

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



fter leaving the conference, my p chatted energetically about what had just seen. Glaring ecological problems we experienced in our first two weeks studying here made us question: will these brilliant speakers and well founded corporations be able to help the Dominican Republic's energy and pollution crisis? I don't know.

But I did know that I needed to do more research, to know how bad the problem really is. Sure the lights go out and the streets are bathed in exhaust fumes from rusting Toyota Tercel's affectionately dubbed "Public Transportation." Every city has its share of ozone layer depleting problems, right? The Dominican is worse though.

In October 2006 the "World's 10 Most Polluted Places" list was released by the Blacksmith Institute (compiled by international environment and health experts, including researchers from Johns Hopkins University, Mt. Sinai Medical Center and City University of New York). In a league with India and China, the Dominican Republic made the list. "A key criterion in the selection process was the nature of the pollutant," said Richard Fuller, director of Blacksmith Institute. (www.ens-newswire.com/ens/oct2006)

The city of Haina, D.R., an old battery recylcing smelter, is a city rampant with lead poising. Impoverished neighbourhoods suffer heavily with life expectancy cut in half (compared to wealthy nations), asthma rates soaring and a severe metal retardation endemic.

Haina isn't the only destitute destination in the Dominican. Simon Bolivar, one of the worst slums in Santo Domingo is another case exemplifying link between poverty and pollution. According to the Dominican Foundation, "Families with higher levels of poverty and social exclusion tend to build their homes on land unfit for living." The shanties, made of cement walls and zinc roofs, are built on the hills overlooking the Ozama River. With no proper roads and no formal trash disposal methods, waste from Simon Bolivar runs off the hillside into the Ozama River and ultimately into the Caribbean. Disease, in turn, is easily capacitated in the tropical, filthy conditions.

Poverty is the labyrinthine problem effecting the land and people. All the technology and innovation shared at the Energy Conference seem to put the horse before the cart. If you want to clean up the air and water, start with the

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

A Decade of Rock & Roll Bliss

Music thrived for the vast majority of the 1960s, and there have been many great and influential bands and albums after disco's short stint at polluting the radio waves in the late 70s. However, most people with taste will say that the heyday for music (for all forms of art in the 20th century for that matter) was from 1967 to about 1977. This is for a very good reason. Every year in that decade of absolute rock and roll bliss had something new and amazing to listen to and

However, some try to do the impossible and choose which year is the best one. Choosing the best year in music is like trying to choose a favorite pair of

underwear--each one has its own special charm and memories. There is no best year and it is nearsighted to try to choose. Thus, this will be a series of nostalgic articles exploring many great, wonderful, totally awesome years in mu-

sic, starting off, randomly drawn from a hat, with 1971.

The year 1971 had David Bowie's Hunky Dory album, which featured one of his biggest hits in "Changes." Pink Floyd also had success with Meddle, which did not put them into the mainstream (they would have to wait two more years for that), but Meddle is often cited as the album where Pink Floyd finally found their melodic and layered style. The highlights are "One of These Days" and the epic "Echoes." Former Beatle John Lennon also saw success when he released his greatest single out of his entire solo career, the cry for peace, "Imagine."

The Rolling Stones released their good, yet troubled bluesy album, Sticky Fingers. It has a mish-mashed feel to it, but it also featured such hits as the lengthy "Can't You Hear Me Knocking," the poetic "Wild Horses," and the roaring "Bitch" and "Brown Sugar." There was, of course, controversy over its humorous cover (which features the close up of the lower torso of a person in tight pants) and over its drug laden songs, but Sticky Fingers was still a massive hit for the band and a fun album to listen to.

1971 was not without its darker moments. The controversial and vastly imaginative American rock band, The Doors, riding on the success of their dark, blues oriented album L.A. Woman (released in February), hit a brick wa when lead singer and lyricist Jim Mor rison was found dead in his bathtub in Paris, France on July 3, 1971. He was 2 years old, and he left behind him anicon ic legacy of powerful poetic lyrics and charismatic stage performances.


Two albums that redefined rock as set a standard for the emerging style of metal were also released in 1971. T most obvious one was Black Sabbath Paranoid, by far the band's most icor album, and one of the most influenti ones of the '70s. Featuring the hard roo staples of "War Pigs," "Paranoid" ar "Iron Man" (which has without a doul one of the most recognizable riffs in m sic), Paranoid set the cynical and thu derous standard for metal.

- punctuated by moments of levity and well-crafted plot twists.

If it existed, this year's Oscar for Best Ensemble Cast would go to "Before the Devil Knows." Ethan Hawke plays Hank, Andy's younger brother. Oscar winners Phillip Seymour Hoffman, Albert Finney and Marisa Tomei round out the ensem-

the Devil Knows You're Dead" is another testament to human avarice and dissolution. You'll feel miserable but engrossed - like only great cinema can make you feel. And, isn't that the point of great art? To remind us how thoroughly base and dissolute we


are? How utterly worthless and without hope? The movie allows its viewer two options: grasping inhuman ambition or, worse, a fate of impotent obscurity.

The movie leaves you guessing. It seems to celebrate modern humanity at its worst, by depicting modern humanity at its best. And, when the closing credits appear, you may find yourself shouting a string of surprised and angry obscenities. If this movie doesn't surprise, assault and traumatize your emotions, you're not paying close attention.

If you want a movie that will reassure you - that will remind you of human capacities for love and forgiveness - a film that's enjoyable to watch and gives you closure, this movie isn't for you. Go see "Atonement," instead. You'll be the happier for it. But if you think film is important - if you prefer film that is challenging, that works under your skin, that keeps you up at night -- you'll appreciate "Before the Devil Knows You're Dead."

William Blake writes, "The road of excess leads to the palace of wisdom." But in the judgment of director and film demigod Sidney Lumet, Blake's wrong. Blake, "Before the Devil Knows" would say, is dead wrong.

"Before the Devil Knows" will show at the Procrastinator Theatre this Thursday, Friday at 7 and 9:30 p.m., and Saturday at 4, 7 and 9:30 p.m. (Feb. 14-16).

Lessons in Underwater Flying

"If I told you the Beatles were going to be here in five minutes, would you get on that stage and start playing?" asks a bearded old vet, still wearing his aviators in the dim atmosphere of the Filling Station. Joking with some of the bar regulars, the band calling itself "Lessons in Underwater Flying" waits for the sound man to finish setting up. Hints of nerves peak through excited faces; this is their first show. With the sound check some of the conversation dies down and curious bar-goers move forward for a better look.

Defined by singer, Nikole Thorne's piercing vocals and curious sometimes childlike circus keyboard melodies, Lessons in Underwater Flying is held together by solid bass and guitar rhythms along with powerful drums. A toy xylophone and mini accordion bring a feeling of preciousness to their deeply layered rock. Throughout the set, the musicians are constantly rearranging themselves on stage, trading instruments and demonstrating their virtuoso of talents. Many of their songs defy traditional verse-chorus-verse structure, instead building crescendos until they burst in an explosion of drums.

After over an hour of playing all original material, with the exception of one cover of Modest Mouse's "Sleepwalking," Lessons in Underwater Flying concluded their set to raucous applause and Slomo Joe and the Knowshows were up.

If you have not heard this Bozeman local favorite, then you have been missing out. Slomo Joe and his band brought banger after banger of pleasing bar rock, including a few punk tunes written by the late Ben Spangler. Their experience and confidence shows as Joe yells to the sound guy, "Turn the suck knob down to five!" Everything from swing to metal

gets these guys, and the dance floor, going. After a few more originals and a few more covers, this rip-roaring band calls it quits.

The Tony Montana Project is next, bringing emotional ska-punk and a gnarly glass-shard dancer to what has already been an overwhelming night. Alas, sleepy-time is calling and we must hit the rocky road.

It's hard to imagine that nestled in the foothills of the Bridger Range, adjacent to million dollar homes and a picturesque gold course, is a landfill filled with millions of tons of Bozeman's solid waste. And within that tonnage of garbage, is a lifetime contribution of my own daily consumption, all beginning with my dirty diapers.

Like many landfills around the country, Bozeman's is nearing capacity and closure is imminent, forcing local city and count to re-examine what to do with the mass accumulations of solid waste that continues to pour in daily.

According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, we produce 230 million tons of municipal solid waste per year in the Un States; or about 4.6 pounds per person daily. That means, that in my 25 years as a user, consumer and abuser, I've made quite the bution, adding some 40,000 pounds of waste to our municipal landfills.

Frankly, I've never thought much about my garbage, and would rather have someone else deal with it. It's that wonderful 'out of out of mind' philosophy that has done wonders in the world on both an environmental and humanitarian front.

Distraught by this attitude, I decided to subject myself to what I've termed as my "social experiment." For one week, I pledged to everything I threw away, including recyclables, forcing myself to confront and examine my daily impact on the world.

Day 1: I unveil the social experiment to my roommates. They are somewhat speechless, perhaps borderline agitated, after I tell them my trash is to remain in the pantry for the entire week in a separate bag. Despite any lingering odors, it is to remain untouched. I tell them we're doing this for the greater good, which doesn't seem to inspire them in the slightest.

Later, I cook breakfast, and am somewhat disturbed by the excitement I feel when I throw away the first piece of waste, an eggshell. I'm feeling enthusiastic. Let the collecting begin!

Day 2: I throw away three credit card offers, which amount to eight pieces of paper and three envelopes. Usually, I don't even look at the offers, but I do notice that Discover has approved me for a \$29,000 credit line.

Day 3: Discovery of the day: I eat a lot of eggs. I wonder if nine eggs in healthy for my cholesterol. The experiment is taking a somewhat psychand is beginning to take a toll on me.


This is getting more difficult. All I can think about is trash, and I find a sciously thinking of how I can use less of it.

Day 4: I go out to dinner and enjoy a greasy burger and French fries. I the burger was served on, the three plastic cups of ranch I requested, six napkins.

Later, I take inventory of my collections: a toothpaste container, a plabottle, a chip bag, an assortment of random papers and an over abundance cans. I find it most interesting what I'm lacking; food products.





Day 7: A time for recollection. Despite the tragic end to my experiment, my major revelation is that a high percentage of my waste is recyclable, probably 60 percent or so.

By putting a little more thought and effort into it, I could reduce my solid waste by a huge margin. I also realize, that the more aware I am of what I'm throwing away, the less I use.

Despite the slight bouts with paranoia, psychological introspection and the disastrous Day 6, I've deemed my social experiment successful: Instead of blindly tossing things in the trash, I am more aware of my waste and how to decrease it.


year, Kelly Gillum, will red-shirt this year due to a shoulder injury.



5 Kansas is fun to watch. Guards Brandon Rush and Mario Chalmers will drive smoothly to the hole, or hit jump shots all night. Kansas is a scary tournament opponent and probably a one-seed. The other sure bet in the Big 12 is No. 12 Texas. This is also a team built on excellent guard play with D.J. Augustin and A.J. Abrams doing most of the scoring, with close to 20 points per game apiece.

Texas A&M has been pretty good as of late with Josh Carter playing well. Texas A&M can go eight or nine deep on its bench with a ton of success. They have been keeping their players fresh and sharing the ball. However, their tourney success will be limited due to the lack of a go-to guy. They do not have what No. 24 Kansas State has in Michael Beasley. He averages 25 points and 12 boards a game. Although they are only ranked 24th, I would fear them come tourney time. They have three upperclassmen, leading three talented freshmen, and Michael Beasley can shoot the lights out.

BIG EAST

This conference is absolutely loaded.

Look for them to earn eight or possibly nine bids to the tourney. Here are the schools definitely in (in conference standing order): No. 6 Georgetown, No. 21 Notre Dame, No. 19 Connecticut, Louisville, No.25 Pittsburgh, No. 16 Marquette and Syracuse. West Virginia and Seton Hall are right on the fringe. Depending on who beats who the rest of the season will determine which one will go. One of them will make it, and possibly both.

With so many strong teams in the conference, it's hard to determine who

the best is or at least how they should be ranked. With the exception of the Louisville game, Georgetown has separated itself from the rest with big Roy Hibbert leading the way. He is averaging 13 points per game with seven boards and more importantly, his 7-foot-2, 275pound frame is a huge defensive presence. Shots in the paint do not come easy against Georgetown. No. 21 Notre Dame is another team that is on a roll. Since their loss in mid-January to Georgetown, the Irish have won five straight and launched themselves into the No. 2 spot in the conference. Notre Dame has an awesome inside-outside combination with center- Luke Harangody and guard Kyle McAlarney. Together, they put up 35 points per game.

BIG TEN

There are three teams that will bring some serious ball to the tourney and represent the Big Ten well. No. 8 Wisconsin, No. 10 Michigan State, and No. 13 Indiana have been battling each other and the road all season. The Big Ten seems to have some of the toughest away games.

Wisconsin is the best bet for a Final Four appearance in this conference.

Hughes, Marcus Landry, and Michael Flowers play magnificently together. They can get out in transition and everyone can shoot from outside. Their defense is what is impressive. They lead the nation in scoring defense, allowing 54 points per game and Landry's recspecs remind me of Horace Grant. He also played some tough defense.

PAC-10

This conference started hot but is fizzling out. Arizona State, Oregon, and USC are playing like high school teams right now. Arizona and No. 17 Washington State have done a good job of battling through some tough games. Watch out for these two teams in the tourney. Other teams may overlook them and, if they do, they will lose - bad.

The big dogs in the Pac-10 right now are No. 4 UCLA and No. 9 Stanford. UCLA has been in two consecutive Final Fours and this year could easily be their third straight. Look for them to earn a one-seed in the tourney and breeze through their first two or three games. No. 9 Stanford is always at the tourney but rarely makes a lot of noise. The Cardinal backers hope Brook Lopez's amazing play -18 points and eight rebounds per game - will lead them back to the Final Four.

SEC

Tennessee is waltzing through one of the weakest conferences. They play an up-and-down game that most teams have no chance of keeping up with. They can easily throw up 10, 12 or 15 points in a couple of minutes. They've been over 100 points three times this year and there will be more.

The last couple of years this has been Gator country, but with the huge losses to their repeat champion team, they are not the same. No. 22 Florida still has game, just a lot less experience. The players that were on the championship teams did not see real minutes. However, look for an upset out of them in the tourney. Coach Billy Donavon knows how to get the most out of his players and put them in the best position to win.

Don't take this as the last word, but the numbers do not lie. With all that has already gone down this year in college basketball, the Final Four could have Super Bowl quality games.

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
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

It had everything I was looking for: abundant natural beauty, solitude, even some decent English lectures on poetry once in a while. And most important of all: silence. To quote my favorite poet again, "the silence that is in the starry sky/The sleep that is among the lonely hills."

But not anymore. Ever since they fired up the blowers on that new chemistry building, it's been bye bye birdie. Literally. It's so loud it's even chasing the birds away, let alone most of the dead poets in residence. Except for Allen Ginsberg. He says he likes it, something about the way it howls.

But I never liked howling much. And
