ROME. March 9 (AP)—Man is ungrateful to a benefactor when he lays his wors to the machine, says Gugilelmo Marconi. The wire ess wizard and famed scientist told Premier Mussotini that last night in a speech that won much attention today in the Fascist press.

"Man's sheer selfishness" drew the fire of Marconi as, in the presence of Ita'y's scientific elect, he gave his report as president of the mational research council.

"The defective distribution of wealth and resources and, above all, human selfishness, have cheated us of the benefits the machine brought," he said. The council, he said, will work threlessly to distribute employment among the people and reduce fatigue through proper utilization of machines.

Court Rules Chains to Remain on Gumman In Lima Trial

Court House Lima, O. March 8 .-Deputy Sheriff Wilbur Sharp, a small sober officer, today looked disectly at Harry Pierpont and said: That's the man who shot Shariff

Deputy Sharp was the third man to testify in the trial of the former heachman of John Dillinger for the first degree murder of Sheriff Jesse L. Sarber last October in a jail raid here in which Dillinger was liberated.

In an almost inaudible voice, Sharp told of the exciting events, which accompanied the murder of the sheriff. Sharp was sitting in the jail office with the sheriff and Mrs. Sarber when the man he identified today as Pierpost came in with two other men.

"One of the men said: 'We're officers from Michigan City and we want to see John Dillinger, the deputy testified.

"The sheriff sort of raised up in his chair and as he did it, the man fired. The others had guns too, The shot knocked the shariff down. His was on one elbow and one of successe that a sheriff could not the men ran to his side and clubbed

Lacking any special training in the duties of a sheriff, the late Dr. Roy F. Holley bravely but foolishly walked into the home of a Ross madman and was slain.

Lacking any special training in the duties of a sheriff, his widow, Mrs. Lillian F. Holley was appointed to succeed him and it fell to her lot to guard the nation's foremost desperado. The elaborate system she set up to guard her prisoner crumpled completely after 32 days and John Dillinger walked out of the Lake county jail.

The system of government which permits persons lacking any special training for any office to assume the duties of that office now is the object of much criticism, both by those , whose sympathies are extended to Mrs. Holley as well as by those who are the loudest in their demands that she resign or be impeached.

Young Sarber Named

A parallel to the Lake county situation is found in Lima, O. where, coincidently, another of the Dillinger mob is on trial for murder. In the Ohio city, Harry Pierpont and two of his pals are alleged to have murdered Sheriff Jesse Sarber when they stormed his jail and liberated Dillinger last fall.

The "powers that be" in that city, swayed by sentiment or political expediency, or both, acted similarly to the "powers that be" in Lake county-named Jesse Sarber's boy, Don Sarber, age 22, to succeed him. A photograph of Lima's new sher-iff seated in the courtroom with his machine gun trained on Pierpont is published on this page today.

A year ago thousands throughout Lake county were grieved to learn that their popular sheriff, "Doc" Holley, had been killed. However, many of the 200 or 300 officers who rushed to the Ross home when they learned of the tragedy privately expressed the opinion that Sheriff Holley needlessly had given his life in pursuit of his duties. They said no experienced officer would have walked into a dark room and into the range of the gun of a killer. They explained the house should have been surrounded to prevent escape of the madman, Mike Lantare, and then the deputies could have waited until daylight to "get their man."

Mrs. Holley Appointed

They all agreed there was no question of "Doc" Holley's bravery. It was said of the sheriff at that time that he would not send his men where he would not go himself. But, it was argued, he lost his life and Lake county lost a popular citizen because he had not had the training and experience a man as-

Then the judge voiced his intention, "for your good and my good and the public good," to name a special prosecutor. Estill protested immediately, declaring such a move was "not proper."

Baker has been warden of the county jail for years and apparently kept out of active politics. He served under the former republican sheriff, Ben Strong, and then under Joe Kyle of Gary, the G. O.
