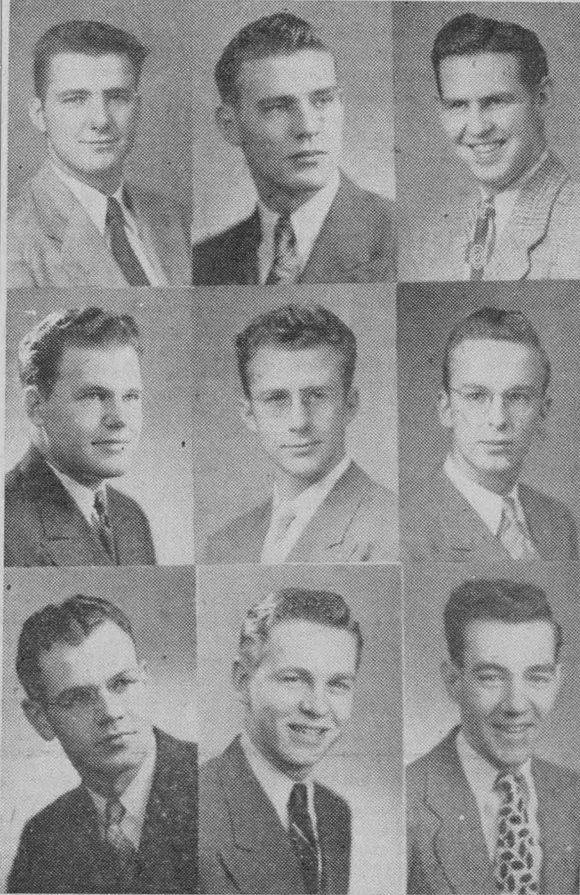

A College Revolution

From February CORONET

Among the most important things he learned in college, the late Robert Benchley listed the trick of putting one paper bay inside another to make a milk shake container, and turning socks inside out to make the holes appear in different places.

Many college students today can match Benchley's list, for they have found that if you sit in a lecture with hundreds of other students three times a week, you can write letters home, knit nine pairs of socks, and graduate after about four years.

In an article entitled, "Needed: A College Revolution," now appearing in the February *Coronet*, Dr. Harold Taylor, president of Sarah Lawrence College, calls for drastic action to reformat our "assembly line educational system" and "return to the real purpose of liberal education, which is to educate the individual liberally."

In the last 40 years, points out Taylor, the individual student has disappeared in our college educational upheaval, lost in anonymity. Yet in our world of tensions and conflicts, it is crucial that our educational system protect the fundamental needs of the individual.

In our large, overcrowded universities, thousands of students move in anonymous groups, trooping in and out of classrooms at the sound of bells. With hundreds of others, he attends lectures where the professor speaks over a microphone to overflow crowds. He studies his texts and marks machine-graded exam papers in a process devoid of any personal element, or the cultivation of new ideas and enthusiasms.

"I contend that the student is being cheated," says Taylor. "This is not college—and it is not liberal education."

Dr. Taylor maintains that drastic action is needed if college education is to answer fundamental needs rather than become one massive quiz program. "The problems, of course, will not be solved until we double the number of teachers and until we bring into the teaching profession the best young college graduates. To do so, we must spend double the present amount of money, and begin to make each college a place where an exciting life of ideas and action is lived by those who teach," says Taylor.

Only if we help the student to find his place in society, can we look to him for the kind of leadership America so urgently needs for the future.

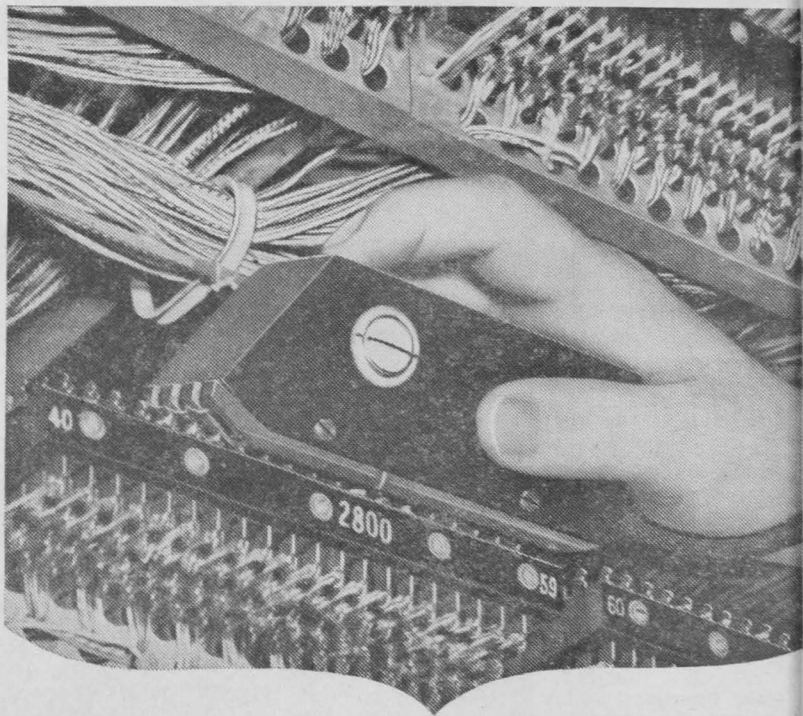

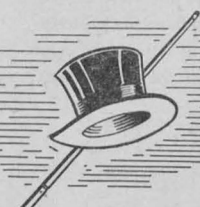
Figuring these at actual cost, it comes to almost \$18. For even those who don't ski and would like to go on a good party, this is a

very fine deal. I sincerely hope the students support this weekend party because it rightly deserves the support of every student at MSC.

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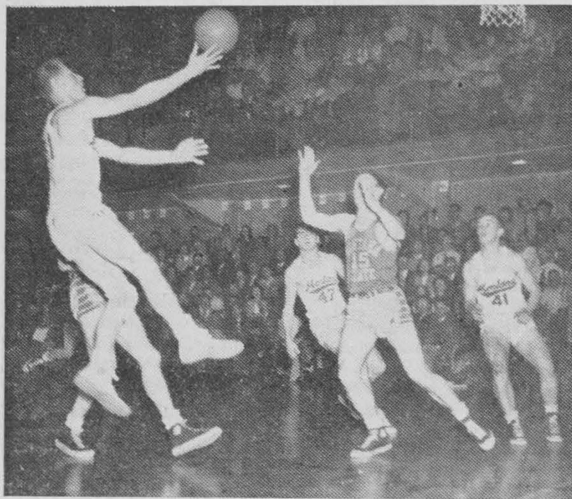
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High Scoring Grizzlies Grab Hoop Crown Edge

The State University Grizzlies now hold a 2 to 0 lead in the four-game race for the state intercollegiate hoop crown as a result of last week's high scoring wins over State at Missoula. By scores of 83 to 71, and 84 to 71, the Silvertips remained supreme in home territory.

Effective shooting by Bob Cope, the first evening, gave the

Grizzlies a definite edge. The tall, forward hooked 29 points through the hoop, 20 of them in the first half, to help along the point total of the first of two games which each broke the previous Grizzly-Bobcat scoring records.

The ball game was even up through most of the first half. The lead see-sawed back and forth several times and was tied at 25-all halfway through the half. Then Cope, Graham, and Carstenson hit to give the Grizzlies a 48 to 37 lead at halftime.

The Grizzlies managed to add one point to that lead during the second half. Throughout the whole game the Bruins hit on 33 of 109 shots for a .303 average while State was hooping 26 of 85 for a .306. Breeden's men were woefully weak at the foul line in connecting only 19 of 41 tries.

A fast break the second night gave the country clubbers almost the same edge in scoring as the

night before. Cope was effectively held down in cutting his point total to 13 points, a 16 point drop from the night before. But evenly distributed scoring among the first five Grizzly tossers was the margin that made up for it.

Again for the first half of the battle it was even up. Then Lou Rocheleau led the Grizzlies to a 10 point lead that was cut only to a 7 point margin at halftime.

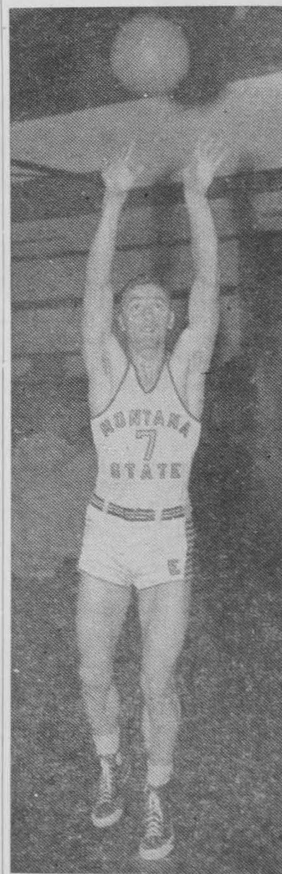
