

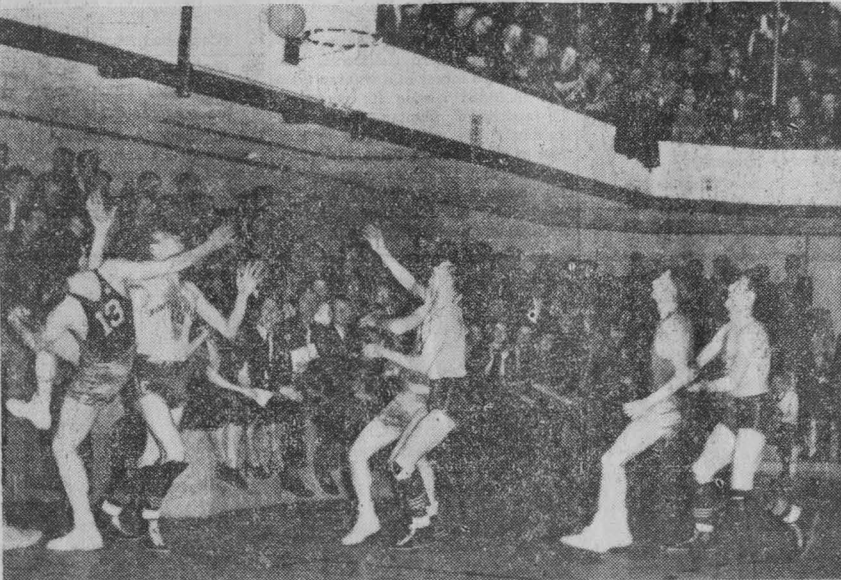

Eddie Exum Checks Hat With Second Squad

Five stars from as many far-flung schools in the Rocky Mountain Conference were set on the pedestal of the mythical All-Conference basketball team named by the combined votes of coaches, sports writers, and officials in the 1937 Associated Press squad.

Bill Ogle, Bobcat guard, with a scoring record exceeding many conference forwards, rated first string position along with Byron White of Colorado U. as master artists of the defense court.

Four powerful quints that met in the division playoffs following deadlocks at the end of their schedules, each sent an outstanding man to the all star team.

Brigham Young was awarded the fifth man, the only one outside the championship contenders, giving three positions to the western division, and two to the traditionally weaker eastern division.

The complete team includes, Ogle, M. S. C., White, C. U.—guards; Babcock, Denver, high score center; Giles of B. Y. U. and Miller of Utah at the forward jobs. Eddie Exum of Montana State and high point man of the western division with 144 scores placed on the seconds.

Ogle was labeled "The ideal running guard" by one of the participants in the poll. "He is lightning fast on the break, a baffling pivot-er and a dead eye on the hoop," added the railbird. 102 points rest in the score books for Ogle's season, the

most in the division for a guard and a record breaker of many years. Comparing Utah's Miller with Montana's Exum, who was the popular choice of many critics, one expert stated, "Exum is a very good shot but not the equal of Miller as an all-round forward."

"Tall Timber" Babcock stood out head and shoulders above other center aspirants both literally and in the records. Two consecutive seasons of high scoring have won him the distinction of the only twice holder of the conference scoring championship. His total for the season looks ominous at 163, only two points behind his last year's high.

Zealous defense and team spirit gave Byron White of Colorado the unanimous vote of every eastern division expert. When White was not on the floor, the Coloradans felt jittery, lost pep, and didn't play championship ball. He and Ogle gave the All-star team a pair of guards as fine as any recruited in many years.

Conspicuous by its absence, was the name of Kent Ryan, the "picture boy" forward from the Utags. An all-conference forward for two years he set out with the handicap of post season football games, and failed to scale the heights that have acclaimed him the sparkplug of the Utah State machine, previously.

Nominated as center of the second team, Ryan is still credited as formidable competition along with the remaining members, Ronnie Young of Denver playing across the floor from Exum at forward, Wade of Utah State and Meecham of Utah star guards.

Babcock And White Also Awarded East Division Positions

RMIPA All-Conference Team Not Yet Named

A telegram received near the printing deadline last night named the all eastern division basketball team from the "Top of the World," student publication at Western State college in Colorado.

Babcock and White, both previously named on all-conference teams were selected for center and guard, respectively. Schwartz of Colorado and Pederson of Western State held the forward posts and Smith of Greeley State nested in the opposite guard court.

Incomplete returns from other conference colleges necessitates withholding the RMIPA all-conference selections until a future date. The Exponent, issue of March 30, will print complete team lineups as voted by sports editors throughout the conference papers as well as a pictorial record of the greater players of the conference.
