Dear Wally:

This will confirm our mutual consent to amend the agreement between us dated April 29, 1959 for publication of two books: JACKDAW ON A CROSS (A SHOOTING STAR) and "the SASKATCHEWAN book" as follows:

Par. 4a shall read as follows: As to the novel: A royalty of 10 per cent of the catalog retail price of all copies sold of said work, less copies returned, on the first 10,000 copies sold, and 15 per cent thereafter; as to the Saskatchewan book: $12\frac{1}{2}$ per cent on the first 10,000 copies sold and 15 per cent thereafter; with the following exceptions:

In all other respects the agreement shall remain unchanged.

This reduction in the royalty rate on the novel is for the purpose of enabling Viking to publish originally at a retail price of \$5.00 (or \$4.95) instead of at the price of \$6.00 (or \$5.95) required by our standard pricing formula for a book of this size at the original royalty rate. It further implies our willingness to estimate our break-even point at 20,000 or more copies instead of 10,000. If, however, we should find that the advance sale justifies a first printing of 30,000 or more copies, the 15% rate shall begin at 7500 copies instead of at 10,000; and for each 5000 copies in the first printing beyond 30,000, the rate shall be increased to $12\frac{1}{2}\%$ instead of 10% on 2500 copies out of the first 7500, until the original rate is regained.

Your signature on the enclosed duplicate copy of this letter will confirm your acceptance of this amendment.
