

## Mysterious "Glooper" remains at large

As of the date of this article's publishing, UPD has yet to find the perpetrator, dubbed "The Glooper" by the MSU community.


"We are honestly stumped here. If anyone has any information about this incident, please reach out to the UPD," Smully said.





## Campus snowplows replaced with flamethrowers

In response to a number of complaints by members of the faculty and student body, University Services has implemented a two-year plan to replace all snow-removal machines with portable flamethrowers.

"It absolutely is an example of synergy," said Head of University Services Administration Gerald Clamsanders. "Besides melting the snow and ice, it keeps the operators themselves warm and lets any potential campus safety threats know that we mean business."

The program, known as FlameCats, comes after years of concerns about poor sidewalk conditions during the snowy winter months. "I'm like, so grateful for FlameCats," said Janet Sinclair, an earth science major who came to Montana from a Rainbow Family commune in Ocala, Florida.

"I'm from SoCal, but I grew up going to Big Bear and Aspen, so I'm all about the steez," said Brock Megadude, a business major who also expressed appreciation for the FlameCats program. "Part of the steez life means that I wear slippers literally everywhere I go — rain, snow or shine. I'm definitely always living in fear that I'll slip on the ice in my Birks, get injured and miss out on that sweet pow!"

Students like Sinclair and Megadude found their fears so all-consuming that they banded together and formed an organization to create change. Calling themselves SlipWatch, they filed countless complaints with the Federal government against the University, vowing not to rest until someone's livelihood was taken away. The result? FlameCats.

"So far it has been super effective," said Joe Maintenance, the director of FlameCats. "We have seen a huge reduction in slipping incidents since we started flaming the walkways."

The FlameCats in action are certainly a sight to behold. Now, every day that snow falls, students can see dozens of workers dressed in Champ mascot uniforms lighting up the Quads, Centennial Mall and Romney Oval with

"We decided to put the FlameCats in Champ uniforms for a number of reasons," said University President Weebodeebo Cruzadiferous. "First, it just felt right, since they are called FlameCats. When asked about students' concerns that the

Out of respect for MSU's veterans, the ceremonial opening FlameCats flame salvo was conducted by a WWII veteran.

"FlameCats is a proud student employer and we do not require any prior experience," Maintenance said. "Honestly, in the interview, we just hand you a flamethrower and if you let her rip, you're hired."

## Llamas to replace CatTracks next school year

On Feb. 29, MSU Monarch of Parking Services Crandy Randall announced that the campus CatTracks shuttle system will be shutting down. Randall proposed that his new electric rocket, the Millennium Falcon, be its replacement. MSU President Wallamazado Cruzaldo promptly vetoed the proposal in favor of a more sustainable solution: pack llamas.

Campus CatTracks launched at the beginning of the 2024-2025 school year in an attempt to slow threats made by the student activist group Several Students of MSU Against Parking Services (SSMSUAPS). According to Randall, this effort has been unsuccessful so far.

"We've actually seen a dramatic increase in SSMSUAPS threats this year," Randall said. He cited the rise in parking violations and the lack of available spaces as reasons for these threats.

During a top-secret University meeting inside the Chick-fil-A kitchen on Feb. 29, Cruzaldo proposed pack llamas as a peaceful way to reduce the widespread campus hate towards Parking Services. "We're hopeful that llama rides to class will make

students forget the fact that they have to park a mile away from their classes," Assistant to the Monarch of Parking Services Dale Dwyer said.

Several students noted concerns about the reliability of llamas as transportation, including junior Mark Prast. "They can't tell time," he claimed. "How are they supposed to be on schedule if they can't even read a clock?"

Llama Llama Red Pajama — renowned author of his self-titled autobiography and president of campus llamas, who gained the ability to speak through falling into the Duck Pond and becoming infected with amoebas — assured the Excrement that time telling would not be an issue. "Time telling will not be an issue," he said. Red Pajama declined to elaborate.

During an exclusive information session open only to out-of-state tourists, Cruzaldo pointed out some pros of using llamas as transportation. "We won't need to hire bus drivers because llamas drive themselves," she said. "The money that we save with llamas can be put toward our next big project — an on-campus trampoline park."

Cruzaldo briefly mentioned that construction for the trampoline park would shut down parking near the Outdoor Recreation building for most of the school year, but refused to take questions on the subject.

Prast and the other meeting attendees questioned the importance of a campus shuttle system. "Would we even need llamas if there were enough parking spaces?" senior Maya Samuel asked.

Despite concerns, Cruzaldo and the Parking Services leadership have begun the llama hiring process and hope to begin the program for the 2025-2026 school year. According to Dwyer, the llamas will be available from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. on weekdays and follow a similar schedule to CatTracks. The service will be free to everyone except MSU students, who must pay for a Llama Lot Parking Pass, starting at \$1,500 a semester.

## Super Bobcat? A mystery player saves basketball season from certain doom

MSU men's basketball will play at least one more game thanks to the heroics of mystery player Bobb Catt during Tuesday's game against the University of Northern Colorado (UNCO) Bears. Catt entered the game shortly after Head Coach Mattias Logiais got ejected from the sideline in the second half.

For the Bobcats, who came into the contest as 10-point underdogs, a win would mark yet another step towards the first-ever four-peat in Big Sky Conference (BSC) Championship history.

After a sluggish start in the opening minutes, MSU was down 24-9 with just eight minutes remaining in the first half. A quick change in the lineup, mainly focused on defending the Bears' strong inside attack, allowed the 'Cats to get back in the game.

The Bobcats ended the half on a 12-4 run, cutting into UNCO's lead 33-25 going into the locker room.

"Coach just told us to keep our focus, keep chipping away, keep defending," guard Cross Ovah said. "Eventually, something will give and we can have a chance to come back [in the game]."

However, not even Ovah, who is in his fourth year playing for the 'Cats, could have predicted

what came next.

With just a little under five minutes passed in the second half, Ovah drove into the paint for a layup that would have cut the 'Cats deficit to just three points. However, he was fouled hard by a host of Bear defenders, drawing the ire of Logiais towards the officials after they didn't call a foul.

Rather than hear Logiais' argument, the officials tossed him out of the game, leaving MSU without its head coach.

Suddenly, the 'Cats got a new sub off their bench. A player named Bobb Catt — who was obviously just Logiais wearing a fake beard — had entered the game.

"I don't know what you guys are talking about. We've had Catt for the whole year," Ovah said. "The guy has just had terrible injury luck all season. Thankfully, he was available for us tonight — we needed him."

Using his superior basketball intellect, Catt destroyed the Bears. What began as an uphill climb from a large scoring deficit quickly turned into one of the largest victories in MSU history.

The Bobcats went on to win 100-56, with Catt recording 47 points, 23 assists, 34 rebounds, 11 steals and 14 blocks. Ovah added 23 points and 12

assists, along with five rebounds and three steals.

"Those guys were incredible; the way they played tonight just shows who they are as players and as individuals," Logiais said. "We needed every bit of juice those guys provided tonight to overcome our slow start."

Logiais refused to answer any questions about the mysterious player Catt, who appeared to vanish into thin air right after the game ended.

MSU will now prepare to face University of Montana for the BSC Championship on March 12, with bragging rights in the age-old rivalry on the line for the 'Cats.

"We'll be ready for whatever the Griz decide to throw at us, so don't count us out yet," Logiais said with a wink. "Those guys over in Missoula aren't ready for what we've got coming."

Even if things don't immediately go as planned for the Bobcats, fans can rest easy knowing that Bobb Catt might save the day once again.

## CUPCAKES AND DUNK TANKS: MSU COMBATS FUNDING CUTS, FREEZES

MSU has finally solved its federal funding woes. The solution? Baked goods — and lots of them.

In light of recent federal funding cuts and freezes with the possible demise of the Department of Education, MSU has turned to a time-honored American funding strategy — the bake sale. I voted for a meritocracy, not whatever this is," said engineering major Eugene Millers, who actually did vote for this but doesn't possess strong enough critical thinking skills to realize it.

The MSU administration itself had to pitch in out of sheer desperation to recoup lost federal funds. Notably, Dean of Students Cakerise, who was locked in the dunk tank for the entire day, raised thousands of dollars in the first hour.

"It's been a great success. I'm really proud of the community MSU has created. You know, part of my job is to make sure students are having a great time," a soaking wet Cakerise told the Excrement from inside the dunk tank.


Apparently, the institution has even considered selling naming rights to corporations for campus buildings to raise money. "The Miller Light Dining Hall has a nice ring to it, don't you think?" Cakerise said right before he was dunked for the fifty-third time that morning.

As the semester winds down and the smell of confectionaries lingers in the air, one thing is clear: The bake sale economy and the CREAM are here to stay. Despite the recent federal

tensions stomping directly on MSU's neck, Misu said that she feels this new financial strategy has only brought campus faculty and students closer together.

"With enough cookies, anything is possible — even paying for a university to run. Just don't ask the Philosophy Department whether money is real," she said. The CREAM will be hosting another bake sale on April 20 due to yet another

Executive Order. This time, all classes on campus will be canceled and all students will be required to help run the booths of their respective departments.

## Starbux manager hosts event for liberal arts students seeking employment

As the spring semester nears its end, many soon-to-be graduates wonder if their degree will really provide employment opportunities. There are few areas of study more easily dismissed for this reason than the liberal arts — a blanket term encompassing history, philosophy, English and more.

In hopes of dispelling this myth and inspiring the next generation of innovators, the Bozeman Starbux General Manager Hasan Biker hosted a live event in the Strand Union Building Ballroom A on Friday, March 28. In an hour-long address to the crowd, he discussed his story and highlighted the variety of career opportunities offered by the organization.

"You are all the future, and the future is now," he said in his opening remarks to the crowd. Biker, who graduated from MSU in 2018 with a degree in gender dance theory, said there are no limits for liberal arts majors post-college.


"After graduating from MSU, the world was my oyster," Biker said. "I immediately moved back into my parents' house in Bozeman, where I spent the next three years honing my intellectual and civic capacities."

Biker was so busy with these vital pursuits — watching political TikToks and attending bi-monthly protests — that he forewent any employment. "It was one of the hardest sacrifices I've ever had to make," he said.

In 2021, Biker's parents retired to Florida, forcing him to apply for jobs. According to him, this traumatic experience shaped him into the courageous and strong-willed individual that he is today. "I knew it wasn't gonna be easy, and to tell the truth, I was terrified. But the fact remains: You can't be brave if you're not scared," he said.

Shortly after applying, he was hired by Starbux — an achievement he credits to his incredible wit and profound insight into socio-cultural issues.

"I stared intently at the hiring manager and asked: When are we gonna start talking about the political and economic state of the world? He looked at me blankly, dumbfounded by my insightfulness. After



following up four times, I got the job," Biker said.

He quickly climbed the ranks and became the general manager just two years later, a position he has remained in since. Biker said that he hopes that his story will inspire liberal arts students who are uncertain about their future.

Louise Owens is one such student, currently finishing up her philosophy of gender-neutral aesthetics degree. She expressed overt confusion about Biker's remarks. "My rent is already through the roof, and my landlord plans to raise it this summer. I need answers — not some pretentious douche telling me to pour lattes for a living," she said

However, Biker insisted on the socio-cultural significance of lattes. The event even featured a slideshow displaying some different works of latte art he had created.

"This is my magnum opus," he said, directing the audience to a photo of a broken foam heart resting atop a cappuccino. "It represents the pain and sorrow I feel for marginalized communities — the sheer guilt that possesses me. I'm at least speaking up about it, are you?"

While some dates leave you in the cold, others can make you feel stuck in the backseat —


