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An annual lutefish dinner is put on by the Ladies Aid of the Lutheran church for the purpose of raising money to help pay the running expenses of the church. Meat balls, too are served for those who dislike lutefish. For the past fifteen years this "feed" has been put on at a charge of fifty cents to a collar. From 150 to 200 are generally served and the Norwegians look forward to this feast with their favorite dishes.

Short class tables are set end to end and are covered with paper table cloths decorated with centerpieces of nasturiums and marigold. Candles, too, are placed in the center and at both ends. A kitchen equipped to do home cooking is located off the church parlors. Here we find the women trying to outdo each other in preparing the food. The pastry is prepared several days in advance in the various homes. The lutefish and meat balls are partially prepared the day before which so much less work the day of the dinner. The members of the aid furnish the dishes or may rent them from some furniture or hardware stor.

Large bowls of lute-fish and meat balls with pitchers filled with melted butter, mashed potatoes and buttered peas are set on the table with a word from the waitress to help yourself. Norwegian pastries come next with the traditional Yule-Brod, Leffse, KromKaga, Flat Bread and Fatte-man. Left over pastries are sold at 25 cents a dozen. Primrost-too, has its place on the with coffee and milk as the beverages.
