Fraternities Pledge 128

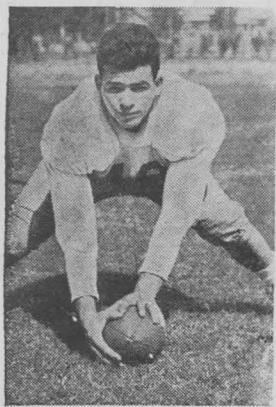

Art Lovera . . . former Butte High star, is proving himself to be a menace to the offensive power of opponents' backfield. Lovera is a senior and playing his third season with the team.

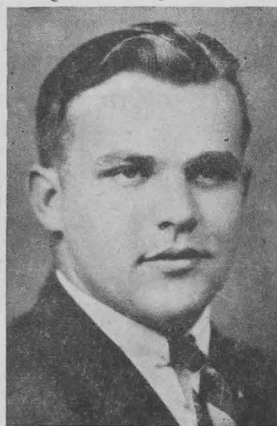
1692 Register For Fall Quarter Work

Despite unsettled national conditions, Montana State College experienced a 3.6% increase in fall-enrollment over last year's fall total. Registration figures reached 1692 as compared with 1633 a year ago, or a gain of over half a hundred students.

518 freshmen registered last Friday as compared with 492 who registered on a corresponding date last year. Crowded conditions remain unchanged.

Echoes from a pep assembly held Wednesday morning indicate that students are now on edge to participate in the largest homecoming celebration ever attempted at Montana State College. Under the leadership of Lt. Rick Roman, assisted by Pierce Patterson, Don Jorgenson and George Biddle, plans are rapidly shaping up for an all out noise parade, and a capacity crowd is expected for the last home game of the season.

The assembly was held primarily to assure a spectacular parade Saturday. College groups have already promised Roman that everyone will have a float. Most of the students are now sporting badges pledging their presence in the parade.

Colorado Miners who made their 1940 homecoming a huge success by defeating the Bobcats, will also take part in the parade with a rooting section headed by a 40-piece band, Lou Howard, Bobcat band director was informed yesterday. The Bobcat band was with the Bobcats when they played the Miners last year and received a box of apples from the Mines band for the visit. The Mines band members wear snappy engineer uniforms complete with broad-brimmed hats.

The Mines band also will put on a program of maneuvers before the game and Director Howard is working out a joint musical program. Tentative plans for the between halves period call for the annual class scraps. I. L. Hebel is the director of the Mines band.

A student delegation started a canvass of the business district Tuesday afternoon to determine sentiment about closing stores, as has been customary the last seven years for Bobcat day. Roman reported Tuesday night that the students had met with wholehearted cooperation and completed their visits to remaining merchants Wednesday.

The students will start joining for the parade at ten o'clock Saturday at which time school will be dismissed. The floats and bands will meet at the high school and

A. J. M. Johnson Finds Fallacy Of Curved Balls

Dr. A. J. M. Johnson, Physics department head, found the fallacy in the recent issue of the Life magazine stating that a pitched ball does not curve and took pictures to prove the fact.

After studying the pictures, which were taken from the same spot, Dr. Johnson drew diagrams to prove that the photography experts of the magazine had failed to take into account that it was the tangent line of the ball that was photographed as it would be impossible to photograph the curve from a single position.

As a person stands at bat, he believes that the ball suddenly breaks before it reaches him. Dr. Johnson says that this is not true as no force could cause the ball to break at a given point. A simple explanation to this is that as the ball reaches the batter, it falls out of his line of sight and appears to break.

New Faculty Members To Be Honored At Reception

Exponent History Revealed By Veteran Printer

Helping the Exponent begin its 47th year of publication is Frank Alderson, linetype operator at the Courier Publishing Company. Frank printed the first number of the college paper 46 years ago this spring and is still helping with its issuance. His ability as an historian is proved by the following article, which he read at the press banquet given last spring.

"It is just 46 years ago this week that my brother Charles and I printed the first number of the College Exponent, in the Courier office. Incidentally most of the Exponents since that time have been printed by the Courier.

"The first Exponent was a small sheet 6 inches by nine inches and printed on a small job press. I was in Professor Phelps's business class at the time, and he asked each member of the class to write an essay for graduation. I wrote mine and included a well known proverb. When I submitted the manuscript Professor Phelps said I should have mentioned the author's name or have marked quotes around the quotation; and he gave me a low mark. I was so mad I never went back, even for graduation.

"The Exponent kept up the same magazine form for years and was the only means of publishing the pictures of the graduation classes.

It is now a very interesting treat to look back over the files and see the prominent Bozeman people of today who were connected with the college as students and Exponent editors—among them Edna Tracy White, Miss Frieda Bull, Charles Fisher, Dr. W. S. Bole, Whitfield Spain, Frank Ham of Whitehall and Homer Thompson of Three Forks.

"Among the first advertisers who are still patrons of the Exponent we notice V. J. Bittner, the tailor; Kenyon's lumber yard; Pease and Steffens jewelry store; Willson's and others.

"The crowning glory of the Exponent came with the Christmas edition December, 1901, when Addison Neil Clark was editor. That edition was in two colors, red and green, and Mr. Clark drew the designs himself. Nothing as artistic has been attempted since. Mr. Clark, who is now a feature writer in San Francisco, also had the Exponent printed with a different color cover each month.

"No file was kept of the Exponent, and it was only by getting copies from the students that one was ever collected.

"One incident I'll never forget was when Jimmy Annin, uncle of two of the students now attending the college, was finishing getting out the last number of the Exponent with which he and Charles Draper had been connected. Just as we were ready to go to press, Jimmy went down to Harry McCay's and got the largest water bucket he could find. He went

and had that filled with a good strong punch. We have been drinking out of that bucket ever since but haven't made a dent in it. Jimmy Annin was the sensational basketball player of his time and did much to work up enthusiasm for the game."

CPT Offers Bargains In Flying Rates

Students desiring to learn to fly at the bargain rates now possible under the civilian pilot program of the Civil Aeronautics administration, must register at once with Dr. A. J. M. Johnson, coordinator, and take the physical examination, as the elementary course will start immediately. Ground school work will be offered on the campus and flying instruction will be at the airport near Belgrade.

The total cost of the elementary course is \$23. By taking the elementary, secondary, cross-country and instructors course students will emerge with a commercial license and an instructor's rating. The cost of all this training is about \$86 under the CPT program. The same instruction to men ineligible for the CPT training would cost from \$2,500 to \$3,000.

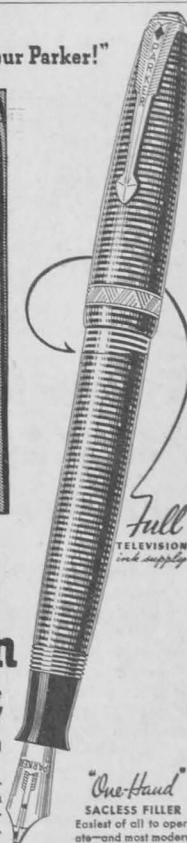

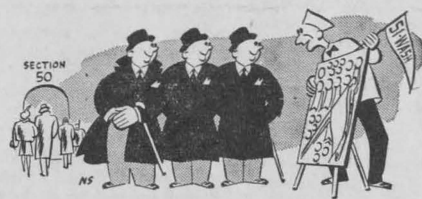

Pilots Triple In Montana Due To CPT Training

Largely because of the civilian pilot training program of the Civil Aeronautics administration, the number of civil airplane pilots in the United States has nearly doubled, with Montana showing a 296 percent increase within a year, reports Dr. A. J. M. Johnson, coordinator of the CPT program at Montana State college.

This program started at Montana State college October 14, 1940. Since that time 59 students, including three women have completed the elementary course and earned private pilots' licenses. Within a few days a new class of 20 will start the elementary course.

Fourteen have graduated from the secondary course which gives graduates a 2S rating, and 10 elementary course graduates will start the secondary soon. Twelve also are taking the cross-country course and will complete training soon. The cross-country course will be followed by the instructor's course which will qualify students for a commercial license and instructor's rating.

From statistics supplied by the CAA, Dr. Johnson reports that Montana had 719 certificated pilots last July 1, the last compilation available. On July 1, 1938 there were only 103 certificated pilots in the state. On July 1, 1940, before the start of the civilian pilots course at Montana State college, there were only 241 pilots in the state. Figures for the entire United States show that the number of pilots jumped from 41,006 July 1, 1940 to 82,277 on July 1, 1941. About 37,000 more pilots are expected to be produced by the CPT courses by July 1, 1942.
