My Mailbox Runneth Over by Andy Rooney

The red sticker on the cover of the catalog read: "THIS MAY BE YOUR LAST CATALOGI

And, in smaller print, "Our latest computer report shows you haven't ordered in a, while. Place an order now and you'll continue to receive every issue of our catalog!

Is this a threat or a promise?

I would be happy to pay a modest amount if I could be assured of never again getting a catalog that I didn't ask for. My mailbox runneth over. Not one in 10 pieces of mail is anything I want to look at, and I'm not including bills. When it comes to catalogs, not one in 50 has anything I want to order.

Last year, I suppose we got an average of 25 catalogs a week in the mail. That's 1,300 catalogs and I ordered one thing from one of them. Two actually. I ordered one pair of shoes from a place that specializes in wide shoes. The other 1,299 catalogs, with postage, represent several thousand dollars - wasted on me

It's not always possible to tell how you got on a catalog list but there are several things that do it:

- Having a hobby.

- Having a baby.

- Being old. Buying a house
- Giving to a charity
- Using a credit card.
- Winning the lottery. Being listed in the telephone book.
 - Giving your name and address to a store
 - when you buy something.

There ought to be a law compelling any company that sends out unsolicited catalogs or advertising material to include a stamped, self-addressed return postcard. It would say simply: "REMOVE MY NAME AND ADDRESS FROM YOUR MAILING LIST OR BE FINED \$100 FOR EVERY PIECE OF LITERA-TURE YOU SEND ME AFTER TWO WEEKS FROM THE DATE OF THIS

The catalogs we get most of are in three categories. The clothes catalogs are mostly Margie's and they got her name off the charge cards she has with those stores. She also gets a lot of seed catalogs. Many of the catalogs that come for me are from woodworking tool companies.

There's a similarity in the literature of many of the catalogs. The catalog I get from a company that sells wide shoes, for example, may have the same catalog writer that another company uses to try to sell me woodworking tools.

Some of their favorite phrases are:

"Once you've used our ..

"Ordinary (blanks) are made from (blank) but our (blanks) are designed specifically for us and made by old world craftsmen from the finest (blank) money can

"Try our (blank) once and you'll never use any other (blank) again."

Banks, credit card companies and insurance agents abuse the mails. Yesterday I got an official-looking letter from a large New York bank. On the envelope it said, "IMPORTANT! PERSONAL!" (They always use a lot of exclamation points. Nothing that claims it's important and has a lot of exclamation points in it is ever important at all.)

If you get a letter from a bank, you should be able to trust the bank not to con you. Some of what you get from banks is important and there shouldn't be any confusion. about what is and what isn't. Anything from a bank that doesn't pertain to your account, should be clearly labelled on the envelope, "SALES PITCH!"

Then we could throw out that stuff from the bank with the catalogs without worrying about it.

I object to the devaluation of the importance of our mail. Mail is special when it's personal and when it's serious business. It ought not be diluted with junk that inishes the satisfaction we all get from our mail.

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Russians and Americans team up to tackle rapids

Russians and Americans for teamwork. It is rather difficult to imagine that 2 rival countries could sit in the same room together let alone work together. None-the- less, Project RAFT was developed (and successful at that) with that very intent, to provide ample opportunity for people around the world to meet in a non-competitive environment to learn and understand one another and ultimately work as a team. Project RAFT organizes and sponsors river rafting exchange programs in the United States, Soviet Union and other nations. RAFT has been labeled the biggest non-profit white water event worldwide.

Once the meeting place (country) is determined the nations congregate and put people from different cultures together on the same boat as they venture down the white rapids together. United on the rapids, everyone must put aside any political differences and conflicts in order to overcome the shared risks of the remote wilderness river. Tim C. Larin, a native of North Dakota and Montana, who is a tour guide was fortunate enough to be a part of the enlightening experience. Tim and his other team members were flown to Moscow where they toured Russia May1 through May 6. A boating company, Sotar donated 6 to 8 rafts to this particular event. Tim admits there was a sense of prejudice towards the Americans and visa versa, but he readily points out the barriers were broken after they came to the realization that everyone was here for the same purpose- to master the white water.

The first day the groups were to start out, the expedition was called off due to snow and then rain. Needless to say, once the weather permitted the boaters casted off and boated down the Chyula River. The rapids were incredible, according to Larin. Apparently, the peak water was around 10 pm at night, so they took advantage of the opportunity to boat even late at night.

Even with the strongest and most dangerous waters tackling against the boaters, the crews conquered them masterfully. In some cases, the rafters had world class paddlers Soviet Union were professionals such as engineers or

Even after an exhausting day on the river, the teams found time to socialize. One night they prepared and acted out skits and attended a folk dance. Not only did the U.S team party, but they took in time for sight-seeing. Touring the area they learned blue jeans and printed T-shirts were extremely popular because of limited availability to the Russians. They also became aware of the lack of money in Russia and how desolate Russia is compared to the

The team has received several invitations for a return visits and plan to extend their visas. In fact, several U.S. photo journalists have prolonged their return and have remained in Russia as guests of private boaters. They will return later this month. Larin believes this event was not publicized enough and therefore had zero coverage in Moscow. His theory is that since the event held no controversy it contained little interest to the media.

Nonetheless, the event was such a success that plans are underway for the United States to host rafting expedition next year in North Carolina. Sponsors are needed for the Russian teams, since Project RAFT is a non-profit organi-

Larin had several reasons for becoming involved with this program. One reason is because he enjoys the thrill of boating and he wanted to see Russia. In fact, he plans to return to Russia one day and visit his new found friends. "I would like to think I made friends," he said. But his primary reason coincide Project RAFT'S main concern, "is to ditch bureaucracy and get to the point of what everybody wants-PEACE!"



Professor of the Month Named by Julie Bennet

Dr. John Hanton, a professor of electrical engineering, has been named Professor of the Month for October by the MSU Chapter of Mortar Board. Professors of the month are chosen for their dedication to higher education and their concern for

Hanton, who is a native of St. Paul, Minnesota has been teaching at MSU for 25 years. He received his B.S., M.S. and Ph.D in electrical engineering at the University of Minnesota. Upon completion of his doctorate in 1964, Hanton moved to Bozeman.

Students and learning are very important to Hanton. In class, he feels students have a right to receive the best possible presentation of useful information. "My job is to give students a quality presentation of up-to-date and relevant material," state Hanton. He feels it's important to keep abreast of his field and remain competent. "After all," he says, "people have to make a living by what I reach them"

Hanton's students certainly find both he and his lectures pleasing. "His teaching style combined with his sense of humor makes his lectures very enjoyable," remarks a students. Hanton tries to make all his presentations interesting. "However," he comments, "some lectures are diamonds and some are stones and you have to do your best with both." It appears Hanton has been very successful with this philosophy.

His students say he has a passion for teaching. As one student states, "This passion for teaching is conveyed to his students as they acquire a passion for learning, and this passion for learning is the ultimate objective for any teacher."

Teaching, above all, is of greatest importance to Hanton. "It's our fault if we don't give students an education," he says. If students don't receive a good education then he feels MSU doesn't look good. "I don't like it when we don't look good," he reconded.

Hanton's experience and dedication to students learning led to his involvement in the design program for electrical engineers at MSU. This is a program which enables students to get practical experience in the "real world" before graduation. Students go outside MSU and work with local companies to design a project that the company needs. So far, the program has been very successful and has caught the eye of several companies that come to MSU for recruiting. "It's useful to the students as a marketing tool in job interviews," Hanton says.

Currently, the design program is an elective. There are approximately thirty students who enroll in the program each year; however, that number will increase substantially since the program is now a requirement for new students entering MSU under the 1988-91 catalog.

Projects outside of teaching have also held Hanton's interest. He has been quite involved with electronic applications in agriculture. Hanton developed a livestock identification system (which is patented) that is currently in use in the industry. He also worked on a pregnancy testing system that not only tests for pregnancy but also determines the number of fetuses being carried.


When he is not teaching, Hanton spends time with his wife, Sharon, and his three daughters, Marge, Katie and Patty.

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

MSU student health services are available to all students by Sheila Devitt, RN.



All students 7+ credits have automatically paid the Student Health Service fee of \$29.50 + \$6.00 dental fee at registration. This fee allows students the use of the Student Health Service and Student Dental Clinic for examinations and evaluations at no cost. A minimal fee is charged for x-rays, lab work, medications, etc. The MSU Student Health Insurance covers most of the incidental charges. However, the charges are the same whether or not a student is covered with the MSU Student Health Insurance. The Student Health Service and Dental Clinic fees are almost always much lower than comparable charges in the local community. Students without the MSU Student Health Insurance pay for the additional charges themselves at the time of service Medications are NOT paid by the insurance. We encourage MSU students to make use of the Student Health Service and Student Dental Clinic. You paid for it, you may as well use it!!

.The little "white chapel" on Babcock has not been used as a chapel for a long time. Presently it is being rented out as studio space by 3 Native American artists. Susan Stewart, Ernie Pepion, and Kathryn Stewart are painters affiliated with the Montana Indian Arts and Culture Association (MIACA.)

MIACA, which started in Great Falls, gained its non-profit status 3 years ago. They are continuously seeking and receiving donations to remain active. The association is made up of an advisory board and artists throughout the state. Jaune Quicktosee Smith and Neil Parsons are 2 well known Native American artists on the advisory board. The artists, working on all forms of art, network with others throughout the aprison.

On November 14th, eight Montana artists will be showing their work in Cambridge, Massachusetts, at the Cambridge Multicultural Art Center. By networking they would like to have Boston artists in exchange come show their work in Montana. The Institute of American Indian Arts out of Santa Fe has already shown an interest in showing their work here.

Contemporary expression is what is behind the work of these artists. They want to get past the stereotypical warrior on a

horse and commercial Santa Fe style. These are fine images, and the public has shown a fondness for them, but they are of the past. The focus of these artists, like those in White Chapel, is taking the Native American Indian, his history, his culture, and his feelings, and showing that he has grown, just as the many other cultures of America, and is continuously a part of America's present. He is very much alive. The group is always looking for more dancers, writers, painters, etc. that have this contemporary style of art in mind.

A tributary of MIACA, the Submuloc (Columbus spelled backwards) Society, is working on a show for America's quincentential in 1992. The message relayed will be the falsehood of Columbus' discovery. The show will focus on the Native American's existence in America before Columbus' arrival. Their contributions in the way of food, agriculture, pharmaceuticals, etc. will be empha-

The sight specific sector of the association hopes to sponsor sight specific pieces, those making a statement, around Montana. This could possibly be launched in the Spring.

The 3 painters at White Chapel pay rent and bills to make their art contribution to society. Ernie Pepion just started painting in the chapel in August of this year. Prior to this he spent time enough at MSU to receive his BA in '84 and MFA in '89. Ernie is a quadriplegic due to an auto accident in 1971. This was no hindrance to his work seeing that he didn't start painting seriously or studying

art in school until after the accident. In his paintings he likes to integrate modernized contemporary Indian beliefs with his handicap. He emphasizes that dreams can take you where you want to go. Emie was able to work a little more independently when the mechanical engineering department received a grant and built Ernie a mechanical

Susan Stewart and Kathryn Stewart, sisters, have been painting in White Chapel since June of this year. Susan enjoys her work at the Artshoppe downtown, but her painting is her true motive. Susan has shown her work in places such as California, Montana, Arizona, and Washington. She has dealers in Seattle and San Francisco. Being able to help young artists and to network across the states means a lot to her.


**Cathryn works on campus with Indian education and the Center for Native American Studies. She coordinates graduate fellowship studies for Native American students. Although her work at MSU is very important to her, her true expression is also through her art. Kathryn likes to use a bird theme in her paintings. Some scenes are from her dreams.

One thing these artists would like to convey through their work is that the Native American is very much alive. "People always think Native Americans are something that existed in the past. Indian culture is very much a part of America."

So, what does flag burning have to do with Art?

So, what does flag burning have to do with Art? Quite a bit, actually. I guess it all starts in America with Betsy Ross, woman artist. One of our first. She made this piece of art by hand and we call it our flag now. It gets reprinted by the millions each year. Like posters of a Van Gogh, it doesn't sell for much. But, if I buy one of his paintings for a few zillion dollars (after my MFA makes its first million) there's no law against my burning it. True, that wouldn't be very smart, but it would be my RIGHT to do with my purchase what I please.

If I waltz into K-Mart and buy a flag for five or ten bucks or so and take IT to my home and burn it to please myself (etc.). I could be arrested. If I burn that K-Mart flag, a long descendent distance from the original work of artby Betsy Ross, I could be arrested. If I'm thinking correctly, the symbol set aside for a moment, there's a paradox in logic here.

I wonder, if Betsy Ross had of lost her mind, or better yet if her husband lost his mind and burnt her creation, saying "Now Dear, this is a ridiculous project. Please, fix my wig"—he would not have been arrested or even publicly reprimanded. One of our founding fathers!

But it you live in twentieth century America and burn a flag in front of K-Mart or the Capitol —you can count on being arrested. The constitution as we know it flies out the window and slam, you're in jail for not liking the zillionth copy of the American flag. Or maybe you did like it and knew how much other people liked it and thought it brilliant as a way of protest to remind people of some social injustice that is going on. Guess you'd better just cancel that thought right out, ch?

What does all this have to do with art? There just so happens to be a man who used his NEA grant to paint a picture of Jesus dipped in urine. Had he not titled the painting accordingly the project would probably have gone unnoticed. Now the Congress has its eyebrows up in arms over the issue. Artists across the country are writing their congressional leaders reminding them about artistic freedom and the first amendment. Now we can't burn the flag:

Say I write a performance and in that performance someone is suppose to burn the flag. Guess we have to cut that scene, ch? It doesn't matter if it's the best or worst piece of literature to come down the pike. It doesn't matter if it provokes thought or will actually change the viewpoints on a crucial issue at the time or not. It simply cannot be put on.

With this new legislation, literature is limited. And so is visual art. You can't handstitch a flag and burn it. You can't paint a flag and burn it, or can you? What can you get away with and what can you not? That's one way to look at the issue. What is IMPORTANT in an artist's decisions about a work of art or NOT is another perspective. Aesthetic considerations can be decorative, primitive, political, etc. But, the political is being edited these days.

If I have a daughter who hand-wove a flag and burnt a whole in it on the Fourth of July, what are the ramifications for her legal record, her public reputation, her tuture image? This seems as absurd and silly as the original concern over the legislation itself. Yet followed through, many "minor" court cases will obviously emerge.

And so you see how it goes. If Congress can tell us what we can and can't do with an OBJECT (Note, to-date: Bible burning is legal, nuclear energy is legal, landing satellites blown to pieces into the atmosphere is legal, you have the right to salute the flag or not, to speak the pledge of allegiance or not, to stand up at the beginning of a baseball game or not) then Congress can tell us what we can and cannot do as artists.

It is a well-known and oft forgotten fact that most great art is not recognized in its own time. It is well-known and oft forgotten by our Congress that fascistic regimes have been notorious for their squelching of the arts, especially when "political" art and political protest begin to merge in an effort to express personal freedoms.



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
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

Senior linebacker Mark D'Agostino came through un touched on the next play and wrapped up Schmidt for an eight yard loss. When Schmidt's pass on fourth and eighteen fell incomplete,

"Today our football team played hard and with a great deal of intensity," said head coach Earle Solomonson. "We played with improved technique and it allowed us to be successful.

The game, played before a sparse crowd of 3,107 diehard Bobcat fans, seesawed back and forth through the middle periods with Weber holding a 19-7 lead at one point in the second quarter.

With the wind at their backs to open the third period, however, the 'Cats opened the scoring after recovering a Weber fumble at the Weber 30 yard line. Jay Judy connected on a 45 yard field goal to pull MSU within two at 19-14.

On their next possession, Montana State drove 76 yards on a 16 play drive that ate up more than seven minutes to score a touchdown that would put them ahead 24-19. The drive culminated with a ten yard touchdown pass from QB John Tetrault to tight end



With the wind at their backs in the fourth period, Weber State marched down the field and regained the lead when Schmidt hit Rob Trebilcock with a 35 yard scoring pass. A pass from Schmidt to running back Geoff Mitchell on the two point conversion attempt put WSC ahead 27-24 with twelve minutes left in the game. That set the stage for the game winning drive.

The 'Cats converted on three separate third down attempts during the drive that would lead to their first win in four weeks.

"Si played with tremendous desire and intensity," said Solomonson. "Si got us those extra tough yards."

When asked if the weather affected the footing or the large number of running calls (MSU ran the ball 77 times compared to only

nine passing attempts), Solomonson said that it had.

"We felt with the field conditions as they were, the key was to have our running backs going forward. The lateral plays were not that effective.

While they may not have been very effective, it was Ryan who said they did serve a purpose.

"The option opened it up and then we were able to come back with the dive," said Ryan, a former Billings West star. "I really didn't have a problem with the footing. The ball was a little slippery, but that's no excuse for our fumbles.'


It was Weber that sprinted out to the early lead thanks to a one yard scoring run by Mitchell in the first half and two scoring passes from Schmidt. One went to tight end Trevor Shaw from 15 yards out in the second quarter and the other went to split end Dave Hall from 16 yards away. Both extra point attempts failed resulting in Weber's unusual total of 19 first half points.

It was Ryan who kept MSU in the ball game in the first half via scoring runs of 2 yards in the first quarter and 11 yards in the second when he broke through the line and bounced off a herd of would-be Weber tacklers.

The win sets the stage for next weekend's Montana State-Montana clash. The Grizzlies bring a 7-2 overall mark and a 5-1 conference mark into the game and are flying high after crushing previously unbeaten (in conference) Boise State.

Montana State will enter the game with a 4-5 overall and 2-4 conference mark. MSU has lost the last three games between the

Butler crushes Grizzlies' Morris at MSU meet

Montana State's Shannon Butler defeated previously unbeaten David Morris of the University of Montana last Friday by 41 seconds at the Montana State Quadrangular cross country meet at Riverside Country Club to claim first place honors.

Butler, who had lost to Morris earlier this season, ran a brilliant race and established himself as the man to beat at the Big Sky Conference championships coming up in two weeks.

"It meant a lot for me to lose (last time)," said the victorious Butler. "It gave me a little more incentive to run harder."

Butler and Morris ran even for the first half of the five mile race, but then Butler began to pull away and Morris was unable to close the steadily increasing gap between them.

"Shannon is running better

and better every week," said men's coach Rob Stark. "In-general, the times were slower which could have been due to the course being a little wet and soggy, but Shannon improved his time by three seconds."

"He won the race with good strategy and good racing."

As a team, however, the Bobcat men did not have quite as much success as Butler. MSU finished in third place with 47 points behind Montana (30 points) and Idaho State (44 points). Going into the meet Stark had hoped to beat ISU and close the gap on Montana.

"I'd hoped to finish ahead of Idaho State," said Stark. "But I am confident that we can beat ISU at the conference meet. The challenge will be to catch Montana and Weber State."

"As a team, we ran a good race, but I think we have a better one down the line."

For the Montana State women, Stephanie Harris captured

second place at the meet while star runner Kathleen Monaghan watched from the sidelines due to a possible ştress fracture.

Harris completed the three mile women's course with a time of 18:05.5, just five seconds behind Idaho State's BobbiJo Waite. As a team MSU finished in second place with 29 points, three points behind victorious ISU's 26 points.

Christine Mount finished in sixth place for MSU while Kirsten Johnson made a dramatic improvement over her race two week's ago in Boise to finish in eighth place. Molly Monaghan and Tara Bohnenblust rounded out the top five finishers for MSU by taking 10th and 11th respectively.

"Kirsten Johnson really ran well," said women's coach Dale Kennedy. "Last week she was dead last on the team in Boise and this week she probably had the best race of all our kids."

Kalakay wins first 'Tour de Hyalite'

The night before I had somehow talked myself into entering the first annual "Tour de Hyalite", and now only five miles into the race I was regretting it.

The "Tour de Hyalite", held September 30th in the Hyalite canyon, was a combination running and rock climbing competition. At the rock, the atmosphere was fun, with competitors cheering each other on as they struggled with completing their climbs. Later that night we all met again for the mandatory party and prizes were awarded to each competitor. By the end of the evening, with the help of a little aspirin and a lot of beer, I had already talked myself into entering next year's event.

Tom Kalakay came away with first place honors in the Tour with a total score of 60 minutes. Jim Parker finished in second with a total of 73 minutes while Doug Chabot finished in third place with a total of 79 minutes.

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

As most of you know, the Registrar's office has implemented a policy forcing students to pay 60 cents for their Winter quarter registration schedule. Granted, this is a paltry sum to quibble over, but it is the principle, rather than the amount, that

Students this year have been hit hard with fee increases. General tuition has gone up 14 percent and student health insurance has increased well over 200 percent. This extra money is used to keep MSU competitive with other peer schools; however, university programs and services are only being maintained at past levels or cut back

There is a general consensus among the ASMSU student government that there are inherent costs involved in running a university that must be abosobed by the administration. These services should be included in MSU's budgeting.

There is a general consensus among the ASMSU student government tha there are inherent costs involved in running a university that must be absorbed by the administration. This includes such things as lights, heat, and building maintenance. Furthermore, certain services must be provided for the well-being of the university community including: campus security, graduation ceremonies, diplomas, class registration, drop-add processing, and class schedule books. These services should be included in MSU's budgeting.

It is with this in mind that the ASMSU student government, in conjunction with the Exponent, is providing a concise schedule of classes to the students-free of charge. We feel that the MSU administration should not be "nickel-and-diming" students for services that the university has an obligation to maintain.

The 60 cent charge for registration sets a bad precedent. What is to stop MSU from implementing charges for other services we students take for granted (expec our tuition to pay for), or in future years increasing the costs of these services balance their budgets?

In 1773, the American colonialists had a "tea party" protesting extraneous taxes imposed by the British Government. Consider this catalog a "tea party" for the students of MSU.



The student may not drop all courses. Students who desire to whitdraw from all classes are to obtain a "University Withdrawal" through the Dean of Students Office Each student is responsible for Fees of all courses after the 15th day of University Instruction.

Although no refund will be given students may continue to drop one or more courses with no grade up to the end of the 25th day of University instruction with the approval of their academic adviser and their course instructor. Transcript Requests
