Enclosed are some slides I promised to send which we might use or which will act as photo ideas in the article on tying my spinners. These are all meant as suggestions to new shootings and I'm sure you will have plenty of suggestions, too.

Top Left hand corner: How to remove strands of Organza for wings of one or two of the patterns.

Next 10 slides across and down: The fly tying sequence of tying the fly. Number 6 shows a needle being used to coat the fly body with nail polish. This should be the actual brush that comes in some of the bottles. Number 9 and 10 show the hackle from the front and being squeezed into a flat plane. I will suggest using a little fly flotant grease on the fingers. Number 11 (number 24) shows another squeezing process.

Number 13 (number 12) is a slide of the 14 Danville regular threads available. I have new spools of the company's 7 fluorescent threads, and I have tied some patterns with the pink which makes a gorgeous looking body. I have asked Danville to explain what the advantage is in fluorescent threads. If I get any information about that I'll include it in the piece. (I will send you some of the spinners tied with different colored fluorescent threads.)

Number 14 (slide number 34) is just some of my spinners on a page from Halford.

Numbers 15 and 16 are of an actual spinner of a JW Dunne fly which was tied by Hardy. This was loaned to me by Datus Proper.

Number 17 shows the handling of a partridge hackle in front of the regular hackle as in the Callibaetis tie, trying to duplicate the smoke or vitta on the front edge of the spinner's wing.

Number 18 and 19 are of golden pheasant topping feather and wood duck flank feather--two kinds of tails for all the flies.

The last slide is of some spinners made with dyed hackle stems prepared by D's Flyes, 1999 So. Zenobia St., Denver, CO 80219.

Here are other photo suggestions. Whole hen necks I prefer to work with and side by side photos of individual hen and rooster hackles.

Please let me know if we're on the right track.

For the chapter on the rusty spinner: "It's very possible to fish a spinner fall successfully without ever getting a look at the bug you're imitating so carefully." SEX, DEATH, AND FLY-FISHING, by John Gierach. 1990. For the chapter on the Pale Morning Dun: "This popular name was given to this species by Doug Swisher and Carl Richards in their fine book, SELECTIVE TROUT, and it is such an appropriate description that I wish I had thought of it myself." I have also included some spare slides of tying sequences and fly patterns. I'm quite happy with the tying sequences, but the fly pattern shots need redoing, possibly with fewer patterns per shot. I have also put into envelopes slides of real spinners many of which should be included in the book and corresponding captions. I will keep these here for the time being.

With a spring 96 publication, we have time for a longer chapter on the fishing of the spinner patterns. Already this year, most of April, I have been fishing some of the spinner patterns on a couple rivers with outstanding success. True, there were duns on the water, but I did not see spinners. But the feeding fish are taking my new spinners as confidently as they take the duns. This can be an important answer to when should the reader fish the spinners in the book.

I received a copy of WET FLIES and a nice letter from Dave. I saw my name so often in the book, I thought I might write you and arrange for royalties.
