## DEATH LETTER SUSPECTFACES A NEL CHMRGE



Moreria May Be Held By State if U . S . Releases Him

Gary police tolday still awaited orders from federal authozities concerning disposal of Ignagio Moreia, Brazilian sweetheart of Mrs. Bessie Hinchley, confessed extorawaiting trial on a federal charge of threatening the lives of Capt. I. S. Norton and Sam Lakin, before attempting the South American's prosecution on a gun-toting charge.
As a federal prisoner, Moreria is n a cell in the city jail where he has been held in communicado ever ince last Thursday, when police and Chicago federal operatives rounded up the Brazilian, the Hinchley woman and two other men who have since been released. The latter were Earl Hinchley, the woman's "legal" but castorf husband, and John C. DeGarmo, fer former common-law mate.
Arraigned Saturday before U. S. Commissioner Schuyler C. Dwyer in Hammond, the woman pleaded guilty to a spedific charge. at tempting to extort $\$ 3,000$ from Cap tain Norton, property agert of the Gary Liad company and presiden of the Gary Commercial Club and Chamber of Commerce. She was taken to the county jail because she was unable to turnish bond, fixed at $\$ 2,000$

"Defense counsel never makes such an offer in any case unless the worst is anticipated," Estill paid. "Had we accepted the offer Dillinget might have received a life sentence, whereas by refusing the deal and insisting on trial, I believe can convict the gangster of holdup murder and send him to the chair.' Dillinger will be tried under the ndiana law making the death penalty mandatory for conviction of murder in the perpetration of a robbery.

Piquett was irritated by Mre Holley's persistent refusal to per mit him to take witnesses to Dif linger's cell. He becane angry this morning when refused the right to take an attractive, dark-haired woman who claimed to be Dillin ger's wile to the cell.

Another Allbi Witneas
Except to claim that she is Mer Dillinger and that "John's a nice boy and innocent" the woman declined to be interviewed by reporters.
Piquett declared the woman is Mrs. Dillinger and she is another "alibi witness." She will testify, he said, that Dillinger was with her in Florida when Pollceman W. P O'Malley was slain in East Chi cago Jan. 15. Dillinger is charged with slaying the officer
Piquett said the woman also was with Dillinger in Fucson, Ariz. when he was captured inearly a month ago. The "riff-raff of the country" isn't going to get a chance to wear a path between the entrance to the Lake county jall and the cell occupied by John Dillinger, Indiana desperado awaiting trial for murder Sherift Lillian M. Holley decided today.
The diminutive woman sherifi enunclated her resolve to keep Mr. Dillinger's "sitting room" unoccupied, as far as possible, in a response to an oral request from Judge William J. Murray of criminal court for a written order giving Dillinger's attorney, Louis Plo quett of Chicago, free access to the desperado's cell.
Piquett had appeared before Mur ray complaining he had been denied the privilege of seeing his client at "reasonable hours." He asked for * written order allowing him to enter the Dillinger cell at will, so long as he didn't trespass on jail regulations.

Piquett Was Meyer Booge, an companied by dealer of Roosevelt Road, Chicago, who also wanted to see Dillinger. Booge told reporters he had been an inmate of the Indiana penitenand that he had learned to know the sunman intimately.
He added he had "run across" vacationing in that Jan.
Dillinger is charged with the mister of Patrick O'Malley, East Chicago policeman, during the $\$ 20$, 000 holdup of the Twin City's First
National bank on the following day, Jan. 15. Dilliager apparently is pinning his hopes of escaping the electric chair upon perfecting an alibi to the effect that he was "sojouraing" in the Flower State at the time the East Chicago bank robbery was perpetrated.

Court Order Threat
It was in response to Piquett's Fequest for a "pass" to his client's deel-trimmed apartment that Judge Murray dispatched Ell Keseric,
criminal court bailife, to ask Mrs. Holley for the written order.
Keseric came back to report that the sherift was unwilling to let Piquett or anyone else "wear a path" to the desperado's cell "day in, day out."
Thereupon Judge Murray sent her a second request, this time in writing. Mrs. Holley was out to lunch when it was delivered at her effice by Keseric.
"If Mrs. Holley won't give you a written pass," the judge told Piquett, "I'll issue a court order making it possiblo for you to see DilBinger whenever you want."
Piquett explained Booge wanted to see the gunman before returning to Florida to round up other witnesses who, he said, saw and talked with Dillinger in various citles in that plate both before and after the
