Montana Physicists Meet In Bozeman

The Montana Physical Society held its annual Spring meeting here last Saturday. Following a business meeting in the morning a luncheon was served at the Baxter Hotel at noon for the group. Among the papers presented was one by Dr. P. L. Copeland of the college physics department entitled: "Determination of Electron Gas Temperature in Mercury Arcs by the Langmuir Probe Method." Roy V. Weigand, senior in Engineering Physics, gave a paper on: "Precision of Results based on Logarithmic Computations," and Dr. Eric Therkelsen, head of the college mechanical engineering department talked on "Specific Heats of Insulating Materials." Dr. John W. Hurst of the mathematics department spoke on the subject of "Linear Operations."

Papers were also given by Dr. G. D. Shallenberger and Dr. E. M. Little of Montana State University and Dr. Geo. L. Shue from the School of Mines. Dr. Johnson, head of the college physics department, is secretary of the society.

ATKINSON MAKES REPLY TO QUAD HOUSING GRIPE

Residence Contracts Forbid Use of Unit For Store or Infirmary

President Atkinson last week answered the student Gripe pertaining to the quadrangle, costs, shifts and other matters arising out of sorority occupation of the units.

This Quadrangle recommendation was made by the Gripe committee after consuming the entire winter quarter with investigations and counter investigations on the part of the students and the quadrangle board.

The lengthy answer made by President Atkinson stressed financial contract with the federal government and contended that quadrangle payments must be met by the resources available to the board as state aid in building payments was and is impossible.

The possibilities of using one of the units for an infirmary or book store-cafeateria are apparently out of the question as contracts etc., state that the quadrangle is to be used as a residence hall.

President Atkinson's answer showed figures on dormitory shifts and residences. Either the figures did not tell all or the sororities were confused and did not fully understand conditions relative to shifts.

This answer of President Atkinson's was reviewed by the Gripe committee and in turn by the senate at the latter's meeting last night.

Bob Everett and Jim Finn were named as a committee of two to answer the President's letter and suggest further possibilities.

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POUNDS—THOUGH NOT OF FLESH

Among the gripes submitted by the Student Senate to the gripe committee and which are under consideration by the latter, is one pertaining to the Physical Department at Montana State College.

That the Physical department charges rather exorbitant fees for its services and materials, is the complaint made by several sources.

The Little International committee received a set back for their show when the Physical department appeared reluctant to install one or two lights for Gatton Field, explaining that the cost would be high—the committee thought it would be too, after looking at the department's figures.

The High School Week committee paid a tidy sum to have the department remove the bleacher seats from the gym floor for their banquet.

It would appear that with the department ordering materials in such quantities as they do and with reductions etc. which common knowledge of buying would seem logical, that department could afford to operate a service on the campus which would be more economical and convenient than could otherwise be brought about.

But this seems not to be the case. Labor charges are certainly high.

Here is hoping the Gripe committee is able to uncover sufficient evidence to warrant the recommendation of a cheaper, more reasonable service from the service department.

"M" DAY

Accosted by several members of Septemviri regarding the spirit shown by the students in painting the "M" two weeks ago, we feel compelled to get a few things off our chest.

From all reports the turnout for painting festivities was lamentable. We regret this, and regret also that the student body is impervious to exhortation on the part of the student newspaper. "It is well known that favorable reaction to appeals to the spirit of the student body is a thing of the past."

Whatever may be said against "paddling" one fact is generally held as true—it will get results. A penalty of ten or twenty or twenty and ten bats for skipping functions supposedly imbued with that "die for good old podunk" feeling, socially termed as "school spirit," has in the past, literally speaking, painted the M.

Septemviri took the paddles away from the Fangs last fall and are now complaining about the "lack of school spirit shown on M day." They did not, however, take the paddling out of the fraternity houses, but thoughtfully "asked the Greeks cooperation" in putting across the newly conceived method of obtaining student cooperation and instilling school spirit into the hearts and muscles of the college student.

The fraternities have not, naturally, seriously enforced "spirit" edicts by means of the paddle, but have, shall we say, caught the fever started by Septemviri. Septemviri should be proud of the fraternities for their, the frats, adoption of the "Septemviri method."

Septemviri's difficulty seems to be in the confusion of the understanding and appreciation of the discussed quality.

School spirit, as we see it, is that feeling a student has towards his institution which causes him to champion his school's good points with a feeling of pride and attach sentimentality in regard to friendships made during the time of his attendance. As the student grows older, attachments linger on.

A student body may have school spirit and

Berkeley, Calif.—(ACP)—If you want to get the best possible marks on your final exams, don't study in long unbroken stretches.

This is the warning of Dr. Ruby L. Cunningham, University of California physician for women.

"Some vigorous activity like a brisk walk or a game of handball during recreation periods would refresh the student and send him back to his books with an entirely different attitude," she said.

"The principal tiring effect of concentrated study is the weariness of the eye muscles. Any activity which focuses the eyes for a rest period on more distant objects will relieve the fatigue."

Bob Everett was delegated as a committee of one to prepare a brief upon the suggestion. Final recommendations will be made at the next meeting.

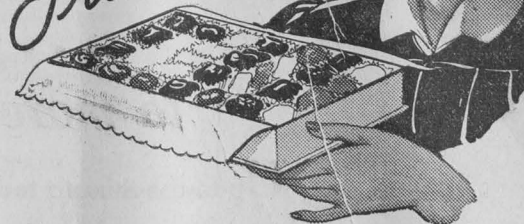
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Kathleen Spain Is Junior Prom Queen

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Professor Hypnotizes To Improve Grades

Charlottesville, Virginia—(ACP)—How he has helped students to improve their grades from 2 to 16 points by hypnotizing them was explained to the Virginia Academy of Science by Dr. D. M. Allan, psychologist at Hampden-Sydney College.

I did this, he said, by talking the student into a hypnotic state and then stating with emphasis: "As a result of this trance your powers of concentration will be greatly increased, your mind will work better and you will not be nervous during examinations. You will have great ambition to be successful in your studies and to improve your class records."

After submitting to the experiment, a number of failing, or near-failing, individuals climbed from the "D" grade to the letter above. Others climbed from "B" to "A". Two students jumped the entire scale from failure to the honor group, an increase of 16 points in their average grades.

During the five years he has been conducting the experiment, Dr. Allan has tried 62 volunteered subjects and improved the marks of all but five, who could not be hypnotized.

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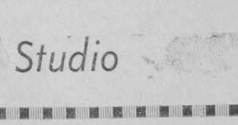
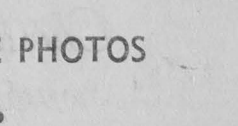
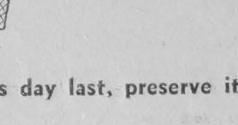
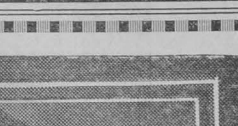
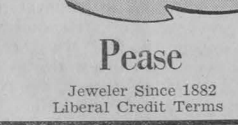
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SIDELINES
