Reagan assails plan

(UPI) A bipartisan deficit-cutting proposal by leaders of the National Governors Association came under heavy fire today from President Reagan and rebellious "young Turk" Democratic governors.

Angered after he watched several Democrats accuse him of favoring the rich and hurting the poor on television two days ago, Reagan met the governors at the White House yesterday morning and accused his critics of "demagoguery."

The gubernatorial leadership presented Reagan with a plan to reduce the 1983 deficit to \$90 billion from a projected \$267 billion. It endorses further cutting in federal benefits for the disabled and elderly and also calls for slashing the administration's defense spending increases.

But as one governor put it, Reagan "came out swinging" against that idea at the one-hour White House meeting. The president's reaction and the uprising by the Democratic liberals cast doubt on the final approval of the plan today, when it will have to win a two-thirds majority of the governors voting.

Other cuts proposed

(UPI) Three former cabinet officials under Democratic presidents and a former Chief of Naval Operations yesterday proposed \$136 billion in defense cuts over the next five years.

The group includes Robert McNamara, Secretary of Defense under Presidents Kennedy and Johnson; Cyrus Vance, who served both in the Pentagon and as Secretary of State; former National Security Affairs Adviser McGeorge Bundy, and Admiral Elmo Zumwalt, former Chief of Naval Operations.

They say the cuts are necessary to reduce mounting budget deficits in the years ahead and thereby strengthen the economy, but they say even with the proposed cuts, the United States would have a more effective military than the administration plans.

The group said the Reagan administration's proposed defense budget is based on unrealistic objectives, contains expensive duplications, and threatens to "overload" the military by adding too many new weapons at once.

No funding for university functions

During last night's budgeting session the ASMSU Senate disagreed over the payment of stipends to students and on the role of ASMSU in funding programs that according to ASMSU President Brad Diede are "the function of the university."

The Senate considered eight of the 30 budgets that are before them for consideration this week.

After a lengthy debate, Senate voted against funding the Career Days program. Last year the Senate passed a directive that 1983 be the last year ASMSU funded the program.

According to Senator Lindsay Anderson, "It (Career Days) should be funded and administered by the Career Placement and Planning Office.

"It does have a place and it does help students," said Anderson.

The major concern of Senators who opposed zeroing the Career Days budget was that the administration would not pick up the budget.

Supporters of the Career Days program failed in a number of parliamentary moves which would have allowed the program to remain in the ASMSU structure.

"I really think that we should stick to our guns on this one," said Diede. Diede argued that if ASMSU allowed the administration an opportunity to return for funding, they would.

"We should get rid of this program once and for all," said Diede.

During consideration of the Tutorial Committee's budget, Senator Mike Stoeckig moved that \$375 be added as a stipend for the director of the committee. Tutorial receives \$375 for the committee of five students.

Stoeckig argued that the way to get more students involved in ASMSU committees was to pay them, even if only a token amount. Stoeckig's motion was defeated and the budget passed intact with only the group stipend.

Included on the Tutorial budget was a directive which instructed the future committee to "look into matched funding from MSU administration because the program is needed and can't be dropped."

This directive was included in Diede's budget recommendations that he presented to Senate and Finance Board before deliberations began. Diede argued that tutoring is education and should be funded by the University.

None of these decisions are final until the budgeting session is adjourned. Until that time, any senator who voted on the prevailing side can ask to reconsider any of the previously discussed budgets.

Finance Board recommendations were passed with few changes and with little discussion on the budgets for Elections, Homecoming, Legislative Research, Community University, ASMSU Administration and Legal Aid. Finance Board passed these budgets at the basic level requested by the head of the organization.

The biggest change in these budgets was over how much Legal Services should charge for a half hour of the ASMSU attorney's time and how much Legal Aid should charge for doing uncontested divorces. Senate rejected a Finance Board recommendation that these fees be raised.

Also of concern was a line item in the Elections budget which allocated \$250 for a summer election. This election would ask summer students if they are willing to increase their activity fee from \$8 to \$15 per student. This would bring the summer fee up to the level of the activity fee paid by students during the rest of the school year.

The order of deliberations for the rest of the week starting tonight will be the programming committees followed by the new programs, the media and finally the facilities and the reserve requests. All the budgets will be heard in the scheduled order. The actual night that each budget is heard may vary due to the length of

discussion over previous budgets.

The budgets scheduled for Tuesday, Mar. 1, in 401 Reid at 6:30 p.m. are Campus Entertainment, Lectures, Arts and Exhibits, Films, Coffeehouse, Performing Arts, Summer Programming, Tech Services and Concerts.

The Wednesday night schedule is Students Against Sexual Assault, Organizational Aid, Media Board, Exponent, Infinity, Media Typesetter and KGLT. The meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. in 401 Reid.

Scheduled for Thursday night are Outdoor Recreation Center, Bicycle/Ski Repair Shop, Intramurals, Day Care, and the Auto Repair Shop. The meeting will be in 401 Reid and will begin at 6:30 p.m.

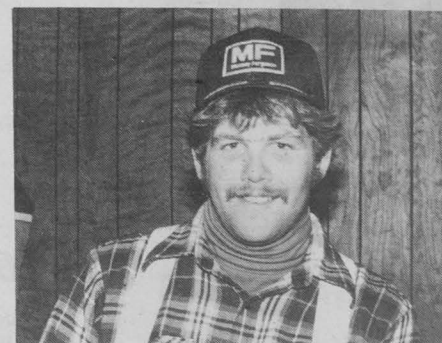

4. No comment.



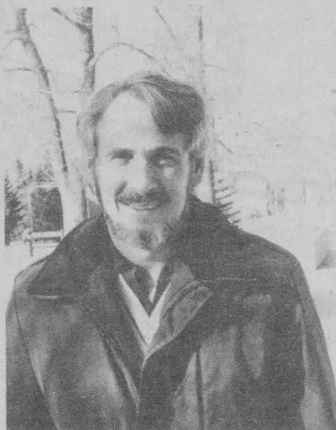

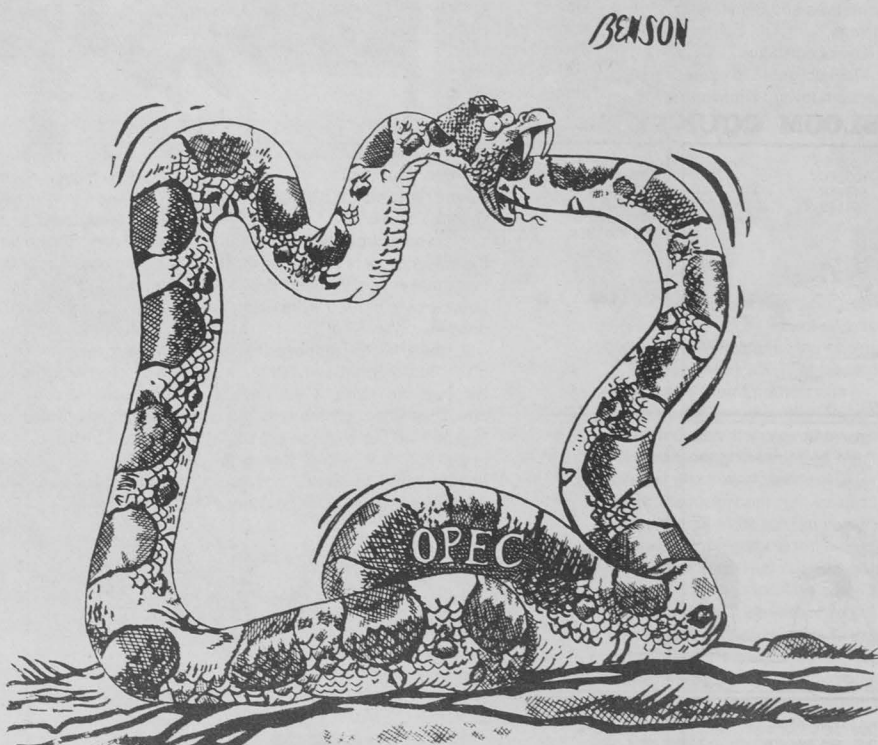

understand we have more money to work with this biennium, but many of the State programs are costing more to operate. If the University System is funded at its level of request, it will only reach the norm, compared to other universities in our country.

sistently been funded for educational less than average. We've always had more students on campus than appropriations have provided for.

Our enrollments prove people want education. I'm not sure this state can afford to deprive people of adequate education.

Why does Montana not have enough revenue to pay for its programs? One of you told me Montana does not have enough "industry" to provide revenues. Can anyone tell me how Montana can stimulate more "industry" for revenue? (I presume when we speak of industry we realize it does not have to be pollutant. Innovation thrives at universities.)

Many types of "industry" are attracted to the benefits they can draw from strong universities. Good universities can provide graduates and research to aid private enterprise and government.

One of you told me you didn't like the idea of Montana graduates taking their education out of the state. How can they stay in the

state if no jobs exist in their chosen fields of study?

Building strong institutions of higher education will prompt various private enterprise to help support Montana. Not only would graduates get jobs, so would blue collar workers. All this is evident in many other States of the Union.

P.S. Please don't suggest raising tuition, and cutting financial aid work study, when either of the two would deny people their right to an education. The Montana Board of Regents is the governing board most knowledgeable of the students' livelihood. They have supported work study and have already raised tuition at a rate most of us paying our own way through school can afford. If you suggest raising tuition to offset general fund appropriations, are you suggesting tuition is to be used to fund other state agencies?

Thank you for your time...I look forward to visiting with you during my next stay in Helena.

Leisure Class, Revisited



Following a policy based upon morals is just plain foolhardiness. I simply cannot understand how any plan of action can be based on them? How morality is weighed in deciding even one of the questions facing the nation and the world, is beyond my ability to comprehend.

Example: What burning moral question is at stake in deciding where and how to deliver a nuclear bomb? If the assumption is taken that the U.S. will not launch its arsenal first, then the question is nearly nil, as no doubt be our morals.

Example: How much morality is invoked in calculating whether or not parents have the right to know what their minor aged children are receiving, along the line of prescription drugs.

The whole idea of the family relieves the government from the burden of knowing where a parent's charges are at ten o'clock at night. Further, if most doctors are required by law to receive parental consent before administering even one tab of aspirin, how may a planned parenthood clinic ever operate in such flagrant violation of the public's concern?

Let me take the argument one step further, if mild forms of mind altering substances are sold over the counter in special licensed outlets because prohibition did not work, can anyone wonder at the huge amount of illegal drugs, from cannabis to cocaine to heroin, that are smuggled and sold on the streets.

All of these questions have been attacked and defended by both extremes of our political spectrum on the basis of a perceived morality. Who's morality? It certainly is not mine.

Setting the record straight, I do not believe that morality can be legislated. All historical attempts at including any morally conceived piece of criminal or civil code have been flagrantly disobeyed. If the criminal flow of drugs considered to be dangerous is to be stemmed, the best way to stem that tide is to control it. If we must lessen the threat of a nuclear holocaust, the best means to do so is to control what weapons systems are to be ready. If the only way parents have of being informed about the drugs that are being issued to their children is trusting the morality of physicians and the set of rules under which the doctor operates, then take a hand in setting the rules.

If you have any problems with the way things are being operated, don't bore me with pleas of corrupted moral fiber. It might be better to study the options more thoroughly, before passing hysterical judgements.

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Better service for students requested

HELENA — The ability to serve more students better.

That's what MSU requested at its budget hearing before the Appropriations and Finance & Claims Joint Sub-Committee on Education on Thursday, Feb. 17.

In addition to making a plea for full funding of the formula, members of the administration, faculty, and the student body also requested a number of program modifications such as expansion of the computer center, creation of a Writing Center, and establishing a Writing Across the Curriculum program.

MSU President William Tietz said that MSU has been in the "position of high enrollment from some period of time." Tietz noted that over the last four years MSU has had 2,598 more students that the appropriations bill provided for, which has created a loss of 110 faculty had the university been funded for every student enrolled.

Tietz and others testifying said that some of the effects of the over-enrollment seen over the past four years give the best indication for the need of full formula funding and accurate enrollment predictions.

The over-enrollment, Tietz said, has not only created an overload on the College of Engineering, the largest and most 4,000 credit hours in 1975 to 16,000 credit hours in 1982.

Tietz said that because of inadequate facilities, the computer science department has had to "turn away as much as 30% more productivity."

MSU Faculty Council Chairman Archie Alexander said that over-enrollment has caused three major

problems: inadequate numbers of faculty, inadequate space and inadequate instructional equipment.

Alexander said that because there aren't enough faculty to go around, that it has a major impact on instruction and advising, with some faculty having over 40 advisees.

Alexander noted that because of the over-enrollment, faculty have had to reduce the number of writing assignments when "we should be seeing increasing use of writing in the different courses."

Alexander added, "What seems to be happening...due to the lack of funds...is we're using it (writing assignments) less and less because we can't afford the time."

Alexander also noted that a lot of the instructional equipment is out of date, citing that a piece of equipment used by the physics department is so old that publishers have discontinued printing of the lab manuals used with the equipment because the equipment is so outdated.

ASMSU Lobbyist Dennis Wagner noted that because of the current situation, students have to compete for a variety of things, such as space in classrooms, space to study in the library, and time with the classroom instructors.

Wagner said that even though the "quality of instruction is very, very high, availability of instructors is very low."

Wagner added in a plea for full funding of the formula, "We're not asking for 100% of perfection, we're asking for 100% of average."

In the area of program modifications, Tietz said that the need for expanding the computer facilities is due to the increasing number of students enrolling in computer science.

Tietz noted that since 1975, the university has experienced a 16% growth while the College of Engineering has grown 95%. Tietz added that the number of computer science majors, which is part of the College of Engineering, has grown from 83 in 1975 to 427 in 1982, causing the computer science credit hours to increase from 4,000 credit hours in 1975 to 16,000 credit hours in 1982.

Tietz said that because of inadequate facilities, the computer science department has had to "turn away as much as 30% more productivity."

ASMSU Senator Mike Stoeckig, a computer science major, testified that he came to MSU because of its reputation for being the "best in the state" for computer science. Stoeckig said that when got to MSU, he found out that "even the best in the state can have a great deal of improvement."

Stoeckig said that because MSU's present facilities can not handle the number of students enrolled in computer science classes now, "the horror stories of waiting in line late in the morning have discouraged people from outside the computer science curriculum to take computer science courses."

Associate Professor of Physics Gerry Wheeler said that the university must keep up with the continually changing state of the art in computers.

Wheeler noted that if the auto industry advanced as much as the computer industry has, a Rolls Royce would cost \$3 and get 3 million miles to the gallon. Wheeler said because of these advances, computers and education now are actually starting to blend together.

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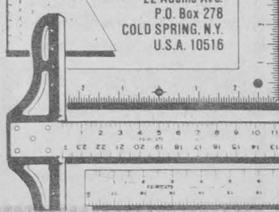
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Campus advising role reviewed

Advising period has just ended on campus again and some students have had the same problems and expectations with their advisors. Here are a few helpful hints adapted from the Academic Advising Information for Students pamphlet put out by the MSU Advising Support Services.

Academic advising at MSU is the responsibility of the faculty with the Assistant Deans coordinating the activity within each college and school.

Each department has its own system of assigning advisors. Depending on the department, the students may have the same advisor for their entire college career, while in others students will change advisors as they progress from a freshman status.

Some students are not aware of what to expect from their advisors. Advisors are to be knowledgeable about their particular curriculum requirements and be able to provide current information, including career opportunities. Advisors should give individual advice in choosing electives which will broaden the students' general education perspective. They are supposed to be reasonably available and informed of the students individual performance. They are also to be familiar with available campus resources and special education events that would be of interest to their students.

On the other hand the advisor

has certain expectations of the student. The students should make and keep appointments, and have given thoughtful consideration to their program and future before the meeting. They must keep their advisor informed of changes in their program or objectives. Finally, students should think about advisors' recommendations with an open mind and be willing to discuss different views.

ferent views.

If the students have problems with their advisor they may interact with an unofficial advisor or inquire into the possibility of changing advisors. If this fails, the students can contact the Department Head or Assistant Dean for assistance.

At MSU it is the responsibility of the student to secure adequate advice.

that there are preventive measures which can be taken before we are faced with an actual assault. Most of the \$1170 that we have asked for will be used for awareness programs, the most important step in dealing with sexual assault. It is a student community need to be educated about sexual assault.

The options we looked into for financing were: 1) the administration, 2) Student Affairs and Services, 3) Women's Resource Center, and 4) ASMSU. Because of financial and time

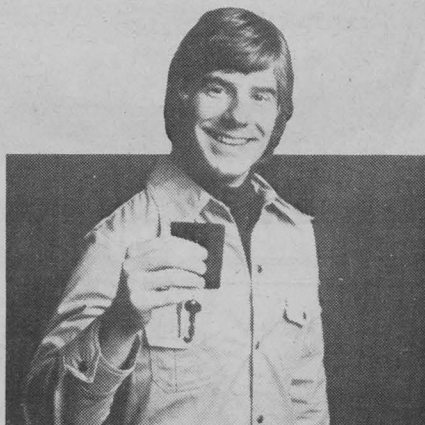
constraints the first three are not able to finance us at this time.

As students of MSU we believe that ASMSU should include the service of SASA to their membership. Our request is one fourth of 1% of the total budget. Entertainment uses 33% of the budget, intramurals 17% and media 15%.

Finance Board has recommended that SASA not be funded by ASMSU. Wednesday night at 6:00 the full senate will make the final decision. All students wishing to show their support should come to the meeting.

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Committee prepares for disasters

One of the problems with disasters is that you never know if you're prepared until one actually happens. Hopefully, the situation won't arise, but it's a good idea to be prepared anyway.

At MSU, the people thinking of ways to be prepared are members of the Emergency Action Committee, which meets about once every three months.

The committee was resurrected about a year and a half ago. It had previously existed under the administration of MSU President Johnston.

Among the potential disasters that could strike MSU, Edward Rice, director of Physical Plant and chairman of the committee, listed flood, fire, riot, high winds, earthquake, nuclear attack, and hazardous materials. A complicating factor is that one disaster will most likely touch off others.

For example, an earthquake, in addition to causing structural damage, can start fires. Additionally, hazardous materials may be released if gas lines are cracked or if a fire occurs among the chemicals at Gaines Hall.

Rice thinks that the probability of a disaster occurring is very low. Riots are very unlikely, due to a generally sedate community; flooding should not affect our mostly high-elevation campus; and an earthquake capable of noticeable damage has not occurred since 1959, when Montana and Hamilton Halls suffered. The likelihood of a nuclear attack is also very low, and Bozeman would only need to worry about missiles overshooting Great Falls.

Admittedly, a fire did occur just a week ago, but it was the first one in a good many years.

A widespread disaster such as an earthquake would also affect the Bozeman community at large, and in such a situation, MSU might very well be on its own, while city and county authorities try to take care of their own. Such organizations as the Fire Department could be over-

loaded with work.

The recent fire at the Hedges Cafeteria demonstrated how MSU reacts to a disaster. The Campus Police sealed off the structure, and once the fire was over, members of the Physical Plant crew moved in to make a damage assessment to see how much repairs would cost.

Donald Wortman, manager of MSU Campus Police and committee member, noted that the cafeteria fire also showed how difficult sealing off an area can be. Shortly after the fire was out, one person was noticed inside who was "just taking a few pictures." People love to be spectators so that they can "run home and tell Susie that they were there."

The Physical Plant crew is also in charge of sealing off the gas line leading to the Heating Plant in case of a more general disaster.

Currently, the Emergency Action

Committee is looking at evacuation plans for all campus buildings. Dormitories are now the only buildings with set procedures for evacuation, and general chaos would probably reign in other campus buildings if vacating them was necessary. Rice said that possible drills might be conducted around campus next fall if plans are formalized, even though people might "pooh-pooh" the idea of practicing an evacuation in the middle of a class.

Other Emergency Action Committee members are John Alwin, associate professor of geography; Dave Birmingham, director of Campus Entertainment; Glenn Black of Continuing Education; chemistry professor Arnold Craig; Rolf Groseth, assistant dean of Student Affairs and Services; Glenn Lewis, director of On-Campus Living; and Laura St. John, director of Administrative Services.

Gym loss

Rich Kees had a very simple and straightforward explanation as to why his Bobcats lost to Montana in a women's gymnastics dual meet at Missoula last Friday.

"We just couldn't get by some of the injuries," said Kees. "I'm not going to risk anyone to try and beat UM."

Janice Grear was once again the top all-around competitor for the Cats, her score of 33.6 placing her third in that category behind Montana's Dolly Reusse and Lori Aubin. Reusse won the competition with a score of 34.2 while teammate Aubin was the runner-up, scoring 34.05 points.

The next competition for the gymnasts will be the MWAC Championships at Boise, Idaho on March 5.

Bobcats capture MWAC

There wasn't much good news to report this past weekend as far as Montana State University fans were concerned, but from the bad news, a gleam of sunshine shone through.

The bright spot for MSU was the performance of the women's indoor track team, which captured the first-ever Mountain West Athletic Conference (MWAC) championship trophy. The meet was held in Pocatello, Idaho, on Friday and Saturday.

The Cat women rode on the fine performances of Janet Buntin and Mary Lynn Guyer to score 102 points, nine points ahead of Idaho State, which had 93. Other team finishers were Idaho, with 62 points, Boise State, with 50 points, and Montana, with 43.

"Our kids and the whole program are excited with the win," MSU head coach Dale Kennedy said. "We peaked just right. It's a very emotional day, but we tried to do some things physically to peak this week. I think we exhibited the most enthusiasm, and the girls really wanted to win. We scrapped for every point we got."

After the first day, the Cats had amassed 20 points, and coach Kennedy felt his team was in pretty good shape.

"We came close to reaching our goal with 20 points, but we got those points in a way we didn't expect. We didn't anticipate that we'd win the 4X800 relay. After the first day, I knew the meet would be close, and we were trying to offset Idaho State's depth."

According to Kennedy, the team score went back and forth between MSU and ISU on Saturday before the Bobcats iced the win with a victory in the final event—the 4X400 relay. But there were some tense moments down the stretch.

MSU held a five-point lead going into the last event and needed to stay close to ISU in order to hold on to first place. Coach Kennedy described the action:

"We were leading the relay for the first two legs, and when Marty Billingsley took it for the third leg, she ran fairly easily the first lap, and ISU's Lynn Wingle moved out in front. Denise Clare took the baton with us in fourth place, and she knew she had to catch Idaho State."

When it was all over, Montana had won it, followed by MSU, Weber State, and ISU. But the final score was held up due to a disqualification in the relay, a disqualification which, if it had been on the Cats, could have cost them the meet.

Ultimately, the infraction was called on

Injuries hurt thinclads

Sometimes, no matter how hard you try and prevent something, it always gets you in the end.

For the entire indoor track season, the Montana State men's team had been relatively free from injury, but in the final meet of the season, a key injury struck the Cats.

Long jump standout Ken Riedl, one of the highest point scorers in Big Sky Conference history, pulled a hamstring during the running of the conference championships as the Bobcats finished in a disappointing seventh place in the meet held in Moscow, Idaho.

"Riedl's injury was a real bummer," Bobcat coach Rob Stark said. "His injury was devastating. In the long jump alone, we could have picked up 10 points instead of two and placed fourth overall."

In the end, the Boise State Broncos came out on top with 97½ points, ahead of Idaho who had 86 points. The Bobcats finished with 41½ points, only 7½ points out of fourth place.

"We had some great efforts that just didn't

get us any points," Stark said of many of the team's school record performances. "We're getting closer and closer every year. We need a few more things to go our way. The big points are not that far away. If we can improve our marks just a little bit, we could double our points. We're not as far away as we seem."

School records came from Scott Arneson in the 800 (1:54.33), Tim Gray in the 400 (48.95), Rick Tilstra in the 500 (1:03.97), and Denny West in the 1500 (3:55.36).

Other top performers for the Cats included Glenn Test who placed second in the 55-meter hurdles (7.49), Neil Kneip who placed second in the shot put (55-9½), Bryan Trebelcock and Alan Pfister who placed third and fourth, respectively (15-7¼, 15-4) in the pole vault, and Jeff Clem who had a personal best in the 3000 (8:26.11).

"We had a good season in terms of performances, and we did well in terms of competition. We stayed injury-free most of the time, but they ended up hurting us. We came so close."

Cat grapplers grab fourth

Having more doesn't always mean you have better.

The Montana State University wrestling team placed three individuals into the final round of the Big Sky Conference Wrestling Championships on Friday, but although this is one more wrestler than they placed in the finals last year, the final team standing was identical to last year's.

The meet, which was held in the Brick Breeden Fieldhouse, was won by Weber State, which outpointed defending champion Boise State, 90½-86. The other teams, in order,

were Idaho State with 55½, MSU with 45½, Northern Arizona with 23½, and Montana with 11.

Both Weber State and Boise State had six wrestlers going into the championship rounds, and although BSU captured four individual titles, Weber's three individual championships were enough to give them the championship.

The Cats' three finalists were David Jones at 118, Jeff Todd at 142, and Lonnie Burt at heavyweight.

Down 7-2 in the third round, Jones was forced to allow his opponent, Tracey Yeates of Boise, to escape so that he could score on take downs, and with 1:03 left in the

match, Jones' strategy was working as he closed to 8-6, but Yeates got a take down with 41 seconds remaining to pull away to a 13-6 win.

While each division winner qualifies for national competition, Jones, due to his fine record during the year, was able to grab one of the conference's at-large berths for the nationals.

"David has had some fine opportunities all year long," MSU coach Bill Willetts said, "and you can bet he will work real hard at nationals. Considering some of the problems David has had this year mentally, he wrestled very well this meet. He and Yeates will have some nice conflicts the next few years."

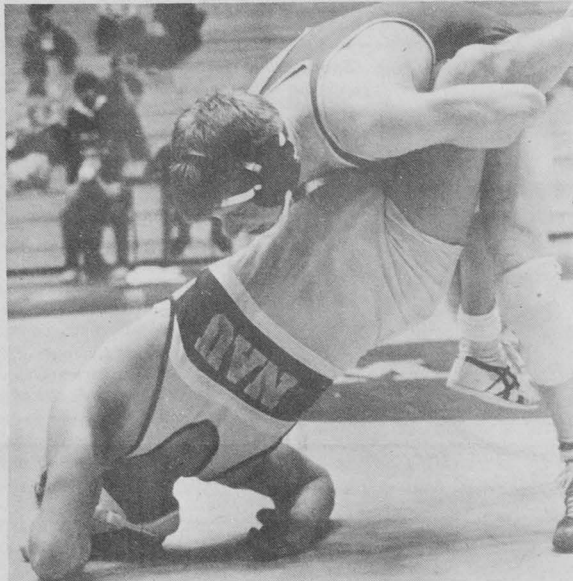
Todd led 4-2 in his match against Dave Lundskog of Weber State with 1:17 left in the match, but Lundskog managed a reversal with 15 seconds to go to send the match into overtime.

Lundskog scored three points in the second overtime period and added a point for riding time to take a 4-0 decision. For the meet, Todd chalked up two pins before his final loss of the meet, as he wrestled for the last time as a Bobcat.

"Not enough can be said about Jeff's efforts," Willetts stated. "He was right there. I feel sad because his career had to end this way, but he had his best meet of the year."

Looking to next year, the Cats will lose only one wrestler in Todd, and Willetts is already looking forward to next season's team.

"I see a lot of enthusiasm for the future. We'll try to utilize the off-season by doing a little wrestling, and hopefully by getting this experience, we will make a better showing next year."

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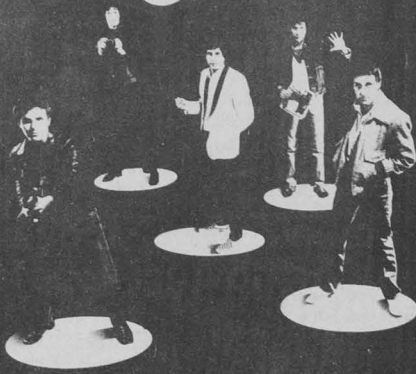
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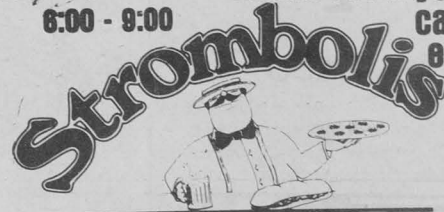

Griz outlast Cats, 60-54

"Freshman phenoms" is becoming a catchy phrase these days, and after Saturday's Bobcat-Grizzly basketball clash, Montana State University head coach Bruce Haroldson might be one of those who would use this saying.

Missoula-native Larry Krystkowiak poured in 14 points in 20 minutes of play and hauled down eight rebounds to pace the Griz to a 60-54 Big Sky Conference win and a sweep of the annual intrastate battle in Missoula.

"Krystkowiak killed us inside," Coach Haroldson said of the freshman center. "He showed why he was our number one recruit out of high school. He angled in and did the job against (MSU center) Tryg (Johnson). Tryg was in foul trouble, and it was tough for him to play hard defense. Their guards penetrated from the top, and our big men had to

pick them up, and they dished it off inside."

Krystkowiak replaced UM starter Craig Larsen with 3:40 left in the first half after the Cats had pulled into a 16-16 tie with 7:35 left, after MSU had been down 14-6. Krystkowiak proceeded to score eight of Montana's next 10 points as the Griz went into the locker room leading 28-21.

After hitting the first four points of the second half, the Cats were promptly outscored 9-3 and trailed 37-28 with 15:01 left in the game, but as they had done all night, the Bobcats clawed back.

Led by Chris Brazier and Jeff Epperly, MSU pulled within one at 43-42 with 10:17 remaining, but the Griz countered with back-to-back three-point plays to stretch their lead to 51-45 with 8:59 showing.

The Cats could get no closer than four as they made it 58-54 with 1:12 left, and they were forced to

foul. Montana couldn't convert at the line, as Derrick Pope and Krystkowiak missed front ends of one-and-ones. With 50 seconds to go, UM guard Marc Glass missed the second of his free throw attempts, but the Griz grabbed the rebound, and again with 23 seconds left, Glass again missed his second attempt at the line, but Krystkowiak grabbed the board to preserve the win.

"It was a terribly frustrating game for us, and losing to the Grizzlies is always a bitter loss," Haroldson lamented. "We just couldn't get over the hump. Derrick Pope did some things I couldn't believe. He was bombing people out of there."

Pope led the Griz with 21 points and 11 rebounds, and was a major reason that Phil Layher and Chris Brazier fouled out and three other Bobcats had four fouls. But UM managed only 10-of-21 shooting from the line compared to 12-of-14 for MSU.

Epperly led the Cats with 18 points, 12 of those in the second half. Brazier countered with 14, while Johnson finished with 13.

The win raised Montana's league mark to 9-3 and 21-5 overall, keeping alive their hopes for hosting the conference championships. The Cats drop to 2-10 in the league and 9-16 overall as they head into their final two games of the year on the road to Nevada-Reno on Thursday and Northern Arizona on Saturday.

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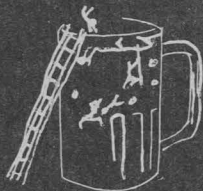

Montana, which elevated MSU to the relay victory and the conference championship.

"I knew the meet would be close," Kennedy stated. "Idaho left three key kids home, and they have the fire power, but they don't emphasize the indoor season. Idaho could have been more competitive, but it turned out to be a barn-burner between us and Idaho State."

Buntin led the Cats with 24 individual points, while Guyer accounted for 20 more points. Buntin won the long jump with a mark of 19 feet, 10½ inches, finished second in the 55-meter dash (7.36), was third in the 400-meters in school record time (57.81), and ran a leg on the winning 4X400 relay team.

Guyer captured the conference 3000-meters in a school record time of 9:42.99 and placed second in the 1500-meters (4:45.77).

Other school record performances came from Clare in the 600-meters (1:35.5) and both relay teams.

Carrie Albano picked up MSU's only other individual win with a 45-8½ toss in the shot put.

According to Kennedy, 12 Cat athletes received all-conference accolades by placing first or second at the conference meet.

"Janet and Mary were all over the track, and they were our big-play producers," Kennedy added.

Kennedy stated that this may be the last MWAC indoor championship because most of the league's coaches aren't supportive of the meet. "Only two coaches want it," he stated. "I would like to have it, but each team's coach should decide how much they want to emphasize the indoor season."

"My decision to emphasize the indoor season may cost us in the outdoor season, but I have a plan for us to be sharp by May. We're really getting excited about the outdoor season."

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UC meet prepares skiers

Amid weather uncharacteristic for a ski meet, the Montana State men's and women's ski teams both placed fourth at the Colorado Invitational ski meet at Silver Creek, Colorado last Friday and Saturday.

Although temperatures reached the mid-40's for the first day of competition, it did not hinder most of the competitors on the MSU men's nordic team, as they turned in another fine performance.

Rick Callies led the way for the nordic team, placing 13th in the individual 15-kilometer nordic race with a time of 52:32.6.

"I was real pleased with Rick's finish," said nordic coach Randy Rogers. "One of his goals in the race was to finish 13th."

Greg Johnson, Shaun Marshall-Pryde, John Barton, and Paul Swenson followed Callies across the line, finishing 19th, 23rd, 24th, and 27th in times of 54:05, 55:02.6, 55:10.6, and 55:26.5, respectively.

Johnson's finish was somewhat of a surprise since he had not been skiing with the front pack as of late, but Rogers felt that the conditions suited Johnson's liking.

"Greg's always done well in warm weather and is finally racing healthy," said Rogers. "It's nice to see him up there."

Rogers was also happy to see Barton and Marshall-Pryde skiing consistently.

"I was fairly pleased with Shaun's result," he said. "It's not as fast as he can ski, but it's pretty good considering how sick he's been."

Although the weather did not bother most of the skiers, it did have an adverse effect on Jon Eggert, MSU's number-two nordic skier. Eggert finished 31st in a time of 56:00.4.

"Jon's always had difficulty with warm weather," said Rogers.

Eggert redeemed himself the next day though, when he skied a strong leg on MSU's fourth-place 3x7.5 relay team under somewhat cooler conditions.

Rogers was pleased with the performance of the team, especially in respect to their first meet.

"Overall, we had a real good race when you consider how far we've come from the first meet," said Rogers. "We've proved we can consistently beat the Alaska schools and New Mexico."

The women's team also proved it can consistently beat the Alaska schools, but it has had problems with New Mexico, which placed third at the meet.

Kelly Kimball led the women's nordic team in the individual 7.5-kilometer nordic relay, placing 11th with a time of 30:10.9, 1:31 behind individual winner Hegge Peikli of Wyoming.

Kimball took MSU's top spot away from Karen Jeske, who finished 14th in 31:11.8.

Following Kimball and Jeske were Cari Christensen, 20th in 34:24.6; Libby Grabow, 21st in 34:47.7; and Za Kraus, 22nd in 35:21.9.

Dave Mahalko led the men's alpine team in both the slalom and giant slalom. Mahalko's time of 1:31.34 in the slalom was good for eighth place, less than three seconds behind individual winner Niklas Scherrer of Colorado.

Kraig Kempt, 20th in 1:32.78; Dan Rynnenen, 22nd in 1:33.34; Eric Winthers, 26th in 1:33.69; and Bret Tallman, 33rd in 1:39.5, followed Mahalko across the line for the Bobcats in the slalom.

Mahalko's time of 1:44.31 in the giant slalom was four seconds slower than individual winner David Roth of Utah, but it earned him 13th place.

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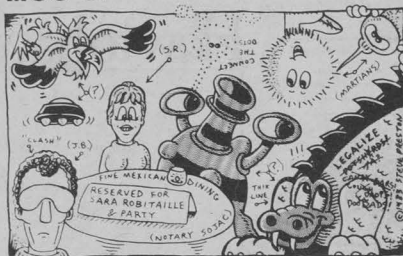

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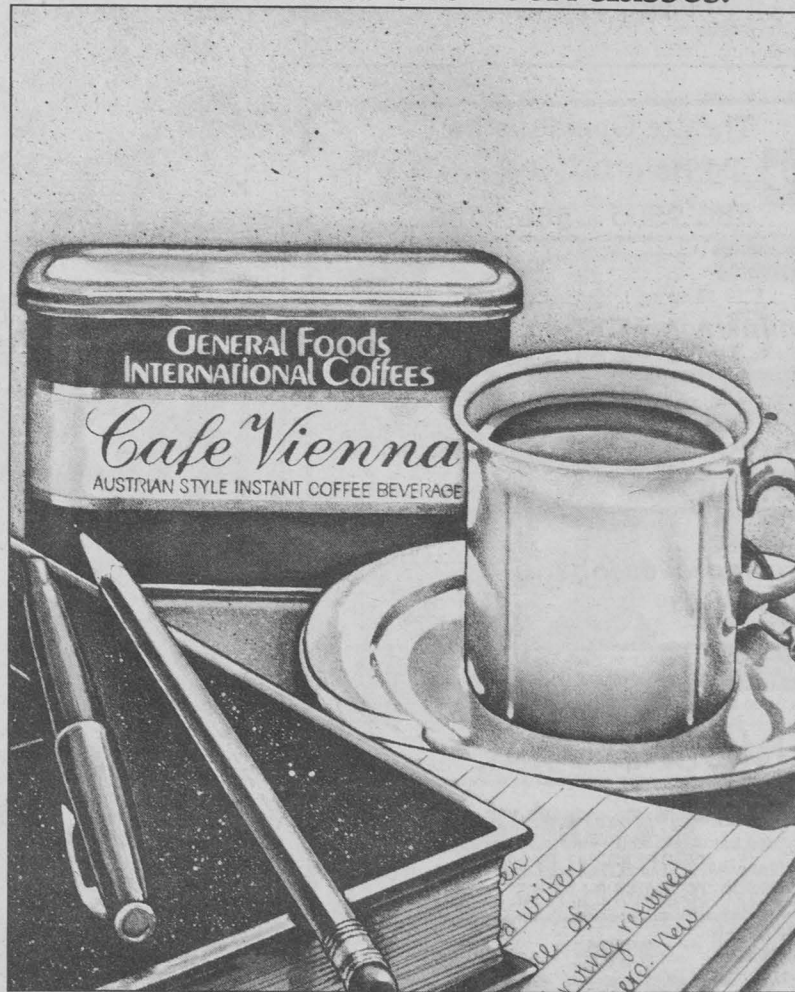


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
