We should be doing more for the students. Perhaps we could pay someone downtown who has the time to set up a workshop, or we could bring someone into the campus for our students. Polio Shot Funds About to Run Out

Federal funds for providing free polio vaccination will soon be exhausted, according to Dr. Thompson, the head of Montana State Board of Health. In the past, pregnant women and persons under the age of 20 have received their polio shots free because of money appropriated by Congress.

Student Health Service has been administering this free vaccine to students during the past year. Any students who are due for their last shot or who have not begun their series are urged to do so immediately in order to receive the last of the federally financed polio serum.

Persons over the age of 20 are presently receiving their polio shots at the Health Service and paying the actual cost of the vaccine. Vaccine will continue to be available on this basis to all persons after the federally financed supply is exhausted.

Little I Show Is May 17-18

Nearly 100 men and women students will compete for showmanship awards at the 24th Little International livestock show to be held May 17 and 18 at MSC.

This year's show will be held in the new field house and with the additional room a number of new features will be added.

Managing this year's Little I is Tom Evans of Stanford and his assistant, Lee Cronk of Savoy. Evans is a senior in agricultural economics and Cronk is a junior in the same course of study.

Sponsored by the Agricultural club, the Little International emphasizes the showmanship ability of the contestants. There will be five showmanship divisions—beef cattle, dairy cattle, sheep, swine and horses. First place winners in each division compete for the grand champion award.

As in past years, prominent Montana livestock men will serve as judges.

Sadie Hawkins Is Girl's Night

Prizes, awards, trophies, and best of all—men, will be the featured attractions at tomorrow night's Sadie Hawkins dance. The annual spring quarter girl's choice affair will be held in the Gridiron room of the Hotel Bozeman.

Awards to be made at the dance include a trophy to the sorority or Hannon hall corridor with the largest percentage of man-chasers, a prize to the best costumed couple (Dogpatch style), and a special door prize.

A Sadie Hawkins queen will be selected by the Les Bouffons, who are sponsoring the dance. To be chosen on the basis of comparison to a figure cutout at the dance, the queen will also receive a valuable award.

As an aid to the women folk the Les Bouffons have put out an approved list of eligible males and will arrange dates for any girl.

Les Bouf president, Fred Booth, emphasized the fact that it is still not too late to get a date.

Vocalist Found Amusing



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EXPONENT Gains 2nd Class Rating

The Montana EXPONENT, student newspaper of MSC, has received a second class rating from the Associated Collegiate Press, University of Minnesota, for the first semester.

Points gained by the EXPONENT in the evaluation totaled 1565, only 35 short of a first-place rating and 135 short of an All-American rating.

This compares with 1175 and 1200 points earned the first and second semesters, respectively, last year. Papers both semesters last year merited third-place ratings.

The scores from the two years cannot be compared directly, because different scales were used in the evaluations.

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MSC Wins Track and Field Events Over 3 Competitors

Host Montana State college distanced the field here Friday on a four-way track and field meet scoring 93 points to 47½ for Western Montana College of Education, 9 for Carroll College and 3½ for Northern Montana College of Education.

Two new Montana State college records were set when Del Layman set a 15.3 seconds mark in high hurdles and 24.8 seconds in the lows. Allen Hammel set the previous marks of 15.4 and 25.6 in 1949.

Saturday, Layman ran the low hurdles in 23.7 which bettered the recognized Gatton field record of 21 set last year. Layman's time is discounted, however, because of a pushing wind. Mohland of LSU in running the high hurdles in 14.2 also was better than all records here but again that clocking was not allowed for record purposes because of the wind.

New Records Fall as Visitors Dominate Field

Montana State university Grizzlies continued their track and field mastery over Montana State's Bobcats last Saturday afternoon scoring an 88-21 win in an abbreviated meet held on a windswept Gatton field.

The Grizzlies won first in all but two of the 12 events held and scored sweeps in four events.

MSC Rodeo Club Delegates 6 to Colorado A&M Rodeo

Five cowboys and one cowgirl from the MSC Rodeo Club will represent Montana State college at the Colorado A&M college rodeo to be held this week end at Fort Collins, according to Edgar Icenoggle of Ennis, club president.

Last week end the Colorado team won the championship of

the MSC rodeo and the Montana State team took second place.

This will be the third rodeo to which the MSC club has sent teams. Other shows away from home in which MSC has competed are the Montana State University rodeo and Brigham Young University rodeo.

Making the Colorado show will be Bill Skelton of Stanford who will enter the bareback riding, bulldogging and bull riding events. Bill Brewer of Cascade will enter the saddle bronc riding, bareback riding and bulldogging and Bill Nauman of Conrad will compete in dogging, calf roping and ribbon roping. Don Edwards of Rockford, Ill., will be in the bareback riding and bull dogging events, and Bill Loney of Cascade will compete in saddle bronc, bulldogging and bull riding.

The cowgirl from MSC is Iris Hughes of Choteau who will compete in the three events for girls—barrel race, flag race and cow milking.

Cats Beat WMC; Split With Eastern

The Bobcats ran their baseball victory string to four in a row Friday as they took a 6-1 decision from Western Montana college at Williams field.

Dick Adler went all the way for the MSC team giving up five hits and one run. A single, a pair of errors and a walk figured in the lone WMC tally in the fifth inning.

While WMC batters were being held in check, Bobcat hitters were collecting 14 hits, 13 of them singles, off Pat Sullivan who went nine innings for the visitors. The only extra base hit of the game was a two bagger which Bob Anderson blasted off the center-field wall in the second inning and drove in Dave Alt who reached base on an error. Anderson scored the same inning on an error.

Diamondmen Split In Eastern Series

Last Monday the varsity baseball team split a double header with Eastern College of Education. The Cats lost the first game 10-9 with Graff getting chalked up with the loss.

In the second fray, Keith Strandburg turned in a fine performance and the Bobcats shut out Eastern 6-0. Both games were played in rainy and sloppy weather.

Ron Warzeka, all-Rocky Mountain conference and all-American tackle who wore his Montana State college football uniform for the last time in the Aluminum Bowl contest last year is listed as one of the promising rookies in "49'er Diggings," official publication of the professional team the MSC star has joined.

Warzeka is also one of eight former college football captains who will be with the 49'ers this year.

Frankie Albert, 49'er coach, says in the same issue, "We think we have a solid bunch of newcomers who will give a good account of themselves in pro competition." He adds that the squad will train at St. Mary's college again this year with rookies reporting July 27, and the veterans a week later.

Survey to Be Made on WAF Program

Air Force ROTC detachment at Montana State college will conduct a survey among the women at Montana State college to find out how many women students would be interested in a WAF Air Force ROTC program leading to a commission as second lieutenant in the U. S. Air Force.

Questionnaires will be distributed to all sorority houses this week, according to Colonel Timmons.

Well qualified college women entering this program will receive \$27.90 a month during the last two years in the program. During the summer between their junior and senior years the girls will attend four weeks of summer camp on an air force base. Upon graduation they will receive three-year active duty tours as second lieutenants in the U. S. Air Force.
